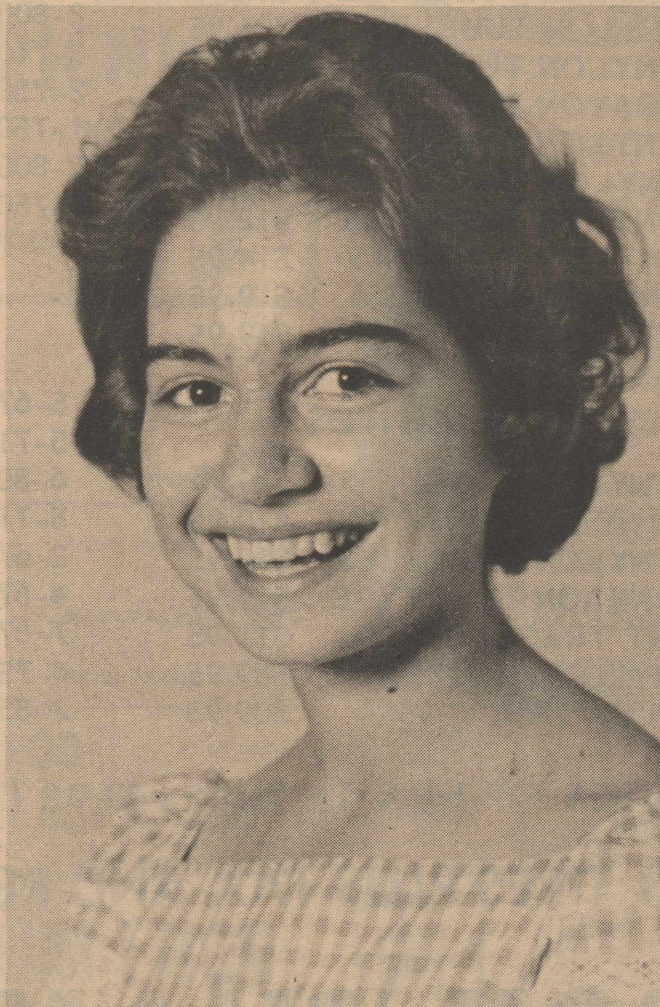

The rally will be held on the bank's parking lot.

Stores probably will be sold out of maroon and white crepe paper, school colors.

At the Longhorn football field, fans will be greeted by a new stadium, completed since the first home game with Nazareth.

And spectators won't have to look long before they find a member of the Beta Sigma Phi selling enchilada suppers.

The eating is from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at \$1.25 for adult plates and 75 cents for children.

Spoilers Role Ready-Made For Underdog Bulldogs

Anton's 2-B Bulldogs haven't won a game this season, but don't rule them out. Take a close look at their opponents, and keep in mind the attitude of an underdog. Especially at an opponent's homecoming.

Last season Anton tromped Hart 26-0. The Bulldogs have 11 lettermen, including six starters, back from the 1962 campaign. Fans are accustomed to winning teams at Anton since their purple and gold took district championships in 1959 and 1960.

This year the Bulldogs have played some toughies. In their opener a rugged Kress team, beaten only by Petersburg and tied by Hart, was pushed in its 26-6 victory over Anton.

The second week of play, one of the top class B teams, Ropesville, used exceptional speed and power to overwhelm Anton, 32-0. It was a rarity in football circles that the Bulldogs were held to 12 yards rushing. Ropesville is heavily favored in its district.

In the third game, Sundown and the resurging Roughnecks put together a combination of runs, passes and breaks to beat the 'dogs 26-6. Despite the score, Anton had 18 first downs to 19 for Sundown and trailed the Roughnecks 253 yards to 299 in rushing. The Bulldogs passed for 39 yards. Sundown is a class A power.

Another powerhouse team, Wilson, turned some of its best backs loose in the history of school to run past Anton, 32-6. So in four games Anton has crossed the goal line only three times. But underneath there's a brighter side.

Besides returning strength, Coach Dave Smith's roster shows five seniors, five juniors, eight sophomores and eight freshmen out for the team. He said earlier this year, "Our greatest advantage this fall should be our speed in the backfield and a strong passing attack."

The coach added, "We have a fast, hard-running halfback, Melvin Bell, and a good-throwing quarterback, Larry Crews, who will help a lot."

Thus far the Bulldogs running and passing game has not jelled into touchdowns.

Bell, who has scored two of Anton's touchdowns this season, is a three-year letterman. He has been clocked at 10 flat in the 100-yard dash.

Crews shared some of the signal calling duties last year but is doing most of the work this season.

Bob Conkin, another Bulldog letterman, has been moved from end to fullback. He scored the only other Anton touchdown.

On the Bulldog line, experienced lettermen dominate every position, with depth evident at all spots.

