Cotton Harvest In Full Swing

Gins at Hart were operating around the clock this week with a check late Tuesday showing 3,373 bales on trailers at the three gins.

They reported 7759 bales ginned with 325 bales on the ground.

Local ginners estimated that from one-half to two-thirds of the crop has been gathered, though there are a few who have not started stripping.

A light snow Tuesday night is expected to slow the harvest temporarily. Temperature in Hart was recorded at 13 degrees Wednesday morning at 6:30 a.m.

Most farmers contacted were unable to give reports on the yield of their cotton as many trailers are still at the gins.

Bob Bennett, who had 225 acres of cotton southeast of Hart, finished stripping Friday and said his yield was approximately one and a fourth bales per acre. He said some was spotted.

Junior Bass, who farms five miles east of Hart, has about 50 percent of his cotton out. He said the grade is strict low middling with light spots. Some of his cotton had light hail. He used defoliation late.

F. A. Smith, four miles south and four west of Hart, had 80 acres of cotton that he thought

would yield about one and a fourth bales per acre.

Smith said he had 40 acres of castor beans with 2,283 pounds per acre yield.

"The wind on Thanksgiving Day did some damage to my beans," he noted.

R. J. Murray, who farms Clint McFarlands land three miles east of Hart, had 36 acres of castor beans with a yield of 1200 to 2000 pounds per acre.

"I plan to plant castor beans again next year," he added.

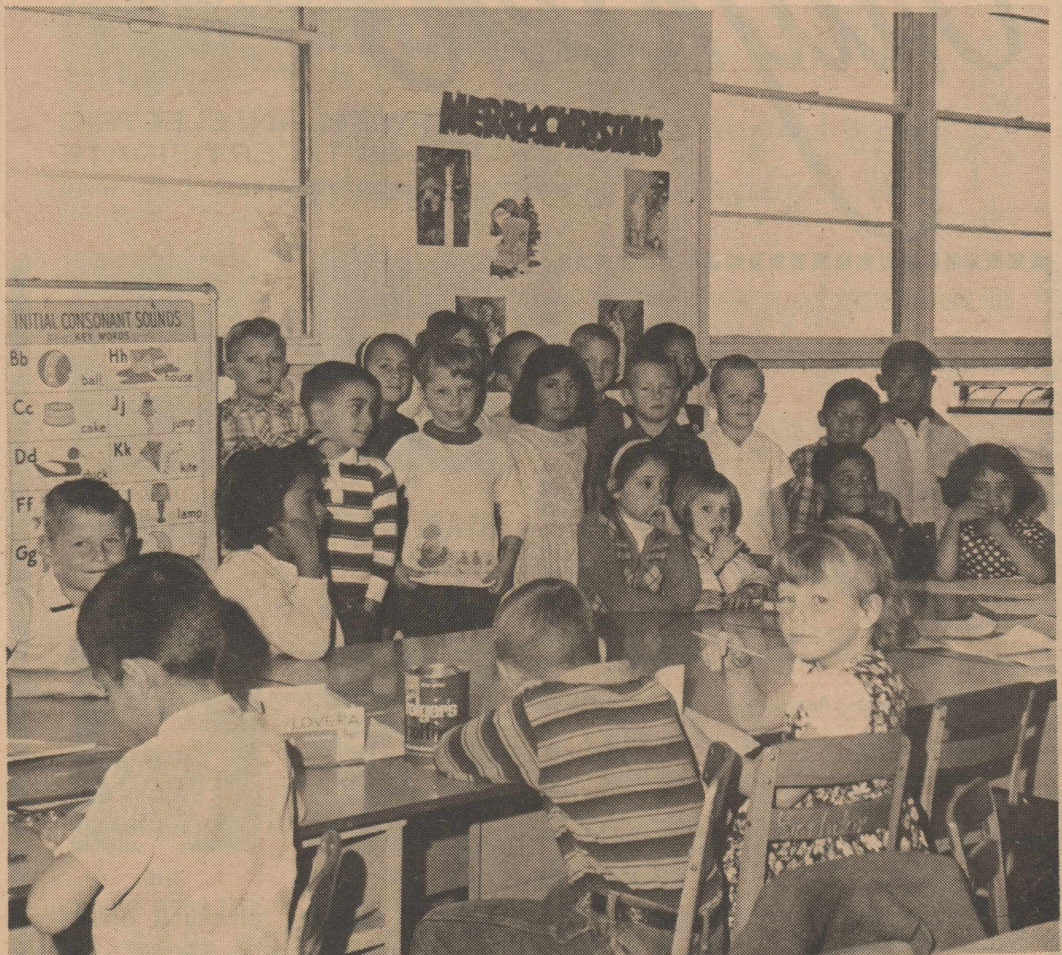
Firemen Buy New Hose

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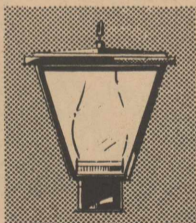

