Hart voters Saturday turned in the school bond election. down a \$460,000 school ex- Only one of the three propopansion program and named two trustees in a separate election. In the largest turnout ever

to go to the polls in Hart, voters defeated the main issue of the election by a narrow count, 156 to 142.

In the trustee election, in-cumbent R. G. Henderson led the ticket with 221 votes.

Deryl Clevenger got the other vacancy with 136 votes.

Verle Crick almost pulled off a write-in victory, capturing 128 such votes. Theron Morri-son received 89.

Clevenger will succeed Rodney Smith, who did not seek re-election.

Supt. Paul Kennedy told the Hart Beat this week that the school board planned a meeting for Thursday night. He said he expected the board would again take up the program to expand the school system.

"Something has to be done," said Kennedy. "I feel like the board will go right back into the program to try to come up with something the electorate can agree on."

Also planned at the board meeting was the organization of the new board, including election of a president to succeed Smith.

A total of 307 votes was cast

sitions on the bond vote was approved. That was Senate Bill 116, the ruling which would have made it possible for the school district to finance the bond program. This proposition was approved, 151-144.

The second proposition, which was the \$375,000 bond required for the building of classrooms and gymnasium was defeated by 156-142.

The third issue, which set up \$85,000 for construction of a 600-seat auditorium, was turned down by 183-114.

Add four in thirds; mix thoroughly until dough begins to leave sides of bowl. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until dough is smooth and elastic, adding more flour if needed.

Place in greased bowl, turning once. Let rise until double in bulk. Punch down and let rise again until almost double.

Turn out on lightly floured board and divide in half. Roll each half into a 15 by 12 rectangle. Wind up tightly toward

you, beginning with wide side. Seal edges by pinching together. Place rolls diagonally on greased baking sheet lightly sprinkled with corn meal. Let rise until doubled in bulk, Brush tops with cold water. Cut with scissors or knife to make several diagonal quarter inche veral diagonal quarter inch cuts across tops of loaves. Set pan of hot water in oven.

Bake in hot oven 15 minutes. Remove and brush again with water and sprinkle tops with sesame seed. Reduce temperature to 350 degrees and bake until golden brown. Brush third time with cold water and bake two or three minutes longer. Makes 2 loaves.





AUSTIN, Tex .-- Clean up the roadsides is a message being delivered by the Texas Good Roads Association and the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Project is described as an "important contribution to the pleas of Governor Connally and the Legislature to seriously and systematically promote tourist travel into and through Texas."

Texas Junior Chamber will encourage its members to join in a project to remove debris and litter from city streets, county roads, and state highways.

Texas Good Roads Association will give the junior chambers money prizes for the best local progress to make their areas more attractive to visi-tors of Texas.

WATER---Final legislative action is near on the bill by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas and Rep. Eligio De La Garza of McAllen to set up machinery for the state to help out financially on big water projects.

Both Houses have adopted the bill, with a small difference. Ralph Hall of Rockwall Sen. added an amendment to give county commissioners courts approval power on recreation facilities planned at reservoirs built under the program. Since no county money will be involved, the House took out this provision.

Voters approved the planlast November by which the Texas Water Development Board will be allowed to use up to half of its \$100,000,000 borrowing power to pay for, or contract to pay for, the building of added dams to on built by local or federal agencies.

Highly complicated procedures were written into the bill to safeguard the money. Cash from future sales of water or storage space will repay the state bonds issued to finance the projects.

INDUSTRY PLAN----State loans would be available for building new, or expanding old, factories in Texas, if the House and the voters approve a plan by Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin.

Dies got the Senate to approve his plan for a \$200,000,000 state bond issue from which loans would be made.

NITROGEN FERTILIZER

TIME The period of greatest utilization of nitrogen by all crops is the 6 to 10 weeks following germination. By the end of that period the die is cast and any deficiency in nitrogen cannot be overcome by later application. The plant and its fruit will reflect that deficiency regardless of how well cared for otherwise. This means that for maximum effect on the quantity and quality of the crop, the nitrogen should be in the soil waiting when the crop is planted, available from the first day the plant can utilize it. There is much to be said for Fall plow-down and side dress applications of nitrogenous fertilizer. But the single most important consideration is that nitrogen be available during the plant's early growth. It means that if you haven't fertilized with a high-nitrogen fertilizer since harvest, it would be wise to do so as soon as possible.