At the ends will be senior Billy Eaton, a 1962 all-district

choice, and sophomore Mike Couch, both with one letter to their credit.

In the tackle position are 230-pound Eddie Henson and junior Paul Swanson. In reserve are Mike Snead, a 210-pound sophomore, and two freshmen, Larry Watson and Allen Betes.

Another all-district selection is available at the guard post in the form of J. D. Harrell, a 175-pound senior with two letters.

Handling the center chores will be Davis Webb, a 180-pound senior with two letters.

Hart came out of its 6-6 tie at Kress with only minor injuries and should take the field here Friday at full strength. Dennis McLain, who has been slowed with injuries, saw limited action against the Kangaroos. He still is on the question mark list.

Thus far the Longhorns have defeated Nazareth, 18-0, dropped a 23-6 decision to

Springlake, rolled over New Deal, 48-20, and tied Kress 6-6. Gametime for the homecoming contest is 8 p.m.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

This week's recipe is a favorite of Mrs. A. L. Wilson. It's a one-dish meal of goulashe, easily prepared with hamburger meat, macaroni, and garden vegetables.

Mrs. Wilson has lived in the Hart Community for five years, moving here from near Halfway. Her husband is a farmer.

Her hobby is raising flowers, and beautiful arrangements grow alongside her country home. She said, "I just put them out and they come up."

The Hart woman also puts up canning.

She is a member of the Baptist Church. Mrs. Wilson has two grown children, Mrs. Doris Morrison of Edmonson and Glen

Wilson of Hart. She has one granddaughter, LaGlenda Wilson.

Ingredients for her recipe are:

- 1 1/2 pounds hamburger meat
- 6 medium-sized tomatoes
- 1 large onion
- 1 large bell pepper
- 3 cups cooked macaroni and salt and pepper to taste.

Put one tablespoon of cooking oil in a skillet and add hamburger meat. Salt and pepper. Put in skillet and scramble until about done, then add diced tomatoes, onion and bell pepper.

Cook slowly until done, and add macaroni that has been cooked. Stir together and serve hot.

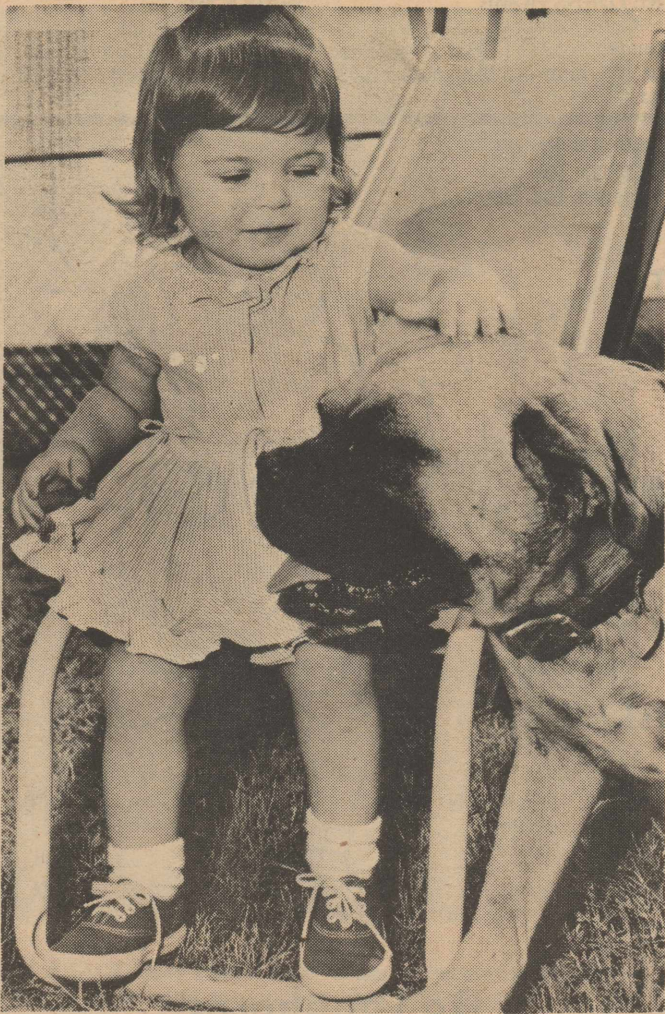

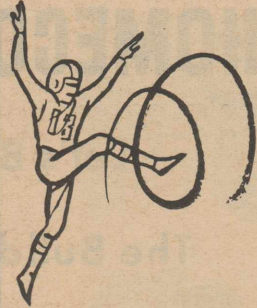

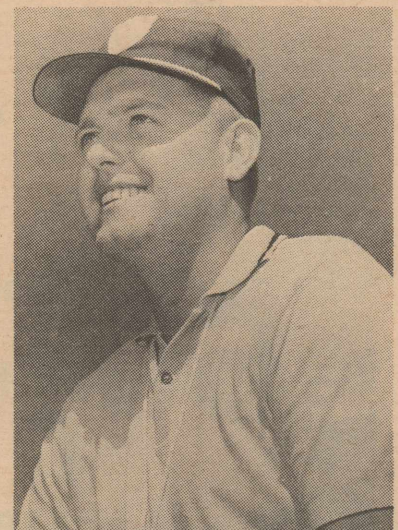

Texas' 1963 State Fair Opens Saturday, Oct. 5

The 1963 State Fair of Texas, a star-spangled "Exposition of Our American Heritage," will open Saturday, October 5, and run 16 fun-filled days through Sunday, October 20.

