Leaders Set Drive Aug. 20-25

Grain sorghum leaders throughout Castro County mapped plans this week to assure the continued economic future for the County's largest acreage crop - grain sorghum.

C.W. Anthony, president of the Castro County Grain Sorghum Producers Association, and other local leaders earlier participated in a directors', officers' and leaders' planning session at the organization headquarters in Amarillo.

Anthony said that the week of Aug. 20-25 has been set for concentrated information and education efforts in Castro County, along with an increased membership drive.

Directors and community leaders in the west half of Castro County will meet for breakfast and a planning session at the Steak House Restaurant in Dimmitt, at 7 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 21. A similar activity for the eastern half of the county will be held at 7 a.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 22 in Lilly's Cafe in Hart.

Anthony reported that a vigorous program of domestic and foreign market development activities as well as expanded efforts in research, and membership service during 1963, are being projected by the association. The program promises to add to the economic value of grain sorghum in Castro and other High Plains counties when supported and implemented by local farmers, through the association.

Castro County, with 144,000 acres expected to be harvested from its 201,000 acre base, yielding an average of 4600 pounds per acre, promises to add at least \$12,000,000 to the area economy.

Ed Bennett of Hart, GSPA secretary-treasurer, indicated that Castro County grain sorghum farmers' participation in the research, market development and service program, calls for an investment on their part of only \$11,000 based on the present proposed association budget.

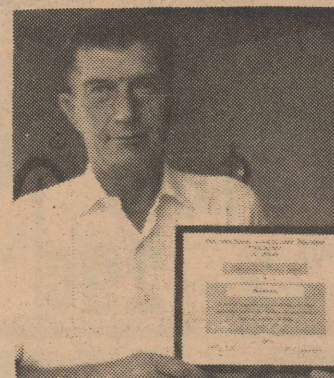

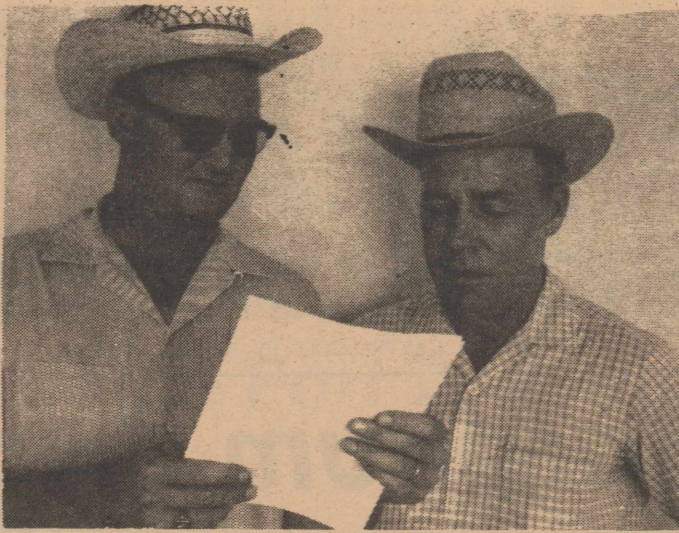

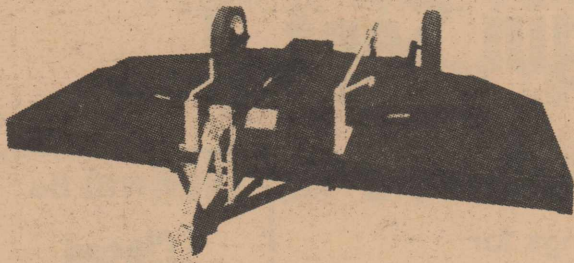

Stocks, Bonds Are Not Same

When you buy a share of stock, you own an interest in every single thing a firm has; when you buy one of its bonds, you don't own any part of the company. The bond or debenture is merely a promise to pay.

Suppose out of 1,000 shares outstanding, you own one share. Then you have an undivided one-thousandth share in the company, not in any particular thing but in every piece.

When you buy a bond, you own no part of the company. The firm promises to pay the loan back when the bond matures.

As a rule, bondholders have little say directly about the firm or how it pick its officers and managers its business. Of course, lenders exercise indirect influence since they must have confidence in the firm and its management before they will part with their money.

Bondholders get their interest before any stockbroker gets his dividends; and should the firm go broke, they get paid out of its assets before the stockholders get a nickel.

Preferred stock, as a rule, yields fixed dividends before the common stockholders get anything, but preferred stock dividends are payable only if declared by the corporation.

As a rule, common stockholders risk more and therefore stand to make greater profit (or loss).