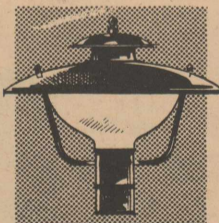

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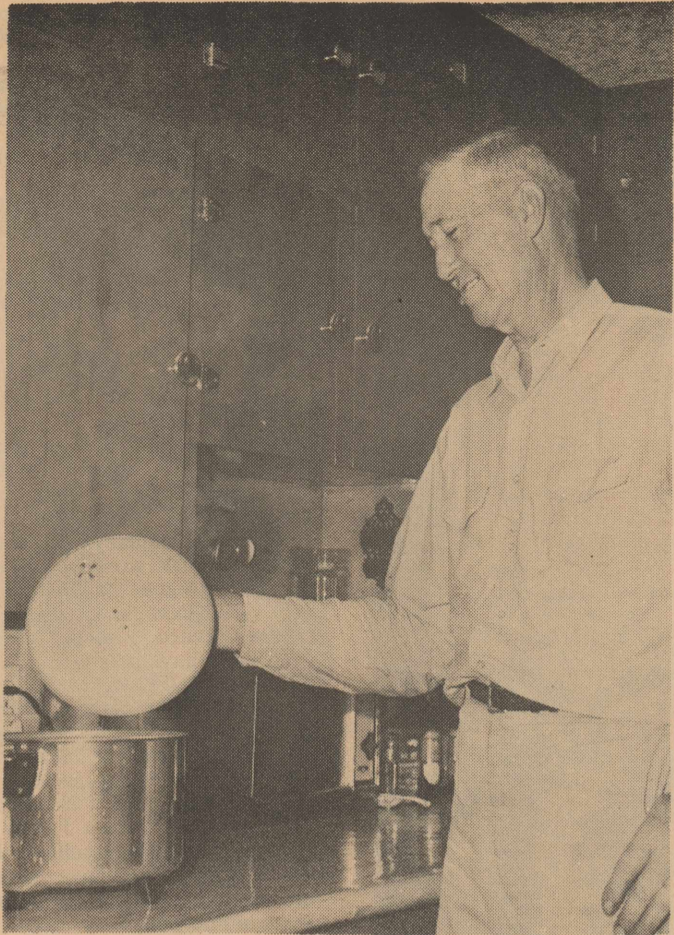

Recipe Of The Week

Another gentleman furnishes our recipe this week as Robert Brooks tells us his theories on the art of steak cooking.

"Cook slowly," Brooks emphasizes.

"Too many people cook their steaks too fast," he says, "And that's a good way to ruin good steak."

Brooks says he uses tenderizer and Accent on his steaks and nothing else.

"This beats salt and pepper any time," he notes.

He says he turns his steaks about twice and bastes them with the juice from the meat. He cooks them in an electric skillet at about 220 degrees.

For a one inch steak, he says it takes about 30 to 45 minutes cooking time.

He cooks roasts at the same temperature.

"Cook your roast slow and it'll keep it from being dry," he explains.

Asked about written recipes, he says:

"I NEVER use a recipe and I NEVER cook pastries."

In the photo above, he is

shown cooking ham hock and beans.

