Bicycle Riding Dog Began On Tricycle

Fact is stranger than fiction. It sounds like a tall tale but there's a dog in Hart that rides a bicycle.

Now, don't get the wrong idea. This dog doesn't jump on and pedal away.

But once it's helped on, it doesn't have to be held on. The dog's name is "Princess", a registered Chinese

Pug, which belongs to Roni McGill, 8. It goes riding with Kim McGill, 10.

"Princess", didn't break in on the bicycle, she started as a pup, riding a tricycle and advanced from there.

"The children," said Mrs. Sam McGill, "used to put her on their tricycles and she would balance and ride with them."

A discovery was made this year that the dog could balance herself just as easily on a boy's bicycle.

The smarter than average pet sits on the bar which runs from the seat to the handle bars. She puts her paws on the handle bars, riding astraddle of the frame.

"She will ride for blocks", said the children's mother, "without falling or trying to get off."

"The other day," said Kim, "she rode with me downtown and didn't try to get off at all." The dog only fell a couple of times at its first lessons but always was anxious to be helped back on.

"Princess" has more talents than just riding a bike. She also sits in a rocking chair, watching TV, and walking on her hind legs, begging for food.

"We don't allow her in the house when she's shedding," said Mrs. McGill, "because she gets so much hair on the furniture."

One might speculate that during shedding season, "Princess" is outside practicing her riding skills.

26 Gridders Report For Longhorn Workouts

Hart, rated third behind Happy and Vega in District 1-B, took to the practice field Monday with 26 boys reporting.

Coach Dub Cleveland said this week he was impressed with the "good attitude" they're showing.

"We're going to be stronger than last year," said the coach, "and will have good speed but not much size."

Cleveland said the Longhorns would utilize a professional-type offense, running from variations of the wing-T.

The head mentor told that if his quarterbacks came along, the team would be going more to an aerial attack than last year.

Joe Rubacaba and Gary Heller will handle quarterbacking chores.

"We're going to be better balanced than last season," said Cleveland, "but we lack experience."

The coach said several of the boys had not played football before.

Workouts are being held from 8 a.m. until 11 a.m. in preparation for the season opener with Nazareth, Sept. 6.

After the first game here, the Longhorns will play their next three games out of town.

Workouts began Monday with 14 lettermen returning from last year's squad.

Captains of the Longhorns this year will be Billy Farris and Dennis McLain, both half-backs.

The schedule this season is almost a duplicate of games played last year.

Five of the contest will be played at home and five away.

New Football Stadium Ideal For Spectators

With football season just over the horizon, the scene is being set for spectators.

Longhorn fans, this season, will have an opportunity to use a new football stadium with completion planned by the second home game.

The second home game is on top for Oct. 4, against Anton.

The Hart School Board voted Aug. 5, to construct the modern 300-seat capacity stadium. Contractor is Vibra-Whirl Co. of Panhandle, Texas.

A reserve section on both sides of the 50-yard line will

be available, and season tickets will be sold for the entire season.

As an added feature, plans are being made to install electrical outlets for each pair of seats, making it possible to plug in electric blankets and coffee pots.

Price of season tickets this year will be \$20 each, in an effort to obtain financial aid for erecting the new stadium.

Season tickets will cover all athletic contests at the school, basketball included.

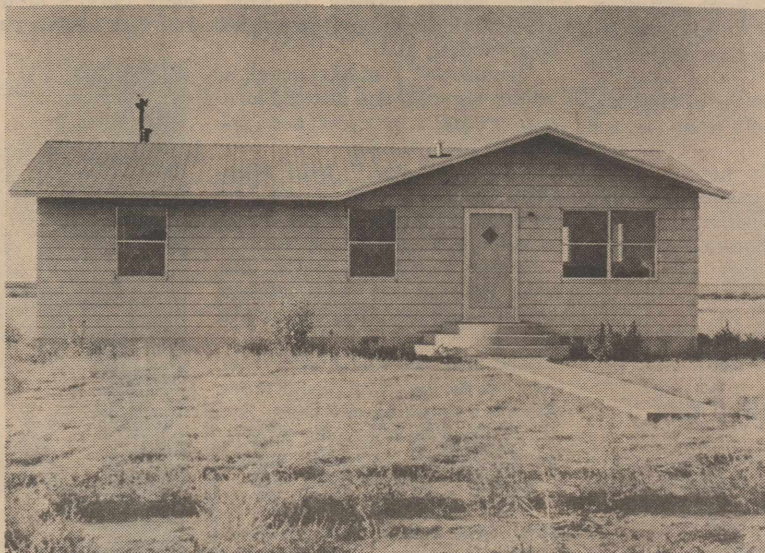

New Law Into Effect

Among the 350 new laws to go into effect Friday, Aug. 23, in Texas is the new speed limit of 70-mile-an-hour on most Texas highways.

