

CORNELL BREAD

In a large bowl, soften 2 packages quick dry yeast in 3 cups warm water. Add 2 tbsp. wheat germ and 3/4 cup nonfat dry milk. Stir in 4 tsp. salt and half of flour mixture into yeast and sugar. Add 2 tbsp. melted shortening. Add rest of flour and sugar. Add 2 tbsp. melted shortening. Add rest of flour mixture. Turn out on floured board, knead vigorously about 5 minutes. Put in large bowl and brush lightly with melted shortening. Cover. Let rise in warm place until double in bluk, about 35 minutes. Punch down dough, turn upside down and let rise another 20 minutes. Turn out on board and divide in 3 equal parts or make 2 loaves and 1 pan of rolls. Brush lightly with melted shortening and let rise about 30 to 40 minutes. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 50
