## Candidates Get On Dotted Line

With Feb. 3 set as a filing deadline, political candidates in the county began making formal announcements this week.

Steve L. Hurt, Plainview, county attorney for Hale County, announced his candidacy for district attorney.

Kent Birdwell, Dimmitt, has announced he will seek re-election as Castro County tax assessor-collector.

County commissioner, precinct 1, has drawn two candidates thus far. E. I. (Tump) McLain has said he will seek re-election and T.C. Ray, a former county commissioner, has said he will seek the office.

Statements of all four candidates appear in this issue.

No announcements had been made Wednesday for sheriff or county attorney.

A brief summary, extracted from the Texas Election Laws, lists what must be done on the political scene, and in what order.

Feb. 3--Deadline for candidates to file.

Feb. 3--Candidates must pay county assessment committee a deposit of \$50 at time of filing.

Feb. 6--State chairman files list of all candidates whose applications were filed before

deadline to Secretary of State.

Feb. 6--County chairman files list of all candidates whose applications were filed before deadline with county clerk.

Feb. 10--County executive committee meets to apportion cost of primaries among candidates.

Feb. 11--County chairman mails each candidate a statement of his assessment with request that he pay the same to county chairman.

Feb. 15--Candidates deadline for paying assessments.

March 2--Only if candidate dies after the deadline for filing, new applications by candidates may be filed.

March 5--State chairman notifies all members of the committees may be filed.

March 5--State chairman notifies all members of the committee and state candidates of the time and place of state executive meeting.

March 9--State executive committee meets and certifies to county chairman the names of state candidates. At this meeting, the committee also decides upon the hour and place of the state convention to be held on the third Tuesday in September.

May 2--First primary.  
June 6--Second primary.  
Nov. 2--General election.

## Fertilizer Plant Will Locate Here

The rapidly growing community of Hart soon will receive another boost, in the form of a major fertilizer blending plant.

Tide Products of Edinburg, Texas, a Union Carbide subsidi-

ary, will invest between \$150,000 and \$175,000 in the plant.

A company spokesman, M. W. Marsh, said Wednesday that construction on the facility will begin in the next few months.

It is one of several planned by Tide Products in this area.

Land has been purchased for other such plants at Littlefield, Hereford, Seagraves and Farwell, according to Marsh.

Three of the facilities have been completed--at Hearne, El Campo and Jennings, La.

Marsh said the plants will blend raw materials "to de-

sired soil analysis specifications."

At Hart, the firm will employ about four persons on a year-round basis, including an agronomist and plant manager, a salesman and warehouse personnel.

Marsh said the company will offer its services directly to farmers, utilizing a "push-button" operation for "prescription blending" of fertilizers.

The plants will be designed to serve areas of 20 square miles, enabling soil samples, tests and custom blending for individual plots.

## Council Sets Rate On Sewer

Hart city council Monday night set sewer rates for its customers.

The rate for residences, churches and most business houses will be \$2.50 per month, according to Mayor Ed Harris.

For cafes, filling stations and laundries, the rate will be \$7.50 per month.

For tie-on purposes, the customer or his plumber will be required to get a permit from the city to tap the sewer.

A \$5 charge for the permit will include the price of a saddle tap to the sewer lines. All other expenses for tying on will be the obligation of the property owner or his plumber, according to Mayor Harris.

## Building Here Over \$200,000

Building in Hart last year reached \$208,270.00, according to a check this week of building permits at city hall.

This is well over the 1962 total of \$156,590.00.

The city granted three business permits last year totaling \$13,370.00. Seventeen residence permits totaled \$160,900.00.

Three permits for additions to residences were recorded with a total value of \$34,000.00.

In 1962, no commercial permits and no permits for additions were recorded. Residence permits that year numbered 22.

## Bank Break-In Nets Nothing

Whoever tried to play "Break the Bank" in Hart last Friday night came up empty handed.

Burglars broke the glass in the front door of Farmers State Bank but apparently made off with nothing.

The incident happened sometime between 11:30 p.m. and 3:30 a.m. Saturday, when the break-in was discovered.

The bank was checked at 11:30 and again at 3:30 by an armored service driver. The driver saw the front door smashed and left to alert bank president Norlan Dudley.

Then the driver went back to the bank and stood guard outside with a shotgun.

No one emerged and when Dudley arrived, a check was made of the interior. They found nothing missing, and nothing out of place.

A check of all funds revealed no losses.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation was called out Saturday morning and made the same determination--no losses.

