LONGHORNS LOCK HORNS

Two different breeds of Longhorns will lock horns here Friday night as the 1-B championship begins to hang in the balance.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. Squaring off in the battle of the 'horns is Hart and Lazbuddie. With Hart advancing one giant step at a time toward the district crown, the visitors are no doubt about it, meditating on an upset.

In the last two weeks, Lazbuddie has taken its lumps from Vega and Bovina. But the 'horns aren't dead, they're just playing 'possum.

From their lack-luster season record, it might appear the Lazbuddie unit is not capable of generating a winning attack.

They've lost five games this season, have tied one and won two. But their showing against New Home is enough to make them feared.

Lazbuddie pulled off a major upset when they beat highly favored New Home, 12-6. A 35-yard pass from Ken McGeehee to Mac Brown did the damage. The aerial bomb took place in the last few seconds of the game.

In the Lazbuddie opener, Wilson, loser of only one game, put the skids under the Longhorns, 28-6. Lazbuddie then whipped Cooper, 28-14, tied Amherst, 12-12, then climbed on the once beaten New Home team.

Whitharral, with a good team this season, got past Lazbuddie by a narrow 28-22 margin. Then Vega poleaxed the 'horns 40-14, in the first district game and Bovina rolled over the Lazbuddie unit, 33-7.

Most of the season, it has been the McGeehee to Brown passing combination which has led to touchdowns. Although against Wilson, Brown sprinted 65 yards to score, putting his team ahead momentarily.

Brown ran 50 yards for a touchdown against Cooper, while Lloyd Bradshaw was picking up two touchdowns on runs of 12 and 26 yards.

Bradshaw scored from three yards out against New Home and McGeehee and Brown teamed up for a 35-yard pass on the last play of the game to win.

In the Whitharral contest, the Panthers were hard-pressed to hang on. Mabry picked up a 55-yard touchdown run for Lazbuddie. Brown plunged one yard, then he caught a 25-yard pass from McGeehee for the other Longhorn touchdown. Mabry and Bradshaw ran the extra points.

In Lazbuddie's loss to Vega, McGeehee and Brown teamed up again for two long touchdowns.

Last season Hart overpowered Lazbuddie 13-0, but there was no district crown at stake.

If Hart gets past Lazbuddie the stage will be set for the whopper with Vega.

Lazbuddie has four players vying for all district honors in McGeehee, Brown, Mabry and tackle Lewis Seaton.

Coach Charlie Walton said his Lazbuddie line could well be the fastest in the entire district. "From tackle to tackle, we have real good speed, and our backs can move pretty well themselves."

Bailey Resigns, Position Open

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

A favorite recipe for apricot salad is submitted by Mrs. Thaylia Irons, a resident of Hart since 1954.

Mr. and Mrs. Irons have seven children, two of them married.

Vera Smith lives in Plainview and David resides in Hart.

Dixie is in the seventh grade. Roxane is in the second and Kent is a first grader. Bryan, 5, stays at home.

There is one grandchild, Kelly Don.

Mrs. Irons says her children take up most of her time. She also keeps the nursery at the Baptist Church, where she is a member.

Mrs. Iron's husband is a combiner and mechanic, and on several occasions the Hart housewife goes on harvest as a truck driver and cook.

She said her family goes in more for basic foods but on harvest she gets to try out fancier cooking because, "the men are so hungry they'll eat anything."

Mrs. Irons also puts up a large amount of canned goods.

The following ingredients are used in Mrs. Iron's Apricot salad:

- 2 pkgs. orange Jello
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 cup pineapple and apricot juice.
- 1/2 cup apricots
- 1 large can pineapple
- 10 marshmallows

When firm, top with the following:

- 1 cup pineapple and apricot juice
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 heaping tbsp. flour
- 1 beaten egg
- 2 tbsp. butter

Cook until thick, when cool, add one cup cream (whipped) Spread over the gelatin and top with grated cheese.

