Fortyseven laborers started on a 30-acre patch and will begin work in a few days on the Aven's 20-acre cuke field. Last year the father and son raised only 30 acres of cucumbers.

Hart Area Gets Soaking Rains

Hart and surrounding areas received a multi-dollar rain Saturday night, bringing more

promise to crop possibilities.
The rain fell slowly, soaking several farms with as much as 2 and one-half inches of moisture.

Hart itself had 1.60 inches

On the J. D. Murray farm northeast of Hart, 2 inches fell. Arthur Cheves, east of Hart, said his gauge showed 2 and one-half inches of rainfall.

H. E. Newman, south of here, said rainfall there was measured at 1 and three-fourths

Dudley Aven told that the cucumber is an easy crop to raise. "It also withstands hail, but if you're going to make any cucumbers, you have to treat the vines kind," he added.

Last year the Avens raised 2,100 pounds an acre on their

they'd have had to work if it had been twice that bad," said Buster.

Aven said he had about \$4,000 bad figured in all our costs."

Aven told that the cucumbers are tended just as cotton and maize. "We use the same equipment to farm them all,"

he said.
"Even though the vines are durable," said Dudley, "we have to watch and see that vines are turned back down after each picking. The hot sun would kill them if they weren't turned."

The Avens planted the cuke

crop the 22nd of June.
"It took nine days between rains," Buster said, "before we could get the 50 acres planted."

The Avens have 100 bee hives placed about the two patches to insure pollination.

"If the bees did not carry pollen from the male blooms to the female blooms, 50 per cent of the cucumbers would be croocked or knubby," said

"We learned a lot about about cucumbers the first year," said Dudley, "we didn't know any-thing about them before last year.

The cukes will bear for about five weeks.
