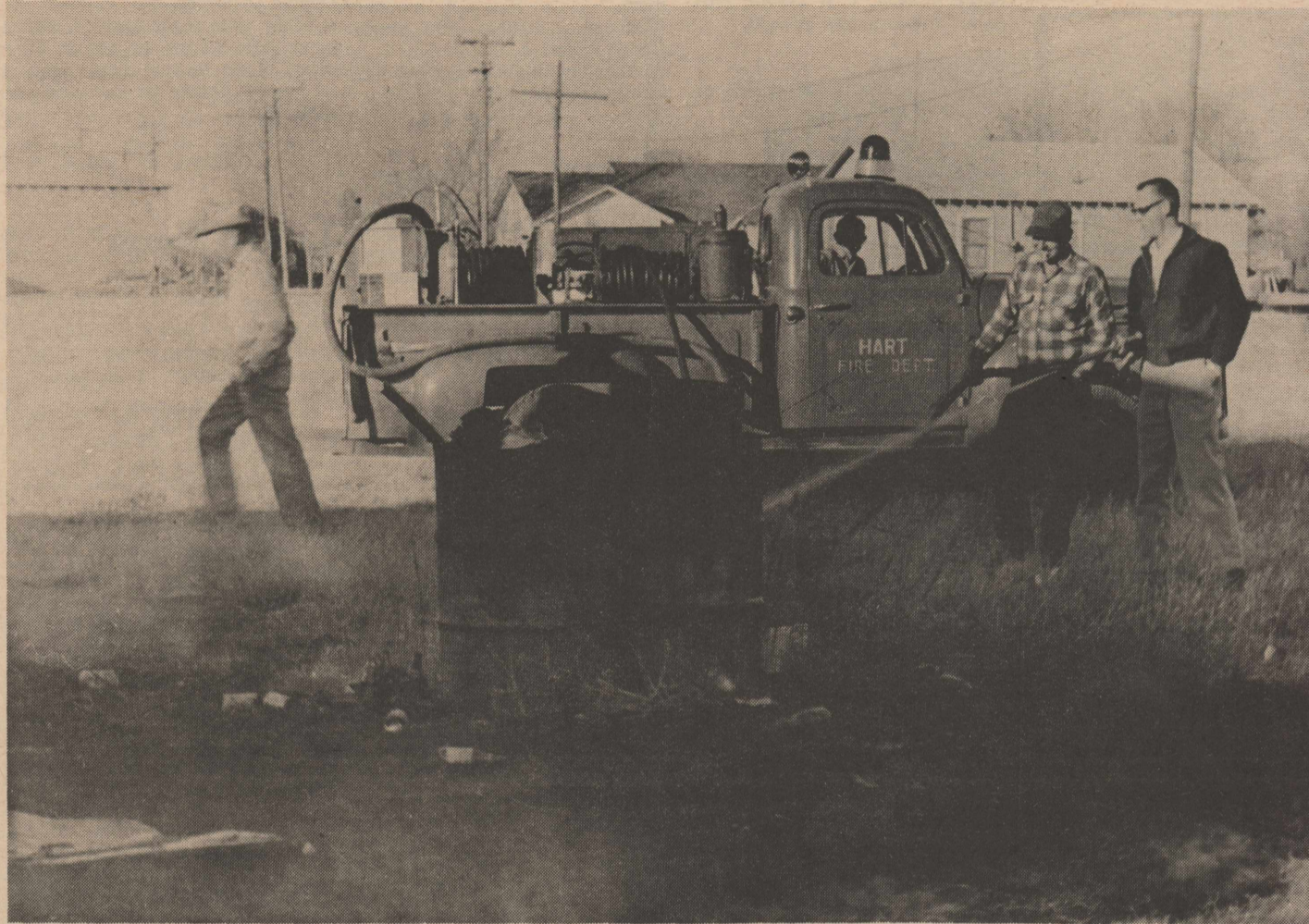

Bond Issue Is Approved At Edmonson

A \$78,000 bond issue for the purpose of providing water and sewer systems was approved by Edmonson voters Saturday.

