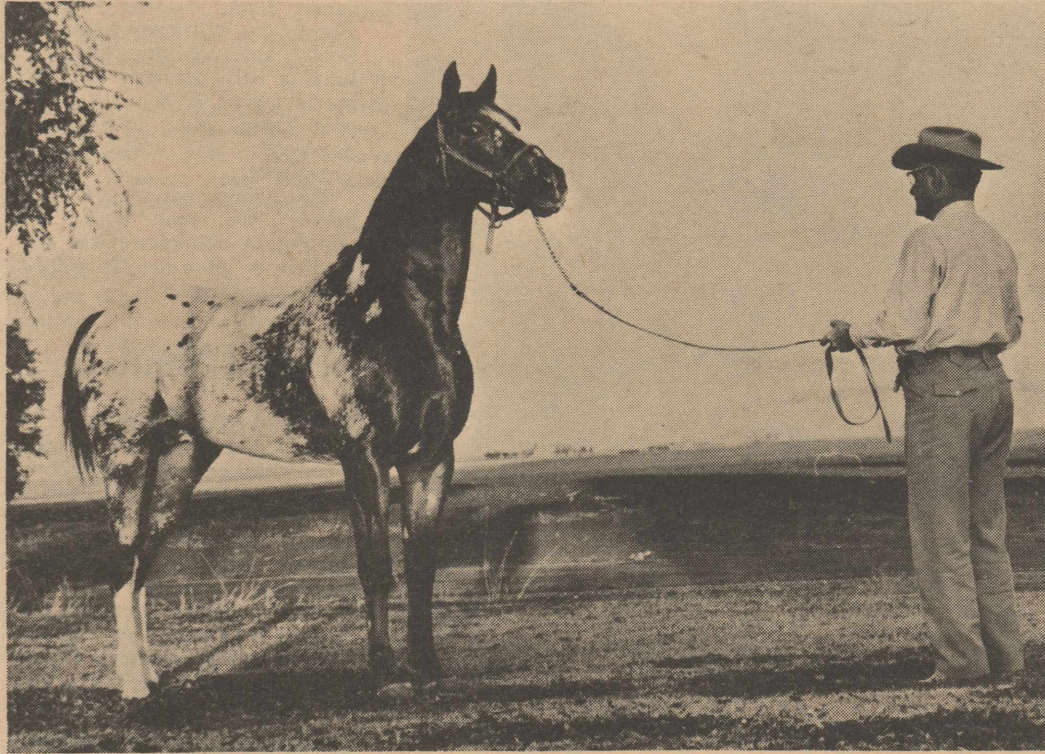

Killer Freeze Goes On Record

The most unpredictable weather in many years for the fall of '63 has just about broken all records in the books.

According to weather records, the latest killing frost for this area was Nov. 9, 1953 and last year was on Nov. 8. This year the killing frost was not recorded until the morning of Nov. 18.

Since 1911 when the experiment station began keeping ac-

tive records, the latest killing freeze went into the books as Nov. 26, 1944.

Mother nature was exceptionally good to farmers in this area, holding off until the middle of Nov. Conditions were ideal for the harvesting of grain, almost all in now.

Had the freeze been average, it would have come Nov. 7, according to the Lubbock Weather Bureau.

Former Resident Recalls Childhood

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter is from a one-time resident of Hart, Bert Rhodes. Rhodes is now minister of the Church of the Nazarene in Oildale, California. In his letter to the Hart Beat, he reminisces on early happenings in this community.

Dear Editor:

I received today through the mail three copies of the Hart Beat and the reading of various news items recalled many happy memories of my childhood days as a boy in the community.

There were names of people that I hadn't thought of for a number of years. Mr. and Mrs. Maple, for instance, were close friends of my parents and I can recall many times when my father and I would pass their place on the way to town.

Three of my close boyhood friends were Tony Smitherman, Stewart Newsom, and Dean Phillips.

A real treat as a kid was to go to Newsom's Grocery with my dad and buy five cents worth of candy. Few were the times when he gave me five cents. But when he did, I'd stand wide eyed looking into the candy case carefully selecting the best buy.

