

Rugged Longhorn Defense Brads Silverton Attack

Hart's Joe Rubalcaba broke over his right tackle early in the first quarter here Friday night against Silverton and sprinted 69 yards for the game's only touchdown.

The score came with 8:23 remaining in the first frame, and it was anybody's ball game to the final whistle.

Tension gripped players and fans alike, and coaches were undoubtedly wishing for a tall glass of sweet milk.

Both teams were rough on defense in a game which emphasized rock-'em-sock-'em football.

Silverton won the toss and elected to receive. Three running plays and they had moved the ball only one yard. So the Owls boomed the ball out on a punt, down to Hart's 46-yard line.

Billy Farris churned for two to the 48 and Rubalcaba hit to the mid-stripe. On third down Max Garrison intercepted a Longhorn pass on his own 45.

With the Owls in possession, they called on Fred Stafford, who found a gaping hole, and rambled to Hart's 26-yard marker. On the next play, however, the ball scooted away from an Owl ball carrier and Longhorn Tommy Morrison pounced on it at the 26.

Kenneth Fincher carried to the 31, and on the following down, Rubalcaba let loose. He took a handoff from Gary Heller, hit between his right tackle and end and found daylight. After he passed the line of scrimmage, Rubalcaba cut sharply to his right and headed down the sideline for 69 yards. He outran three Owl secondary men to the goal.

The extra point attempt was off to the right, and Hart took a lead they would never relinquish.

Silverton, a class A power, was in trouble again following the kickoff. Fincher kicked a low dribbler which was finally fielded on the Silverton 25 and returned back to the 29.

On the first play Farris "reddogged" from his linebacker position, caused the Owl back to fumble, then jumped on the loose hog hide himself.

The Longhorns came out of the huddle with the ball on Silverton's 27. Farris slashed to the 22, and an Owl piled on after the whistle had blown. The penalty moved the ball to Silverton's 11, half the distance to the goal.

A stout defensive stand by the Owls pushed Heller back to the 12 on the first play, and on the third and fourth downs, threw the 'horns back to the 25.

Hardly had the Owls laid their pinkies on the pigskin until they had fumbled again. Once more it was Morrison who hugged the loose ball, this time on the Owl's 23.

Fincher rammed for good yardage to the 15, and Rubal-caba punched to the 12 and a first down. Heller wormed to the 9 and Farris managed two more to the 7.

An incomplete pass to David Gardner brought up fourth down and five-to-go for a first. Fincher looked like he might get the necessary yardage, but he was chopped down at the Silverton 4, and the Owls took over.

Quarterback Gregg Towe tried a jump pass to end Dennis Tomlin which fell incomplete. Stafford got two yards on the second down and the Owls quick kicked on the third.

The punt went only to Silverton's 37, but a 15-yard clipping penalty against the Longhorns moved the ball back to Hart's 49. Three running plays netted only five yards, and Hart was forced to punt.

Here's where Longhorn guard James Mitchell led the defensive charge. With the ball on the Silverton 25, Mitchell shot the gap twice in a row to throw Owl ballcarriers back to their own 18.

Silverton punted to the Hart 45, and once more the Long-horns took possession, playing ball control along with aggressive defense.

After Hart had moved to midfield, Heller fired a pass complete to Fincher on the Silverton 46, only to have the ball batted out of his arm and see an Owl recover.

Monty Smith, the big Silverton fullback, began his work-horse chores. He slanted off guard to his 49 then let teammate Stafford carry to Hart's 44, picking up the Owl's first lst down of the game.

Stafford kept the pressure on with another first down gallop to the Longhorn 38, but a five-yard backfield-in-motion penalty moved the Owls back to the 43.

Once more Mitchell broke through the offensive line to tackle the Owl quarterback for a five yard loss, and on the next play it was Fincher who collared an Owl back behind the line of scrimmage.

With the Owls needing 24 yards for a first, they punted to Hart's 32 and held the Longhorn at the 41, forcing them to punt.

The Longhorns again came alive on defense with Mitchell, Harvey Sullivan and Rubalcaba forcing the play.

Each play became more filled

Each play became more filled with suspense as both teams looked for an opening.

The Longhorns couldn't get a drive going after receiving the ball and punted out to the Owl's 20. Towe fielded the ball and found the way cleared by downfield blockers. He cut to his left sideline and hot footed it to Hart's 24 before Fincher overrode him from behind.

The play was rubbed out by a clipping penalty and the ball was brought back to the Owl's 19. Farris crashed through the Silverton line to drag Towe for a loss back to the 13, and Smith could only get out to the 17 before his team had to punt again.

Hart came alive offensively shortly before the half, taking over at Silverton's 40. Heller got four to the 36, and then picked up a first down to the 25.

On the next play Heller passed to Fincher on the 8-yard line, but an illegal procedure penalty moved the ball back to the Owl 30.

Only scant seconds remained in the first half when the Owls dropped Hart runners back to the 36.

Moments after the second half got underway, Max Garrison broke loose from his 21 yard line and rambled all the way to Hart's 23. Garrison was dragged down from behind by Carl Ward.

On the next play Hart defenders broke through to knock down Smith for an eight-yard loss back to the Longhorn 31. Smith collapsed in the huddle, and an ambulance was brought onto the playing field. The big fullback regained his feet how-


JOE RUBAL CABA, Hart halfback, sweeps his left end for good yardage in the game last Friday with Silverton. Hart won, 6-0.
