## Temperatures Drop To Zero

### Shepard Injured

Roland Shepard, Hart ginner, was taken to a hospital in Dimmitt Saturday morning after he was injured in an auto accident here.

Shepard was reported to have head injuries.

The accident occurred about 1:30 a.m. Saturday morning on State Highway 194 in Hart.

Shepard was driving a 1961 Chevrolet pickup. The pickup, traveling north, collided with an ICX freight truck, driven by Austin Patterson, Wichita Falls. The freight truck was going east on the highway.

According to Highway Patrolman Noel Carter, the Shepard vehicle attempted to cross the highway and was struck on the left side by the freight truck.

The Shepard pickup was described as a total loss. Damages to the freight truck were estimated at \$200.

Freezing temperatures, snow and ice kept students out of school Monday.

A blizzard Sunday night brought winds up to 40 miles per hour and dumped approximately four inches of snow on the area.

The precipitation started soon after noon Sunday in the form of a drizzle. About 4:30 in the afternoon snow started to fall. By nightfall heavy wet flakes were covering everything above ground but melting on pavement.

By 10 p.m. Sunday night stiff winds were blowing the snow into deep drifts and visibility on highways was near zero.

Numerous motorists were stranded on roads throughout the area. All were apparently rescued.

Temperatures dropped to 12 degrees Monday morning, 8 degrees Tuesday morning and down to zero Wednesday morning.

Another two to three inches of snow were dumped on the area Monday night.

This snow fell on top of a snow and ice coat remaining from Sunday night's storm. Temperatures melted practically none of the snow Monday.

By Tuesday afternoon most streets were passable but travel on highways remained hazardous.

Most Hart school children were unable to enjoy their holiday Monday.

As one person put it: "Most everyone has either got the flu or is just getting over it."

The snowman, usually quite in evidence after snow storms, was a scarce item in Hart Monday.

Two Hart Cafes were burglarized sometime last Thursday night, but neither lost any cash.

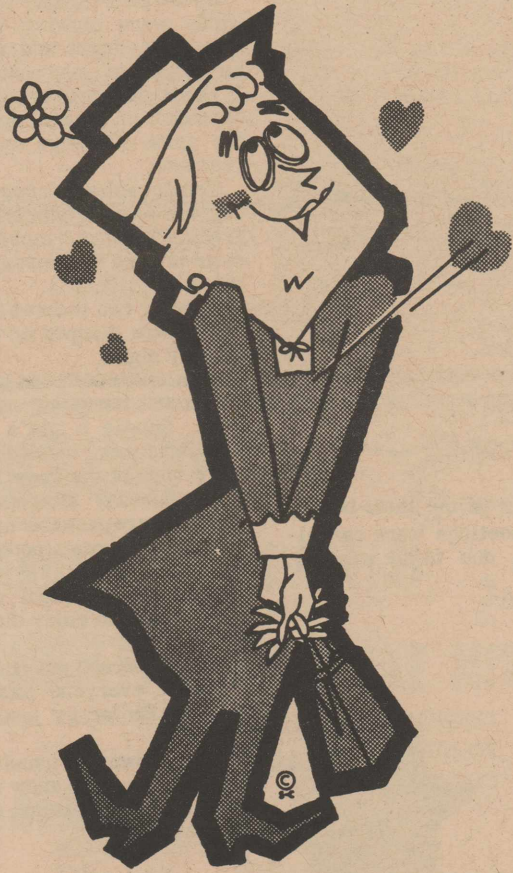
The burglars took only cigarettes at both places---Lilly's Cafe and Green Frog Cafe---Deputy Sheriff Granville Martin reported.

## Recipe Of The Week

### ITALIAN SPAGETTI SAUCE

2 lb. lean hamburger meat  
 1 small onion  
 1 cup diced celery  
 3 tbs. shortening  
 1 cup stuffed olives  
 1 medium can mushroom buttons.  
 2 cans tomato paste  
 2 cans tomato sauce  
 1 pod garlic  
 Salt and pepper to taste  
 2 cups water or more to desired consistency for sauce

Brown meat, onions, and celery in shortening. Add olives, mushrooms, tomato paste and tomato sauce. Tie garlic in cloth bag and add to sauce.

Salt and pepper to taste and add enough water to make sauce. Cover and cook over medium heat 45 minutes to one hour;

add more water if needed while cooking. Remove garlic bag. Serve over cooked spaghetti or add to individual servings of cooked spaghetti. The remaining sauce will freeze well. This is also good with combination salad and hot garlic bread.

