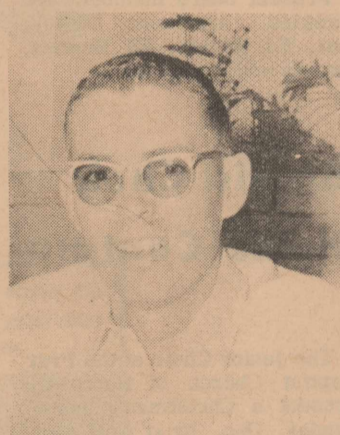
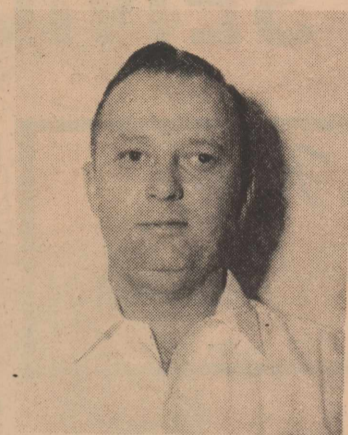
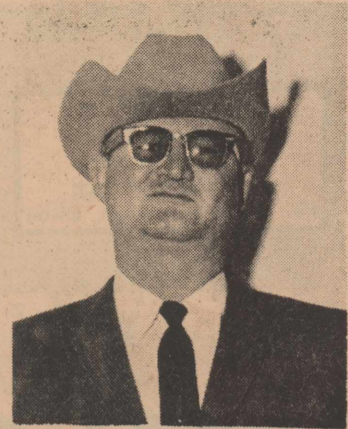

Christmas Recipes Of The Week

CRANBERRY SALAD

1 cup sugar
1 large can crushed pineapple drained
1 cup coarse chopped nuts
2 cups cut up marshmallows
1 pkg. Raspberry Jello

Blend ingredients and let stand while preparing jello. Dissolve one package of raspberry jello in one cup of boiling pineapple juice (if not one cup add water) cool jello until thick, mix with the above and last mix in one pint of whipping cream. Pour into desired molds and chill for several hours.

COCONUT VELVET SALAD

Dissolve 1 pkg. orange jello in one cup hot pineapple juice chill until thickened, add 1 cup milk chill again until slightly thickened fold in three fourths cup cream, whipped and three-fourths cup coconut.

FRUIT COCKTAIL PUDDING

1 cup flour
1 cup white sugar
1 tsp. soda, pinch of salt

1 egg
1 no. 2 can fruit cocktail
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup chopped nuts

Sift dry ingredients three times and add beaten egg, then add fruit cocktail, pour into oiled and floured pan, sprinkle with brown sugar and nuts. Bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool and top with whipped cream. I use more brown sugar and pecans than recipe calls for.

PECAN PATTIES

2 cups white sugar
1 cup brown sugar
2/3 cup corn syrup
1 small can evaporated milk
1/3 cup butter
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup shelled pecans

Combine sugar, corn syrup and milk in heavy sauce pan. Cool until a few drops form a soft ball. Remove from the

heat, add butter, and vanilla, let stand about 10 minutes, add the pecans and heat until creamy. Drop by tsp. on waxed paper and shape into patties.

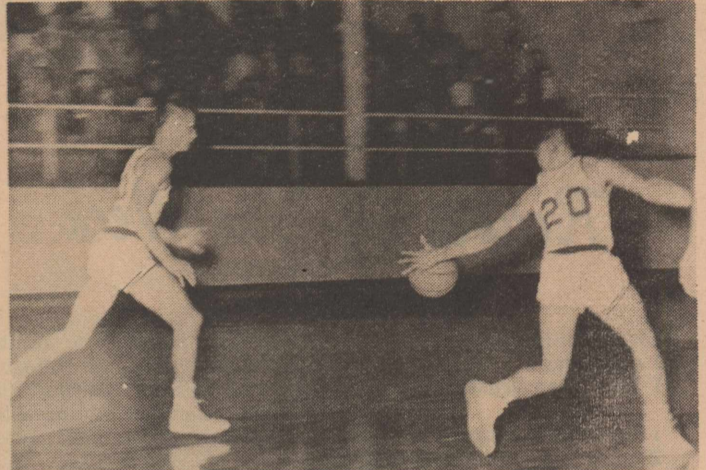