I can recall plainly the day

the first new buses for the school arrived. Two or three couples in the community went back east to pick them up. I believe Mr. Bennett, (Ray), was one.

Some of the most enjoyable times of my life were the hours spent riding the bus to and from school. What times we did have. On one occasion the driver had us get out to help push the bus through some mud.

We didn't want to go to school that day so we all pushed the bus in the ditch and as result the driver had to send some of the boys after a tractor.

Needless to say, we spent little time in the classroom that day.

In speaking of the classroom, they were so cold on most winter mornings that all the kids spent most of the mornings hovered around the steam heaters.

We lived four miles south of town on the road to Olton. Tump McLain's place joined ours to the east. The lake in Lett McLain's pasture was our swimming hole. We used to get tire tubes and use them to keep us afloat as we paddled across the lake.

There were seldom any fires but I do remember one. The

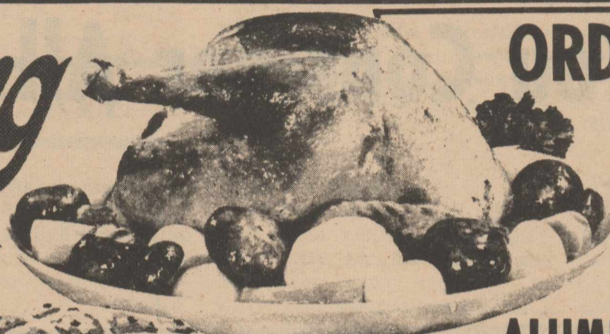

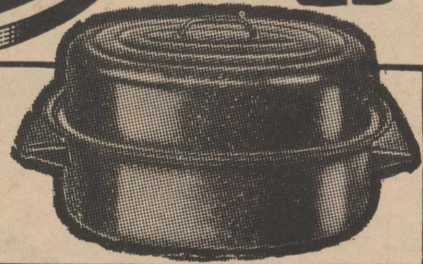

I understand that in recent years the school has burned also.

When we moved into the school from the one which was down near the Hill Store, the farmers came with their trucks and trailers and moved all the seats and equipment.

The beginning of the school lunch program was a day to remember. The kitchen was a corner of the science room. We filed by the kitchen counter to pick up our hamburger and then back to our class room to eat.

I recall the school board permitted the gym to be used for skating each Saturday night. One of the most outstanding events of the year was the community Christmas program. Santa Claus came and delivered toys and candy.

It has been 17 years since we moved from the wonderful community of Hart. Many new people have come and with the passing of years some things have changed. But I'm sure the friendliness and warmth of the people have remained the same.

After completing my college work in Pasadena, California, we remained in California and are now in Bakersfield.

My wife, Leta, and I have four boys, Gary (10), Rusty (7), Rolly (5), and Scotty (2).

Should it ever be possible for us to visit in our boyhood community we will drop by and say "hello".

