Hart Farmer Raising Contract Hybrid Feed

Hybrid seed and their enlarged yields have made the farmer into more of a grain planter than he was a few years ago.

For that reason, more farmers are wanting hybrids, and so are many cattle raisers. Hybrids are considered more palatable.

Dwight Miller, a Hart farmer, recently went into a contract to raise hybrid seed.

Many non-farmers and non-agriculture people have only a limited idea of how the seed are raised.

Miller explained their growth this way:

"It takes a combination of sudan and kafir to raise this particular variety. The sudan is crossed with the kafir, and we get a pasture grass."

The sudan acts as the male, fertilizing unit, while the male sterile or female kafir is the feed producer. They are planted in a combination of rows along side each other.

"The sudan," said Miller, "was planted 10 days before the kafir to give it additional growth and prepare it for pollination."

The female kafir, Miller said, would grow up with all blank heads if not pollinated.

"Early in the morning," the farmer said, "it looks like a cloud or thin fog over the kafir rows."

Only a slight breeze sends millions of pollen particles sifting onto the kafir heads. Each single grain bloom must be fertilized separately.

Miller's hybrid endeavor is his first, but he says it takes only a little more work to farm it.

The farmer must plow under his sudan before much longer to

eliminate growing seed feed on unauthorized land.

Miller said the hybrid he is growing is under contract to a seed company in Plainview.

"These seed," he explained, "can only be planted for one year after they're raised here. Any longer than that, and the hybrid will turn into sudan."

He added that the hybrid, if planted for more than one year, would be filled with exaggerated sizes and mixed varieties.

Miller told that the price is a little better on the hybrid and that he hopes it will offset the difference in production.

"The better the germination" Miller explained, "the higher the price."

ship in the Mothers Club is to have a son who plays football--and the willingness to work.

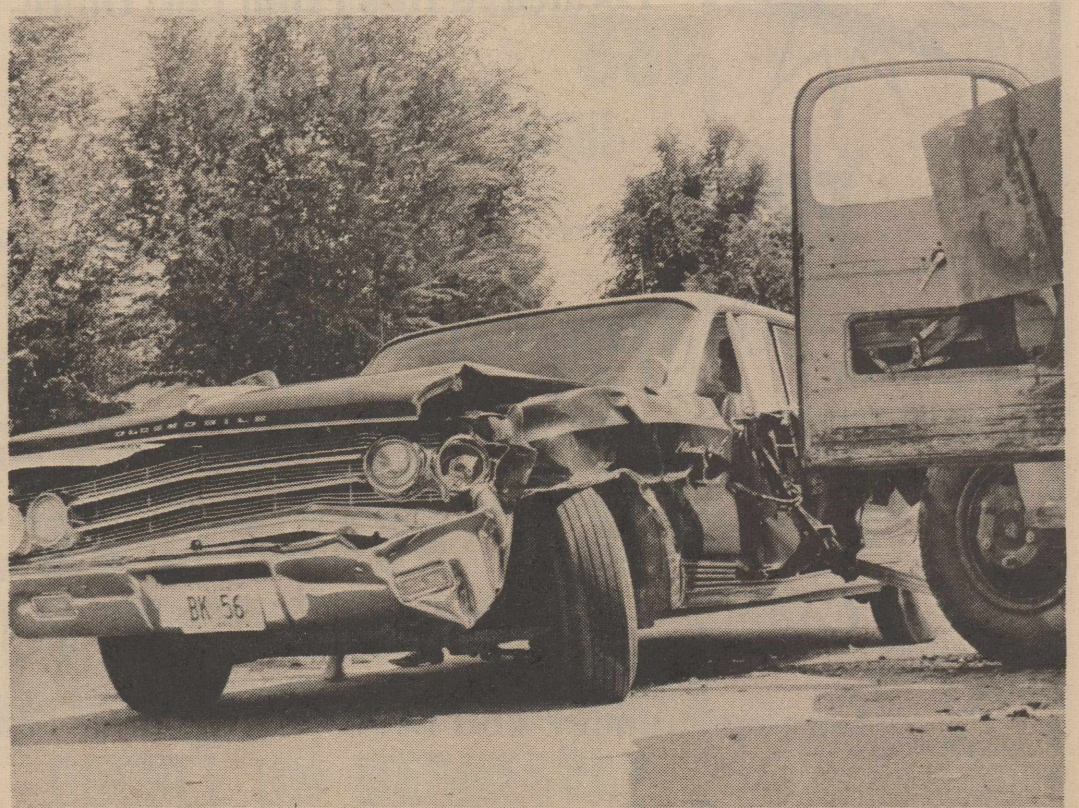
President of the Club, Mrs. Everett Heller has said that every work undertaken is in the interest of the entire team.

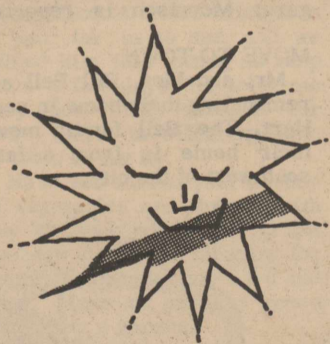

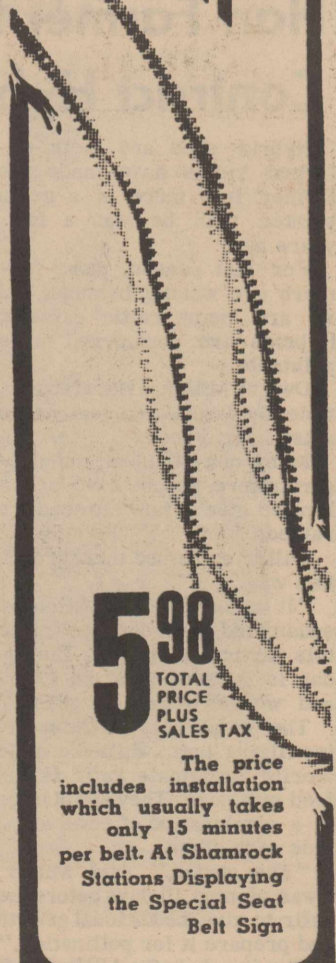

 1 1/2 cup sweet milk
 3/4 cup coconut
 3/4 cup sugar
 4 tablespoons flour
 2 egg yolks
 3 tablespoons butter