Two propositions were on the ballot. Proposition No. 1 called for the issuance of \$25,000 in waterworks system tax bonds and was approved by a vote of 18 for and 2 against.

Proposition No. 2 called for a vote on \$53,000 in waterworks system revenue bonds. Vote was 21 for and none against.

Tax Bonds are to mature serially with a maximum maturity date not more than 25 years and at a tax rate not to exceed five per cent.

Maximum maturity dates on revenue bonds are not to exceed 25 years and interest rate not to exceed five per cent.

The bond election was the first held since Edmonson became incorporated late last year.

Election officials were Mrs. J. E. Gardner, presiding judge; Mrs. Bill Pinkerton, assistant judge; Mrs. O. W. Barry and Mrs. Leon Melton, clerks.

Terms of all three members of the commission will expire and Hart will elect a mayor and two commissioners.

Presently serving are Mayor Ed Harris, and commissioners Norlan Dudley and Claud Cox.

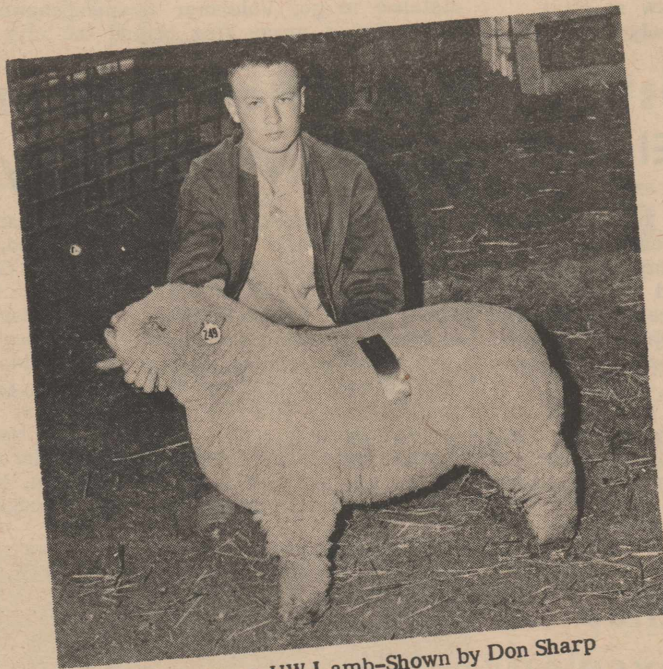

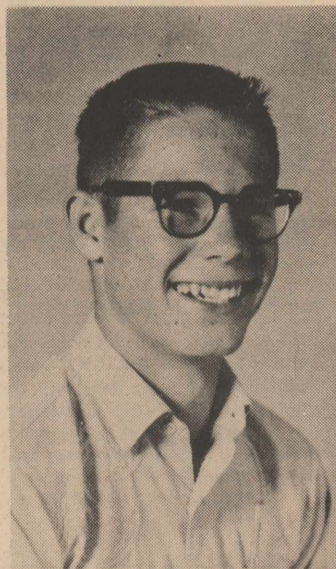

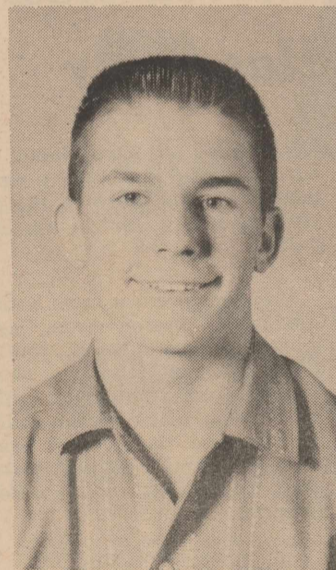

CHERRY CAKE

Sift together into bowl the following ingredients:

- 1 3/4 cup flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt

ADD:

- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 large egg
- 3/4 cup milk

Beat with rotary beater or spoon until smooth. Pour into greased and floured 9" square pan after adding 2 cups well drained cherries (save juice) and 1/2 cup nuts. Bake 30 to 40 minutes.

