often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mrs. Brooks said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way.

It is estimated 24 hours will be cut off the time between de-

posit and delivery. Mrs. Brooks said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."