"How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," the award-winning Broadway musical comedy, and the State Fair Horse shows both will open Friday night, October 4.

Gov. John Connally will officially open the Fair in ceremonies Saturday morning following the opening day parade through downtown Dallas, led by the 4th United States Army Band.

Opening day is also Rural Youth Day, and some 100,000 4-H Clubbers, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers from all over Texas will be on hand.

Keyed to the Americana theme of the Fair, there will be a colorful "Parade of the Stars and Stripes" around the fairgrounds each evening at 6:45 p.m.

Exhibits from around the world will be on display in the Texas International Trade Fair in the World Exhibits Building.

Spanning a wide range of interests, other special features include the "Faces of Freedom" display of 75 original historical paintings, an authentic encampment of Indians from the Iroquois Nation, the "Wonderful World of Jewelry and Gifts", "Optical Mazer" demonstration of a new concept of transmitting communications over light beams, FFA children's barnyard, new 1964 model cars

in the Automobile Show and "live" television broadcasts from the Gas Exhibits Building.

Daily free fashion shows, a quilting bee, demonstrations of food preparation in the "Texas Kitchen Window" and the traditional displays of prize-winning arts and crafts and home-making skills will be in evidence in the Women's Building.

More than 2,200 head of pure-bred cattle, swine, sheep and goats will compete in the 11th annual Pan-American Livestock Exposition, October 5-13, and there are approximately 2,500 entries in the Jr. Livestock Show October 16-19. Twelve hundred horses and ponies will perform in the free horse shows.

Special free attractions include the Texas Music Festival October 8, Dallas Symphony Spectacular October 10, Military Tatro October 12, East Texas on Parade October 15 and a College Jazz Show October 16.

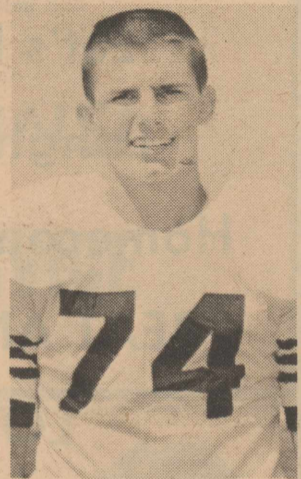

Highlights

AUSTIN, Tex.--Gov. John Connally spiked increasing rumors of a "near future" special legislative session on congressional redistricting and made clear that he plans to await the decision of a federal court on this touchy issue.

In a specially-called press conference, the Governor also emphasized his support for poll tax repeal. He said "Chaos" will result at the polls if the state constitutional amendment is rejected and the Federal amendment to ban the poll tax requirement for voting in presidential and congressional elections is ratified.

Connally was in Washington this week to discuss U. S. financing of the screwworm eradication program, oil imports, forest lands around Toledo Bend Dam, the Jefferson County seawall project, and possibility of a national park in the Guadalupe Mountain Peak area.

He said that President Kennedy may come to Texas on or about November 21-22.

Connally indicated no surprise at a recent statewide Belden poll which showed that 61 per cent of the voters interviewed approved of the way he is running his office. That's an increase of seven per cent since May. Survey revealed that Mexican-American, Negro and labor representatives liked the Governor by about the same percentage as other voters.

REDISTRICTING SUIT HEARD--A federal court took under advisement a Republican group's suit for Texas congressional reapportionment. Suit alleges discrimination against big cities in present representation.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr argued that the U. S. Supreme Court has furnished the Legislature no real guidelines for carving out new districts.

Rep. Menton Murray of Harlingen, chairman of the House Committee on Congressional and Legislative Districts, testified that this was a key factor in the Legislature's failure to re-district this year.

AWAIT FEDERAL ACTION--Carr told newsmen he plans to take speedy action to enforce the Texas Communist registration law after the federal government winds up its present proceedings against John W. Stanford Jr. of San Antonio.

U. S. Subversive Activities Control Board held lengthy hearings on alleged-Communist Stanford's activities at the request of U. S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy.

Stanford refused to register under either State or Federal Communist control laws. Recently he wrote President Kennedy: "The government has no business telling me what my politics should be."

