Homecoming Activities Slated

Hart's Longhorns, after scrapping tough Springlake in a hard-fought battle, play host to the Dew Deal Lions here Friday night at 7:30 in the homecoming game.

The Hart record stood at 1-1 this week after the Longhorns fell to Springlake 19-0.

Heavily favored Springlake was forced to put on an extra burst to edge the battling Hart eleven, as the Longhorns kept the game close all the way.

The Wolverines scored in the second period when Richard Mitchell ran three yards for a TD. It stayed at 6-0 until the fourth quarter.

Quarterback Jerry Been ran five yards for the second Springlake touchdown, then passed to Jerry Sanders on a play that covered 70 yards for the third Wolverine score. Terry Latham kicked the extra point after the third score.

Hart Quarterback Joe Rubalcaba came through with a sparkling 70-yard run late in the fourth period, but Springlake held at the 20. Earlier in the game, Dennis McLain got off on a 30-yard run.

Billy Farris and Johnny Kittrell were defensive standouts for Hart.

Springlake gained 271 net yards for the night, while Hart picked up 122.

"I thought we played well on defense," Coach Dub Cleveland said this week as the Longhorns prepared to meet New Deal.

The Lions outscored Lazbudie last Friday night, 35-22, with Fullback Jimmy Barrington scoring four touchdowns, one on a 48-yard run. The New Deal record is now 2-0, including a victory the previous Friday night over Cooper, 15-0. Barrington scored both touchdowns in that victory.

Hart had beaten Canyon B in its opener, 12-0, with Rubalcaba getting both touchdowns.

1st Bale Ginned Olton Man Wins Contest

First cotton of the year for Hart rolled into Hart of the Plains Gin Saturday from the W.H. (Bill) Sharp farm eight miles northeast of Hart.

The 440-pound bale was ginned Friday at 5 p.m. and placed on display in front of Farmers State Bank.

Gin Manager L.J. Rice said the bale was ginned from 1800 pounds of raw cotton. Seed total was 750 pounds.

The gin paid Sharp 50 cents a pound for the cotton, \$100 a ton for the seed and gave free ginning, wrapping and ties.

The cotton was Gregg variety and was pulled from five acres. Twelve hands worked 3 1/2 hours to pull the 1800 pounds.

Sharp planted the crop on April 17 after watering once before planting. The crop was watered once after planting.