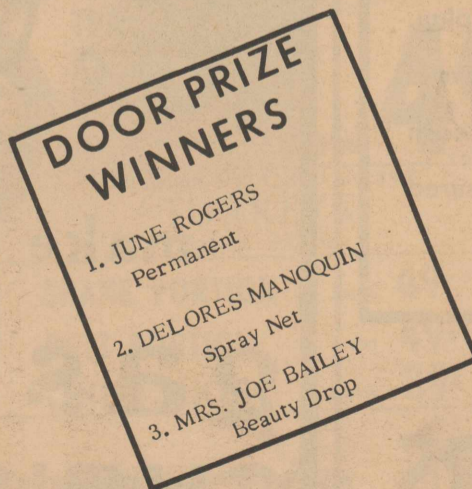

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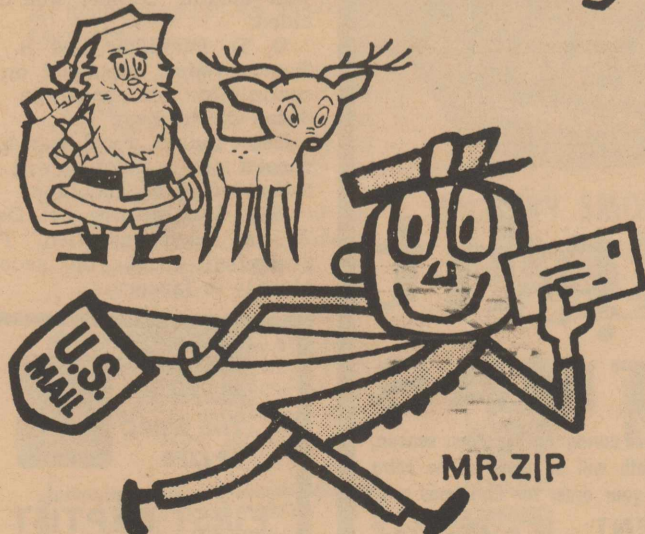

Teacher Says Classroom Work Keeps Her Happy

"If a teacher is not dedicated to his profession, he has no right to call himself a teacher. Teaching is such an important job."

This is the way Mrs. Lanny Tucker, mother of two and first grade teacher in Hart Schools, feels about her profession.

"I love my work," Mrs. Tucker says sincerely, adding:

"I have thought many times that I would not teach another year and stay home to be with my children until we can all go to school together."

"But each time," she adds, "My plans do not materialize because I know I would not be a contented person if I were not in the classroom nine

months of the year."

Mr. and Mrs. Tucker have two children, Jim, seven years old and in the second grade, and Lana, 17 months old.

Tucker is an agriculture teacher at Hart.

"I wanted to teach little children," says this first grade teacher, "because I have been around and worked with the 'little folks' since I was 16 years old and really enjoyed that type of work."

"Most of my work with the little ones was done in church work and in camps before I got my degree," she adds.

This is Mrs. Tucker's sixth year to teach at Hart, the only school she has taught in.

She taught second grade last

year and says she enjoyed it but that her "first love" is the first grade.

"I think my mother-in-law probably had the most influence on my decision to become a primary teacher," Mrs. Tucker notes.

"She has taught little children in Estelline Public School for more than 40 years and is a 'shining example' of what a truly dedicated person is in his profession."

"I have a long way to go to be the teacher she is," she laughingly adds, "but I'm working on it."

Mrs. Tucker graduated from Estelline High School in 1953 and attended Texas Tech from 1954 to 1958, where she majored in elementary education.

She is now working on her Master's Degree at West Texas State University, going to classes every Tuesday night. She will have a speech minor in her graduate work.

Besides teaching, Mrs. Tucker says she loves all kinds of sports "except football."

"I have never learned to appreciate that game," she says. "I remember when I was a cheerleader in high school, the other girls would have to tell me when we made a touchdown and when to yell."

Mrs. Tucker also says she is a great fishing fan and, since moving to the Plains where there are few places to fish, she is taking an interest in golf.

One of her main hobbies is scrapbooks and photo albums.

"I have kept a scrapbook since I was a freshman in high school," she says, adding, "and that's been a long, long time."

She says the most rewarding fact about her teaching profession is that she has a part in teaching little children to read and in giving them their "send-off" in their educational training.

"It would frighten me, though," she notes, "if I had time to stop and think how important a child's first year in school really is."

The next meeting set Dec. 23 has been cancelled. The group will meet the second Monday in January.



