Postal ZIP Code Is 79043 For Area

Hart Postmistress Jewel Brooks has announced that the new ZIP Code for mail in this area will be 79043.

"Everyone in Hart will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance

of mis-sent mail." Postmistress Brooks said.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally July 1.

Postmistress Brooks stressed the importance of all Hart residents learning the city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, she said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last work in mail addressing," Mrs. Brooks said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

She cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code:

Jewel Brooks, Postmistress,
U. S. Post Office,
Hart, Texas, 79043

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mrs. Brooks said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way.

It is estimated 24 hours will be cut off the time between deposit and delivery.

Mrs. Brooks said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

Lawn Mower Rips Toes

Herman Burress almost lost four toes to his lawn mower Tuesday and may lose them yet.

He was reported mowing his lawn and trying to move the water hose with his foot.

The mower, minus the guard, ripped into him.

Burress was taken to Plainview Hospital and Foundation for treatment.

"Clegg Larry" is also called a fine roping horse. "He's got a lot of sense and a good disposition," said the owner.

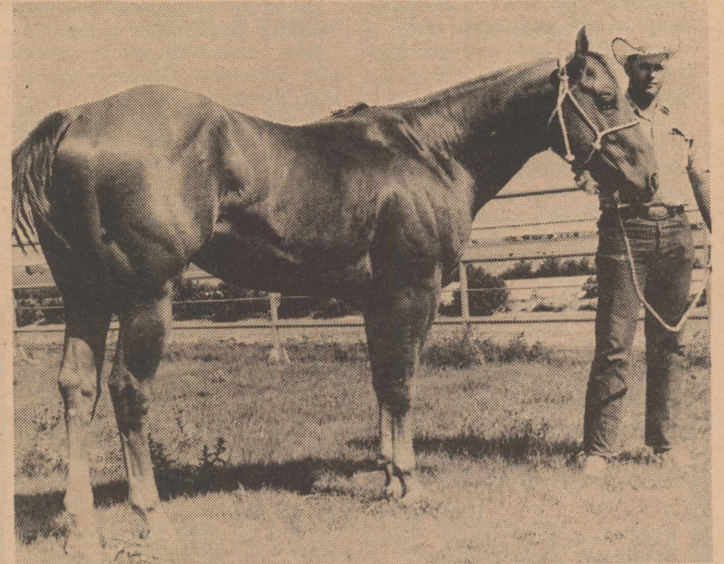
Horse breeders around Hart already have taken a fancy to the stallion. They hope to improve their quarter horse lines with registered bloodlines.

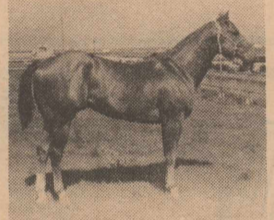

What the McLains' are exceptionally proud of is a couple of trunks.

They've completely re-decorated the hand-me-downs, both estimated to be near 70-years-old.

Trimmed with wood, the trunks are made with square nails and have rounded lid. (Trunks are no longer made with curved lids.)