LAW ENFORCEMENT CONFERENCES--Hundreds of local prosecutors, sheriffs, judges and policemen met here for the 13th annual attorney general's law enforcement conference.

Speakers included Carr; Dist. Atty. Alton R. Griffin, 72nd judicial district; Gaines Co. Judge Charles E. Lawrence; Dawson Co. Sheriff Henry C. Mayfield; Washington Atty. Gen. John J. O'Connell; Midland Co. Atty. Harrell Moore; Harris Co. D.A. Frank Briscoe; Runnels Co. Judge W. H. Rampy; Gray Co. Sheriff R. H. (Rufe) Jordan; Dallas Co. D. A. Henry Wade; State Atty. Leon Douglas of Vernon; Dist. Atty. Bill W. Waters of Pampa; State Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall; Assistant Atty. Gen. J.C. Davis; and Federal Judge John R. Brown of Houston.

TRIBUTE TO GARRISON--Col. Homer Garrison Jr., received a surprise tribute on his 25th anniversary as director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Said Sec. of State Crawford C. Martin, representing the Governor at the program honoring Garrison: "It is a tremendous job protecting the lives and property of the people of Texas. We Texans are very fortunate in having a tremendous man to do the job over the past quarter of a century."

CRISIS PERIOD AHEAD--Following a meeting of leaders in the screwworm program, Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde, predicted the eradication drive

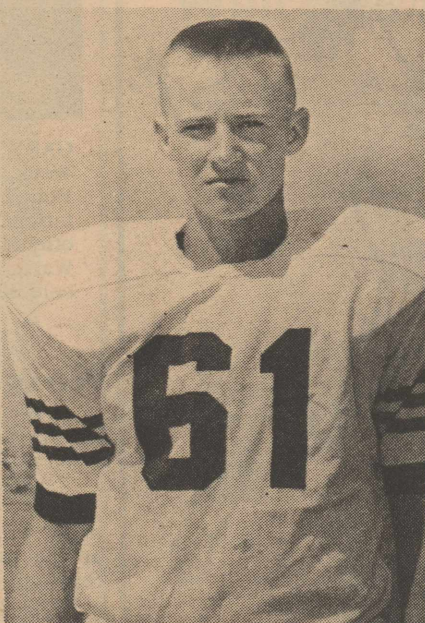

will face perhaps its most crucial test within the next 30 to 60 days.

Screwworm cases were reported in the Big Bend area, Wilson, Kenney, Media, Bandera, Dimmitt, Maverick, Edwards, Frio, Val Verde and Zavala counties.

Program leaders called for early drops of more steril flies in the areas hardest hit. Also establishment of federally-financed "barrier" zone 200 miles deep into Mexico to block continued migrations of screw-worm flies across the border.

DISASTER AREAS PROCLAIMED--President Kennedy notified Governor Connally that he has declared the zone hit by Hurricane Cindy on September 16 as a "major disaster" area. He also advised that damages are being surveyed by federal government representatives to determine assistance requirements. President Kennedy pledges "all possible assistance in the rehabilitation of the area."

NEW APPOINTMENTS--A Governor's Committee on Eradication of Tuberculosis in Texas, headed by Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre of Woodlawn Hospital, Dallas, has been appointed by Governor Connally.

He also reappointed Louis A. Scott, El Paso attorney as Rio Grande Compact Commissioner and J.C. Wilson, Pecos rancher, as Pecos River Compact Commissioner.

Jack Valenti, Houston advertising man, was picked by the University of Houston Board of Regents as its representative on the Committee of the Governing Boards of State Colleges and Universities.

VACANCY CLAIM--Guerry Strong of Austin contends that a land "vacancy" exists in Victoria County. However his claim has been turned down by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

So Strong will file suit in Victoria County within 90 days, seeking to have some 6,300 acres of land declared the property of the public school fund, instead of private owners. Since

the land involved contains much oil and gas production, the claim is being hotly contested by the landowners and oil and gas companies with interests in the area.

Strong has filed another claim in Hidalgo County on a long, thin stretch of land which has 1,800 landowners.

Should Strong be successful, the "good faith claimants" will have the right to buy back the land they thought they owned, at a price to be set by Sadler. Strong will get one-sixteenth of the oil and gas, the school fund will get the rest of the royalty.

STOCK ISSUES MOUNT HIGH State Securities Commissioner William M. King says August permits for issuing stock in Texas exceeds the July figure by \$2,000,000. Total reached was \$19,499,357. Big push for state-based securities sales brought the fiscal 1963 total of securities authorized by the state board to \$2,500,000.

