\$1,000 Contributed Toward Community Building For Hart

The dream of a community building in Hart is about to be realized.

Contributions totaling almost \$1,000 have been donated toward the construction of a building to be called "The American Legion Recreation Center."

Claude Ray, one of the workers in the fund-raising drive, told The Hart Beat that enough money has been collected to construct a 16 by 24 foot building.

More funds will be needed for tables and chairs, he said.

New Approach Is Planned; Two Trustees Are Named

Hart voters Saturday turned down a \$460,000 school expansion program and named two trustees in a separate election.

In the largest turnout ever to go to the polls in Hart, voters defeated the main issue of the election by a narrow count, 156 to 142.

In the trustee election, incumbent R. G. Henderson led the ticket with 221 votes.

Deryl Clevenger got the other vacancy with 136 votes.

Verle Crick almost pulled off a write-in victory, capturing 128 such votes. Theron Morrison received 89.

Clevenger will succeed Rodney Smith, who did not seek re-election.

Supt. Paul Kennedy told the Hart Beat this week that the school board planned a meeting for Thursday night. He said he expected the board would again take up the program to expand the school system.

"Something has to be done," said Kennedy. "I feel like the board will go right back into the program to try to come up with something the electorate can agree on."

Also planned at the board meeting was the organization of the new board, including election of a president to succeed Smith.

A total of 307 votes was cast

in the school bond election.

Only one of the three propositions on the bond vote was approved. That was Senate Bill 116, the ruling which would have made it possible for the school district to finance the bond program. This proposition was approved, 151-144.

The second proposition, which was the \$375,000 bond required for the building of classrooms and gymnasium was defeated by 156-142.

The third issue, which set up \$85,000 for construction of a 600-seat auditorium, was turned down by 183-114.

Brett Aven Given Blood

Little three-year-old Brett Aven was rushed to a Lubbock hospital last Tuesday after suddenly becoming ill.

He was given a blood transfusion at Methodist Hospital as a result of internal bleeding. He was reported to have lost a large amount of blood.

The youngster had fallen previously and had hit his back on the TV set, said his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Aven.

The boy was not believed seriously hurt from the fall, Saturday, but became worse Tuesday.

Recipe Of The Week

Mrs. Willis A. Hawkins Sr., submits this week's recipe.

She has been a Hart resident since 1941. She and her husband are Methodists and have five children.

FRENCH BREAD
1 tbsp. shortening
1 tbsp. salt
4 tbsp. sugar
1 package yeast
6 cups sifted flour
corn meal

Dissolve shortening, salt and sugar in one cup boiling water in large mixing bowl. Cool to lukewarm by adding 1 cup cold water. Blend in yeast (if compressed, crumble over mixture) if granulated follow directions, subtracting that amount of water from total called for.)

Add four in thirds; mix thoroughly until dough begins to leave sides of bowl. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until dough is smooth and elastic, adding more flour if needed.

Place in greased bowl, turning once. Let rise until double in bulk. Punch down and let rise again until almost double.

Turn out on lightly floured board and divide in half. Roll each half into a 15 by 12 rectangle. Wind up tightly toward you, beginning with wide side. Seal edges by pinching together.

Place rolls diagonally on greased baking sheet lightly sprinkled with corn meal. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Brush tops with cold water. Cut with scissors or knife to make several diagonal quarter inch cuts across tops of loaves. Set pan of hot water in oven.

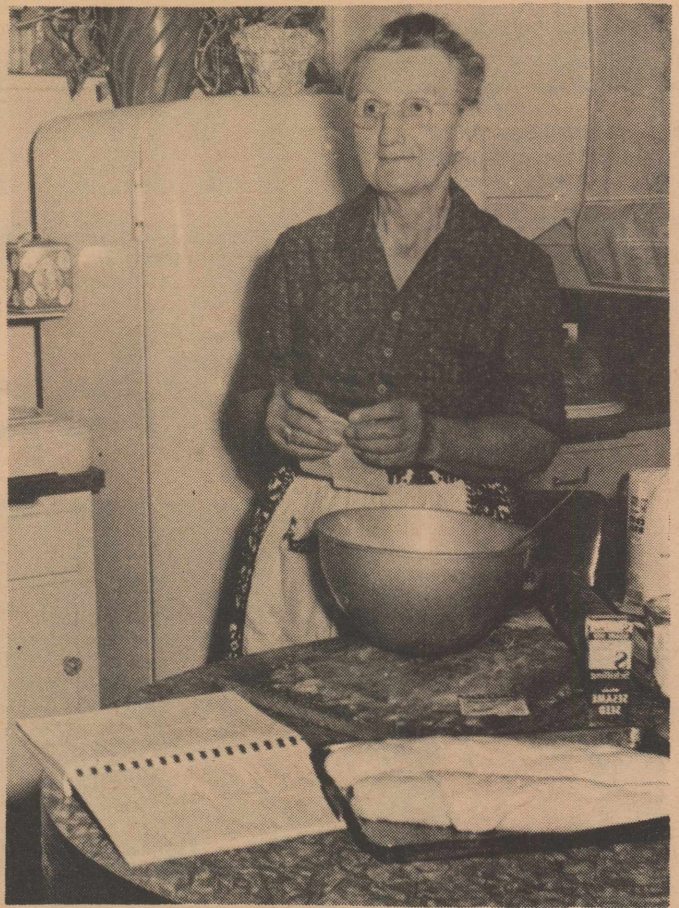
Bake in hot oven 15 minutes. Remove and brush again with water and sprinkle tops with sesame seed. Reduce temperature to 350 degrees and bake until golden brown. Brush third time with cold water and bake two or three minutes longer. Makes 2 loaves.