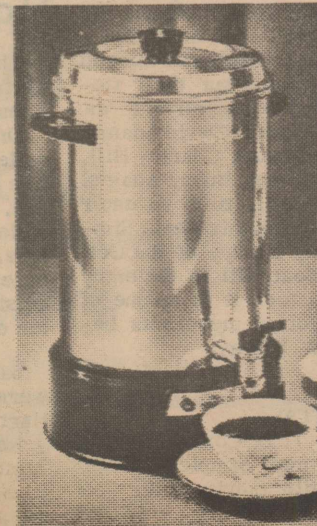

Mrs. Nicholson Says Reward Is Great In Being A Teacher

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of features which will be run through out the school year on Hart school teachers. This week's personality is Mrs. Eddie Nicholson.)

"When planning my life's work, if some sooth-sayer had told me I was going to become a teacher, I would have promptly told him he was out of his mind."

Martha Nicholson, Hart third grade teacher, made that statement in discussing the whys and wherefores of becoming a teacher.

She added, "Coming into the field of elementary teaching has proved to be a most gratifying move in my life."

Mrs. Nicholson has been teaching one year besides having substituted at schools in Amarillo and Canyon.

Speaking of her profession, she said, "I dare say that in any other profession there found such mental stimulus. Never does a day pass during which the teacher doesn't have a good laugh, make a few mistake, experience disappointment and joy

at the same time, and come out of it all a little better person.

The third grade teacher was graduated from high school at San Saba in 1957 and completed BS requirements at North Texas State in 1960. She also has studied at West Texas State University on the graduate level.

Mrs. Nicholson is completing requirements for a Master's degree. Her BS is in art education and English.

"There is no greater reward for an adult than to be a part of this world of children."

As far as outside interests are concerned, some of her husband's coaching enthusiasm can't help but rub off. Mrs. Nicholson says, however, that children's literature and the searching out and evaluating it pleases her most. She also is interested in art and drawing.

Mrs. Nicholson sums up her teaching attitude by saying, "There is nothing so beautiful as the inquiring mind of a child. There is nothing as sad as the little disappointments he has that seem so big to him."

Cost Analysis Made On New School Structure

An analysis of costs for the new junior and senior high school and gymnasium was released this week by Supt. Paul Kennedy.

The report was compiled by Brasher and Goyette, architects and engineers for the building project.

General construction costs per square feet will amount to \$6.94. Mechanical cost will be \$1.59 a square foot, while electrical costs will run to 65 cents a square foot.

Total base bids amount to \$321,694.

The structure will take in 35,104 square feet.

Rooms and facilities included in the construction are two science rooms, one homemaking laboratory, one library and study hall, eight classrooms, 672 square feet in area, and two classrooms, 784 square feet in area.

There also will be high school principal's offices, and school administrative offices for the Supt., board, tax assessor and for teachers work and curriculum area.

The gymnasium with physical

education facilities, includes basketball and football dressing rooms and fixed bleachers for 300 and folding bleachers for 300.

All academic classrooms and administrative offices will have year-round air conditioned facilities for summer and winter.

Construction is of fireproof materials throughout. Walls are all of face brick with concrete block back-up and plastered. Framing is of structural steel for the classroom portion with pre-stressed concrete for the gymnasium.

Direct building costs include program and intercom system, scoreboard and other fixed equipment.

Hart Longhorns Tromp Happy Cowboys, 12-0

The Hart Longhorns scored the first time they got possession of the football last Friday night against Happy, then played bang-up defense to skunk the Cowboys, 12-0.

The victory moved the 'horns a giant step closer to the district crown.

Happy came to play football and put the fear of defeat into the Longhorns throughout the game.

Hart, as it has all season long, came up with the big defensive plays when they were needed most. In holding Happy to a goose egg on the scoreboard, the Longhorns haven't allowed a single point to be scored on them at home this year.

They blanked Nazareth 18-0, Anton, 25-0, Silverton, 6-0, and Happy, 12-0.

Hart opened the encounter as if it would run the Cowboys off the playing field. The hometown 11 kicked off to Happy, and Harvey Sullivan tackled Eddie Moudy on the Cowboy 17 to get the game underway.

