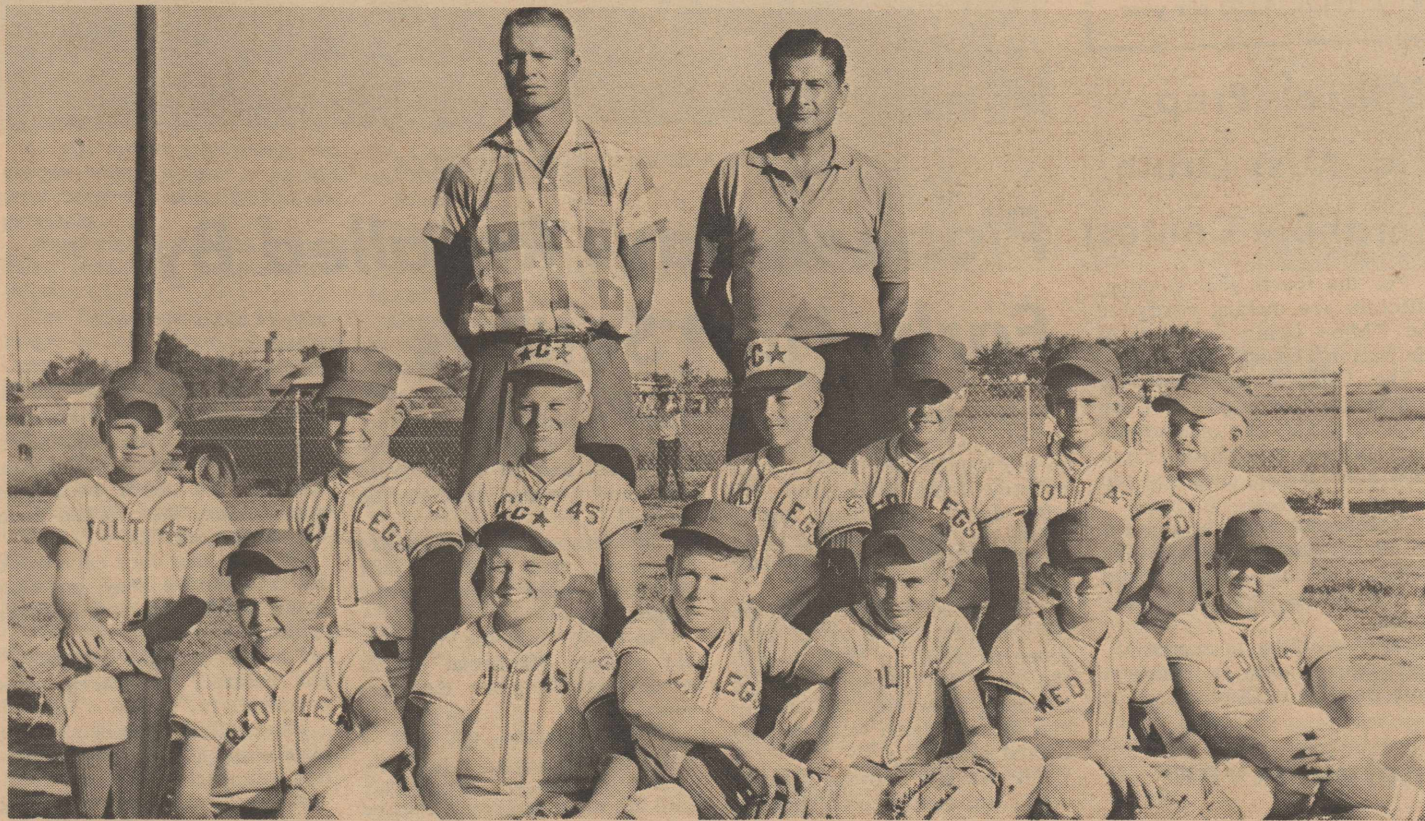

Hart All-Stars Win Area Meet



CHAMPIONS of the All-Star Little League Tournament held at Olton are these Hart players. The All-Star team went through the six-day, six-team tourney undefeated. The near-flawless fielding and clutch-plays by Hart's Little League All-Stars boosted them to the championship Saturday in the Olton-held tournament.

For six days, suspense rose and fell as the victory tide finally settled in Hart's favor. Six teams were entered.

The fiery All-Stars from Hart pulled off three straight conquests, overthrowing Olton on the final night.

Tuesday, Hart clobbered Earth, 16-3. They then rose to the occasion of beating a good Sudan team, 9-8, Thursday.

There was no stopping the Carl Rambo and Doug Higgins coached All-Stars.

With David Land doing the lion's share of the pitching, the evenly-balanced lineup got to Olton, 6-3, Saturday night.

Hart led one to nothing after the first inning of the double-elimination tournament. Olton, who had climbed back into contention, by beating Amherst and Sudan, never could get going against Hart.

The second inning was the killing blow administered by Hart, as the visitors came up with five runs, taking a 6-0 lead.

After Donnie Black got on from a fielder's choice, Billy Sanders singled and Phil Davis walked to load the bases.

A muffed ball by the Olton catcher, one he couldn't find, allowed Black and Sanders to cross the plate. Davis scampered to third.

