Is it really going to hurt anything for you to take your child out of school for just one day?

NUMBER 34

Paul Kennedy, school superintendent, answered this question this week by noting:

"Let me state that your child attendance in school is important to the child as he accomplishes more by being in re-gular attendance. It is more important to the child than it is to the school."

He added, however, that tea-chers are earned in public schools in Texas by the attendance of the pupils in the schools called the Average Daily Attendance or ADA.

If a school earns less than 20 teachers, that school is allotted part-time principals and no special service teachers.

If they earn the 20 teachers, the high school principal is not counted as a teacher and is free to devote his time to administrative duties.

Besides the principal, the school is alloted special service teachers such as libraries, nurses and others, which are free to the school, as the state pays all of their salary.

To earn 20 teachers, a school must have an average daily attendance of 488.

The first half of this school year, Hart school earned 496 ADA, above the number needed for the 20 teachers.

"However, during the re-cent epidemic," Kennedy said, "we had an alarming number of absences. We did earn, for an 11-day period of school,443 ADA, which is far below the 488 needed for the last half year."

Speaking on financial bene-fits of attendance, Kennedy said:

"If the principal is free to the school, there is one free teacher to take his place. The special teacher is free to the school and we would earn two extra teachers, thereby making a total of four extra teachers added to our school at no cost to the school district."

He noted that a beginning teacher, with no experience, in Texas earns \$4014 per year. "If we multiply four times \$4014, that would make a total

of \$14,056 or a minimum amount that would benefit the school." He commented that the school

is using the four extra teachers r but the local district

is paying them. "If we could earn the teachers by attendance," Kennedy said, "then the district would have that money to improve the phy-sical facilities of our school." In order to comply with this. the school will need an attendance of approximately 96 percent.

Hart schools now have 527 pupils enrolled. "It is readily understandable

that your child's attendance is important," he said.

"It could be that one day out to go shopping could cost your child extra teachers and the school over \$16,000. Keep your child in school," Kennedy concludes.

Census Roll Nearly Completed

Census roll for the year is almost completed in Hart, according to Paul Kennedy, superintendent of schools.

Over 525 students have been enumerated on the roll at present with a few outstanding. Kennedy said they have enumerated 46 pre-schoolers, children who will start to school

in the 1963-64 school year. "We know that we will not find all of these six years olds, however," he said, "if the parents have not signed a census blank and the children have not contacted the schools."

He added that it is important to the child since the school plans a pre-school day, which

most children look forward to attending in the spring.







salt, gradually add to boiling water, stirring constantly.



Bring to boil, simmer over low heat 6 to 8 minutes stirring often. Remove from heat add 1/2 cup hot mixture to egg yolks, blend warm egg mixture into cornstarch mixture cook over low heat 4 minutes stirring constantly. Remove from heat gradually add lemon rind, juice and butter. Cool before pouring into shell.