Another law concerns hot check passers. It requires at least one day in jail and \$1 fine if convicted.

The new traffic speed law applies only to highways in good enough repair to warrant a higher speed.

Highway officials have asked motorists to use common sense on roads which make fast driving dangerous.

On the hot check law, legislature voted to tighten up on offenders.

If convicted the easiest a person can get off is with the \$1 fine and a day in jail. First offenders, could, however, be given up to two years in jail and a fine of \$1,000.

Penalties apply to all checks less than \$50.

Businessmen will be required to send out a certified or registered letter to the party passing the check.

If the check is not made good within 10 days, the merchant can take his claim to court.

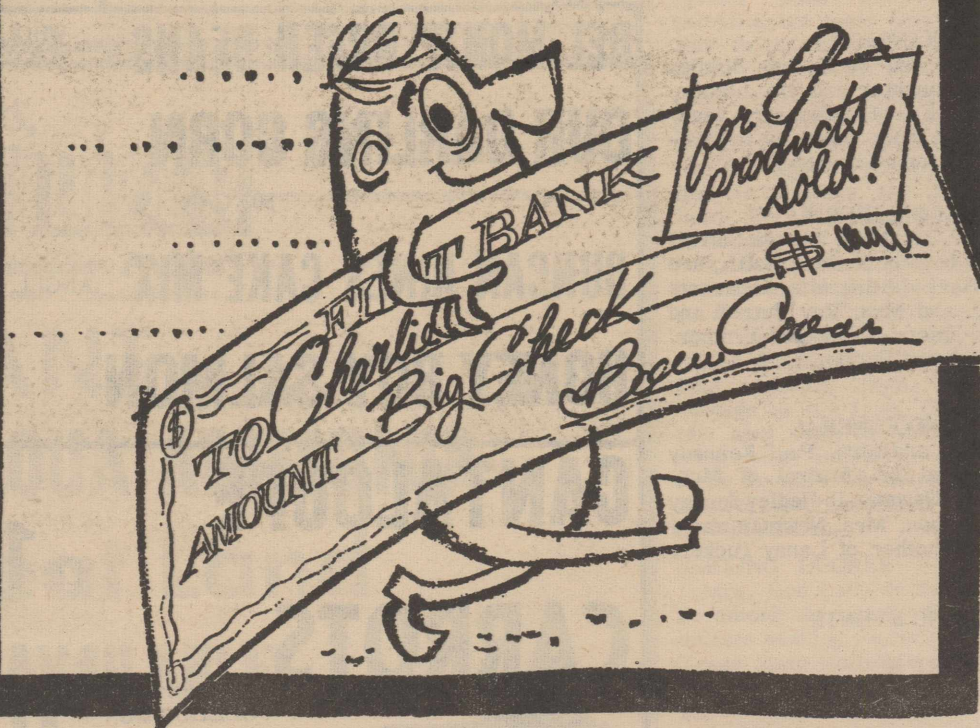

11. Drove to Indiana, went through underground caves which have rare, blind fish with skin growing over their eyes.

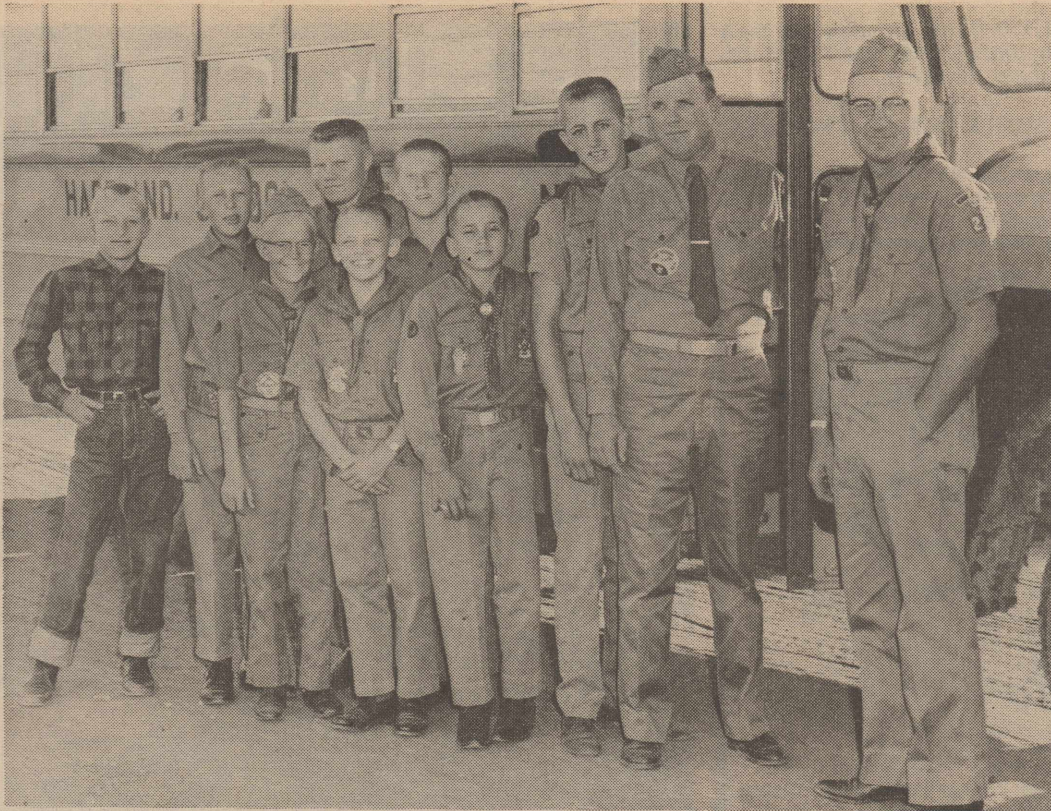
12. Went through Meramec Caverns State Park in Missouri, camped.

13. Drove to Honey Creek, Okla., to recreation area, Lake O' the Cherokees.

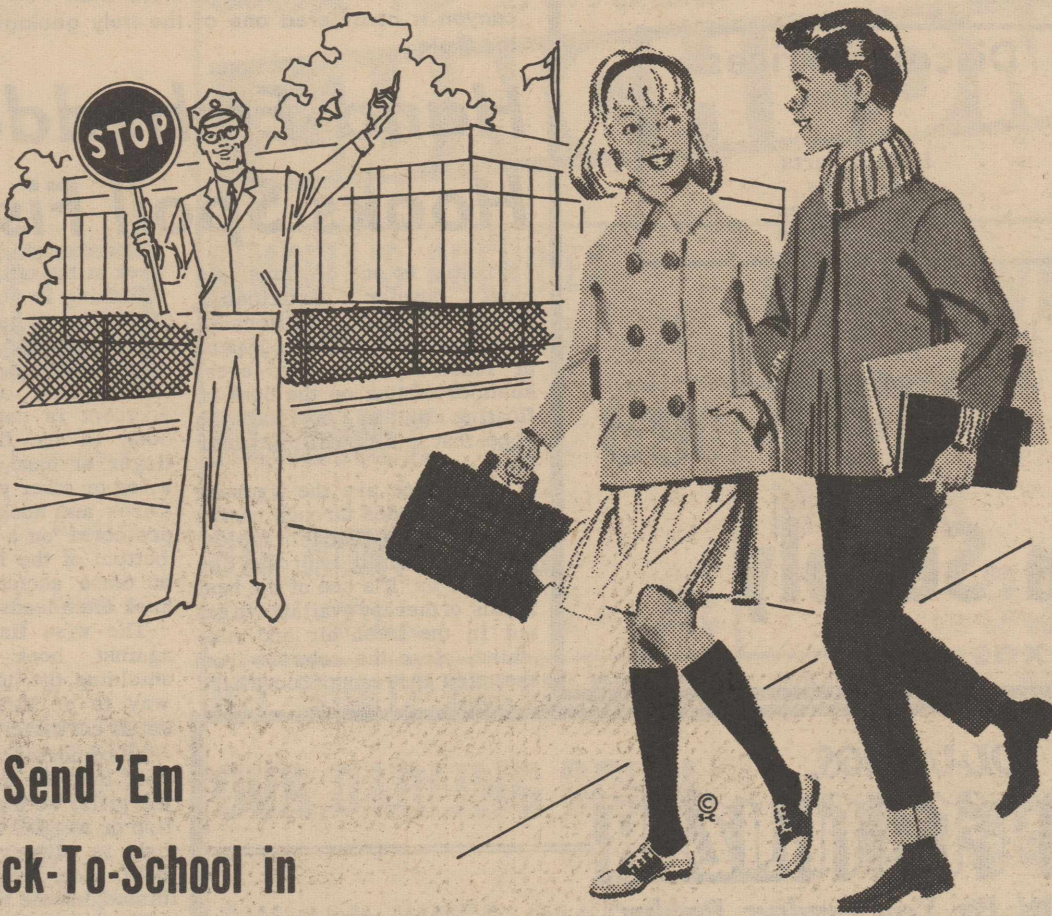
14. Spent day by Lake Altus, Okla.