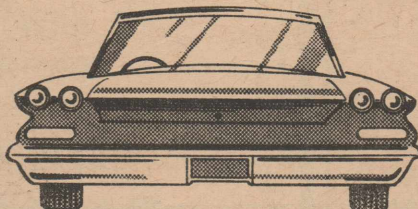

AUSTIN, Tex.—Lawyers are wondering if the Texas Senate really passed a constitutional amendment resolution proposing that the voters give women equal rights.

Records show that this resolution passed the Senate 26-5. But it also shows that the Senate voted down an amendment which would have made it clear that the purpose of the proposal was to repeal all laws on the statute books which treat women differently from men.

When courts interpret the laws and the constitution, legislative intent is what they must determine. Records now show that the legislative intent of the Senate was not to repeal all the discriminatory laws about women.

This proposal, by Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan, has been defeated in the Senate many times before.

It now goes to the House of Representatives, which has PASSED it many times before.

**TEXAS SELLS ITSELF**—Legislators' proposals to add such slogans as "Lone Star State" and "Texas Has Everything" to auto license plates haven't found favor with Dewitt Greer, chief engineer for the State Highway Department.

"T-E-X-A-S is the only slogan this state needs," Greer told the House Appropriations Committee. He added that more wording on car tags just means additional expense.

"All law enforcement of-

ficers will tell you," Greer explained, "that the readability of the rest of the plate is lessened if you crowd in slogans."

**PARKS-HIGHWAY TIE IN**—Greer testified before the same committee during hearings on a bill by Rep. David Haines of Bryan to put state parks under the Highway Commission's jurisdiction.

Greer made it clear that his commission is not seek an extra job. But he stated, "If you gave us the parks to administer, we would do an outstanding job of it."

Haines' proposal is an alternative to Gov. John Connally's suggestion that the Parks Board be combined with the Game and Fish Commission.

Rep. Haines said he thought Greer's agency could and should take over the parks, and make each highway district responsible for the parks in its district.

"If the parks were improved," Haines stated, "it would increase highway travel, which would increase gas consumption. And that would increase the gas taxes to the highway commission, so they would have a high stake in doing a good job."

**DEATH OF POLL TAX?**—If the rest of the Senate feels like the Senate committee on constitutional amendments, the poll tax may be on its way to extinction.

Committee gave a nine-to-two approval of Laredo Sen. Abraham Kazen's bill to submit to the people a constitutional amendment that would kill the poll tax as of February 1, 1965.

The two "no" votes in committee came from Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas and Sen. Galloway Calhoun Jr. of Tyler.

"Ayes" came from Sens. Kazen, Charles Herring of Austin, Roy Harrington of Port Arthur, Don Kennard of Fort Worth, Culp Krueger of El Campo, Walter Richter of Gonzales, Aaron Schwartz of Galveston, Franklin Spears of San An-

tonio and Jack Strong of Longview.

If Kazen's bill passes the full legislature, voters would make the final decision in the 1964 general election. So far, every state that has voted on the federal constitutional amendment to do away with poll taxes, except Mississippi, has voted to drop it.

**"COLOR-BLIND" TAX**—Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth introduced a bill to make the poll tax "color blind."

Green called the race notation on voter registration forms useless and outmoded. Further more, "It is an additional bar to full citizenship."

He believes his bill will pass with little opposition, but there are many who consider the race notation a necessary aid to voter identification.

**ANTI-POLLUTION BILL**—A bill to give a county health officer the power to enter and check business establishments and manufacturing plants "To discover threats to the public health" from air or water pollution was revived by Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston. He failed to get it passed in previous sessions.

Governor Connally is supporting the new bill.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL DONATIONS OPPOSED**—Contributions from oil companies to finance investigations by the attorney general to see if competitor's oil wells are slanted would be outlawed under a bill introduced by Rep. Ben Barnes of DeLeon.

Nearly \$300,000 in contributions from major—and some minor—oil companies was used by former Atty. Gen. Will Wilson to make such surveys in East Texas.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr told Representative Barnes that the \$80,000 recently appropriated by the legislature will be sufficient for his investigations.

So Barnes filed a proposal which would make it illegal for

the attorney general to accept money from anyone to investigate or prosecute anything.

**PARENTAL PAY PLAN**—Fifty per cent of a man's weekly wages could be attached to pay child support if Tyler Rep. Ben Jarvis' bill becomes a constitutional amendment.

**COUNTY UNIT CHANGE PROPOSED**—Rep. George T. Hinson of Mineola thinks it's time someone started doing something about "modernizing county government." So he has introduced a bill to require county commissioners to be elected by the county at large.

