Draw Project Awaits Lamb, Castro Funds

Only Castro and Lamb Counties have not taken steps to share costs of a proposed planning party for the Running Water Draw Watershed Project.

When Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday to ante their share of \$12,500, added pressure was put on the two abstainers.

Castro County has been asked \$8,333 for two dam sites. Lamb County's costs of one structure amounts to \$4,167.

Funds allocated thus far by the counties affected by the watershed project include \$12,500 by Curry County, New Mexico; \$12,500 by Hale County and \$20,000 by the city of Plainview; and \$12,500 by Parmer County.

It was indicated in a meeting held in Plainview that the State Soil Conservation Board would meet in June. No definite date has been set.



R. D. PYEATT, Hart farmer, is making a habit of bringing in the first load of wheat. He has been first now four consecutive years. Pyeatt pulled across the scales at 7 p.m. Friday, June 7. Moisture in the dryland wheat was measured 14-20 with a 60-lb. test. Farmer's Grain gave a \$25 premium for the first load. Pyeatt farms five-and-a-half-miles north of Hart.

Pets From Assorted Animals

There are three Brooks boys, David, Roger and Robert. They have pet foxes on their farm west of Hart.

They also have pet dogs, ducks, bantam chickens, pigs, horses, a ground squirrel, and cats.

Several years ago there were as high as 30 cats counted on the premises. Today, the number has dwindled considerably.

It was only a few weeks ago that the boys added the foxes to the bevy of pets.

"We washed them out of a hole in the west pasture," David, 13, said, pointing to the location.

Mrs. Brooks, with daughter, Rene, standing, close by, said, "the little fellows (foxes) were covered with mud, and I washed

them off by pouring water on them."

There were three of the sly rascals about a week ago, but only two remain. Number three jumped into a bucket of oil and killed himself.

"Mischief" and "Rascal" are surviving right well.

One of the twin boys, age 12, said, "We fed them on a baby bottle for about two weeks, then they started eating meat."

The boys have also raised mice, pigs and skunks on the bottle, so they're old hands.

Once they nursed 18 pigs until they were old enough to tend for themselves. A number of rabbits also hit the bottle.

Since the Swift fox are so

plentiful around the Brook's farm, the nipples probably aren't finished with.

Mrs. Brooks said, "I'm sure there must be more than 50 in the pasture just east of here." I see them almost every morning rolling and tumbling at play.

"One of the remaining fox," joined one of the boys "is just about as wild as they are."

The other captive fox is almost fully domesticated. It takes to petting while its brother snaps at reaching fingers with great gusto.

Even the brave ducks, Taffy and Daffy, don't tread too near.

They've probably read the story about the ducks and the fox.

The latter game is in Hart. Games played this last Tuesday night saw Hart's Colts take a 7 to 5 loss from Dimmitt's Gold Sox.

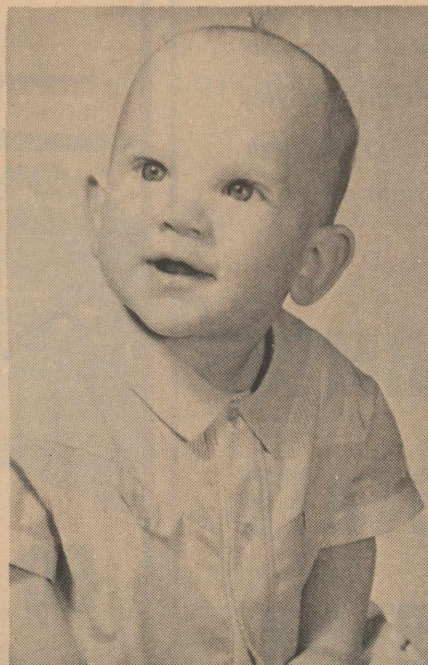

She attends the Baptist Church and is a Sunday School teacher for the junior girls.

Her recipe is Western Chocolate cake.

2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1/2 tsp. salt--sifted together in a large bowl.
1 stick oleo
1/4 cup cocoa
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup water

Mix in sauce pan on high heat until mixture boils. Mix 1 tsp. soda in cup of buttermilk.

Method: Pour hot mixture over sugar mixture and stir well. Add buttermilk, soda and 1 tsp. vanilla and stir again. Add 2 whole eggs one at a time and beat well. Bake in large size oblong pan for 20 minutes at 400 degrees Fahrenheit.

ICING
1/4 cup cocoa
1 stick oleo
ADD:
6 tbsp. milk
1 tsp. vanilla and a little salt.
Put over medium heat and bring to a boil. Pour over 1 box of powdered sugar and beat until smooth. Spread on hot cake.