Another missed ball by the catcher allowed Davis to slide home safely for run number four.

David Land then walked Jimmy Ferguson singled, and M.J. Janek singled on an error by the Olton shortstop. Gary Rambo singled home Land and Ferguson before Olton could put down the up-rising.

It was too late for Olton to get back into the game, although they did threaten in the top of the fifth.

Earlier in the top of the fourth Mike Gullett homered for Olton to drive in Danny Collins, making the score 6-2.

The fifth inning had the earmarks of trouble for Land. Johnny Lewis bounced the ball off Billy Sander's chest for a single, Frank Salvador walked and Tony George stepped to the plate.

Land got George on a strike out, but the runners advanced. Big play of the inning was when Charles McClain hit to shortstop Phil Davis, who threw home to catcher Don Sanders, making the tag on Lewis at the plate.

Salvador scored later in the inning, but Land struck out Maurice Green, to kill the threat and win the game, 6-3.

Hart Couple

Wreck Victims

A Hart man and his wife, are in Lubbock Methodist Hospital today as a result of injuries received Sunday in a two-car collision near Lubbock.

One man, Saragosa Morin, of Morton was killed in the wreck which seriously injured Mark A. Martin, 67, and his wife, Eva, of Hart.

The accident occurred at 2:40 p.m. Sunday south of the Woodrow community at the intersection of U.S. Highway 87 and FM Road 41.

Mrs. Martin was reported in critical condition early this week, and her husband was in serious condition.

She is said to have a broken arm, leg, crushed thigh, crushed chest, three broken ribs and internal injuries.

Her husband has three broken ribs and possible internal injuries.

Highway patrolman Wayne Baker said Morin, 41, was headed east on FM 41. Martin was traveling north on U.S. Hwy. 87.

The front of Martin's car struck the right side of the Morin vehicle as Morin pulled into the intersection from a stop sign.

The vehicles reportedly traveled together 90 feet to the parking lot of a night club. Morin was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital.

Pioneer Days Recalled By Early Hart Settlers

Hubert Maples was talking. "We came out here in 1916 in two wagons, 180 miles across country from Wellington. My wife drove one team, and I drove the other. We were looking for cheaper land and better grass.

"Cattle were plentiful on the big ranches, but a lot of them froze to death in 1919. It was the 12th day of April when a Norther blew in. The cattle had already been weakened by a hard winter.

"It started snowing after a cold rain, and the cattle bunched up in fence corners. The snow began to drift, and the weaker cattle just lay down and died.

"The cattle that lived, walked over the fences drifted under by snow. It took months to rustle up the survivors."

That was the way a Hart man and his wife found the early West when they pulled up stakes 47 years ago to move out here.

Maple, a young man then, was just getting started in the cattle business. He had 40 head of Whiteface that he had shipped in on the railroad. His father-in-law had more than twice that many that Maples helped run.

"We drove the cattle in from

Tulia," said Mrs. Maples. There was a quarantine then at Kress, and we were afraid we would get the cattle tied up there."

Land was selling for \$8 to \$14 an acre, and rancher Jack Kellough sold some to the Maples.

"In 1917," said the 75-year-old pioneer, "I broke out 70 acres and 30 more the next year."

Maples started out with a walking plow.

"He walked for two days," said his wife, smiling, "then he hitched two horses and two mules to a sulky and rode."

The Hart man bought a tractor in 1937, modernizing his farming. He says of the first steel-wheeled vehicle: "At least it kept me awake."

He adds, "I was born too early to be a farmer. It's easy now. I wore myself out with an old plow and goose-neck hoe. They burn the weeds out now."

Maples tells that he cut several maize crops with a knife before getting his first, row binder.

Mrs. Maples was the typical pioneer woman.

Along with taking care of a son, Glen, she filled her days helping tend to chickens, turkeys and hogs.

"I've gotten up at 4 a.m. many a morning," she said, "to change irrigation rows, watered by a windmill."

She also helped deliver more babies than she can remember.

The 74-year-old woman added, "We didn't work from sun to sun, we worked from can until can't."

She told that once each week, she mounted a pony, put Glen in the Saddle with her, and rode to the post office.

"I took along a tow sack," she related, "to carry some groceries in."

When asked about recreation, Maples said, "our only recreation was work."

It wasn't many years after the Maples moved to this area that they bought a Model-T.

"It was a real automobile," said Maples, "It beat a wagon. We need 'em again. There wouldn't be so many bad wrecks, and if you turned over, you could get out and set 'em back on their wheels."

Hart began making progress in 1928 when a railroad spur was built into town.

It wasn't many years later that telephones began creeping into homes. "Telephone wires," said Maples, "were strung on barb-wire fences with a two-by-four extended from the fence posts. Tumble weeds used to cover them up."

After the country became more populated, the Maples told, there were fiddling contests and dances and a man who came through twice each year showing silent movies.

Time, with its evolutionary tempo, has ticked away the yesteryears.

But time has not been able to fade the fertile memories of the Hubert Maples.

MEAT LOAF:

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 3/4 cup Old Fashioned Mother's Oats, uncooked.
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup milk

Combine all ingredients thoroughly and pack firmly into a loaf pan. Cover with tomato sauce. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about one hour. Let stand five minutes before slicing.