Each county precinct would have to put up resident candidates, which, Hinson explained, would assure continued local representation through pooled knowledge of each precinct's problems, and prevent the largest community from filling a commissioners court with its own residents.

Hinson believes his county-at-large election plan would get commissioners from all precincts to work at all times for the best interests of the entire county.

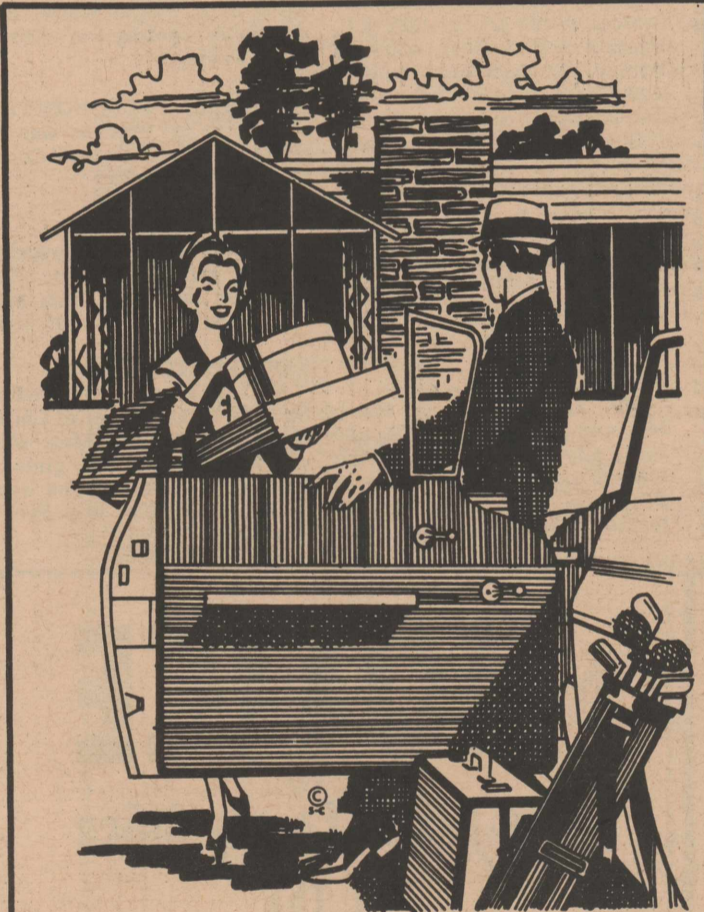
If his bill becomes law, Hinson sees it as a forerunner to eventual, economical pooling of the resources—capital, road machinery, manpower and equipment—of all a county's precincts into one central unit.

**DO 'EYES' HAVE IT?**—A proposal by Rep. Bill Walker of Cleveland that the state song be changed from "Texas, Our Texas" to "The Eyes of Texas" has been referred to a study subcommittee which includes no Texas exes.

Subcommittee chairman Gene Hendryx of Alpine is a Sul Ross graduate. One member, Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth, finished at T.C.U., and the third member is an ex-Aggie—Rep. Richard C. Slack of Pecos.

Some interested legislators have suggested that the "Eyes of Texas" might be made more

palatable if the opening bars of the "Aggie War Hymn" were added.

But a state association of music clubs has indicated that the Aggies aren't the only ones opposed to a change of the state anthem.

**A&M DIRECTORS NAMED**--An ex-Aggie, a "Harvard man," and a graduate of Case Institute of Technology were named by Governor Connally to six-year terms on Texas A & M College's Board of directors.

L. F. (Pete) Peterson of Fort Worth, recently named president of A&M's Former Students Association; Gardiner Symonds, head of Tennessee Gas Transmission Company of Houston, who received a master's degree from Harvard; and Case graduate Dr. A. P. Beutel, director of Dow Chemical Company, are Connally's nominations.

Senate will vote on seven other college board appointments this week. But the date it will consider the A&M appointments has not been set.

**BEACH BEHAVIOR**--"We have a terrible situation in regard to littering on Padre Island," says Nueces County Judge Noah

Kennedy.

Kennedy and two other Corpus Christi officials appeared before a House committee to speak in favor of a bill by Rep. James Lattimore of Corpus Christi which would allow Gulf Coast counties to regulate speeding and littering on public beaches.

**UNION SUES TEC**--A suit against the Texas Employment Commission has been filed by the AFL-CIO.

Labor union accuses three TEC commissioners and four employees of "pro-employer lobbying."

Petition also alleges use of state funds for research and preparation of pro-employer amendments to the State Unemployment Compensation Act.

