Rains Continue To Splash Area



Some Farms Receive Hail

The crop outlook in the Hart area appears to still be bright, despite persisting rainfall totaling more than six inches since last week.

Some heavy hail damage was reported about eight miles northwest of town, toward Dimmitt. About 300 acres of cotton were reported ruined Saturday afternoon as the hailstorm covered about 10 sections.

But in the immediate Hart community, a local gin operator said "right now crops look in real good shape."

"Our prospects here look good in cotton and grain both," the ginner added. He seemed to think damp weather could cause insects to attack cotton, and that farmers are ready for muddy fields to dry so they can combat the thriving weeds.

Some hail fell on potato crops, but were damaged very little, noted a local grain operator. He also asserted that "as a whole around Hart, things are in pretty fair condition for this time of year."

Farmers northwest of town reporting hail damage were Ray Clark, Jimmy Bostick, Ronnie Farris, Paul Brooks and S.R. Hutto.

The bride was attired in a white bridal gown fashioned with three-quarter length sleeves. White accessories accented the bridal gown.