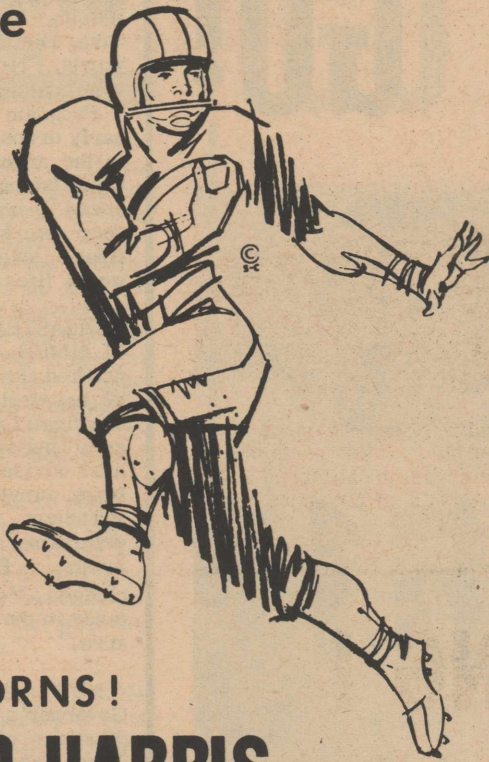

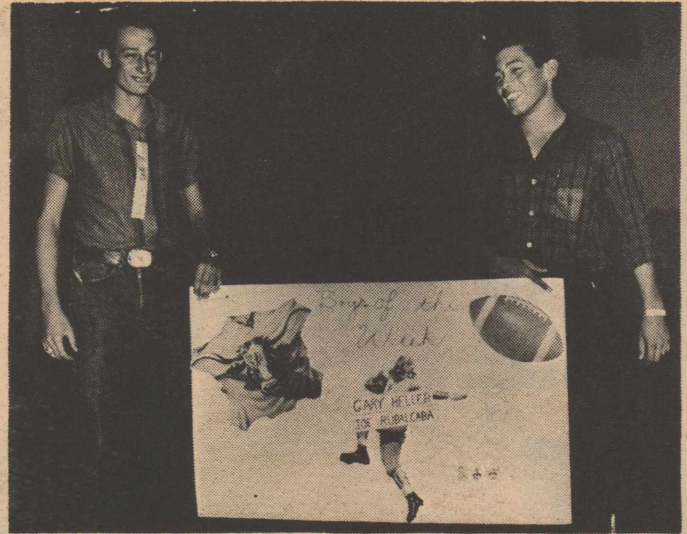

Nicholson said the pickup was driven by a Plainview man. A small sports car driven by the coach was damaged.

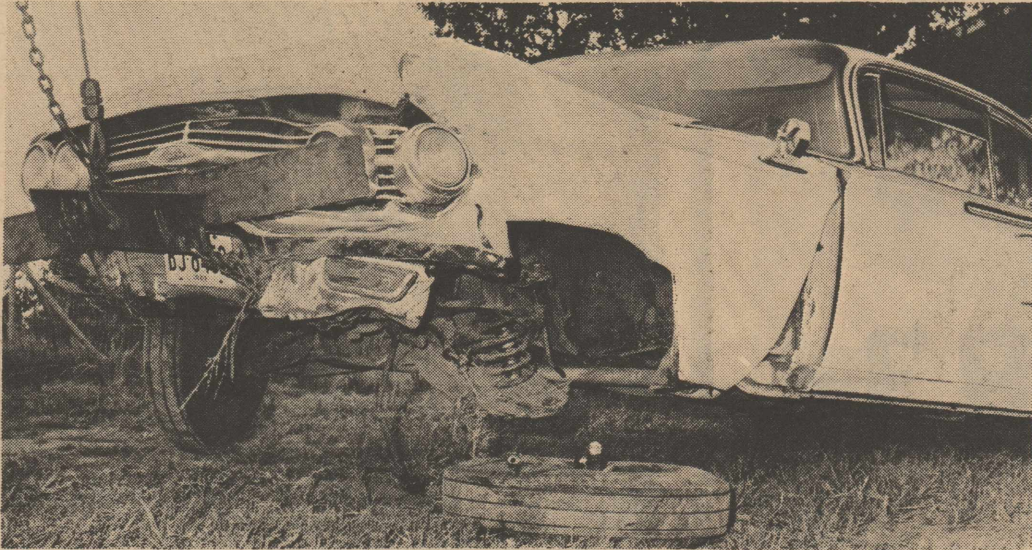

Hart Girls Hit Pole, Miss Injury



TWO HART HIGH School girls, Sherron Bass and Carol Nivens, walked away unharmed Thursday after colliding with a highline pole. The accident happened about three miles north of Olton on FM 168 in front of the E. E. Curry farm home. Impact of the collision splintered a high-line pole which helped support lines carrying 22,000 volts. Electricity was off for approximately 30 minutes in areas served by the lines.

Lady Luck was riding in the front seat last Thursday with Two Hart High School girls when their car went out of control and skidded off the highway, splintering a high-voltage high-line pole.

