

They favored one proposal

and voted down another.

Accepted was the \$360,000 bond for construction of a new junior high-senior high school and gymnasium.

Failing to pass was the \$75,000 for construction of a

600-seat auditorium.

It lacked 25 votes, being defeated 158 "against" to 133 "for".

There were 13 mutliated votes in the passing proposal and nine were thrown out in the auditorium voting.

Supt. Paul Kennedy said, "we had 307 voters in the first election and 304 in this one." He added, "I'm glad we got the school this time."

Kennedy said, "Herbert Brasher, the architect, has estimated construction will begin sometime in July.

The expansion program will provide, aside from the gymnasium, nine general classrooms, two science laboratories, a library study hall, commercial room, home making room and general administration area.

The new building will house both the junior high and high school.

The present high school will be converted to an elementary school.

First proposal in April was a \$460,000 bond. The junior-senior high school failed by 14 votes and the auditorium was defeated by 69.

CARROT PECAN CAKE

1 1/4 cup salad oil

2 cups sugar

2 cups sifted flour 2 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. soda

l tsp salt

2 tsp cinnamon

4 eggs

4 eggs
3 cups finely grated raw carrots
1 cup finely chopped pecans
Combine oil and sugar, mix
well. Sift together remaining
dry ingredients. Sift half into
oil-sugar mixture and blend.
Sift in remaining dry ingredients alternately with eggs, one
at a time mixing well after each
addition. Add carrots, mix well
Mix in pecans. Pour intolightly Mix in pecans. Pour into lightly oiled tube pan. Bake in slow over (375) about one hour and 10 minutes. Cool upright in pan. Remove from pan, split in 3 layers, spread with orange glaze between layers, on top of sides.

Churches, schools and other organizations have special services for this day of days and homes pay special honors to those who have made real homes possible.

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


