School Expansion Needs Told

Reasons behind the Hart school board's choice of building plans in the school district's \$460,000 expansion program were advanced this week by Paul Kennedy, superintendent

of schools.

Hart citizens will decide the fate of the bond election on Saturday, April 6, the same day on which they will elect two members to the school board.

Supt. Kennedy offered clarification of the board's thinking behind the proposals for an all-masonry, air-conditioned school building along with a gymnasium and an auditorium which

would seat 600.

"After studying school building construction, the board found that a compact air-conditioned school building could be constructed complete with

equipment at a cost equal to or less than a conventional type building," Kennedy said.

"A study of the schools that have had experience with compact air-conditioned buildings showed that utilities and maintenance costs were from six to 10 per cent cheaper than those in the conventional type building.

"With these facts in mind, the board arrived at the conclusion that the compact air-conditioned building is the type that should be built for the Hart system.

"The gymnasium will not be air-conditioned, but plans call for evaporative type cooling in the auditorium."

Regarding plans for the gymnasium, Kennedy said:

"When our present building was constructed, less than 150 students were enrolled in Hart schools. Today more than 500 students are enrolled and the present gym is not adequate to care for this number of students.

"The present gym is also used for an auditorium and a place to practice any program, other than athletics, which is held for the public.

"It is necessary, according to standards of school accreditation set up by the State Department of Education, for adequate facilities to be provided for the youth of the community, state and nation in the development of the physical fitness program.

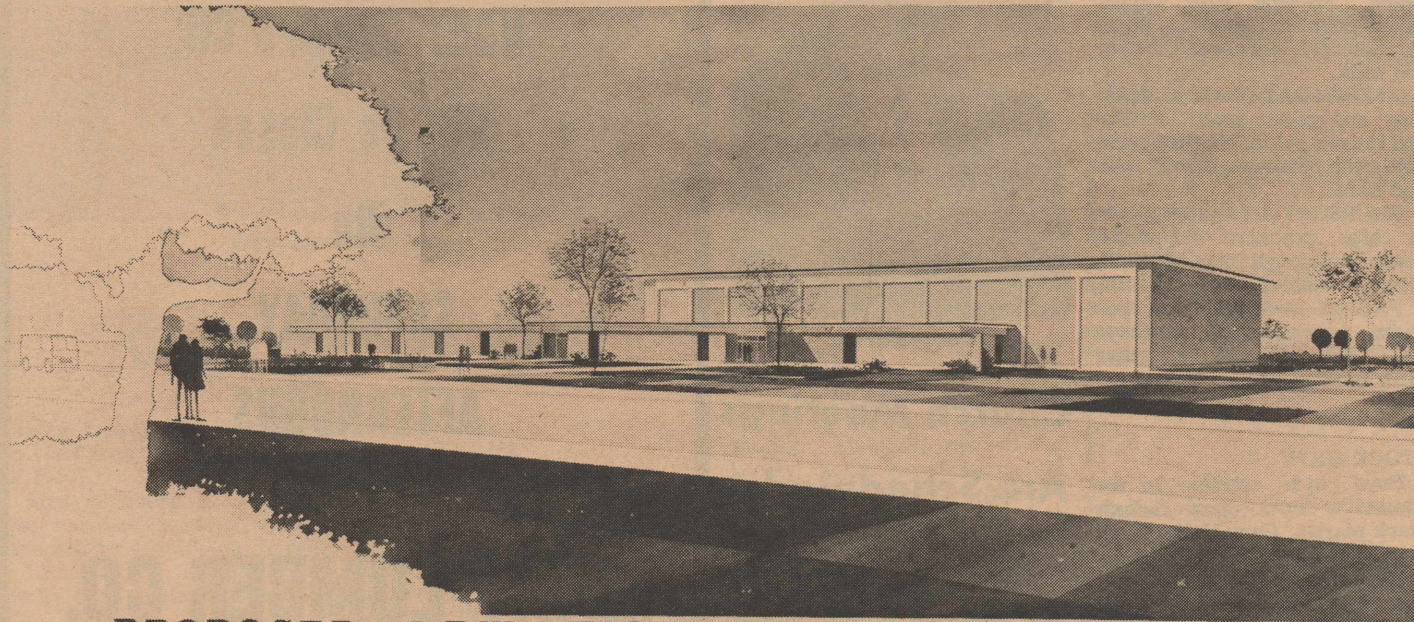
"The proposed gymnasium was included in the plans after long and careful consideration.