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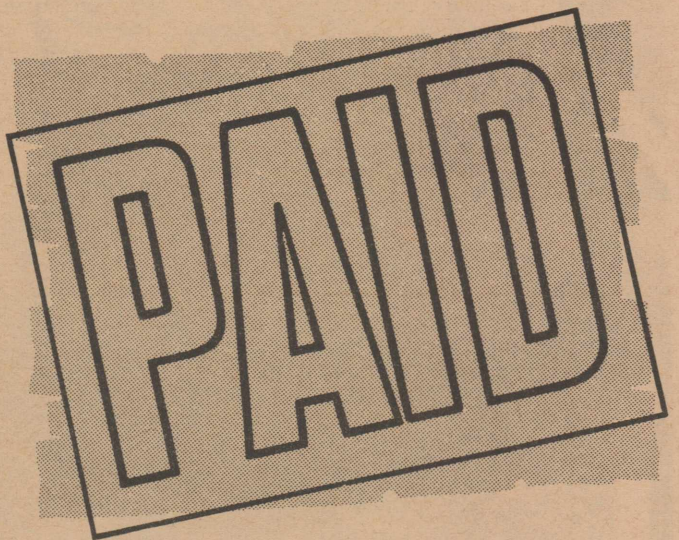

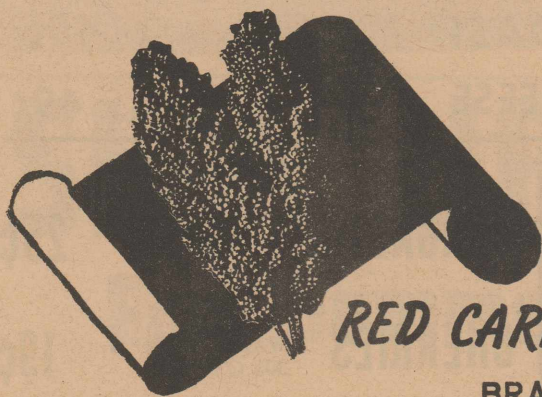

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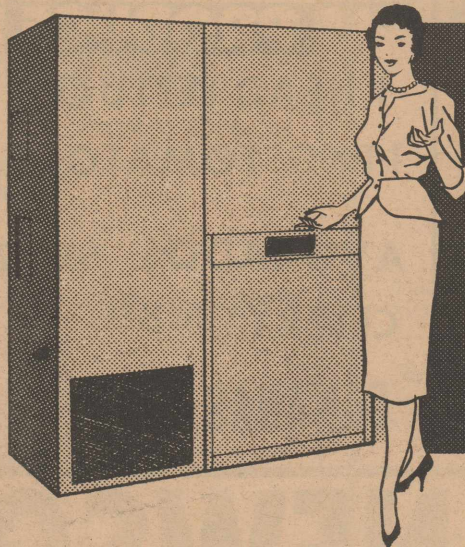
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High School Track Team Is Third At District Team

Three Hart athletes did well enough to gain trips to regional. That meet will be April 20, in Lubbock.

Berths to regional were won by Dennis McLain, Carl Ward and Felix Rodriguez.

McLain won the 100 in 10.7. (He was clocked at 10.3 in the preliminaries), won the 220 in 23.3 seconds and the low hurdles in the time of 21.7. McLain was also third in the pole vault.

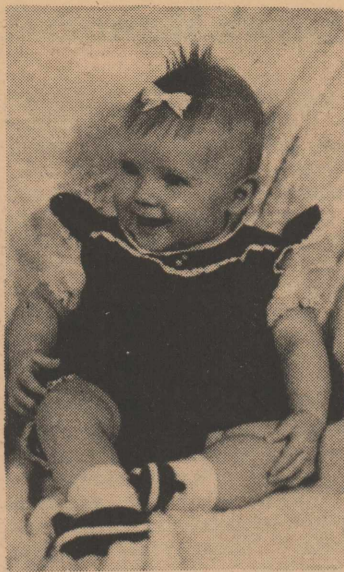
Ward won the high jump with a leap of five-feet-five inches and threw the discus 106.2 1/2 feet to place second.

