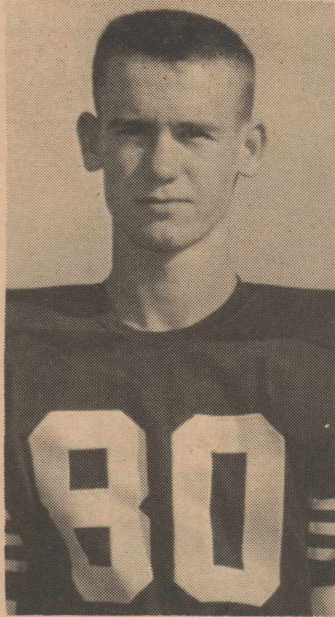


Hart Tries Kress After New Deal Loss

Snags TD Pass

Hart's Longhorns go against arch-rival Kress here Friday at 8 p.m., with both teams trying to break two-game losing streaks.

Both the Longhorns and the Kangaroos have met defeat the past two weeks after winning their openers.

Hart lost a heart-breaker to New Deal here last Friday night, 16-14, spoiling some of the fun at homecoming. Kress, meanwhile, was dropping a 16-6 decision to Petersburg.

Kress will enter Friday night's battle as the favorite. Kress won last year's battle, while Hart was the winner in 1960.

Mike Freeman has been a top ground gainer for the Kangaroos all year, and he's expected to lead the Kress attack against Hart. Freeman scored on a 55-yard run in the Kress opening win over Anton, proving he's a breakaway threat. After

beating Anton, 18-0, Kress fell to Turkey, 18-6, and to Petersburg.

The Longhorns will counter with a balanced backfield which features the running of Johnny Kittrell, Dennis McLain and Billy Farris, and the throwing of Quarterback Joe Rubalcaba.

In last week's loss to New Deal, Rubalcaba connected on touchdown passes to Farris and End Carl Ward as the Longhorns almost pulled off a victory against the Lions. A field goal in the last 45 seconds gave New Deal the victory.

New Deal got off to a fast start against the Longhorns with Halfback Randy Peoples leading the way. In the first period, he ran 29 yards to the Hart 21, then he hit Kenneth Boothe with a pass to the four. On the next play Peoples drove across. After he kicked the extra point, New Deal led, 7-0.

Hart came right back, how-

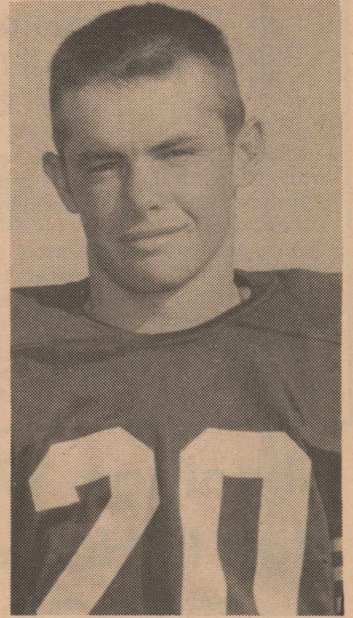
ever, getting three quick first downs as the Longhorns moved to the Lion 20. There, Rubalcaba flipped a pass to End Ward, who took it on the three and whipped across for a six-pointer.

Farris ran the extra points and Hart enjoyed an 8-7 half-time lead.

Early in the fourth period, New Deal's Jimmy Barrington ran 15 yards for a score and the Lions roared ahead, 13-8.

Hart came right back on the strength of a 70-yard kick-off return by Kittrell. With the ball resting at the Lion 26, the Longhorns drove on down to the 10, where Rubalcaba hit Farris with a pass for Hart's go-ahead TD. Hart led, 14-13, with six minutes left.

But New Deal drove back, picking up four first downs to the Hart 11. There, Peoples stepped back and booted the winning field goal with 45 seconds left in the game.

A RAINY DAY IN HART---Farm activity came to a standstill here Tuesday as wet weather set in. Streets were muddy, skies were dreary as slow rains totaled some two inches in the Hart area. Farmers awaited clear skies to resume the grain harvest and get the cotton harvest under way. The weather began to clear Wednesday.

Slow Rains Here Total Two Inches

Slow, steady rains in Hart Monday and Tuesday left around two inches of moisture over most of the area.