Moudy and Culp were only able to push the ball out to their 24 before punting. The ball rolled dead at Hart's 43.

From that point Dennis McLain carried three times in succession. The speedster half-back took a pitchout from Gary Heller on the first play and hit for seven yards. On second down, he took a pitchout around his opposite end and picked his way to Happy's 33 and a big first down.

Again it was McLain who carried. But this time he was dragged down after getting only a yard to the 32.

Billy Farris lugged for his first time, getting two more yards to the 30. For a moment, the third and seven looked lean and long, but Joe Rubalcaba found a large hole up the middle on a trap play and churned to the 11-yard-line.

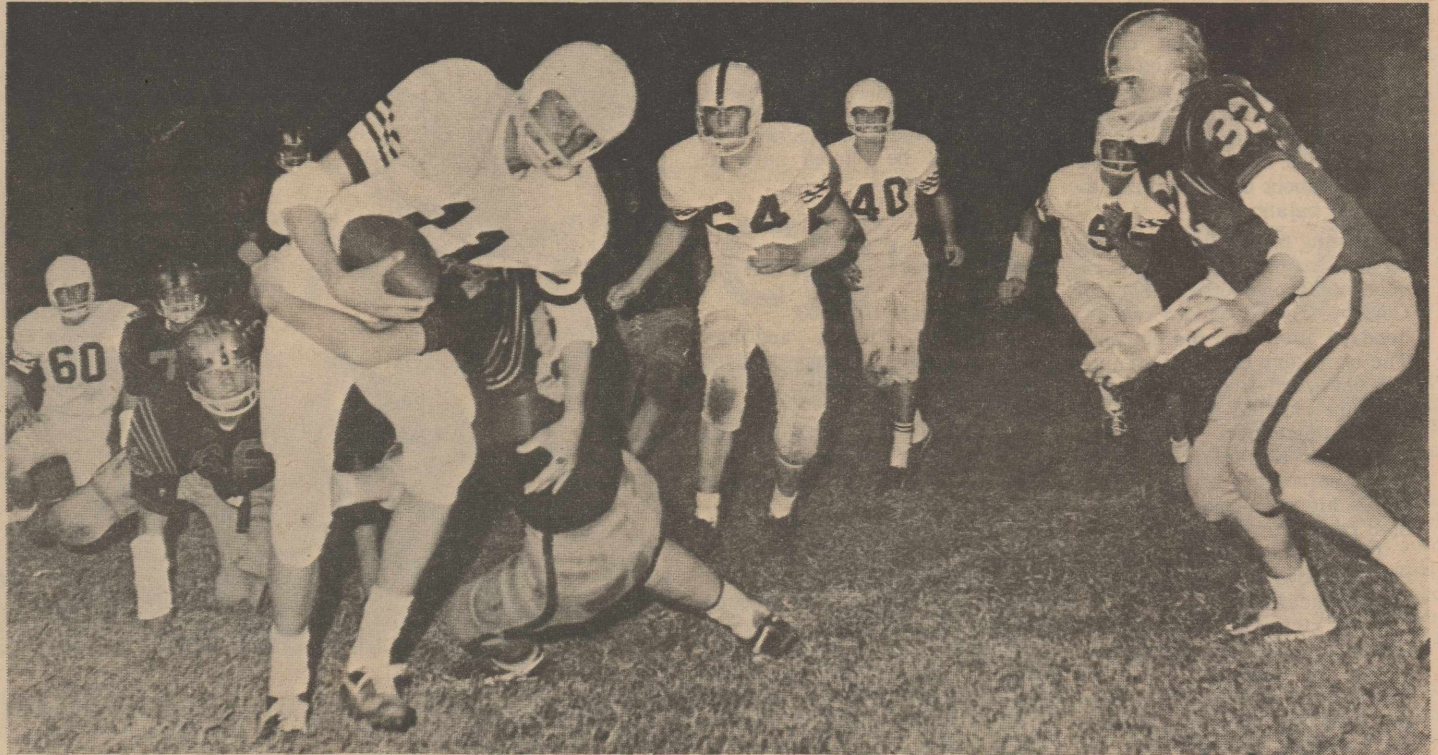
Heller kept to the Happy eight and McLain was called on again. It looked as if he would go over for the touchdown, but was knocked down at the one. McLain was not to be denied a second time, booming over for the score with 6:48 remaining in the first quarter.