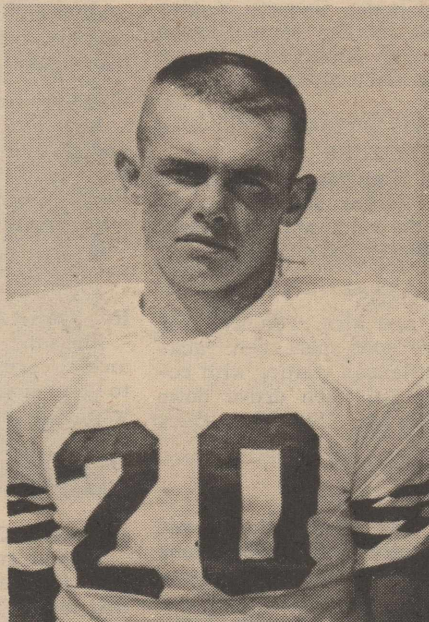
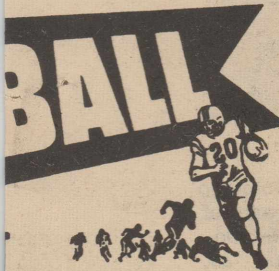

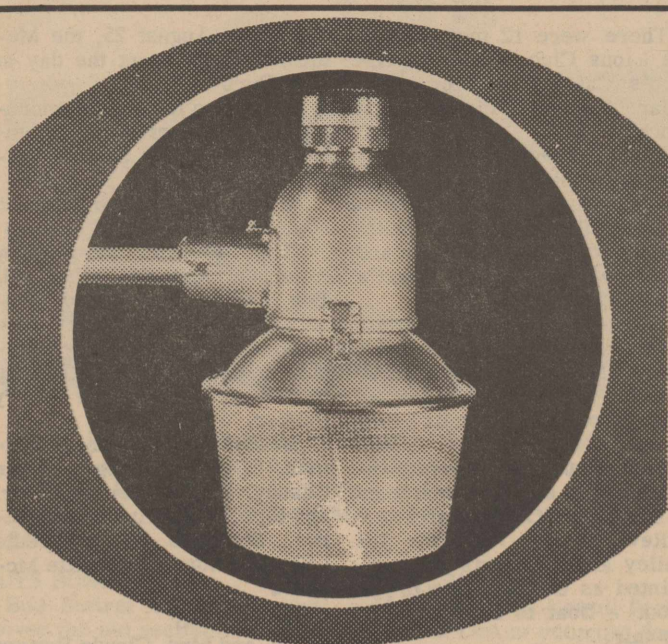

Editor's Note:

The following article was clipped from a teacher's magazine and was written by Erma Hibler in appreciation of teachers. It was passed on by a Hart Mother, who also has a child in the second grade. The article was entitled "Thank You Teachers".

Words of praise are not spoke nearly often enough and even then they seem to come slowly. But suddenly I realize how important my son's teacher is to me and how much I appreciate her.

Last fall as my first child entered school, I wondered what his teacher would be like. Would she understand him? Could she settle him down enough to teach him anything?

Sure, he was excited and anxious about going to school. I was excited too. And I couldn't help wondering, as many mothers do, about that all important person, his teacher.

Although my son has his charms, he also has faults. I worried as there were times when his faults seemed to be in over supply. We mothers do not intend to send our children to school with any imperfections; but just as their little shadows follow them, so do their faults.

However, teachers have a wonderful kind of patience and my son soon adjusted to life at school. He adjusted, along with about 27 other pupils.

I think of my son's boisterousness and multiply by 28 and I just ache. And as he reads to me from his first reader in typical first grade form, and speed, I multiply by 28 and ache some more. I can't help but feel a deep respect and affection for his teacher.

Although I have only known her for a few months, she is my friend, as well as my son's teacher.

She is a friend because she is honest with me in reporting his progress, in telling me the area in which he needs to improve and in discussing frankly his social attitudes. I know my son will grow up as a good citizen because of the devotion and dedication of the many teachers who will teach him during his school life.

I feel certain that there are other mothers like me who would like very much to say "thank you" to their child's teacher, but who find words of praise difficult to say. They, too, would like to express their appreciation to you for spending your time and money to train yourself to teach.

Thank you for going to PTA regularly, when you could use the time on paper work; for standing, when your feet keep telling you to sit; for smiling when you are too tired to smile.


Thank you for making my child feel that he is important yet only one of the many. Thank you for helping him find whatever it is he can't find; for listening to the little "important" things that he might wish to confide in you.

Thank you for noticing when he isn't feeling well, and for your patience when he is abounding in good health and with near volcanic energy. Thank you for teaching him about honor and courage and loyalty and patriotism, and for helping him practice these things each day. Thank you for the many, many ways in which you help him to grow.

And thank you, too, for being kind and patient with me, his mother, and other mothers like me. In a way you are my rival, but I appreciate you and respect you more than I could ever say.