However, FBI men pointed out that whoever broke the front door glass committed a federal offense.

The bank was good as new to depositors who arrived Saturday morning. The glass was replaced before daylight Saturday.

## FARM ACCIDENT

Felix Castro, Latin American laborer on the Wamon Foster farm northeast of Hart, was seriously injured Saturday evening when he stepped from a moving tractor and the implement ran over him. He received a broken leg and numerous lacerations. He was rushed to Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

## Longhorns Beat Happy In District

The Hart Longhorns open district play Tuesday night with a 55-53 victory over Happy, but the Hart girls lost their encounter, 77-62.

Billy Farris led the Horns to come-from-behind victory scoring 17 points. David Gardner added 15, Carl Ward 13 and Gary Heller and Kenneth Fincher, five each.

The Longhorns fell behind at the end of the third period, 42-38, but put on a strong finish for the win.

Dixie Kendrick led the Hart girls, scoring a total of 44 in a fine shooting display.

In games last Friday night at Springlake, the Horns fell, 57-48, and the girls lost, 48-31.

Farris led the Hart five with 22, while Gardner had 13 and Heller, 10. Miss Kendrick led the girls with 19, while Connie Bailey added eight and Verletta Crick, four.

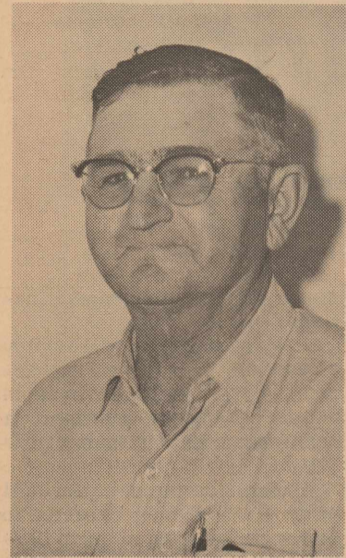
For the season, the Hart girls have won six games and lost seven. Miss Kendrick is the leading scorer with 265 points, averaging 20.4 per game. Connie Bailey has 215, for an average of 16.6.

The Hart boys have won eight and lost six. Farris has 196 for an average of 14 points per game, while Gardner has 175 for an average of 12.5. Ward has tallied 168 for a 12-point average and Heller 145 for a 10.4 mean. Fincher has hit for 82, six per game.

Hurt is married, the father of three children and a member of the First Presbyterian Church, Plainview, where he is on the Board of Deacons.

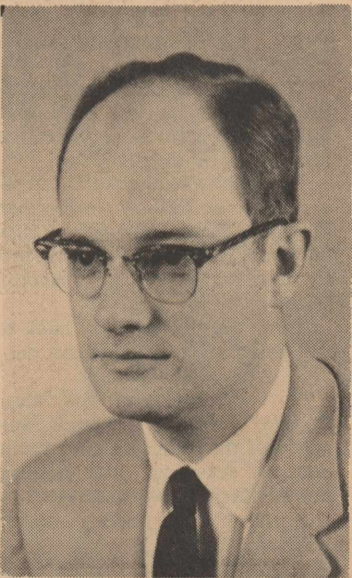
He is also a member of the Plainview Lions Club.

He and his wife, Lavelle, have two daughters. They are members of the Baptist Church. Ray, born in Hart, is a graduate of Hart High School.

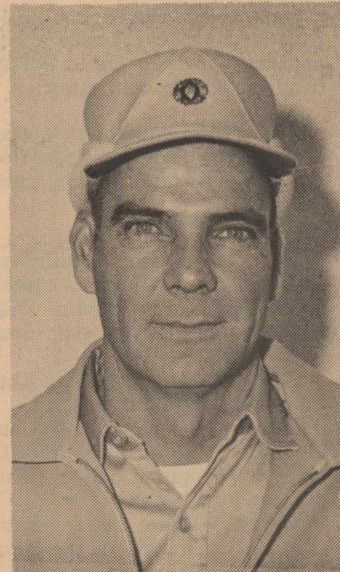
"In asking for a second term as your county commissioner, I feel my prior experience in that office will help me do a good job for the people of precinct 1.

