## Public School Meeting Tuesday

### Seniors Sell Subscriptions To Earn Senior Trip Money

Hart High School senior class members will begin selling subscriptions to The Hart Beat and The Olton Enterprise Friday to raise money for their senior trip.

Eddie Nicholson, senior class sponsor, said the 12 members of the class will begin canvassing the Hart area after school Friday.

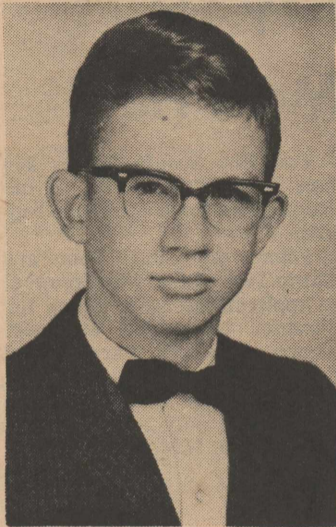
A one-year's subscription to both newspapers, either new or renewal, will sell at a combined rate of \$3.98, including tax.

Separate one-year subscriptions are \$2.55 for The Hart Beat only, or \$3.57 for The Olton Enterprise only. Both prices include state tax.

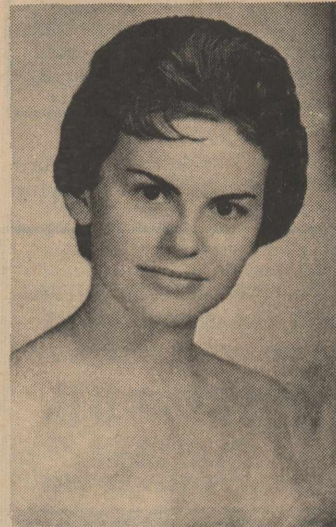
These prices are for papers going to residents in Castro and Lamb counties and any county touching these counties.

The class will receive a commission on all sales, to go toward their senior trip.

In addition, class members will be working to win a total of \$20 in cash prizes for themselves.

A community question-and-answer meeting on a new bond proposal for expanding Hart Schools is scheduled Saturday, night at 8 in the Hart school gymnasium.

The election, called last Thursday night by Hart school trustees, is set for Tuesday, May 4. Voting will be at the Hart City Hall from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Two propositions will be on the ballot: 1. \$360,000 in bonds for construction of a new junior high and senior high school building, and 2. \$75,000 in bonds for construction of a school auditorium.

Absentee voting in the election is now under way at the county clerk's office, courthouse, Dimmitt. Absentee balloting will end April 30.

Figures for this election are trimmed somewhat from the \$460,000 proposal which was defeated at the polls by a narrow margin on Saturday, April 6.

Total of the election is \$435,000 in bonds, with a reduction of \$15,000 in costs for the junior high-high school building and a reduction of \$10,000 in costs of the auditorium.

Board members told the Hart Beat that the \$15,000 is being saved by a reduction in the size of the gymnasium. The cost of the auditorium was reduced by simplifying finishes of the structure.

To help voters in their study of the new program, the board of trustees is publishing a list of questions and answers about the bond election on the back page of today's paper.

"The meeting Tuesday night is being held to answer any further questions about the bond election," board president R.G. Henderson said.

The board as a whole endorsed the bond election with this statement: "The board of trustees unanimously endorses this building program as the best for our school district and urges its approval."

Approval of the first proposition for \$360,000 would give the schools a total of 15 classrooms and a gymnasium in the junior-senior high school building.

This would include five classrooms for a junior high, four for senior high, two science labs for the junior and senior high schools, one commercial classroom, one homemaking classroom, a library and a study hall.

The square foot cost for construction only is estimated at \$9.00 per square foot, with the balance of the funds to be used for equipment, fees, furniture and paving.

Approval of all of the bonds will increase taxes 35 per cent. This would be from an increase in assessed valuation and the tax rate would remain at \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value. Details of the tax situation are told on page eight.

