1915 Model-T Captures Spirit

Remember the old Model-T
"lizzies" in the heyday of Henry
Ford?

Can you recall the magneto headlights—the coal-oil tail-light, wooden-spoked wheels and the oooga, ooga of the coarse—sounding horn.

For Paul Armstrong those days have returned. He has a 1915 Model-T that reeks with the past.

More impressive about Armstrong's sleek-looking coupe, he searched out the parts and put it together himself.

He's a dandy sight steering the relic of yesteryears down Main Street in Hart.

The postmistress here teased Armstrong by telling him:"This is the first time I've ever handled a car through the post office."

Several pieces, including two tires from the Firestone factory have been mail-orderes. Armstrong said, ""I started

putting it together last fall." He ordered the chasis, got some pieces from an Amarillo wreck-

ing lot and the body, motor and fenders from Fort Worth.

"As a farmer, I get plenty of outdoor life", Armstrong said, "therefore when the weather is bad and winter comes on, I work on the model-T".

He tells that it's just a hobby

He tells that it's just a hobby and wishes others would get interested.

"As a member of the Horseless Carriage Club," said Armstrong, "our purpose is to restore the cars just as Henry (Ford) made them,"

Collecting the antique relics of the road is the newest hobby in the U. S.

"The scarcity has made them valuable," says the Hart farmer. He estimates an offer of \$1,500 to \$2,000 would be made on his 1915 model.

"You'd be surprised how much early history a person picks up about automobiles by owning one of these old timers," said the A & M graduate.

He tells that the original 1915 cost was \$750 and the average horsepower was 22 or 23. "They

Hart school trustees approved the largest budget in the school's history and set the school calendar for 1963-64 at a meeting Thursday night.

The budget for 1963-64 amounts to \$616,097.09, compared with \$205,968.39 for last year. Most of the difference is the \$360,000 bond issue for a new high school and junior high building which is incorporated in the new budget.

Estimated expenditures are \$109.84 less than the expected revenue for 1963-64.

Total anticipated expenditures are \$616,097.09. Total revenue expected is \$616,206.93. Approximately \$129,138 of this will come from local sources, based on 95 per cent collection of taxes.

A complete listing of revenues and expenditures expected in 1963-64 is printed on page 7 of today's Hart Beat.

The tax rate was set at \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation, the same as last year. Valuations were increased to take care of the bond program.



ANOTHER JUNIOR COL-LEGE?---Board of Education has authorized a Travis County junior college election.

But it turned down an application for a Scurry-Fisher County junior college. Turn-down came after a committee said the oil-rich area could afford a college, but could not dig up enough students to meet state board requirements.

In its refusal report the committee, headed by former State Senator Penrose Metcalf of San Angelo, implied that the board may change its criteria for es-tablishing junior colleges after the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School makes its recommendations in August of 1964.

Currently, the board requires proof that taxpayers in the district can support a public junior college. But it also requires a minimum of 500 students.

Watershed Conservation

Interest in watershed conservation is increasing steadily in this area, according to reports by Charley E. Hill, secretary of the ASC County Committee.

The interest here has been activated by the intended work on Running Water Draw.

Conservation measures are in the planning stage for the Draw. Other watershed programs are being planned and carried out throughout the na-

Farmers and ranchers are sharing in these conservation programs.

Last year conservation measures were applied on more than 113,000 farms in the United States.

The total farmer and rancher investment in these soil, water, woodland, and wildlife practices during 1962 amounted to about \$40 million. Half this cost was covered by the Agriculture Conservation Program.

While farmers reap the immediate benefit from improved land management, a watershed protection program really benefits everyone in the community and nation.

Direct results have been pointed out. They are upstream watershed protection reduction.

watershed protection, reduction of siltation in lakes, streams, and reservoirs; better and cleaner water, and fewer da-

maging floods.
Indirect results include such benefits as economic stability and prosperity of both farm and urban industry, which are necessary for basic rural areas development.




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