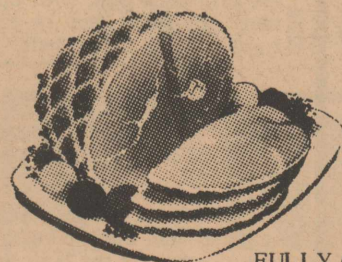

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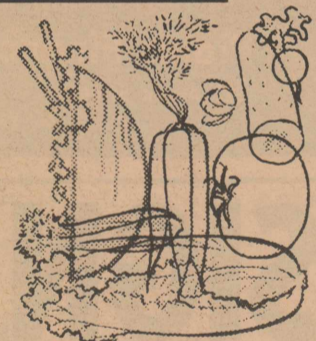

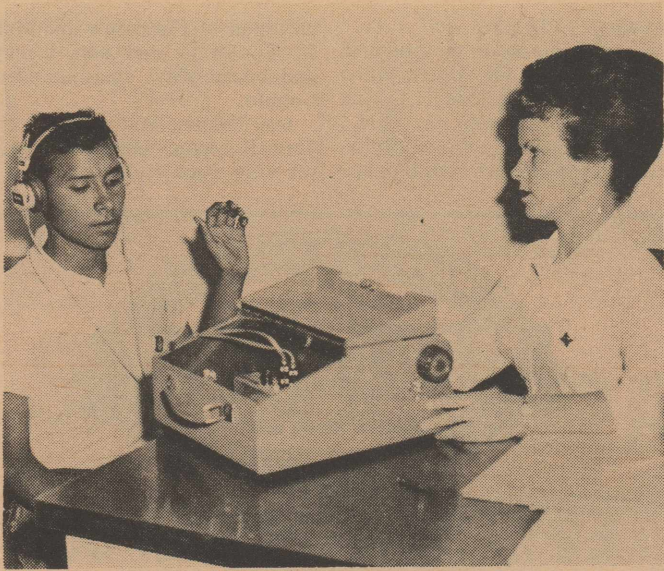

She is the woman behind the scenes who finds out if a child needs glasses or is hard of hearing. She also makes sure students are vaccinated and watches for communicable diseases.

Mother of three children, Mrs. Davis spends three days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday in Hart and Tuesday and Thursday in Nazareth.

This is the Dimmitt woman's second year as school nurse. She was graduated in 1955 from Methodist Hospital School of Nursing in Dallas.

Mrs. Davis said, as she checked a youth's hearing, "I make two checks at two-day intervals to determine whether a student is hard of hearing or seeing."

She adds, "if they are, I send a note to their parents stating the degree of malfunction."

Mrs. Davis said she finds in her periodic checks that more students have trouble seeing well than hearing.

As a guardian of health, Mrs. Davis takes an avid interest in the students. She told of a young

boy who had been helped with a hearing aid and of the special outside attention he received. Hart school children speak

well of the nurse. Perhaps they're aware that she has a measure of their well-being in her hands.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford



TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—Clean up the roadsides is a message being delivered by the Texas Good Roads Association and the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Project is described as an "important contribution to the pleas of Governor Connally and the Legislature to seriously and systematically promote tourist travel into and through Texas."

Texas Junior Chamber will encourage its members to join in a project to remove debris and litter from city streets, county roads, and state highways.

Texas Good Roads Association will give the junior chambers money prizes for the best local progress to make their areas more attractive to visitors of Texas.

WATER---Final legislative action is near on the bill by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas and Rep. Eligio De La Garza of McAllen to set up machinery for the state to help out financially on big water projects.

Both Houses have adopted the bill, with a small difference. Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall added an amendment to give county commissioners courts approval power on recreation facilities planned at reservoirs built under the program. Since no county money will be involved, the House took out this provision.

Voters approved the plan last November by which the Texas Water Development Board will be allowed to use up to half of its \$100,000,000 borrowing power to pay for, or contract to pay for, the building of added height on dams to be built by local or federal agencies.

Highly complicated procedures were written into the bill to safeguard the money. Cash from future sales of water or storage space will repay the state bonds issued to finance the projects.

INDUSTRY PLAN-----State loans would be available for building new, or expanding old, factories in Texas, if the House and the voters approve a plan by Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin.

Dies got the Senate to approve his plan for a \$200,000,000 state bond issue from which loans would be made.

High Plains Agronomist Speaks To Lions

The Hart Lions Club heard Delbert Langford, High Plains agronomist, speak Monday on the use of fertilizers.

Langford summarized information on tests and experiments made by the research center. He told the assemblage that

the most important factor in the use of fertilizer is the growing season.

Lions were told that fertilizers are cumulative in the soil. Langford said, "There are high rates of fertilizers being left in heavy soils helping to increase yields."

Langford spoke of a test plot that produced 7,200 pounds of grain without fertilization. He said, "When the plot was first seeded it produced 4,000 pounds, but fertilization gradually increased yields."
