BRACEROS here are picking cucumbers on the Buster and Dudley Aven farm about four miles south of Hart. The harvesting began Monday and will last for about five weeks. Forty-seven laborers started on a 30-acre patch and will begin work in a few days on the Aven's 20-acre cuke field. Last year the father and son raised only 30 acres of cucumbers.

## Aven Cucumber Harvest Begins

The harvesting of cucumbers began Monday on the Buster and Dudley Aven farms south of Hart.

Other cuke raisers also had laborers in the field.

The Avens have gone into the cucumber business in earnest. This year they have better than 50 acres, compared to the 30 acres, and they'll be back in the same place in three days.

If more than three days are allowed between pickings, the cukes become culls, the men said.

"We had to have them work today despite the mud, and

they'd have had to work if it had been twice that bad," said Buster.

Aven said he had about \$4,000 invested in the help alone before they ever started to work. Each Bracero costs more than \$50 to acquire, before food, bedding and utensil expenses are made.

Dudley Aven told that the cucumber is an easy crop to raise. "It also withstands hail, but if you're going to make any cucumbers, you have to treat the vines kind," he added.

Last year the Avens raised 2,100 pounds an acre on their 30 acres. The average market

price was figured at about \$3.

Buster joined, "We made close to \$200 an acre after we had figured in all our costs."

Aven told that the cucumbers are tended just as cotton and maize. "We use the same equipment to farm them all," he said.

"Even though the vines are durable," said Dudley, "we have to watch and see that vines are turned back down after each picking. The hot sun would kill them if they weren't turned."

The Avens planted the cuke crop the 22nd of June.

"It took nine days between rains," Buster said, "before we could get the 50 acres planted."

## Hart Area Gets Soaking Rains

Hart and surrounding areas received a multi-dollar rain Saturday night, bringing more promise to crop possibilities.

The rain fell slowly, soaking several farms with as much as 2 and one-half inches of moisture.

Hart itself had 1.60 inches of rain.

On the J. D. Murray farm northeast of Hart, 2 inches fell. Arthur Cheves, east of Hart, said his gauge showed 2 and one-half inches of rainfall.

H. E. Newman, south of here, said rainfall there was measured at 1 and three-fourths inches.

## Baptist Church Revival Begins Sunday In Hart

He also was pastor of the First Southern Baptist Church in Pinehurst, Washington, and Buena Park, California.

Jeter attended Baylor University and Wayland Baptist College, graduating in 1952.

He received a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1958 from Fort Worth.

Hallcom is choir director of the First Baptist Church in Bryan.

He also is an accomplished trumpet player, having made several recordings.

## Stranger From The Streets Well-Acquainted With Piano

Ever so often a khaki-clad man wanders into the Alford Cafe in Hart and seeks out the piano in the back room.

He could easily be mistaken for one of the farmers who gather inside.

The stranger is hardly seated at the piano, however, when music from catchy boogie-woogie tunes to Beethoven pours forth.

Bennie Martin is no farmer, although his present business is closely connected with them. He's a representative for an aerial spraying service in Plainview.

His music is not amateur. Until seven years ago he was a professional pianist. He started playing when he was 13.

Martin became a professional in 1920, organizing his own band.

In his 64 years, he's played hither and yon. From New York to New Orleans, Martin was on location 18 days doing the music in Paramount's "Big Carnival" starring Kirk Douglas and Jan Sterling.

He's worked with the Columbia Broadcasting System as a pianist for Thomas J. Flemming, the Irish tenor.

He has played at the Globe in New York, one of the largest theaters there.

He had his own combo for 10 years, entertaining at the "Peacock Lounge" in Albuquerque.

"I started playing," said Martin "to get away from the cotton patch. Now, here I am back in it."

Seven years ago, the Plainview man gave up playing for a living and began working for the spraying service. "It's family owned," told Martin, "and they wanted me to help out."

"I still play every chance I get," he confessed.

Customers at Alford's probably don't know (those who have heard him) they're listening to a man who can start and play several bars from as many as 2,300 songs.

"Several years ago," said the retired musician, "members of the Musician's Union made a test as to the number of tunes

I could play."

His talent is not limited to the piano; he plays the drums, bass fiddle and "some guitar". "I can teach the guitar better than I can play," Martin added.

Martin, who lived many years in Ponca City, Okla., taught piano lessons there for about 15 years.

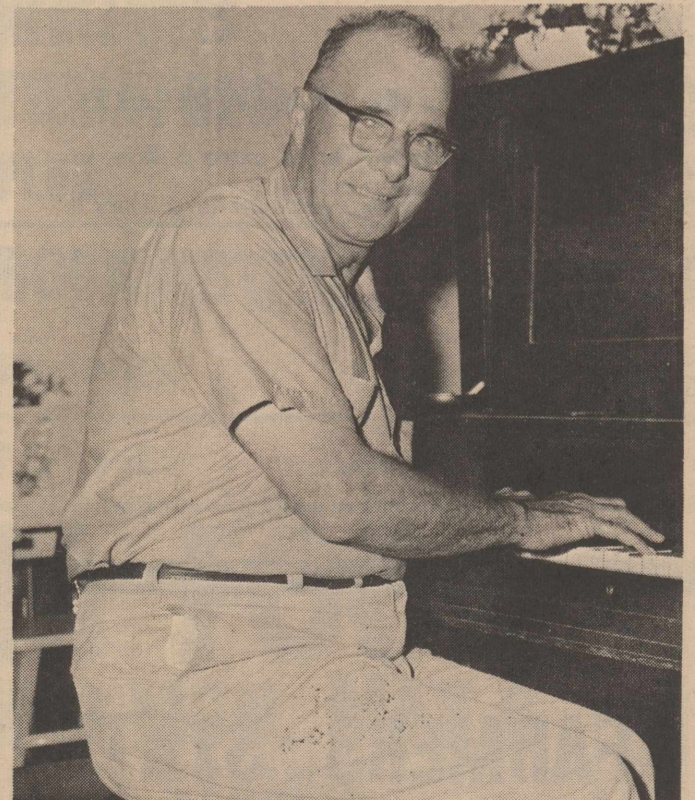
"My smallest class was eight and my largest was 35," he related.

He tells that one day he would like to start giving lessons again.

Martin likes to improvise on certain numbers, especially the old standard tunes and jazz.

"When I was a boy," told Martin, "King Oliver's Dixieland Jazz Band would come to town. I liked them, and wanted to be a musician. At first my parents didn't like the idea, but I loved music and wanted to play."

There's a good chance he will remain welcome at Alford's, especially if he shows up as an after-dinner musician.