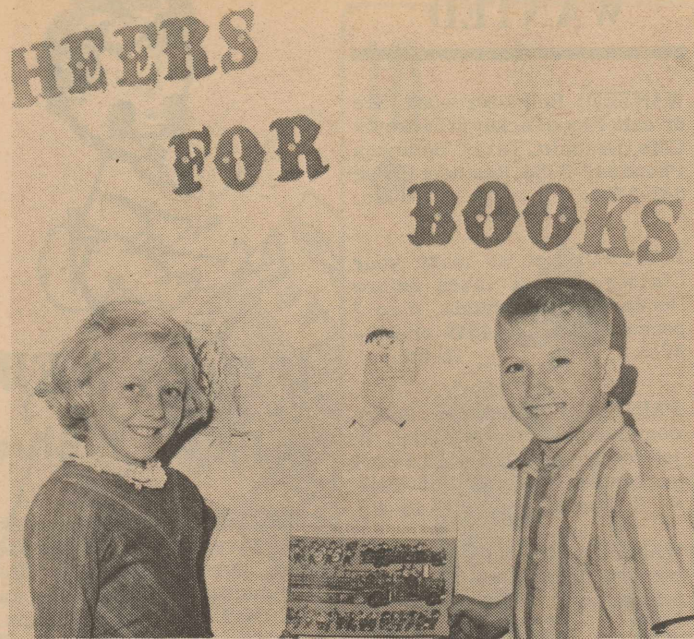

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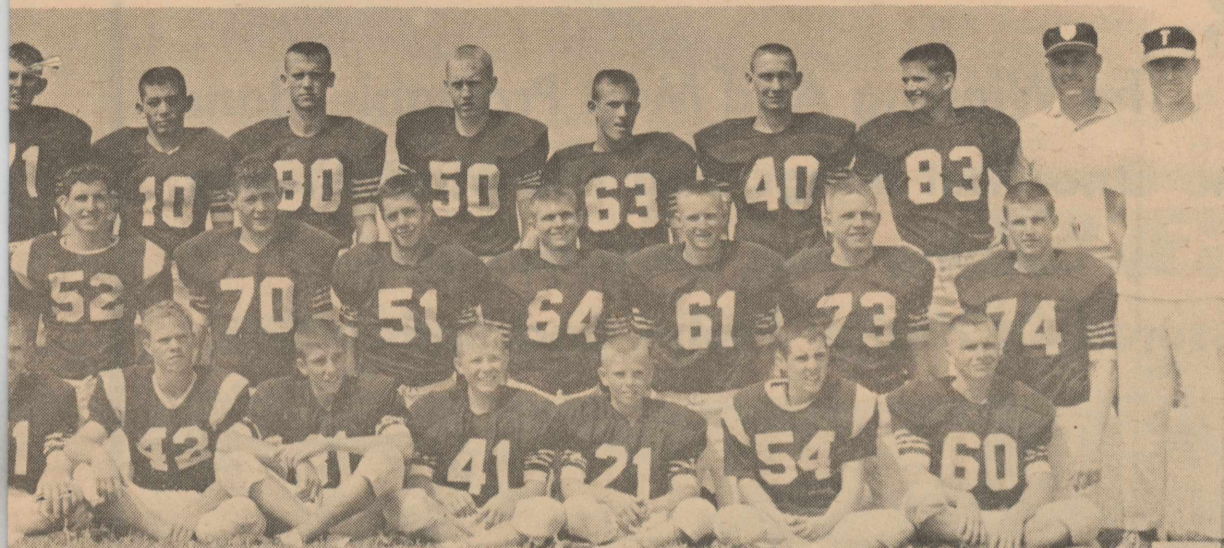
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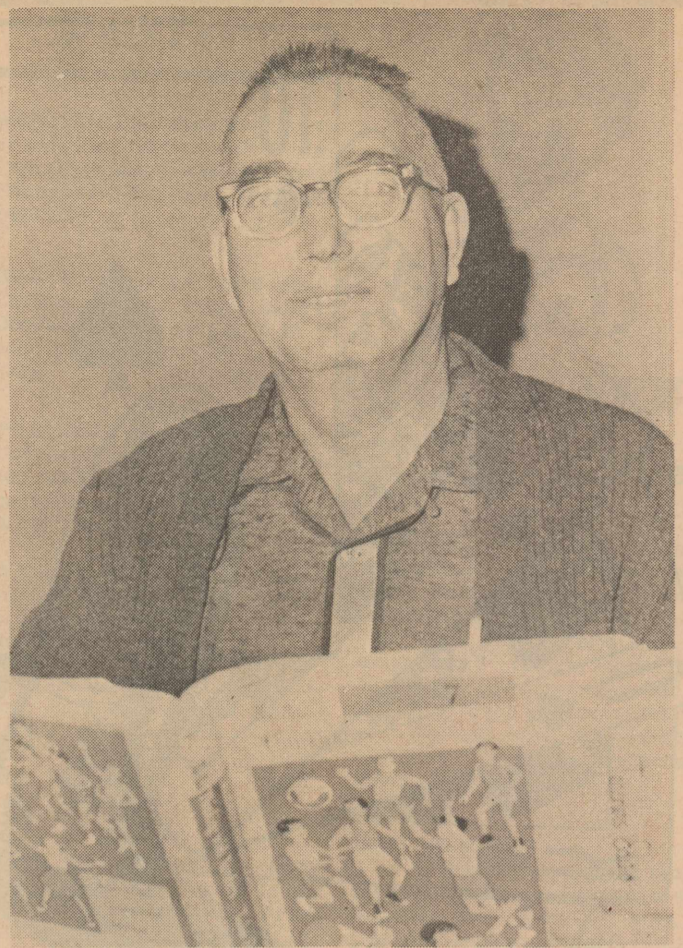