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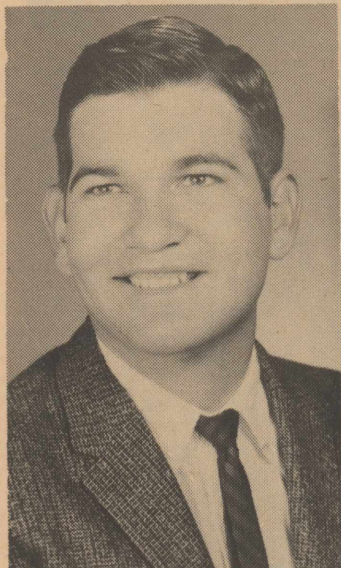

The trainee will begin next year full time vocational agricultural instruction.

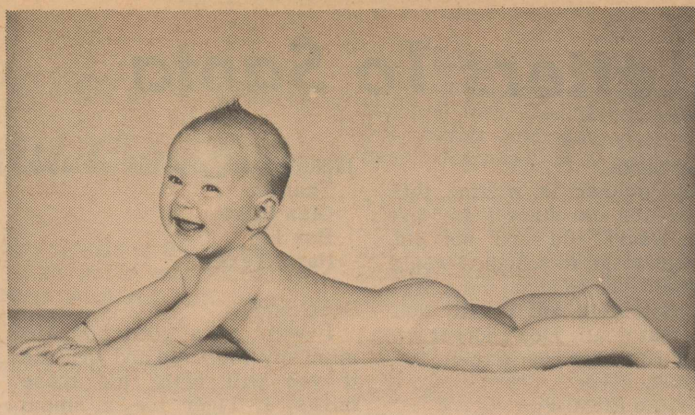
Mathis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Mathis. His favorite sports are football and golf.

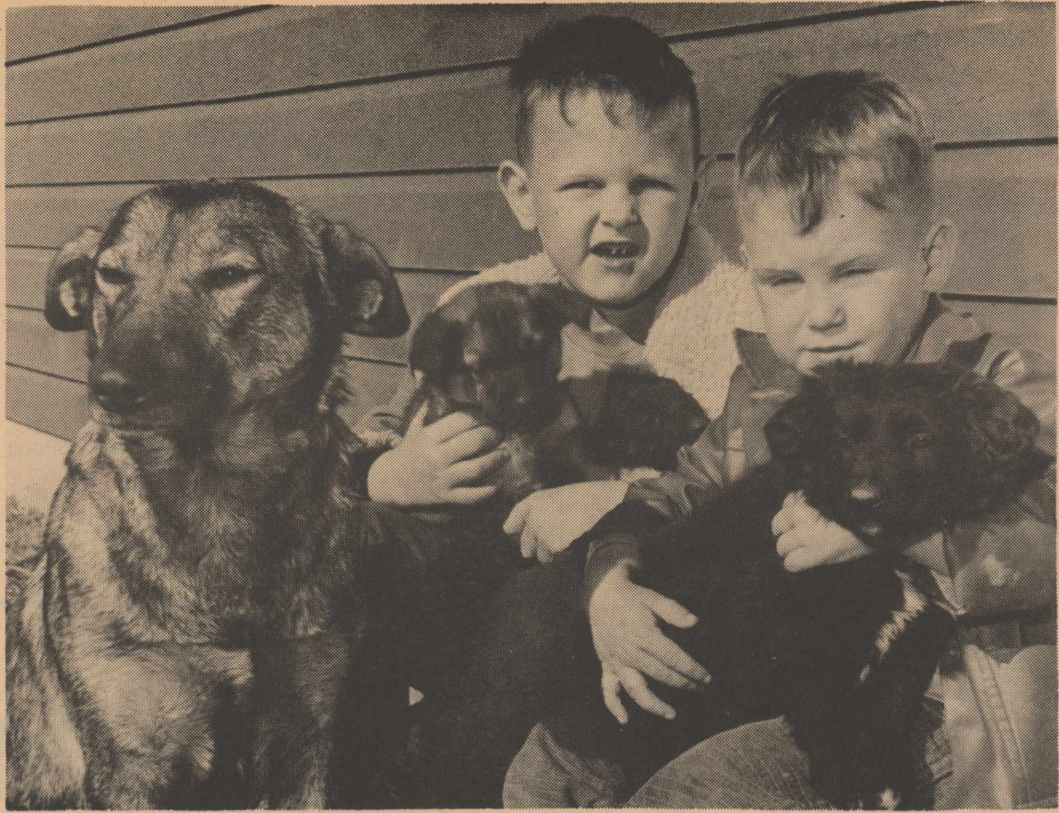