Neither Carol Nivens nor Sherron Bass, both 16, was injured in an afternoon mishap which easily could have been fatal.

"They're lucky to be alive," said Johnny Schenck, Southwestern Public Service man. He told that the high-voltage wire, which missed hitting the girl's car by about 15 feet, carried 22,000 volts.

The accident occurred almost directly in front of the E. E. Curry home, three miles north of Olton on FM 168.

Miss Bass, driver of the automobile, said, "We were headed south when a station wagon began backing out from the Curry residence, and a pickup was coming toward us in the other lane."

The girls were about 100 yards from the Curry residence when the brakes were first applied, as indicated by skid marks.

"When Sherron hit the brakes," said Miss Niven, "they locked and we began fish-tailing."

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith said the girl's vehicle slid 50 or 60 yards before running off the pavement.

The left front fender of the 1960 model Impala struck a pole and brought it tumbling down. Only one wire broke on the main line, with the remaining strands keeping the pole from completely falling to the ground.

Three smaller electrical wires running to the Curry home were cut by weight of the overhead stands.

Mrs. Curry said, "I was getting ready to sew when the light bulb overhead exploded and a ball of fire shot to the floor. I heard the crash but was too busy putting out the fire to go outside."

She said the damage was slight and that only two small holes were burned in the floor.

"When I went outside," she added, "the girls were both standing beside the car. A live wire was popping on a hubcap which had rolled off, but neither girl had a scratch on her."

Impact of the collision knocked off the front left wheel and did extensive damage to the automobile. The vehicle is owned by Miss Bass' brother-in-law, Donald Ray Clark.

Southwestern Public Service Company was called and the current shut off.

Areas served by the line were without electricity for about 30 minutes.

Mrs. Curry said, "It happened at exactly 5:15 because that's when the clocks stopped."