No longer are the lower level grades being dominated by women teachers. Even though there was once a time when male teachers were the rule rather than the exception, they gave way to the women.

The trend is working itself slowly back again.

Effort To Update Math Meets With Approval

The current effort to update mathematics to match the space age meets with approval of some parents and personnel from 10 public schools in the Plainview area, judging by their responses to a questionnaire.

What's more, they think from the grade school set into high school, students will share their interest in the new approach to mathematics.

This evaluation of the "creative mathematics" rapidly being adopted in schools across the country comes from a survey of 36 adults, including 3 Olton residents, who are taking a workshop course in elementary school mathematics taught the first nine weeks of the semester at Wayland Baptist College, by Dr. Dorothy McCoy, chairman of the Division of Physical and Biological Sciences.

Returning the questionnaire were 36 participants from Abernathy, Cotton Center, Dimmitt, Floydada, Littlefield, Olton, Petersburg, Plainview, Springlake and Tulia.

Teachers are not the only ones interested in the space age approach to the subject. Six housewives are among the 3 Olton students enrolled in the class. Although one of them described herself as a mathematics major of "ancient vintage" who is taking the course because of continued interest in the subject, others are interested in the course primarily because they want to keep up with what their children are taught in school.

The new concepts, such as empty set, base five numbers, simple equations and equal and equivalent sets, are helpful in developing mathematics reasoning power in children, believes an elementary school principal from Petersburg, J.D. Knutson.

When the number line for addition and some sets were introduced to Latin American first graders in Petersburg, the results were gratifying says their teacher, Mrs. Letha Stahly.

Terminology of the new approach makes it easier to get an idea across, believes Jack Bounds, Plainview, who has been introducing the new concepts to members of his ninth grade classes in general mathematics and modern algebra, who have not previously been taught this method.

"The new approach is easier to understand than the one I was taught in elementary school. It does not underrate children either," comments Carol Elmore Hamner, senior elementary education major from Fritch.

Although the new textbooks for mathematics, prepared by the School Mathematics Study Group with support of the National Science Foundation, are not yet officially used by most area schools, many teachers report that they are mentioning the new terms to classes and presenting illustrations of the new concepts in class periods in numbers and arithmetic.

Dr. McCoy thinks the new approach will likely be accepted in most area schools within a few years. She has noted interest in the approach in conferences and institutes she has participated in during recent years.

Although most workshopers describe the modern mathematics as "utterly fascinating", "creative" and "a challenge to the exceptional student", some reservations are expressed. Just because first graders can learn algebra and geometry as it is presented under the new system, it may not be wise to teach these concepts at such an early grade level, believe some local educators.