Heller tried to pass to Farris for the extra points, but threw high and incomplete.

Happy came right back after the kickoff with Mark Maynard, Tom Moudy and Jim McManigal slicing for long yardage.

After Moudy had run for two ground-eating plays, Culp carried to Hart's 26 only to have the ball knocked from his hands. Farris played losers-weepers, pouncing on the "hog-hide" on his own 31.

McLain, Farris and Heller pushed the ball out to their 41 when a Longhorn fumbled and a

Happy lineman claimed possession.

Behind the stout running of Moudy and McManigal, the Cowboys edged to Hart's 13 again. Hart, however, put its toughest efforts into defense and held at its 29 yard line.

When the Longhorns took over, McLain was given the ball out of his 34 and Farris poked to the 35. A third down pass attempt was off target and Kenneth Fincher went back to punt.

For the first time this season, Fincher had the ball blocked and Happy took over again. This time the ball was resting on Hart's 30.

Culp and McManigal carried twice to the Longhorn 23 and Moudy was wrapped up again at the 23. A fourth down passing attempt was broken up by Sullivan, and the 'horns plays and an incomplete pass failed to gain the needed yardage and Hart had to punt. Fincher this time kicked from deep in his own territory to the Happy 40.

Carl Ward, who raced downfield under the ball, tackled the receiver just as the sphere was caught. Ward made two other similar tackles.

As the first quarter ended, Hart still clung to its 6-0 lead and twice had stopped fourth down tries with short yards needed by the Cowboys.

Hart held on its own 36 midway in the second quarter then came to life offensively. Rubalcaba rammed up the middle for good yardage to his 45, and Heller pitched complete

to Fincher for a first down on the Longhorn 49.

Heller faded to pass on the first down, but finding his receivers covered, he tucked the ball and ran to the Hart 46. Farris appeared to be trapped

well behind the line of scrimmage on the second down but shook loose from four would-be tacklers back to his 43.

There was a questionable

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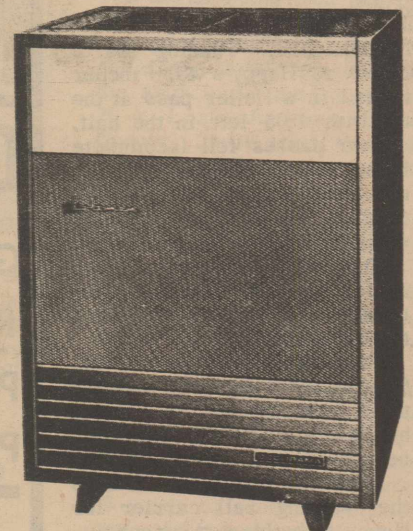

fumble on the play but officials ruled Hart had recovered.

With a little less than four minutes to halftime, Heller rolled out to his left and threw a rushing pass complete to Farris, who was running wide open. The play got underway at Happy's 40. Farris made the reception about the 25 catching the ball off balance.

Running for at least 10 yards on the verge of falling, Farris regained his footing near the Cowboy 15 and outran two secondary men into the endzone. The Longhorn back was hit about the one-yard-line, but his momentum carried him in for the second touchdown.

McLain was trapped on the extra points try as he tried to circle his right end. There was 3:46 remaining in the half.

That was plenty of time for the Cowboys to give the Longhorns a scare.

Ward kicked off and Maynard fielded the ball around his own 15 for the Cowboys. The young man was off and running, breaking into the open at midfield. He rambled to Hart's 44 before Roger Lancaster was able to head him off. Only Lancaster remained between Maynard and a touchdown.

