It Was Too Cold **For Polar Bear Hunt To Last Very Long**

Hunting down and killing a Polar Bear in Alaska is no job at all---if you're lucky and if you can take 52-belowzero cold.

That's the word from Jim Height, a Hart man who ought to know.

Jim has a den full of hunting trophies as a result of his long-time hobby.

One of the most striking is the fur of a Polar Bear. Jim has turned that one into a rug that covers an area of 10 by 10 feet.

He likes to kid about that

bear. "This one's kinda little," he jests, "you ought to have seen his mama."

Actually, the bear, which weighed 2,000 pounds, was so old he'd lost his teeth. Jim had some false teeth made up for the head.

Is a Polar Bear hunt a hard one?

This one wasn't, says Jim. "You know, we flew out of Kotzebue, Alaska, and we were back in a flat three hours."

It happened in March of 1959.

"Brother, you're wrong if you don't think 52 below isn't cold," says Jim.

The den at the Height home is a hunter's dream. Jim, who has hunted in Alaska on four different occasions, has the heads of a couple of moose, antelope, deer, a Dahl sheep and a Caribou, along with others. He's hunted extensively in Texas, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and other states.

His favorite rifle is a 30-0-6, which he says he always uses. "I guess I'd take this one along if I went rabbit hunting,"

Jim laughs. Mrs. Height has accompanied

her husband on many hunting trips, but she leaves the hunting to Jim. "I've never shot a thing." she says.

New Teacher

Jim and a couple of guides left Kotzebue in two planes about 9 a.m. and flew out about 150 miles to the Bering Sea, not far from the coast of Siberia.

One plane was used as a hunter along the way. Once the bear was spotted, Jim's plane landed. He fired one shot and the bear was dead.

"It got him right in the neck," Jim says.

Ballots will be mailed to eligible producers Aug. 24 and should be returned to the ASC office by Sept. 11.



Flame Cultivation Tours Are Set Friday At HPRF

Results from flame cultivation control of weeds will be viewed and explained during tours at the High Plains Research Foundation Friday afternoon Aug. 10 at the Foundation's research farm at Halfway, located 14 miles west of Plainview. The Texas Butane Dealers Association sponsors the tours.