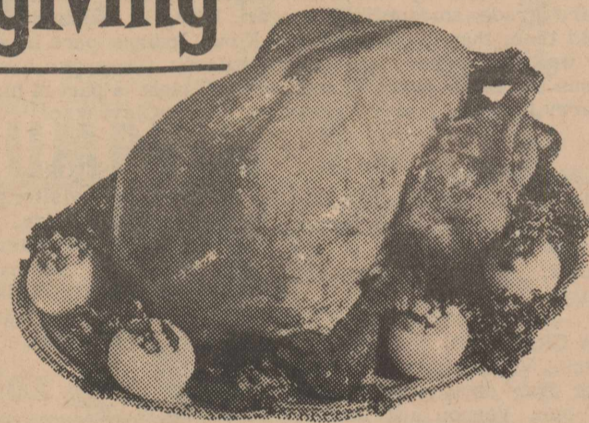

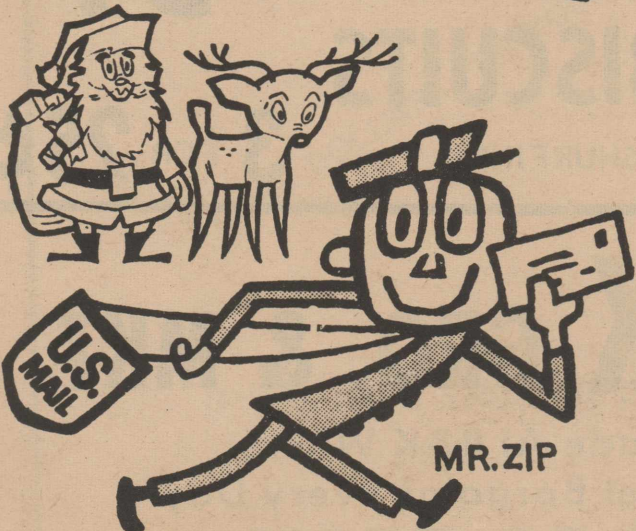

Vega Overruns Hart, 62-20, To Win District 1-B Crown

Football was the game and Wayne Taylor was the name. The big, powerful fullback scored four touchdowns last Friday night in a lop-sided 62-20 victory over Hart to give Vega the I-B District championship.

Vega scoring began like a bad dream then turned into a nightmare before it was over. Hart fans watched as if in a trance while Taylor and company riddled a herebefore staunch defense.

Taylor, a human dynamo, led his team to its first district championship in the history of the school. He didn't waste any time about doing it. The 161-pound senior, who looked and ran more like a 190-pounder, carried the ball 32 times out of 46 times the first half, picking up three touchdowns and putting Vega ahead at halftime, 28-0.

The only really bright spots for Hart were the two touchdown runs by Dennis McLain. The first one did not come until late in the third quarter when Hart was trailing, 34-0.

Almost everything Hart did went wrong. When they gambled on fourth down, they failed and the ball went over. When they passed, the ball was usually intercepted and run back for a touchdown. When they punted, there was a good chance the ball would come dribbling back and Vega would take over. Fumbles were commonplace.

Frustration led to frustration. What was supposed to be a toss-up ball game, developed earmarks of a track meet.

Hart kicked off and Vega's Purcell brought the ball back to his own 35, but a clipping penalty moved the ball back to the Vega 12.

Taylor carried five times in a row, ramming out to his 37. Robert Gibson packed the hide twice to his 47. Then Taylor and his brother, Don, alternated to move the ball to Hart's 21.

Quarterback Johnnie Price got two more to the 19. From that point big Taylor hooked up and rumbled like a Sherman tank into the end zone. Price faked to "bulldozer" Taylor up the middle and pitched out to little Taylor around the left end for the two extra points, 8-0.

Joe Rubalcaba took the ensuing kickoff near his 15 and returned it nicely to his own 41. Billy Farris carried twice to the 48 and McLain got a first down to the 49.

Twice in succession McLain carried and rolled to the Vega 46 before the attack bogged down. Fincher punted to the Vega five.

This time the champions could only move to their 41 when it became necessary for them to punt. The ball rolled out on Hart's 17.

Farris rammed back to the 21. McLain managed five more to the 26, then he picked up a first down to his 38.

When it looked like Hart might catch fire, they fumbled on their 38 and Vega's Wayne LaGrone recovered.

It was then Hart discovered Taylor's initial runs weren't flukes. On the first play, he carried to the 33. On the next, he bulldozed to the 26. He then hit to the 22 and let his brother carry to the 17.

By then it was his turn again and he lumbered to Hart's four. The rugged back was held at the one on the first down, but he went over standing up for the second touchdown.

