Flu Epidemic Closes School

Hart schools closed Tuesday afternoon after an influenza epidemic struck the city and over 80 students reported out sick Tuesday morning.

Total enrollment of the Hart school is 525.

Eight teachers were also unable to make classes Tuesday.

Two of the instructors, Mrs. Warren Lemons and Mrs. Eddy Nicholson, are in the hospital.

Superintendent Paul Kennedy said Wednesday that he hoped classes would resume Monday.

He said the absences had started the last week or two and "it seemed to really take hold over the weekend."

"This reminds me of the flu back in 1918 and 1919", he said. "We've got whole families here that are down with it."

A local doctor described the sickness as a type of Asian flu and noted that the flu itself was not usually dangerous. He added that the complications can be severe.

Symptoms are a headache, a general feeling of illness, high temperature, body aching and a dry cough.



PECAN SUGAR COOKIES

2 eggs
3/4 cup sugar
2/3 cup wesson oil
2 tsp. vanilla
2 cups flour
1 tsp. lemon flavoring
1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. baking powder

Beat eggs with fork, stir in Wesson Oil, and flavorings. Blend in sugar until mixture thickens. Sift in dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoonfuls on ungreased cookie sheet. Stamp each cookie flat with bottom of greased cookie dipped in sugar. Dip in the sugar for each cookie. Put a pecan half on each cookie and bake in hot oven until lightly browned.

Grain Sorghum Officers Told

C. W. Anthony will head the Castro County Grain Sorghum Producers Association as President during 1963. The Castro County farmer was elected at a County-wide meeting of the producer group last week, at which speakers challenged local grain growers to step up their interest in local livestock feeding and

other outlets, and to become more interested in foreign and domestic policies affecting their own pocketbook.

Other officers of the Castro County group for 1963 elected at the meeting are: Vice-President, Edd Bennett of Hart, secretary-treasurer J. R. Brown of Dimmitt.

Sam Thomas, agriculture development director of Southwestern Public Service Company, said that the expansion of commercial cattle feedlots with capacities of 1000 head from 72 in 1956 to 145 now, indicates the rapid yet healthy rate of expansion of utilization of grain through livestock in the area. He encouraged local farmers and grain handlers to take an active interest in the end

use of their principal commodity-grain sorghum, and pointed out that grain fed within the County where it is produced adds two to three times its value to the local economy than when it is utilized elsewhere.

The fact that immediate knowledge on the part of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association that area far income was destined to be lowered through changes in the administrative interpretation of the 1963 Emergency Feed Grain Program, back in November, 1963, was credited with the group's being able to obtain changes which resulted in restoring farm income through the 9 cents per hundred increase in price support which was announced by Secretary Freeman on December 10, 1962. In reporting this, Nolan Chandler, Agricultural Assistant of GSPA, went on to point out that the Association is carrying on vigorous programs both at home and abroad leading to more orderly expansion of grain sorghum's use and availability. He mentioned specific examples of needed attention if additional markets are to be had in the Arizona-California cattle feeding area, and the vast poultry feeding district of the Southeast United States.

In giving direction to the

Association for its legislative activities through the coming months, local farmers wanted.