"These actions violate state law prohibiting state employees from influencing legislation or legislators," claims the union.

Sen. Culp Krueger of El Campo, sponsor of one of the TEC bills, says the suit is just another AFL-CIO smoke screen to hide the real issue--which is their opposition to the appointment of J. E. Lyles as labor's representative on the commission.

**LBJ LAW HIT**--Rep. O. H. (Ike) Harris (R-Dallas) has introduced a bill to repeal the so-called "Lyndon Johnson law".

Present law permits a candidate's name to appear on the ballot twice, thus permitting him to run for two offices at the same time.

**CONVICT LABOR**--Use of prison labor to improve state parks is under consideration.

This fact was brought out in a legislative hearing of the House Appropriations Committee.

Dr. George Beto, director of the Texas Department of Corrections, was asked about the prospect of using convicts to clean up and repair parks buildings. He replied that prison officials already are considering this.

**CARR DISCUSSES PROSECUTIONS**--Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Polk County Dist. Atty. Sam Freas have held preliminary discussions toward possible state-county coordination of prosecutions for graft in Polk County.

Carr said the Polk County official has asked for help in prosecuting indictments returned by the county grand jury against four county commissioners and a county judge for malfeasance of office.

**SECURITIES EXAMS**---Securities dealers and salesmen will have to pass a written exam to get a license if a bill by Rep. Gene Fondren of Taylor becomes law.

**SADLER SAVES FUNDS**--Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler says he is doing more work for less money.

Sadler has written the chairman of the Senate finance and House appropriations committees that he is asking \$82,000 less for 1964-65 operations than the present budget.

**SULPHUR PINCH**--Sulphur industry spokesmen have asked for a tax cut to help them fight competition from Louisiana, Mexico and elsewhere.

After hearing three Texas sulphur producers tell of declining sales, closed mines,

worker layoffs and shrinking dividends, the House Taxation Committee assigned three members to make further study.

A bill proposing a cut of 37 cents per-long-ton in the Texas severance tax, now \$1.40, would equalize the rate with Louisiana.

Rep. Bill Walker of Cleveland is author of the bill for a \$1.03-per-ton rate.

**DANIEL APPOINTEE REJECTED**---Texas Senate has rejected confirmation of former House member Joe Ed Winfree of Houston as a member of the State Board of Control.

This action removed the veteran legislator from the office he has held the past seven months.

Senate was behind closed doors for an hour and 35 minutes. They confirmed a long list of Daniel appointees, plus some by Governor Connally. Winfree's was the only one turned down.

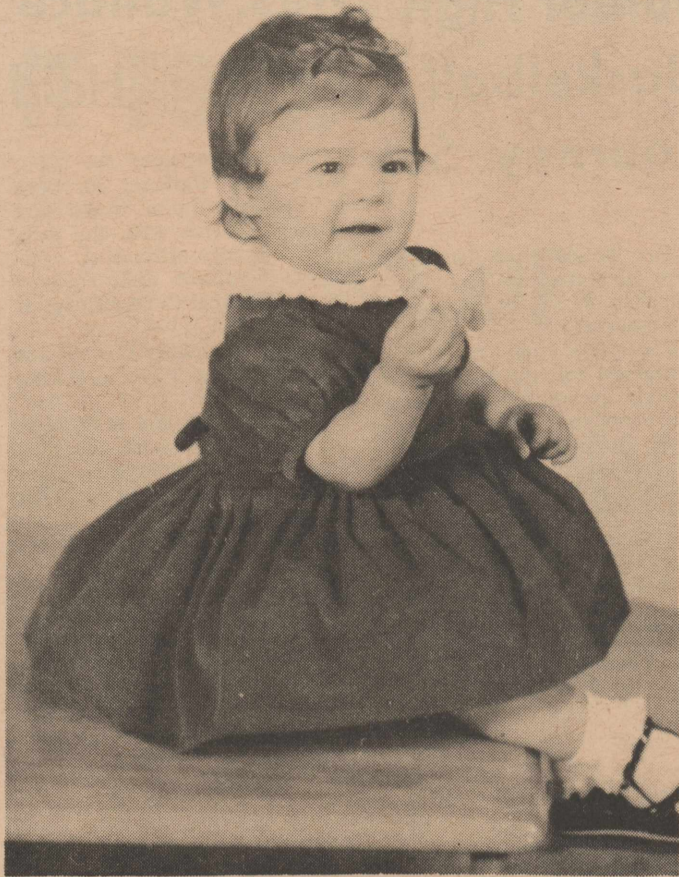
