Varner was only 17 points off on the tie-breaker, while


Calvin Alexander of Hart was 21 away for second place.



Lazbuddie 29-14 Hart Victim

Hart's Longhorns, looking ahead to Vega, allowed a "Johnny-Come-Lately" Lazbuddie team two touchdowns in the last quarter here last Friday but had little trouble winning, 29-14.

In taking the decisive victory, Hart pushed toward the District I-B showdown Friday with Vega. The winner will represent this district in the regional playoff. The out-of-town game Friday will be another clash between two Longhorn units.

Lazbuddie is scoring against Hart, became the first team this year to cross the home goal. Hart had consecutively shut out Happy, Bovina, Anton and Silverton prior to the Lazbuddie game.

Hart kicked off to get the game underway Friday then both teams played heads up defense to keep each other at bay.

Not until midway in the first quarter did Hart generate steam needed to drive within striking distance. Lazbuddie went into a shotgun offense in an effort to exploit the passing game.

Passing from the Hart 35, Lazbuddie quarterback Kenneth McGeehee aimed one downfield which was picked off by secondary man David Gardner. He returned the ball back to his own 49.

On the first play from scrimmage Dennis McLain, who enjoyed his greatest night, broke loose for a 21 yard gain to the Lazbuddie 30. Kenneth Fincher carried for another good gainer to the 21.

With second and one to go, Gary Heller rolled out to his right and spiraled a perfect strike to Carl Ward for touchdown number one. Heller tried to find an open receiver on the point after, but when they were all covered, he ducked his head and plunged for the two points. With 4:08 remaining in the first quarter, Hart had taken an 8-0 lead.

Lazbuddie saw another one of its passes picked off moments later, and it too was turned into a Hart touchdown.

McGeehee tried to jump pass to his right end but overthrew the target. Fincher made the grab on his own 35 and rambled back to the Lazbuddie 28.

McLain found running room to the 19 and Billy Farris uncorked to the 10. McLain carried again, to the five. On the next play Farris ripped the middle and went into the endzone.

A 15-yard penalty for holding nullified the score and moved the ball back to the Lazbuddie 19.

The triumph for the visitors was short-lived, however, when Heller passed to Farris in the right flat and the shifty half-back weaved his way through defenders into the endzone.

The extra point was kicked by Larry McKay and Hart had themselves a 15-0 advantage. The score came with 10:49 remaining until halftime.

Things moved slowly for a while after the touchdown when McKay kicked out-of-bounds three times on the kick-off. On the last kick, Lazbuddie took over on their 40. The visitors only had the ball one play until they put it into the air and Ward intercepted for Hart. He captured the pigskin on his own 25.

Two plays later a Lazbuddie player, Johnny Mitchell, suffered a broken nose and the game was delayed about 10

minutes while an ambulance carried him to a hospital.

Lazbuddie threatened about midway in the second quarter when Johnny Mabry and Gary Mac Brown carried to Hart's 21. McGeehee moments before had recovered a fumble on the Hart 30.

A stout defense by Hart held Lazbuddie, then it was McLain's time to shine again. The race-horse back took the first play from scrimmage 79 yards on a spectacular touchdown run.

McLain broke over his right tackle and end, cut to the outside and outran three secondary men to the goal. Heller, on the extra-point attempt faked a kick and wheeled to throw a low pass to Farris complete in the end-zone. The score then stood 23-0 and Coach Dub Cleveland began to substitute freely with his reserves.

Hardly had Hart kicked off until Fincher had intercepted another long pass and returned it to his 35. Harvey Sullivan





Number Of Situations

WASHINGTON-Unemployment can reflect the desire to work but inability to find a job. It can also reflect the ability to work but lack of great desires for a job.

Present employment surveys by the Department of Labor don't show the difference.

The average unemployment rate is 4.8 per cent. That is for all the jobless. Teen-aged boys have a 13.1 per cent rate; teen-aged girls 12.7 per cent. Married women have a 6.4 per cent rate. Single men over 20 have an 8.8 per cent rate.

It is possible that some teenagers, though seeking work, show no great desire for it because they are living at home with their parents. It is possible that some married women are very choosy about the type of work they will accept so long as their husbands are supporting them.

These surmises are suggested by the fact that among the group clearly with the greatest incentive to work, married men not separated from their wives, the unemployment rate is 2.3 per cent, less than half the average.

Just One Year Worth \$17,500

WASHINGTON---Parents of high school students have a chance to make this year worth an average of \$17,500 apiece to their children. It is a startlingly large sum for a teenager to get for a year's effort. Many persons highly skilled make far less. But if parents keep their children in school this year, they can reasonably expect them to earn an average of \$17,500 more over their working lives than if they dropped out, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. A full four years of high school would be worth \$70,000 extra.

Youths who drop out, moreover, may drift from one transitory job to another throughout their lives. For educated persons, good, permanent jobs are plentiful.

The problem is critical. We have one time for schooling, when we are young. Yet about one million youths will quit this year unless parents, friends, teachers, businessmen, and others act to help the waverers now.