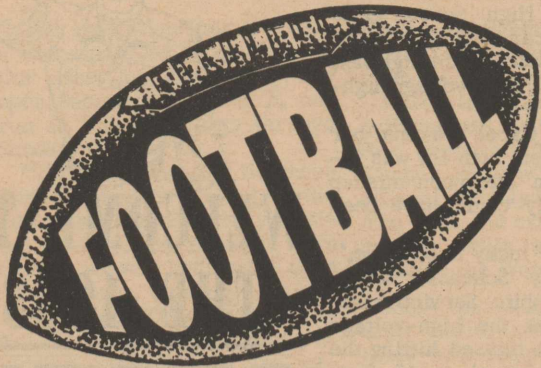

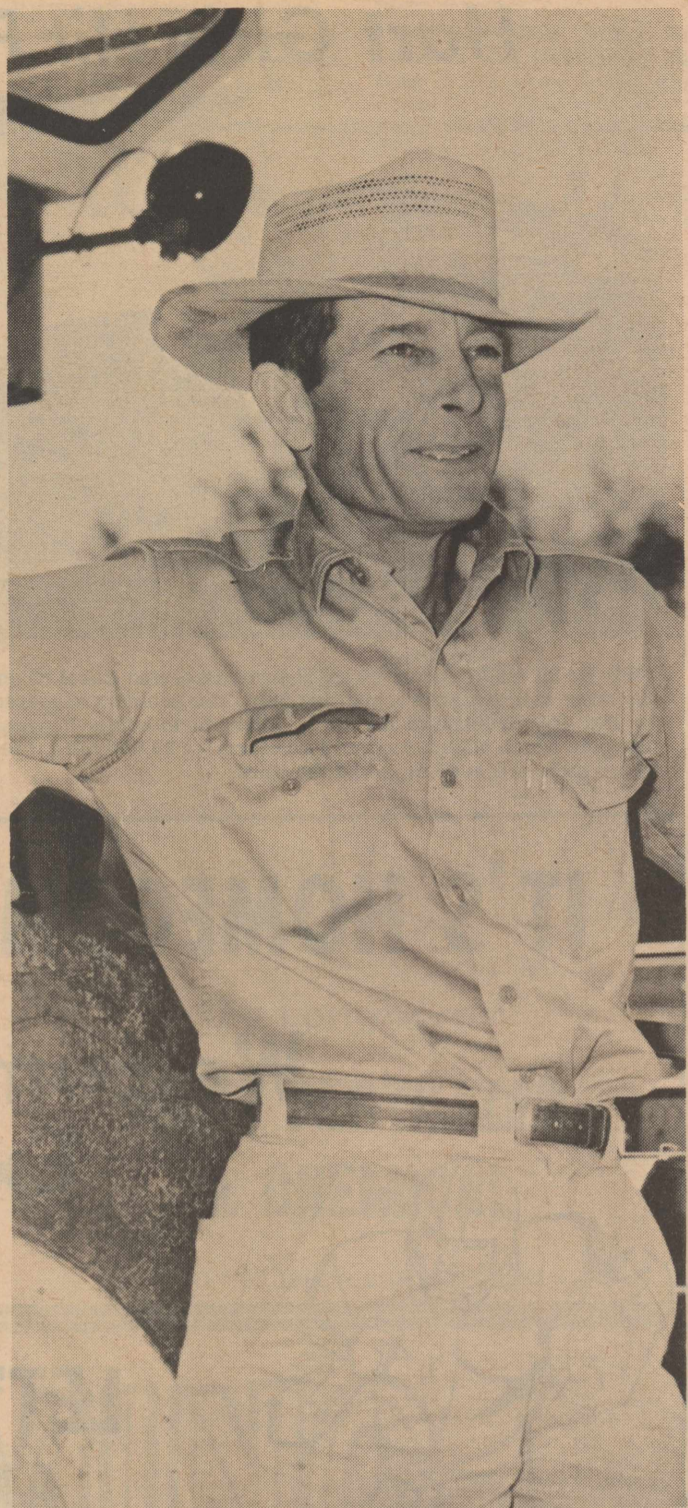

WADE MILLS

Diversified Hart Farmer Raises Hogs And Cattle

This Week's Farmer is a man who believes in diversified farming practices.

Wade Mills is one who doesn't put all his hopes for financial gain in one basket. The 48-year-old farmer in the last several years, has gone "whole hog" into the hog business.

His 25 brood sows turn out from 350 to 400 pigs a year. Mills also has 50 mother cows supplementing his cotton, feed and wheat income with calf crops.

For the past 10 to 12 years, the Hart farmer has raised hogs, and in the last five years, he has really concentrated on porker production.

Mill's pig output is such that for the year around, pigs are either being born, weaned or shipped to market. "I try to sell them when they reach 255 pounds," said Mills, "that's the weight the market is interested in."

The mammoth-sized Landress- Hampshire crossbreeds are awesome appearing creatures, all top lean producers.

Mills has sheds and barns equipped to handle the pigs through the winter time and also has his own feed crusher and mixer. He crushes almost a ton of grain a day.

Mills and two hands also farm about 800 acres. Included

in the acreage is 400 of feed and 130 of wheat. His cotton is farmed by J. D. Murry.

Mills has lived in the Hart area all his life. His parents came to this country in 1902. The farmer said he has seen this country go from dryland to irrigation and to mechanized farming.

He still has a 1942 "M" Farmall which was the first piece of rationed farm equipment to come through Castro County. The tractor had steel wheel with lugs.

Just as soon as the war was over, Mills converted the tractor to rubber tires.

As farming changes have been made, the modern-minded farmer changed with them. Mills said he could remember when irrigation wells were drilled in the 1930's and the changes in farming that they made.

"It was back in 1926", said Mills, "when my dad bought his first tractor, and he saw the possibility of power." The rush to break pasture and prairie land began in 1929, added the Hart farmer.

Mills still has a section of land which is unbroken. He's converting it back to natural pasture grass, making certain he always has an extra basket.

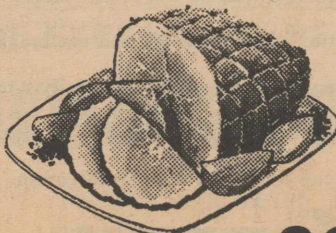

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Hart Comes From Behind To Tie Kress In Thriller

A last-ditch touchdown in the fading seconds of play Friday night handed the Hart Longhorns a 6-6 tie with Kress' 3-A Kangaroos in a non-district thriller.

Hart began its tying drive 94 yards from the Kress goal with 4:29 showing on the scoreboard clock.

As seconds ticked away, the Kangaroo's 6-0 lead looked big and safe. But when the final whistle blew, Kress and its fans were limp as a rag doll.

Carl Ward was Hart's big gun near the game's close. The lanky end caught a fourth down touchdown jump-pass then intercepted a Kangaroo's aerial with 10 seconds to play.

Ward also was the key figure in setting up the scoring play with a pass reception from his own 43, down to the Kangaroo 22.

Although Ward was a stand-out, it took a supreme effort by the entire team to fight from behind.

Leading the offensive punch were Joe Rubalcaba, Gary Heller, Billy Farris, Kenneth Fincher and Ward.

Yoeman workmen on the defensive line for the Longhorns were such players as James Mitchell, Harvey Sullivan, Roger Lancaster, Tommy Morrison, David Gardner and Larry McKay.

The Kangaroos got the jump on the 'horns when they put together 16 plays in the second quarter and pushed over for a touchdown.

First quarter penalties kept the Longhorns off stride as 60 yards for rule infractions were marched off against them in the first half.

Benny Tye, James Lockridge, and Stanley Young, Kress backs, bulled their way from their own 17-yard line early in the second quarter with Lockridge finally banging over from the one-foot line.