CLEAR RED SAUCE

Mix together in saucepan:

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch

Stir in gradually:

- 1 cup boiling water
 - 3/4 cup juice from cherries
- Boil 1 minute stirring constantly. Keep hot until time to serve.

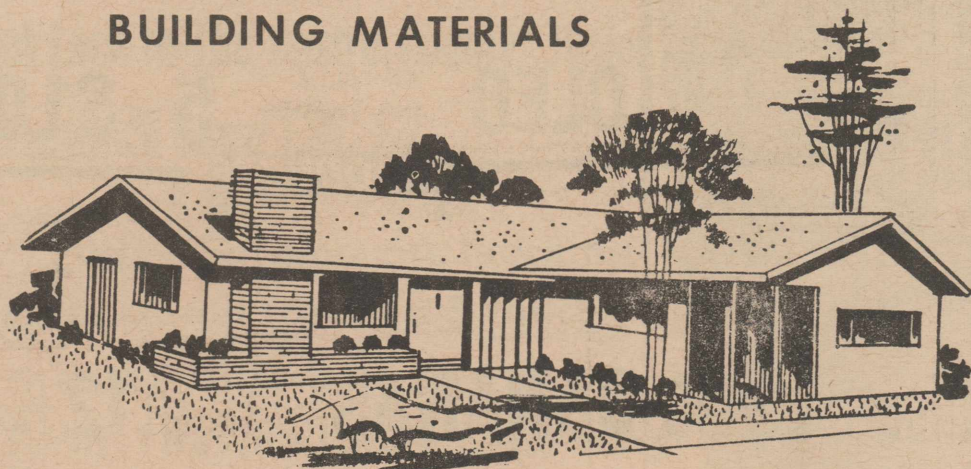

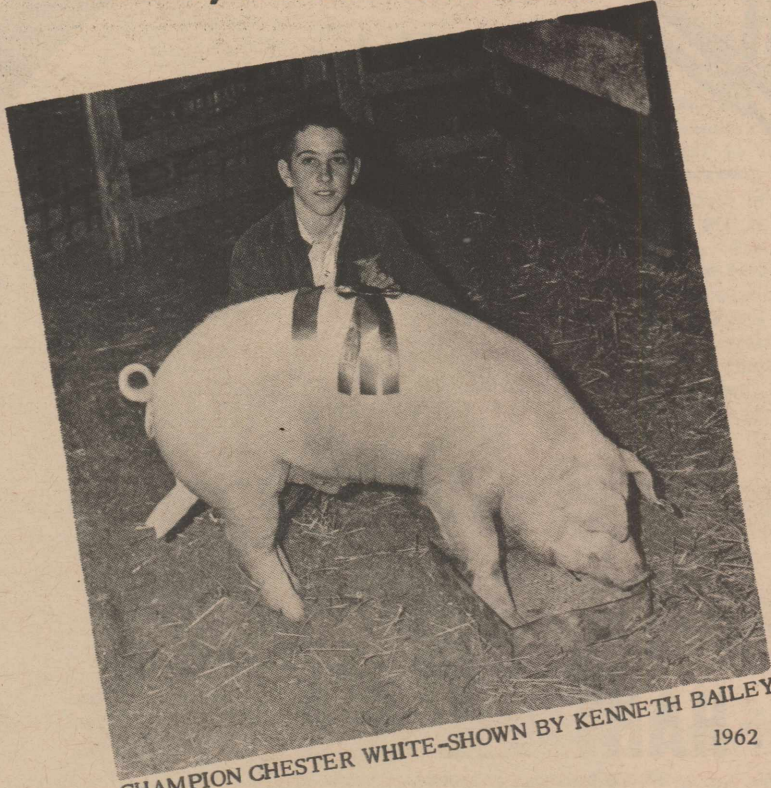