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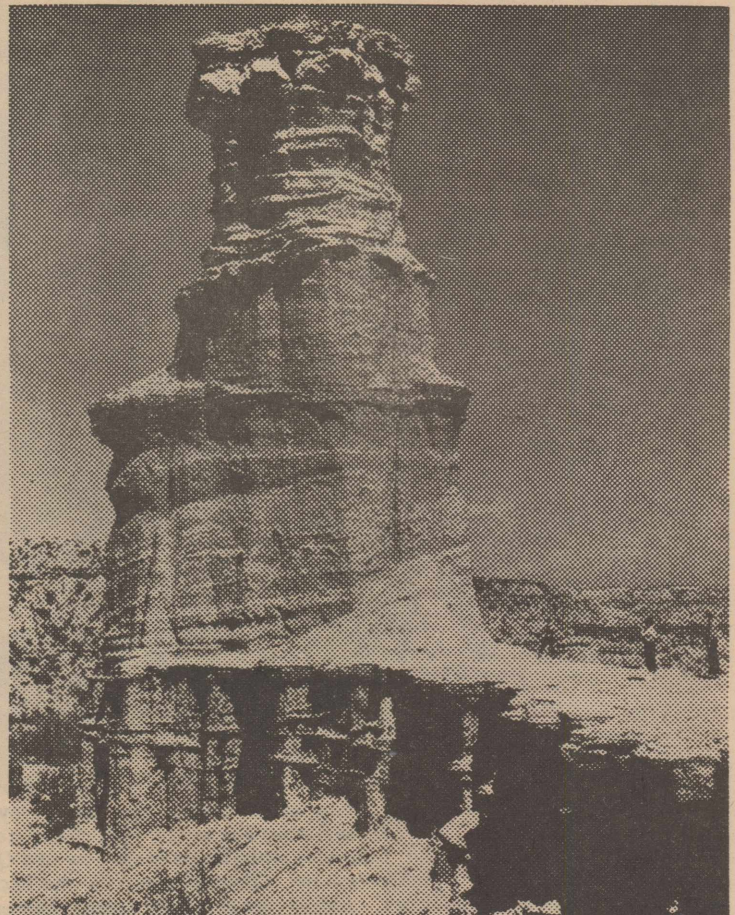

Hand-Embedded Hooks Spoil Fishing

Fishing is one of America's most popular participating sports. Literally millions of men, women and children spend at least a day or two every summer sitting on the bank or floating about in a boat with the hope that a fish will take their bait.

Unless you are the vigorous type who wades through racing rapids or rows hard for miles, fishing is mild exercise for most of us. It's one of the best forms of therapy available to get out in the fresh air and sunshine, clear the cobwebs from the mind and recoup from a hard

week at the office.

Fishing is good for body and spirit, but it has some built-in safety hazards. Most of them can be avoided.

The most common fishing accident is catching a barbed hook in the flesh, usually a finger or hand, but sometimes a leg or other part of the body. Lures and hooks left lying unprotected on a dock or in the bottom of the boat cause many of these accidents. Baiting a hook often leads to an accident.

The wise fisherman guards against hook accidents by shielding the hook. One simple way to do this is to stick a small cork over the barb.

In removing a hook from the fish, hold the fish firmly under the gills, so that its head can't flop or wiggle. A freshly caught fish is slippery and hard to hold. Get a firm grip before dislodging the hook.

If, despite precautions, a hook becomes imbedded in your hand or finger, don't try to pull it out. Your physician will snip off the shank and push it through, thus causing less further damage to torn flesh. The doctor also will, if necessary, administer antibiotics and tetanus toxoid. Hook wounds often lead to infection unless treated by a physician.
