New Bond Election Is Planned

B&K Opening Announced

Formal opening of the B and K Grocery is Saturday, April 20, owner Kenneth Lambert annunced this week

nounced this week.

Lambert said, "Free merry-go-round rides will be offered to children as will free suckers and balloons."

He added, three baskets of groceries valued at \$25 each and three valued at \$15, will be given away at Saturday night's drawing.

Persons registering for the drawing do not have to be present to win, said Lambert.

The Hart man has been in the grocery business since 1947, having begun work in a Plainview grocery store. He worked in the wholesale grocery business in 1946.

He moved to Hart in 1957 and bought out Homer Hill in 1959 to become full owner of his first grocery store.

Lambert saidhe started planning his new store about a year ago. "This store," said Lambert, referring to his new place of business, "is to be completely a grocery line, while the other store will handle just farm supplies."

Lambert said he thoroughly enjoyed the grocery business, although he puts in an average of 12 hours a day.

The grocery man said that the majority of prices are dropping on groceries. "Beef is down," added Lambert, "and staple goods are down two or three cents per item."






