Steve L. Hurt, Plainview, county attorney for Hale County, announced his candidacy for district attorny.

Kent Birdwell, Dimmitt, has announced he will seek re-election as Castro County tax assessor-collector.

County commissioner, precinct 1, has drawn two candidates thus far. E. I. (Tump) McLain has said he will seek re-election and T.C. Ray, a former county commissioner, has said he will seek the office.

Council Sets Rate **On Sewer**

Hart city council Monday night set sewer rates for its customers.

The rate for residences, churches and most business houses will be \$2.50 per month, according to Mayor Ed Harris.

For cafes, filling stations and laundries, the rate will be \$7.50 per month. For tie-on purposes, the cus-

tomer or his plumber will be required to get a permit from the city to tap the sewer.

A \$5 charge for the permit will include the price of a saddle tap to the sewer lines. All other expenses for tying on will be the obligation of the property owner or his plumber, according to Mayor Harris.

At Hart, the firm will employ about four persons on a yearround basis, including an agonomist and plant manager, a salesman and warehouse personnel.

Marsh said the company will offer its services directly to farmers, utilizing a "push-but-ton" operation for "prescrip-tion blending" of fertilizers.

The plants will be designed to serve areas of 20 square miles, enabling soil samples, tests and custom blending for individual plots.

Bank Break-In Nets Nothing

Whoever tried to play "Break the Bank" in Hart last Friday night came up empty handed. Burglars broke the glass in the front door of Farmers State Bank but apparently made off with nothing.

The incident happened sometime between 11:30 p.m. and 3:30 a.m. Saturday, when the break-in was discovered.

The bank was checked at 11:30 and again at 3:30 by an armored service driver. The driver saw the front door smashed and left to alert bank president Norlan Dudley.

Then the driver went back to the bank and stood guard outside with a shotgun.

No one emerged and when Dudley arrived, a check was made of the interior. They found nothing missing, and nothing out of place.

A check of all funds revealed no losses.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation was called out Saturday morning and made the same determination--no losses.

However, FBI men pointed out that whoever broke the front door glass committed a federal offense.

The bank was good as new to depositors who arrived Saturday morning. The glass was replaced before daylight Saturday.

RECIPE OF WEEK

She submits two recipes this week, one for cookies and one for spiced tea.

Plain Cookies

- 1/2 cup Crisco 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla

1/4 tsp. water

l egg

1 cup and 2 tbsp. sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 tsp. soda

1/2 tsp. salt

Blend Crisco and sugars. Beat in vanilla, water, and egg. Sift remaining dry ingredients together and add to the sugar and egg mixture. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 275 de-grees for 8-10 minutes or until golden brown.

Note: To make cutout cookies, add approximately 3 cups additional flour. Makes about 3 dozen.

Spiced Tea

Boil 1 pt. water and 15 cloves for 15 minutes. Then add 1 tablespoon tea and seep 15 minutes. Strain this into the juice of one lemon and one orange and 1 cup sugar. Dilute to about 3 to 1 with water and heat.

In addition to his work as a member of the board of super-. visors, Mills has also done an outstanding job of soil and water conservation on his farms in the Hart area.





One Year Ago In Hart

The taxpayers in Castro County voted by a 40-1 margin to create a hospital district to finance construction of new hospital facilities.

In Hart, 38 votes were cast and all were for the hospital district. A separate taxing agency was created by voting the hospital district, which will obtain the necessary \$32,000 annually, amounting to \$500,000 over 16 year period, to build a new hospital in Dimmitt.

On January the 17th of last year, our residents were numbed by below zero temperatures for last weekend.