Jimmy Davis, eight miles north of Hart, reported 1.80 inches of rain. Mrs. Davis said, "As long as the wind doesn't blow, there will be no damage."

Jim Brooks, six miles north and one east, reported "over one inch."

On the Dean Sanders and

Glenn Reed farms, two miles east of Hart, two inches were reported.

Five and a half miles west, V.E. Beardon reported "over one inch." He said there was no damage except to postpone the harvest.

Hart of the Plains Gin reported 1.60 inches and Hart Producer's Co-Op Gin reported "over two inches of rain."

Cheatham Will Represent Hart In Heritage Program

H.L. Cheatham has been selected to represent Hart public schools on the steering committee for the Plains American Heritage Program in which 11 area cities participate. First meeting of the committee will be at 6:30 p.m. Monday Oct. 1 in the Heritage Room of Van Howeling Memorial Library at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview.

Serving as alternate will be W.L. Cleveland, Hart, according to school officials making the appointments.

The Steering Committee will make plans for the poster, essay and project competitions conducted annually among students of each school and will also plan monthly meetings for the purpose of exchanging ideas and obtaining information regarding America's heritage.

All social science teachers in the participating school systems are asked to attend the annual kickoff banquet which will be held Oct. 15, according to Lyle C. Brown, assistant professor of history and

political science at Wayland and new director of the American studies program.

Other teachers chosen by school officials to serve on the committee are Clifford Curry, Olton; Eleanor S. Griffin, Plainview, Cotton Center representative; Mrs. Avis Smith, Dimmitt; Kenneth Patterson, Hale Center; Jim Peggram, Plainview, Kress representative; Miss Mary Sutton, Lockney; Kenneth Foster, Petersburg; Walter Edwards, Tulia; Howard Humphrey, Abernathy. Plainview representatives are I.L. Whitfield, Plainview High School, Miss Lucile Flowers, Estacado Junior High School, and James Bottorff, Coronado Junior High School.

The award winning Plains American Heritage Program, in which Olton and Hart have participated the last years, is now entering its fourth year. Last year Wayland, which coordinates the program, was presented a George Washington Honor Medal in the College Campus Category from the Freedoms Foundation, Valley Forge, Pa., in recognition of the program which "emphasizes citizenship to some 13,000 public school students and teachers, some 650 county faculty and uncounted hundreds of parents" in the 11 participating cities.

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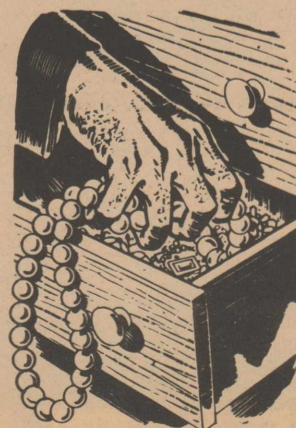

HUSH PUPPIES

- 1/4 cup minced onions
- 1 cup yellow or white corn meal
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon red pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 cup and 2 tablespoons boiling water

Hot fat for frying

Pour boiling water all at once over mixed dry ingredients. Stir thoroughly. Drop from tablespoon into 350 degree deep fat, especially flavored if fried in fat where fish has been fried.

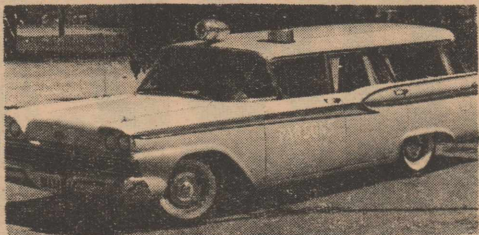
City Council Meeting Held

Next meeting will be held Monday night Oct. 22 at the city hall.

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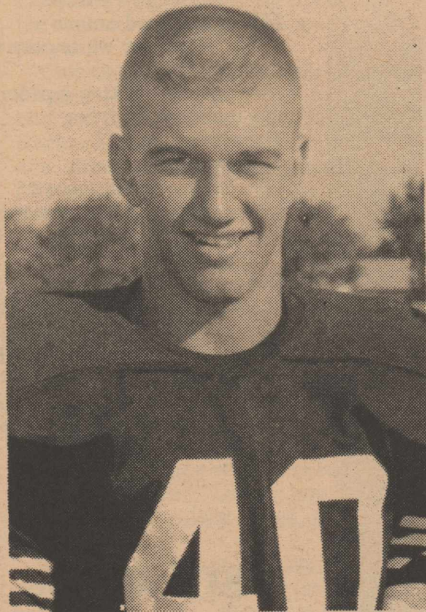