Happy's Culp kept to the Hart 41, then the Cowboy's luck changed to a dimmer hue. On second down they fumbled, and David Gardner staked a claim to the ball for the Longhorns.

With the football on Hart's 40, Farris picked up nine to the 49. Again the swift back carried. He broke into the open at the line of scrimmage but slipped down as he made his cut.

Rubalcaba, running hard, drove to Happy's 45. Fincher hauled in a Heller pass at the 34 with 1:05 left in the half.

Two passes fell incomplete before McLain broke loose to the 26. Rubalcaba picked up a first on the Cowboy 21, and 15 seconds showed on the clock.

Three incomplete passes, two in the endzone, had the Cowboys hanging limply on before time finally ran out.

From the third quarter on, Happy played the Longhorns off their feet. Coming back like a house afire, the Cowboys began a drive from their own 20.

Doyle Bryan came alive as the leading ball carrier for Happy as he blasted for consistent yardage.

On four different occasions, it was Bryan who picked up the necessary footage on fourth and short yardage attempts.

With McManigal pitching in, the Cowboys moved the ball five and six yards at a time all the way to Hart's 12. With a first and 10, McManigal blasted for one to the 11. Bryan got two more to the nine and hit again to the seven.

The Longhorns threw almost every available man into the defensive line to stop Bryan near the three and take over.

Farris got the 'horns a little breathing room out to the six. Heller kept to the seven and McLain punched to the nine before the Longhorns were forced to punt.

Fincher punted from his own endzone to his 44. Ward made his typical downfield tackle rolling up the Happy receiver before he could untrack.

Again the Cowboys became dangerous offensively. Moudy and Bryan alternated packing the ball all the way back to Hart's 20-yard line before the Longhorns threw up their brick wall defense and stopped the drive.

The 'horns moved the ball

back to midfield before punting. Fincher kicked out-of-bounds on the Cowboy 13 with 46 seconds to play.

Ward, James Mitchell and Lancaster collared Culp back to his five as the quarterback tried to pass. Two other Happy passes went astray as the game ended.

Next week Hart will battle Lazbuddie in an important tussle of the Longhorns. The game will be played here at 7:30 p.m.

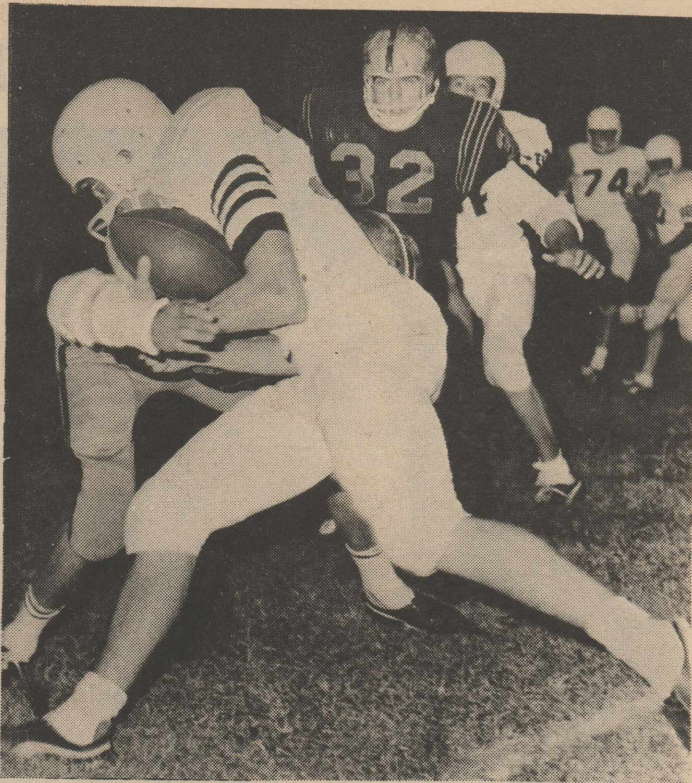
