Bank Increases Capital Structure

The steady growth of Farmers State Bank of Hart since its beginning six years ago was reflected this week by an increase in its capital structure.

President Norlan Dudley announced that certified surplus of the bank has been increased \$50,000, bringing total capital structure to \$150,000.

Dudley also announced the elevation of Kenneth Warren, 26, from cashier to vice-president and cashier.

O. D. Dinwiddie, vice-president (inactive), was named vice-chairman of the board of directors.

Warren, a resident of Hart the past 16 years, has been with the bank since its opening in December, 1957. Prior to that he was employed by Farmers Grain Co. of Hart before becoming a bookkeeper at the bank.

The new vice-president, who is single, is active in Hart community activities, having served as secretary of the United Fund, secretary of the Lions Club and a member of the Volunteer Fire Dept. He attends the First Baptist Church.

Dudley said he anticipates deposits of the bank will hit a peak of about \$2,500,000 in January.

Total deposits at the end of 1963 were \$1,818,279.80, compared to \$1,535,079.65 at the end of 1962.

At the end of 1957, when the bank was first started, deposits totaled \$535,751.92. They rose over the million-dollar mark at the end of 1960 and approached \$2 million at the end of 1963.

Members of the bank's board of directors are Willis A. Hawkins Sr., chairman; Dudley, Paul Brooks, T.B. Cox, Dinwiddie, Edward L. Harris and George E. Bennett.

Philosopher Gives His Views

Just an old country boy come back home.

This is the way Anthony, better known as Tony, Steiert describes himself, now that he has returned to Hart after being gone nearly a quarter of a century.

Steiert, Lt. Col., USAF, retired Dec. 1 after 23 years of service.

He is now in Hart visiting with his mother, Mrs. L. A. Steiert, and his brothers and sisters and their families.

Oldtimers may remember him as a scrappy little outfielder on the Hart baseball team in the day of sandlot leagues.

Time has, no doubt, made many changes in the man, but the "scrappy" characteristic still remains.

Steiert is a man with some pretty definite ideas and he likes to talk about them.

One gets the impression, from an almost hidden twinkle in his eye, that he might even enjoy a good rousing argument.

Certainly, he enjoys "getting his point across" or swaying his listener to his way of thinking.

He has that characteristic, so often found in the military, of almost automatic adjustment to the immediate situation, surroundings or person.

He is a man who obviously likes people and, perhaps in so doing, he unconsciously submerges his own personality in the interest of communication.

What makes this person tick? he seems to ask.

And he really wants to know. In fact, Steiert wants to know what makes the whole world tick.

In all probability, his "second career" is going to be devoted to finding the answers to that question.

"I haven't made up my mind what I'm going to do," Steiert insists.

He then proceeds to prove

to his questioner that there is only one possible thing for him to do.

"As communities become tolerant, so will nations," he says, adding:

"People just don't understand each other."

This, he thinks, is the root of most of the world's troubles.

A photography fan, he plans to tour Europe extensively, take pictures with his stereo camera and "REALLY get to know the people."

He then plans lecture tours in this country trying to do his part in helping people know each other better.

"For example, when I was a schoolboy up there," he gestures toward Nazareth, "I thought a Jap was a funny little man with protruding teeth."

"I couldn't have been more wrong," he explains, noting that he had had Japanese working

for him and they are really "wonderful people."

"They came to the station to see me off when I left," he says. "Some of them walked five miles to be there. Now that's something."

After a thoughtful pause, he exclaims:

"Me.....I probably wouldn't walk five blocks to see someone off."

As he talks, one can't help but notice his eyes.

Perhaps his most convincing asset in any argument, they seem to reach out, grab the listener, pin him to the wall and then plead:

Look here, how can you possibly disagree with me?

It isn't likely that too many people do.....for very long.

Entering the service in May of 1941, Steiert received his commission in August of 1942. He has served in Oklahoma, Texas, Florida, Colorado, Arizona, California, Washington, North Dakota and in Europe, England, Japan and Pakistan.

At the time of his retirement, he was stationed at Grand Forks Air Force Base in North Dakota.

He has been active in Toastmasters and has won a number of awards for speaking. He has accumulated 5,000 slides with 2,500 in 3-D.

"I think I'm going to see the world now that I have time to enjoy it," this world traveler says.

"You don't really appreciate the country in flying over it at 25,000 feet. It looks a little different when you're on the ground," he adds.

With a quick smile, he sums up his philosophy this way:

"You have to take time to take stock and decide the road you're going to take. The world has been good to me. It's like a bank and I've been drawing heavily on it."

"It's time I made a few deposits."

Hart Pops Olton Five

Hart's Longhorns romped to a 63-44 victory over the Olton Mustangs at Olton Tuesday night, running season's record to 7-5.