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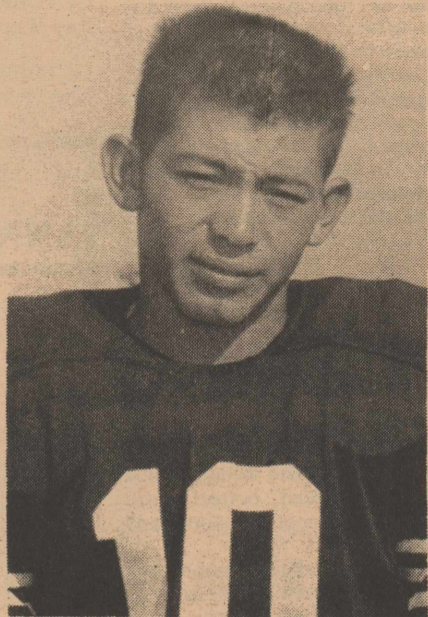
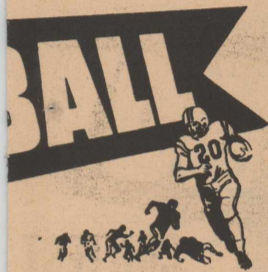

Brain Surgery Risks Reduced By Cooling

"Numb with cold", a common saying, is being put to practical use by modern surgeons.

As an operative technique in neurosurgery, hypothermia (lowering of body temperature to subnormal levels) is being used successfully in Texas, a report in the September issue of the "Texas State Journal of Medicine" reveals. Although it is employed as an anesthetic aid during surgery, it also causes other changes in the brain which make neurosurgery easier for both surgeon and patient.

Changes in the brain which are caused by controlled cooling include shrinkage in its size and reduction of blood pressure. Blood flows more slowly, metabolism is slowed, and less oxygen is consumed. These enable the surgeon to carry out procedures which otherwise would be technically difficult or impossible.

The use of cold as an aid to surgery is not new. Napoleon's military surgeon applied ice on the battlefield to perform painless amputations, and the use of snow and ice water, a local analgesic dates back to the 11th century. In 1939, generalized hypothermia was introduced into practical medicine in the treatment of cancer. More recently, it has attracted wide publicity for its use in heart surgery, and since 1945, controlled lowering of body temperature has been used to reduce the risks of brain surgery.

In an article appearing in the September issue of the Journal, four cases are reported in which successful neurosurgery was performed on patients whose temperatures were reduced to 88 F. These cases summarize problems in which hypothermia "has been helpful and even life-saving."

In the first case the pituitary gland of a 49 year old man was removed. Cooling caused shrinkage of the brain, facilitating exposure of the gland to be removed.

A 17 year old boy is the subject of the second case. He was in excellent health until he had a sudden headache and weakness of one side of his body. Brain surgery was performed under hypothermia and correction of malformed blood vessels was successfully accomplished.

The 35 year old nurse in the third case had a sudden onset of pain at the back of her head. Examination revealed that the wall of an artery in her brain had weakened and dilated to form a small blood-filled sac called a berry aneurysm. The condition was corrected through surgery under hypothermia, and she returned to work in three weeks.

The fourth case concerns a 67 year old man with symptoms similar to those of patients having multiple sclerosis. One artery leading to the brain was completely obstructed and another artery narrowed. Surgery corrected the condition. Because blood circulation to his brain was precarious, hypothermia during surgery gave added protection since it reduced the amount of oxygen needed by the brain.

The method of safely reducing temperature is a very gradual process. It is achieved by using a special blanket which contains coils through which the cooling solution flows. The machine which cools or warms the solution flowing through the blanket coils have sensitive controls for temperature regulation.

A small amount of anesthetic agent, which may be all that is required during a six-hour operative procedure, is administered to the patient as the temperature is being lowered; thus he is kept comfortable and is not allowed to shiver. Not only is shivering unpleasant for the patient but, by increasing cerebral metabolism, it defeats the very purpose of the cooling.

Hypothermia reduces the stress of the operation for the patient, according to the article which states, "Instead of having a 'washed out' appearance after surgery, patients who have undergone hypothermia often react similarly to those who have undergone a minor operation."