"For the junior high and high school, the board feels there is a definite need for two cross courts and one playing court."

Provisions are made in the plans for 250 permanent seats and 300 pull out or roll away seats.

"This was thought necessary to provide space for future growth, and at the same time cut

School Tax Increase Explained

The tax increase necessary under the proposed building program for Hart Public Schools was clarified this week by Supt. Paul Kennedy.

"The increase will consist of two divisions," he said. "The first will be an increase in maintenance money.....funds which are used to operate the school. The other division is for payment of the building bonds."

Hart schools have been operating on the same amount of money since 1955, the superintendent pointed out.

"We have been doing this with rising costs in materials and supplies along with a rapid increase in enrollment."

Kennedy offered this comparison in materials cost: "In 1955, we could buy mimeograph paper for 78 cents a ream. The same paper, according to a quo-

tation I received Monday is 99 cents a ream."

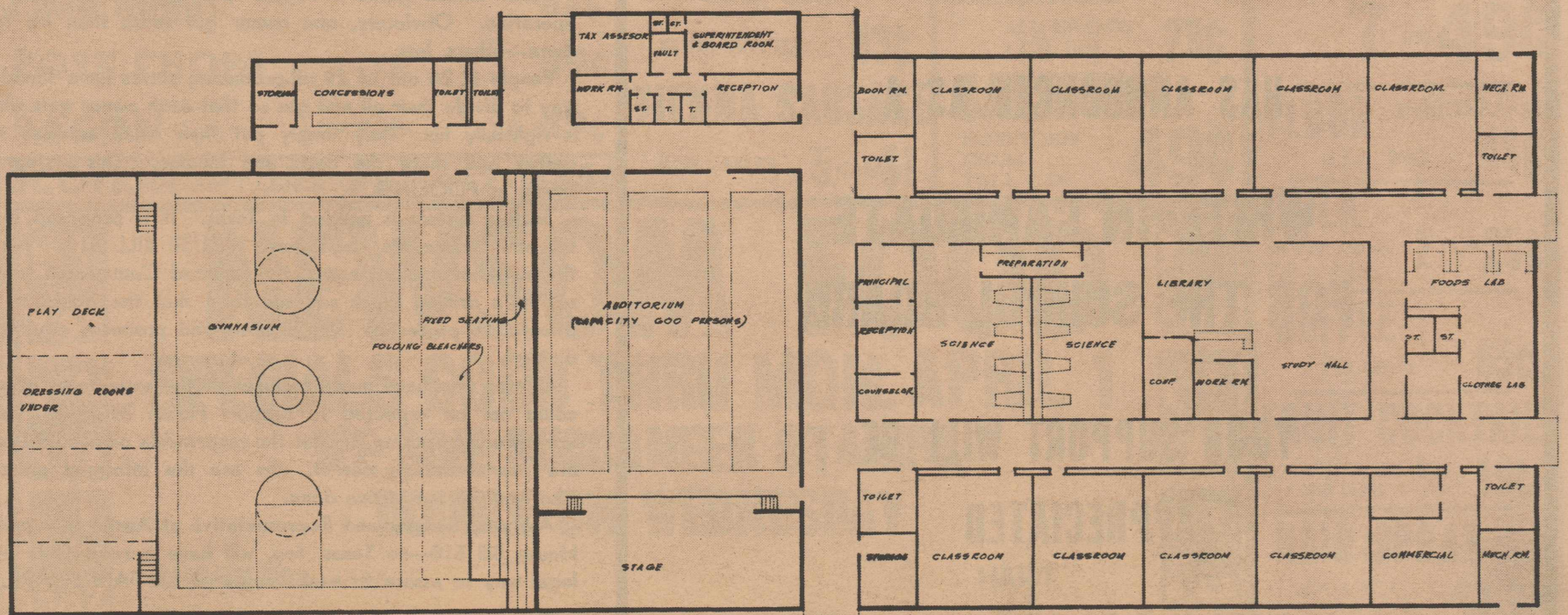
"Our enrollment in 1956 was 360. Our peak enrollment this year was 554."

School taxes under the proposed bond issue would be increased 40 per cent.