Hart's girls, meanwhile dropped a 62-41 decision that brought their season record to 6-5.

David Gardner led the Longhorns to their win, scoring 26 points. He got big help from Carl Ward, who hit for 14 and Bill Farris, who added 10.

The Longhorns took a 30-18 lead at the half and coasted to the victory.

The girls were led by Dixie Kendrick's 29 points, while Connie Bailey had nine. For the year Dixie has 202 points for an 18.3 average and Connie has 189 for a 17.2 mean.

The Longhorns, for the year, are led by Farris' 157 points for an average of 13 per game. Ward follows with 152, while Gardner has score 147. Gary Heller has tallied 130 and Ken Fincher has scored 77.

County Elections Scheduled

January is the month to pay your poll tax and, in Hart, this may be taken care of at Farmers State Bank.

Several county offices will come up for election this year. Offices to be filled include sheriff, county attorney, county tax assessor collector, and commissioners for precinct 1 (Hart) and precinct 3 in the northwest part of the county.

Filing deadline is Feb. 2.

First primary is set May 2 with second primary June 6 and general election, Nov. 2.

Anyone between the ages of 21 and 60 must have a poll tax receipt to vote in Texas.

Poll tax fee is \$1.75. Of this amount, the county gets 25 cents, the state, 50 cents, and the schools, \$1.