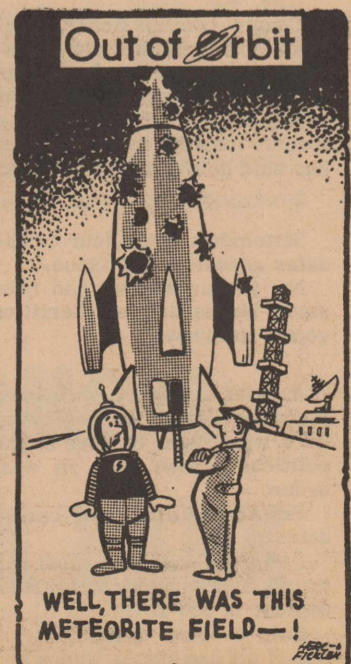

RECIPE OF WEEK

Mrs. Dee Clark, mother of two small children, has plenty of demand for cookies around her house.

She submits two recipes this week, one for cookies and one for spiced tea.

Both Wyona and her husband are graduates of Hart High School. They are members of the Baptist Church.

He farms at Friona and works at Hart of Plains Gin.

Their two children are 14 month old Rondee and 28 month old Gay.

Plain Cookies  
 1/2 cup Crisco  
 1/2 cup brown sugar  
 1/4 cup granulated sugar  
 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
 1/4 tsp. water  
 1 egg  
 1 cup and 2 tbsp. sifted all-purpose flour  
 1/2 tsp. soda  
 1/2 tsp. salt

Blend Crisco and sugars. Beat in vanilla, water, and egg. Sift remaining dry ingredients together and add to the sugar and egg mixture. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 275 degrees for 8-10 minutes or until golden brown.

Note: To make cutout cookies, add approximately 3 cups additional flour. Makes about 3 dozen.

Spiced Tea  
 Boil 1 pt. water and 15 cloves for 15 minutes. Then add 1 tablespoon tea and seep 15 minutes. Strain this into the juice of one lemon and one orange and 1 cup sugar. Dilute to about 3 to 1 with water and heat.

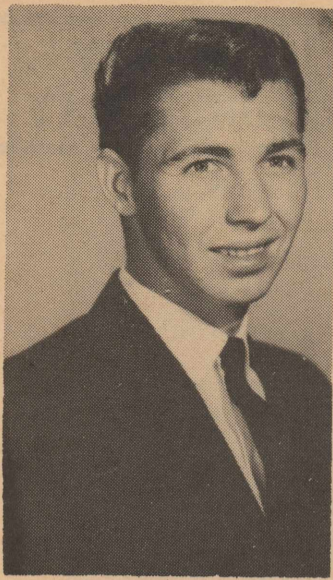

Requirements of 12 hours of work completed at Wayland and an overall grade point average of 1.00 must be met by all

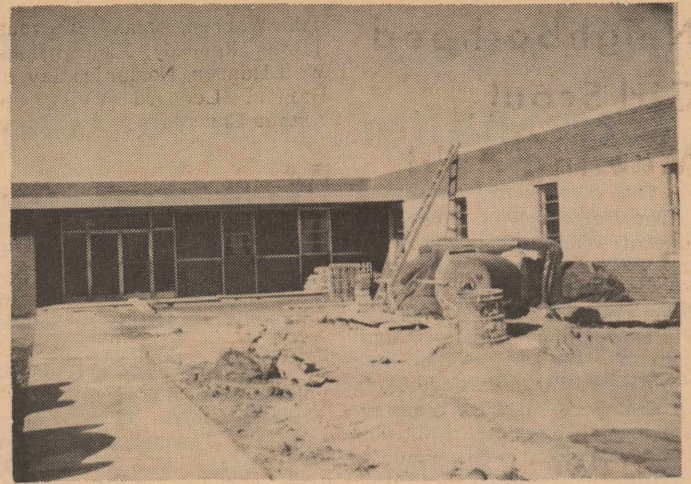

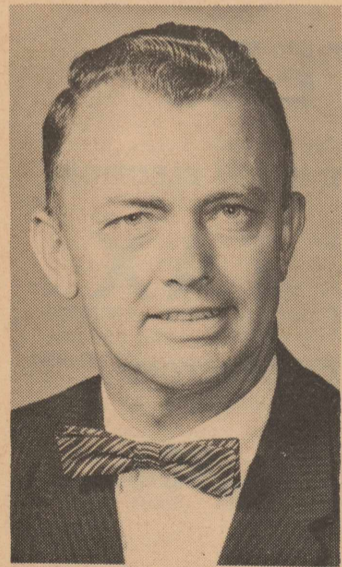
Dr. Howard has his BA degree from Mississippi College and his BD and Th D Degrees from New Orleans Seminary.
