



Castro Fair Set Sept. 12

The Castro County Fair in Dimmitt will unfurl its flags Thursday, Sept. 12, bringing back a touch of days when preserves, cotton candy and prize watermelons were fair trademarks.

The fair will last until the 14th.

Officials have asked that all exhibits be in place by 6 p.m. Thursday. Judging begins at 9:30 a.m. Friday. A parade is scheduled in

downtown Dimmitt at 2:30 p.m. Saturday with trophies being awarded to the first three winning riding clubs.

Hart has been invited to participate in the parade. The Junior Riding Club will enter its 24 members.

Stadium Plans Now Call For 500-Seat Capacity

Sale of season tickets to fin-nce the new football stadium Panhandle. Cost of the strucance the new football stadium planned for Hart has gone over with such enthusiasm that expansion is planned even before construction gets under way.

The Hart school board voted Monday night to expand the new stadium from 300-seat capacity to 500-seat capacity.

Pre-season reserved seat sales by the Hart Mothers' Club have totaled about 200.

The ticket sales are continuing and anyone who wished to purchase tickets may buy them from members of the Mothers Club.

Work on the new stadium will begin Monday, according to Supt. Paul Kennedy. Conture will be about \$5,000.

The stadium will be about 90 feet long and will be situated between the 35-yard

lines. It will have about 200 electrical plug-ins for fans to use for electric blankets during cold weather, according to Kennedy.

The Mothers Club announced that any student who wishes a season ticket to all games, junior high and senior high, may purchase one at the school office for \$5.00

The reserve seat tickets for adults are selling for \$20, with half of that going as a donation to build the new stadium.

Longhorns Battle Nazareth Friday

Nazareth will invade the football domain of the Hart Longhorns here Friday, Sept. 3, bringing to town one of the strongest offenses in District 1-B.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

The Swifts, with an eightman team, will step up to 11man ball next season. They have scheduled games this year with Hart and two other 11man teams.

Coach Jack Aldridge will run his Swifts onto the field Friday bolstered by 16 lettermen, as he prepares for the transition to regulation size teams.

Aldridge is optimistic about his chances, pointing to a backfield filled with veterans and to

"We'll have a power team with adequate speed," Coach Aldridge said, "Depth is our strongest point."

The coach listed passing as his team's weakest factor and called attention to the absence of a good break-away runner. Aldridge is assisted by Coach

Carl Irlbeck. Hart, coached by Dub Cleveland, Eddie Nicholson and Don Ewing, is also stronger this year.

Cleveland said, "We're going to be stronger than last year, and will have good speed." He added that the Longhorns would be small, with the largest boy tipping the scales at 169.

We're going to be better balanced than last season," said the head mentor, "but we lack experience."

Although the Longhorns are returning only six regulars, they have their three top scorers returning.

Cleveland, who is in his second year as head coach, hopes to improve on the third place finish last year in District 1-B by taking the season opener.

The Longhorns finished last year's season by taking the last

two district games. They beat Lazbuddie, 13-0, and won over Vega, 30-0.

Enrollment To 551

Enrollment at Hart was up to 551 Tuesday, 55 students over the second day of enrollment last year at the schools.

Supt. Paul Kennedy said that the first day of school Monday saw 526 pupils enter the Hart school system.

He expects the number to keep on the increase and perhaps reach 600 by time harvest gets in full swing.

"If I was predicting," said the Supt. "I'd say we would reach 600 since our maximum enrollment was 554 last.year."

Kennedy pointed out that there were 73 more students near the middle of school last year than when classes began.

The Supt. said the one per cent of white children enrolled was 57.71, compared to 42.29 per cent Latin American students.

August Brings Inch of Rain

Hart received approximately one inch of rain during August. Rain was so scattered that at times area farmers received from one-half to two inches at time of the showers.

Most farmers are now through irrigating cotton and grain and would like to see about 60 days of hot, dry weather.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR **Objections Made On Dogs Running Loose**

Editor's Note:

The following letter was written by R. A. Futrell and is en-titled "Dog Tales I Hear Around Hart". It was written after Futrell read an article in the Tulia paper concerning a new city ordinance which will control the unrestrained freedom of dogs. Quoting a part of the Tulia story: "The ordinance, created by popular demand, provides that dog owners must keep their animals either on a leash or in a pen. The law provides that dogs running at large will be impounded and vaccinated. If not called for, the dog will then be destroyed after a specified time. Futrell says:

The above clipping from the Tulia Herald is a perfect parallel to the conditions in Hart, according to what people living in Hart tell me.

One man told me that his wife owned one of those famous kind you see around town and that she thought it was a won-derful pet, "just a big over-grown puppy", that wouldn't bite anybody.

She threw her arms around it one day and picked him up to love him a little, and he bit her through the nose.

Another man says when his morning paper is thrown out on his lawn, a 24 hour vigil of the canine corp is still in progress,

and he often fails to get the paper he has payed for.

Another thing, you don't want to walk up to a pickup with one of those things riding in the back, unless the owner sees you before that "big over-grown puppy" sees you.

So go the dog tales people tell around Hart. The Hart Beat would not contain half of them.


Oh yes, we have a family pooch out at our house. He will weigh about nine pounds, and he's getting old and a little ill. He tells everything he knows and a few things he doesn't know.

When friends come around, he always tells it. I investigate the disturbance, and if there is any biting to be done, I do it myself. He knows if he tries it. he won't get but one bite.



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
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