### Senior Trip Being Eyed

Hart seniors will pack up their school-day worries Saturday May 18, and take off for Colorado Springs and Denver on the annual senior trip.

They plan to visit the mint in Denver, Canon City and the Royal Gorge.

The group will pull back into Hart Thursday, May 23.

Already the group is anticipating the affair by getting their money in order. They will begin selling subscriptions to the Hart Beat next week to raise additional capital.

The seniors will get back just in time to walk the stage for their diplomas. Graduation is May 24 at 8 p.m.

Right now thoughts are on the junior-senior banquet, Saturday, May 4.

Baccalaureate exercises have been announced by Paul Kennedy, superintendent, for May 12.

Eighth grade graduation is Saturday, May 25 at 8 p.m., and final exams are scheduled for the 23rd and 24th of May.

Report cards will be handed the congregation Monday, May 27.

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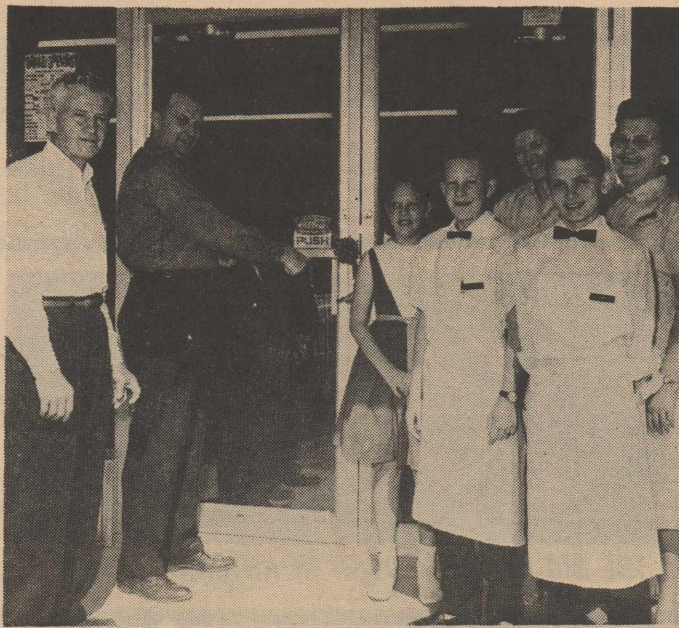

## Farmer Howard Bridges Is Conservation Champ

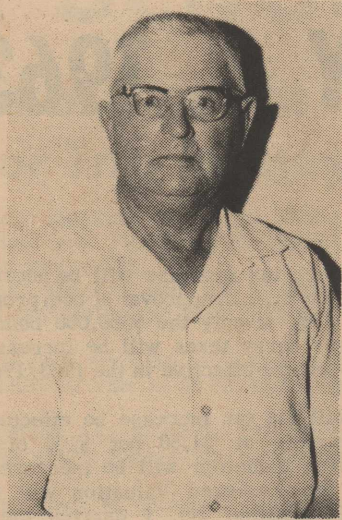
Howard Bridges of Sunnyside was notified last week that he has been selected as the Champion Conservation Farmer of Texas.

# QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

## HART INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

### BOND ELECTION MAY 4, 1963

1. When and where will the election be held?.....On Saturday May 4, 1963 at the Hart City Hall, from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

2. Who may vote in the election?.....Any resident of the Hart Independent School District who has rendered property (real or personal) for school tax purposes; who has lived in Texas one year and in Castro County six months prior to the election, and who lives in the District on the day of the election; and who has paid his (or her) poll tax or has an exemption.

3. How many bonds are to be voted on?.....Proposition No.1: \$360,000 bonds for construction of school buildings. Proposition No. 2: \$75,000 bonds for a school auditorium.

4. What school facilities will be constructed if the \$360,000 bonds for school buildings are authorized by the voters?.... These facilities total 15 classrooms for a Junior-Senior High School, containing 21,400 square feet; 5 classrooms for a Junior High School, 4 classrooms for a Senior High School, 2 science laboratories for the Junior and Senior High Schools, 1 commercial classroom, 1 home-making classroom, 1 library, 1 study hall.