The extra point failed and Vega led, 14-0.

Hart had the ball one play after the kickoff. Gary Heller tried to jump pass to his left end; the ball was deflected and Gibson intercepted.

The play had begun on Hart's 35, and Gibson ran the ball back to Hart's 24. Wayne Taylor carried five of seven times, ramming to the one-foot line. Price sneaked over for the score. The

extra point try was no good and Vega led 20-0.

Next time Hart got possession of the ball, they kept it four downs before a fourth and three failed at their own 30 and Vega took over. Hart decided not to punt against a gale-like wind.

With 10-seconds to halftime, Taylor carried three times and he was over for another touchdown. Gibson ran the extra

points and Vega extended its lead, 28-0.

Heller, Farris and McLain alternated carrying after the halftime kickoff, but could move no further than midfield when Hart punted.

After holding Vega at the Longhorn 24, Hart moved the ball out to the 31 and fumbled again.

Wayne Taylor carried to the 28 on the first play, but a 15-yard holding penalty moved the ball back to the Hart 43.

Three more runs by Taylor and a complete fourth down pass to Jones spotted the ball on Hart's 10. Wayne Taylor carried to the three and Price pushed over from there. The extra point try failed and Vega led, 34-0.

Vega was penalized 15 yards on the kickoff and booted the ball from its 25. McLain carried back to his 47.

Hart got a break which helped them get on the scoreboard moments later.

After Heller had passed to Kenneth Fincher on the Vega 44, two running plays failed when Farris was tackled by his noseguard and a 15-yard penalty moved the ball to the Vega 20-yard line.

A pass from Heller to McLain enabled Hart to get its first penetration to Vega's five. Heller was thrown back to the 9 while looking for a receiver, but McLain took a second down pass in the left flat for a touchdown and the loss didn't matter.

McLain used his speed to good advantage in cutting the corner and outrunning his defenders to the flag. The extra points were no good as a pass try fell incomplete.

With little less than two minutes gone in the fourth quarter, Vega had moved to Hart's 35. Wayne Taylor broke up the middle and was gone again. Vega led 40-6.

Hart had the ball three downs and had moved to their 34. Heller tried a flat pass, but Vega's Roy Jackson picked it off and ran for a touchdown. Jackson ran the extra points and Hart fell further behind, 48-6.

Hart came back strong in the

top part of the fourth quarter. Moving from their own 34, Heller passed complete to Mark Martin to the Hart 41. Again Heller jump passed complete to David Gardner to the Vega 45 and a first down.

Farris made his best run of the night when he zigged and zagged to Vega's 25. Danny Rodriguez lost all the way back to his 32 attempting to pass, but McLain broke loose to the 24 on the next play.

Faced with a big third down, Heller threw complete to Fincher to the Vega 11. Farris got five yards to the six and on second down, McLain took a pitchout and cut sharp for the endzone flag.

He was hit at the goal line but went over for the touchdown. The extra point try failed. Score, 48-12.

Vega moved from its own 20 to score in three plays. Jones took a pass from his own 24 and outran Hart defenders 76 yards for another deflating touchdown. Don Taylor took a neatly-disguised pitchout for the extra points and a 56-12 lead.

Still playing against Vega's starting lineup, Hart brought the ensuing kickoff back to its 26. But Farris lost one and Rodriguez was trapped back to his 21. An incomplete pass brought up fourth down, and Hart's center snapped a dribbler to Fincher who fell on the ball on his own five.

With reserves in the game for Vega, it took them two plays to punch over another touchdown. Freshman back Robert Wells carried over and Vega led, 62-12.

Hart got its last touchdown when Fincher lined up against the sideline unseen. Heller threw from his own 42 and Fincher was long gone. A jump pass to Gardner gave Hart its 20th point.

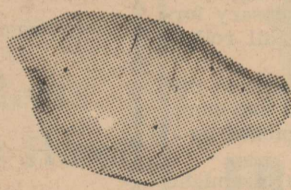
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