"Ten per cent of this 40 per cent increase is for maintenance money," he said. "This money will have to be raised regardless of the outcome of the bond election."

"If people will compare the increase in the cost of farming to the increase in the cost of education," Kennedy said, "they will realize that it would be impossible for the farmer to operate today on the same cost-per-acre basis that he did in 1955."

"The building program will use 30 per cent of the 40 per cent increase in taxes. The other 10 per cent will be necessary in order to operate the schools," he said.

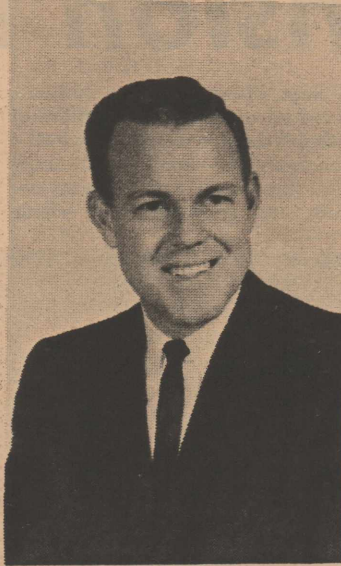

YOUR FAIR SHARE...

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks.

They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception.

Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved.

As we all know, oil and gas don't pay any attention to fence lines.

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on very small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under the neighbors' land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share—others, less.

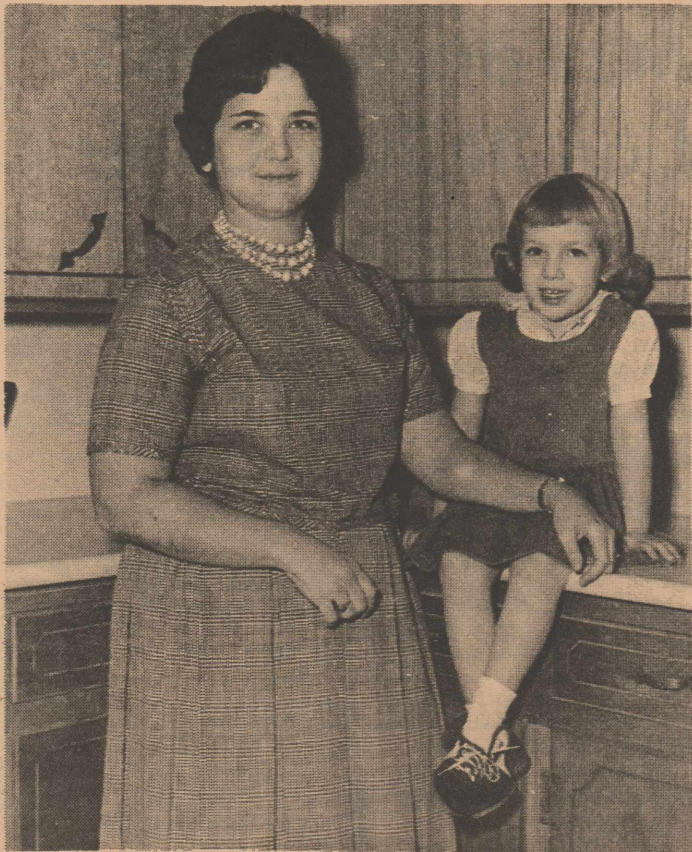
People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510—so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure to each landowner his FAIR SHARE.