Tye was the battering ram in the drive, carrying for 33 yards on the ground and nabbing a pass from 11 more.

Kress' tally came with 8:54 remaining before the half. And it almost didn't happen then. It took the Kangaroos four plays to push over from the Hart 2-yard line. On three of those plays the ball was resting on the one-foot line.

Ward and Farris led the defensive onslaught which almost killed the drive. When Lockridge finally did score, the ball was only a few inches across the goal line.

Hart's Gardner took the ensuing kickoff and ran it back to his 32.

On the first play Heller passed to Rubalcaba to Hart's 43 and a first down.

Dennis McLain, still visibly slowed from leg injuries, took a pitchout and was dropped back on the 40. On second down, Heller threw incomplete to Ward, then Danny Rodriguez tried to connect with Fincher only to see Kress' Tye make a falling interception back on his own 33.

Three running plays by the Kangaroos and they were forced to punt. Gardner called for a fair catch and fielded the ball at his 44.

From this point, frustrating penalties reset the Longhorns.

Heller kept from the 44, picking up six yards to the 50. A fifteen yard penalty for pushing moved the ball from the spot of the infraction back to Hart's 33.

the next play and made a jittersbugging run back to the 45 only to see the run erased with another 15-yard pushing penalty.

This time the ball was brought back to the Longhorn 34.

Heller lugged out to the 40, and the 'horns were faced with third and 14. Rubalcaba supplied the necessary yardage as he broke into the Kress secondary and rambled to the Kangaroo 45.

On the first running play, Rubalcaba was tossed back to the 48, but two fine runs by Farris moved the ball all the way to Kress' 24.

With 2:51 remaining until halftime, Heller reeled to the 18, and Rubalcaba broke loose for 10 more to the 8-yard line.

With first and goal to go, Heller kept to the 6, and Farris rammied to the 3 and the ball squirted away. A Longhorn pounced on the slippery pigskin, and the drive was still alive.

On third down, Heller was hit hard on the one. The scoreboard clock showed 40 seconds until the half, and Hart was faced with one of its most crucial plays.

Rubalcaba took a handoff from Heller over the right side of the line and blasted across the goal. But a Hart lineman had jumped off-side, and a penalty moved the 'horns back to the 5.

Heller circled his right end, but was met headon at the 3, and the ball went over. Kress had time for only one running play before the half ended, and Lock ridge punched out to the 9.

Hart dominated the last half but each time it headed goalward, interceptions halted the drive.

The Longhorns had 18 first downs to the Kangaroos' 11.

When Hart began to move goalward late in the third quarter, another pass interception by the Kangaroos killed the drive on the Kress 22 yard line.

A pushing penalty moved the Kangaroos back to their own 14, but they ground out to their 43 before forced to punt. Hart ran the ball three plays and failed to gain the necessary yardage and they too punted.

The ball rolled dead on Kress' 31, and from that point the Kangaroos put together a drive which moved them all the way to Hart's 6-yard line before the Longhorns took over.

In the 5:40 remaining in the game, Kress was to handle the ball only three times more and one of those was on a kickoff.

Farris, Heller and Rubalcaba rammied for yardage, and Fincher and Ward kept the drive going with three pass receptions.

A crucial play came with 2:04 showing on the clock. With the ball on the Hart 43, Heller dropped back and threw long downfield to Ward, who finally was dragged down from behind on the 22.

McLain circled his right end, fumbled, and the ball rolled out-of-bounds on the Kress 16, still in possession of the Longhorns.

Farris punched to the 14, and Heller squirmed to the 10 for another big first down. Only 49 seconds remained in the game.

On the first play, Heller attempted to pass to Fincher, in the endzone but the ball slipped

off his outstretched fingertips. Again Heller dropped back to throw. He was swarmed at the 15 and threw incomplete. His pass almost was intercepted at the 5. Third and 10 faced the Longhorns, and 30-seconds showed on the clock. Another aerial fell incomplete, missing Farris at the five.

With fourth down and goal to go, Heller jump-passed to Ward, his right end, who bulled into the endzone. Ward was hit once near the 5 and almost stopped again on the 2-yard line. A second effort lunged at the goal and he was over. Hart tried the same play for their extra point, but the ball was batted incomplete.

With the game tied 6-6, Hart tried an on-side kickoff. Kress recovered, however, on its 35. On the first play, the Kangaroo quarterback threw incomplete. On the second down, Kress had even worse passing luck. Ward came out of nowhere to pick off the ball at the 4-yard-line and ran it back to the Kress 25.

On the first play, Heller threw complete to Ward on the Kress 10, with 2 seconds showing on the clock.

With enthusiasm fever high, Heller tried again to pass for the winning touchdown. But the ball fell incomplete, and the game was over.