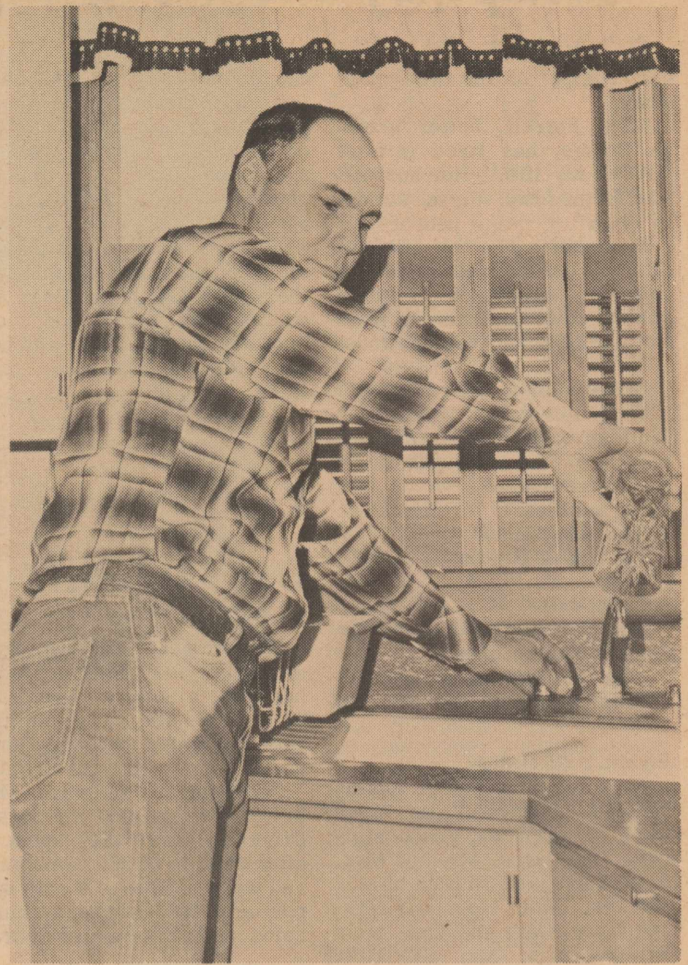

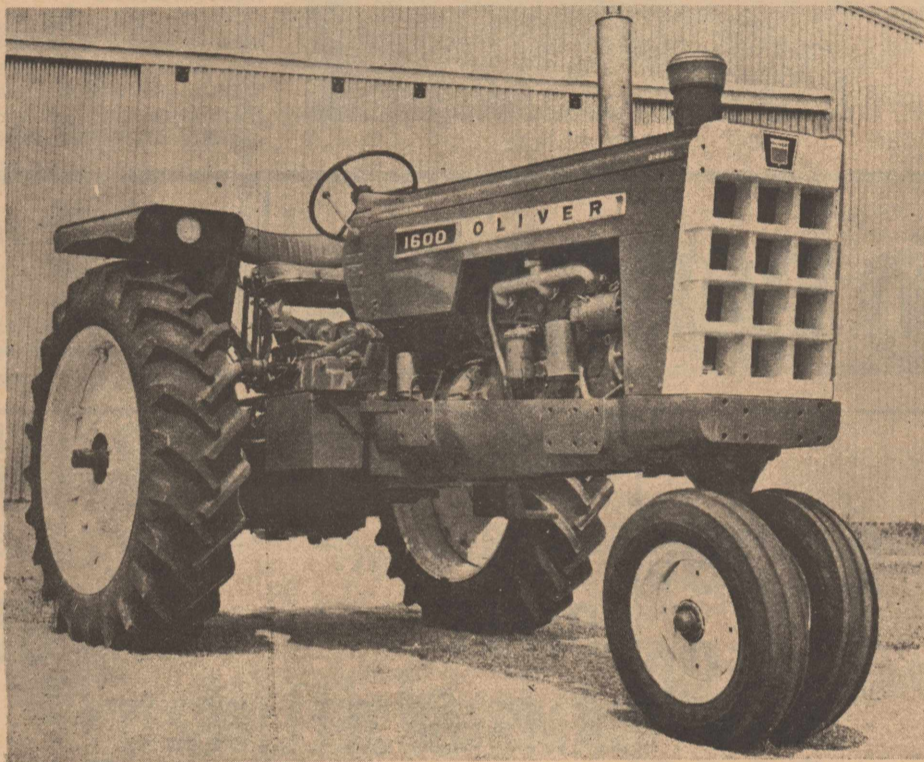

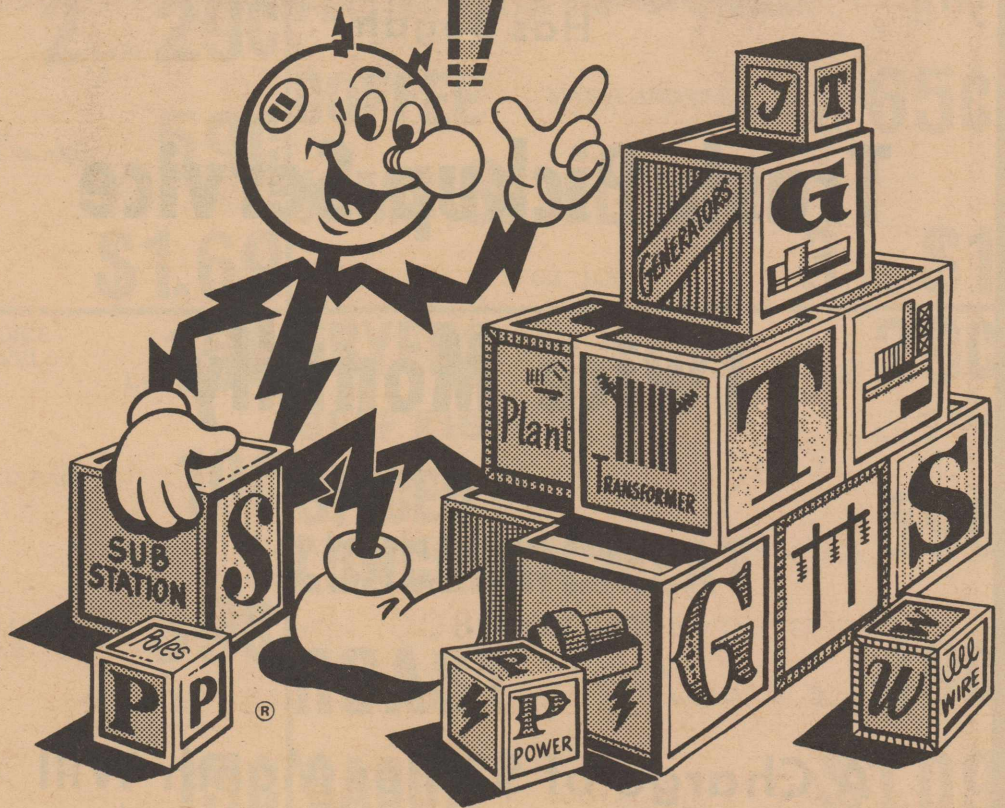

On the 1964 ballot, the resident voters of Castro County will be voting for two county committeemen positions being held now by C.W. Anthony and George Bradford. The names on the ballot for commissioner's precinct number 2 are Earl Lust and Frank Wise; for committeeman at large are Ray Riley and Tommy Stanton.

The 1963 committee for Castro County made up of C.W. Anthony, George Bradford, Lester Dowell, Lester Gladden and H.E. Henley has issued 152 permits from Jan. 1, 1963 to November of 1963. During this time, 125 wells have been drilled. The committeemen serve three-year terms and the directors, two-year terms.

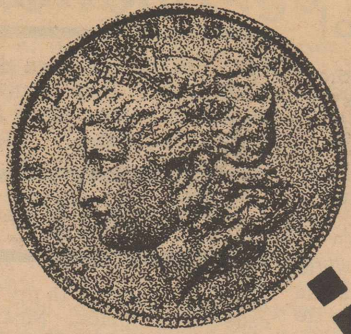