In addition, a gymnasium for basketball and physical education classes together with dressing rooms suitable for a combination of football and physical education basketball use will be constructed and will contain a total of 12,300 square feet.

The building will be constructed as one unit, will be of fire resistant, steel frame and masonry construction, will have a total area of 33,700 square feet and will have provision for future expansion, if necessary. The square foot cost for construction only is estimated as \$9.00 per square foot, with the balance of the funds to be used for equipment fees, furniture and paving.

The building will be located on property now owned by the District across the street from the present high school.

5. What type of auditorium will be constructed if the \$75,000 bonds for a school auditorium are authorized by the voters? The auditorium would be constructed as an integral part of the Junior-Senior High School building so that it could be used for speech, choral, music and future band classes. It would have a seating capacity of 600 persons and contain 7,000 square feet.

6. How has a reduction been made from the original construction estimates?.....The gymnasium was reduced in size and the auditorium was simplified in finishes.

7. How will the bonds mature?.....If authorized, the bonds will mature serially over a period of 26 years from 1964 through 1989.

8. What will be the annual cost of principal and interest on the District's bonded debt if these bonds carry?..... Approval of the full amount of \$435,000 bonds will mean an average annual principal and interest cost to the District on outstanding bonds plus the new issue of about \$40,000. If only the \$360,000 school building bonds are authorized the average annual principal and interest cost to the District on outstanding bonds plus the new issue will be about \$36,500. The district is presently paying \$16,000 annually on outstanding bonded debt.

9. How much tax increase will be necessary to pay for these new bonds?.....Approval of both propositions will increase taxes 35%. If only the \$360,000 bonds for school building purposes carry taxes will be increased 30%. The increase would become effective in the 1963/1964 tax year.

10. How will the tax increase be effected?.....The tax rate will remain at \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value. The Assessed Valuation will be increased; If all of the bonds carry the Assessed Valuation will be increased 35%. If only Proposition No. 1 carries the Assessed Valuation will be increased 30%.

11. What is the School District's present Assessed Valuation? \$6,353,750 for 1962.

12. What is the estimated Assessed Valuation if the bonds carry?.....With an increase of 35%, the estimated Assessed Valuation will be \$8,700,000 with allowance for a small natural increase. If assessed values are increased 30% the estimated Assessed Valuation will be \$8,300,000 with allowance for a small natural increase.

13. What will the financial statement of the District if the bonds are authorized?.....

Approval of all of the bonds will mean the Assessed Valuation of approximately \$8,700,000; the bonded debt will consist of \$223,000 present bonds and \$435,000 new bonds, a total of \$658,000; the ratio of bonded debt to Assessed Valuation will be 7.56% and the tax rate will be \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value.

If only the \$360,000 school building bonds are authorized the Assessed Valuation will be approximately \$8,300,000; the bonded debt will consist of \$223,000 present bonds and \$360,000 new bonds, a total of \$583,000; the ratio of bonded debt to Assessed Valuation will be 7.02% and the tax rate will be \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value.

The area of the District is 151.5 square miles, and the District has never defaulted on payment of its bonded debt.

14. Would the above financial circumstances be favorable to the District?.....Yes, under either situation the School District would present a good financial statement with a favorable debt ratio, and would find a readily available market for its bonds.

#### TO THE PATRONS OF THE HART INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

A new Junior Senior High School building for our school is needed because:

- Of general overcrowded conditions;
- Present high school physical facilities, including those for physical education are inadequate;
- Study of the possibility of remodeling and adding to the present school building has proven that it is more practical to construct a modern Junior Senior High School building to meet the demands of present day education.

We have spent many weeks studying various means of enlarging and improving our school building. The Board of Trustees unanimously endorses this building program as the best for our School District and urge its approval.