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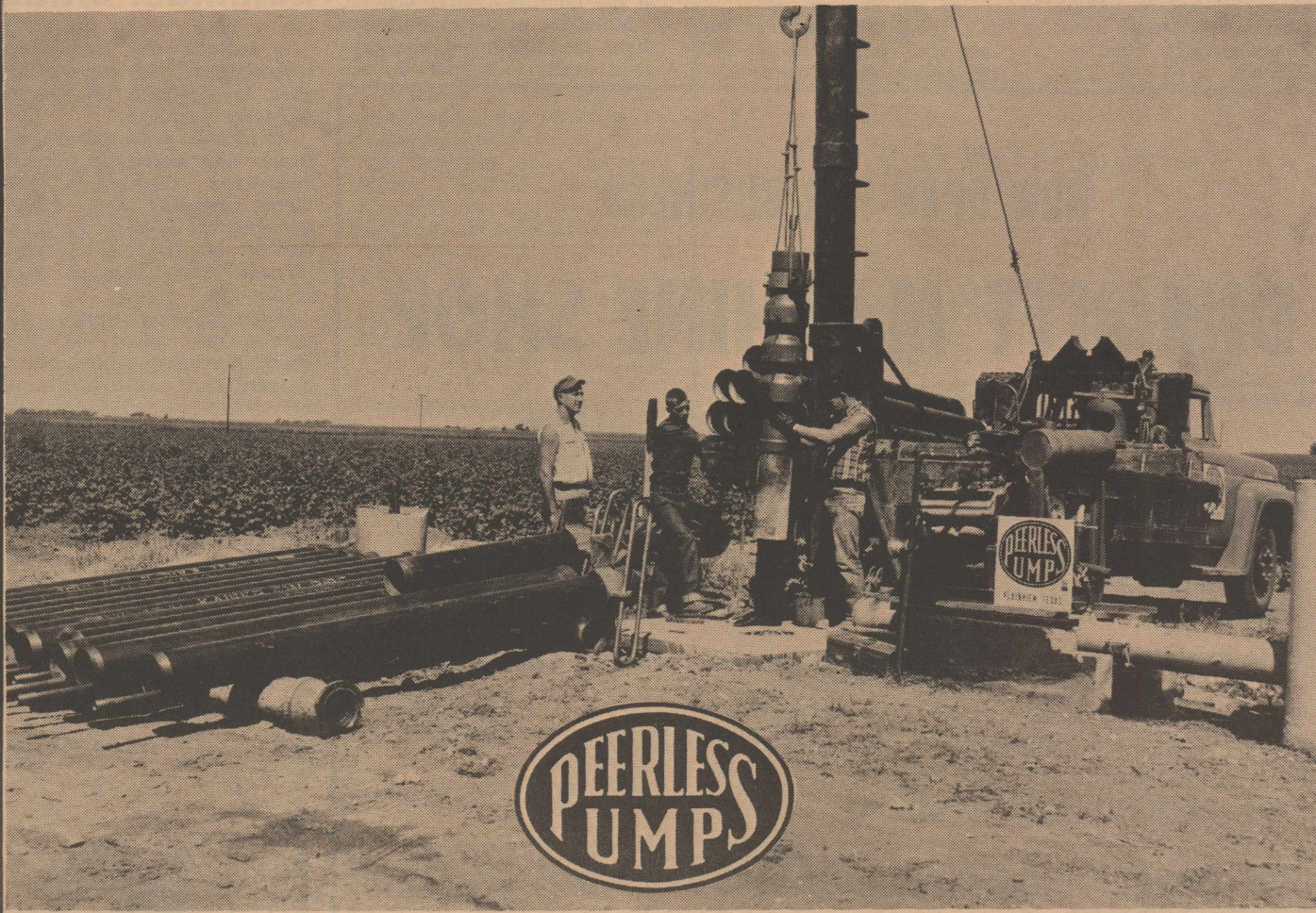

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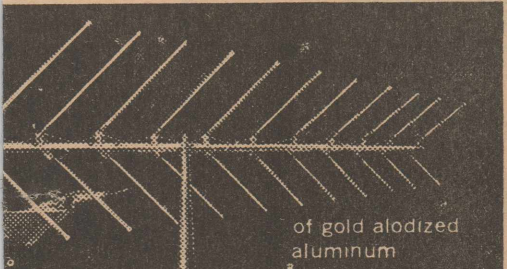

down the cost and have more space available for the use of gymnastics," he said.

Discussing the proposed auditorium, Kennedy said:

"The people of Hart and the children of the Hart school system are entitled to the privileges of assembling in a place that is convenient and comfortable and at the same time lends to the air of the occasion.

"Many times during the year, there is a need by the community for a place in which a large group can assemble.

"At the present time there is no such place in Hart.

"The people of the Hart community need such a place, and will need it still more as the community grows.

"If the people build the auditorium, then Hart must pay for it, no matter whether it comes from school funds or civic funds.

"An auditorium would be used by the school many times a day. It is doubtful that there would be a room in the system that would be used more regularly.

"The people have asked that a band be added to our curriculum. We certainly need an auditorium to assemble that type of organization.

"Indeed, the Hart schools and the community do need an auditorium, so that the youth of the community can have the privilege of studying the fine arts, such as music, art and speech."
