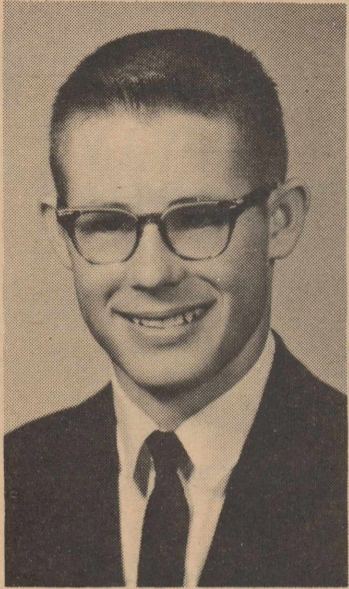

Dixie Kendrick led the Hart girls with 19, while Connie Bailey got 14.

Last Friday night, the Hart teams won a pair of victories from Dimmitt teams. The Longhorns won, 62-34, paced by Gardner's 20-point night. Ward had 14 and Fincher 12. The girls won their game by 49-34, as Miss Kendrick notched 21 and Miss Bailey 16.

The Longhorn record is now 10-6, including 2-0 in conference play. The girls are 9-6 and 1-1 in district.

6:30. Next Tuesday night, the Hart teams play host to Lazbuddie, with the first game at 6:30.

Coach Eddie Nicholson called for support from the townspeople.

"It is very early in district play, so as it now stands we have a long way to go. With a lot of support from the community, Hart could be a better contender for championship."

NOTICE TO BIDDERS OF CITY'S INTENTION TO LET CONTRACT OR CONTRACTS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE CITY'S SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM AND TO ISSUE TIME WARRANTS NOT TO EXCEED \$16,000 IN PAYMENT OF ALL OR A PORTION OF THE COST THEREOF

SEALED PROPOSALS addressed to the Mayor and City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, will be received at the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, Hart, Texas, on February 7, 1964, until 1:00 o'clock p.m., for furnishing all labor, materials and equipment and performing all work required for constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System, in accordance with specifications and plans approved by the City Commission, on file in the City Clerk's Office; and at such time and place all such proposals will be publicly opened and read.

PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS may be examined without charge in the office of HATFIELD ENGINEERING CO., 509 West 10th Street, Amarillo, Texas, Consulting Engineers, and may be procured from said Engineer upon deposit of \$10.00 for each unit, as a guarantee of the safe return of the plans and specifications.

A CERTIFIED OR CASHIER'S CHECK or an acceptable bid bond in an amount not less than five per cent (5%) of the total bid shall accompany each bid as a guaranty that, if awarded the contract, the bidder will promptly enter into contract with the City of Hart, Texas, and furnish bonds on the forms provided.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a Performance Bond and a Payment Bond, each in the amount of the contract, written by a responsible Surety Company authorized to do business in the State of Texas and satisfactory to the City Commission, as required by Article 5160, V.A.T.C.S., as amended by H.B. 344, passed by the 56th Legislature, Regular Session, 1959.

Bidders are expected to inspect the site of the work and to inform themselves of all local conditions.

Attention of bidders is directed to the provisions of House Bill No. 54, Chapter 45, passed by the Forty-third Legislature, at its Regular Session, requiring that not less than the general prevailing rates of per diem wages for work of a

similar character in the locality where the work is performed, shall be paid all laborers, workmen and mechanics employed in the construction of public works.

IT IS THE INTENTION of the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, to issue time warrants to the contractor or contractors in payment of all or a portion of the cost of the above mentioned improvements, not to exceed the principal sum of SIXTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$16,000), said warrants to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, and to mature serially, the maximum maturity date to be not later than December 31, 1979.

The City will make arrangements for the contractor to dispose of the warrants herein mentioned at their face value, and the contractor must agree to deliver the warrants at face value to the party with whom the City has made such arrangements.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to award the contract to that bidder or bidders, who in the opinion of the City Commission offers the proposal to the best interest of the City.

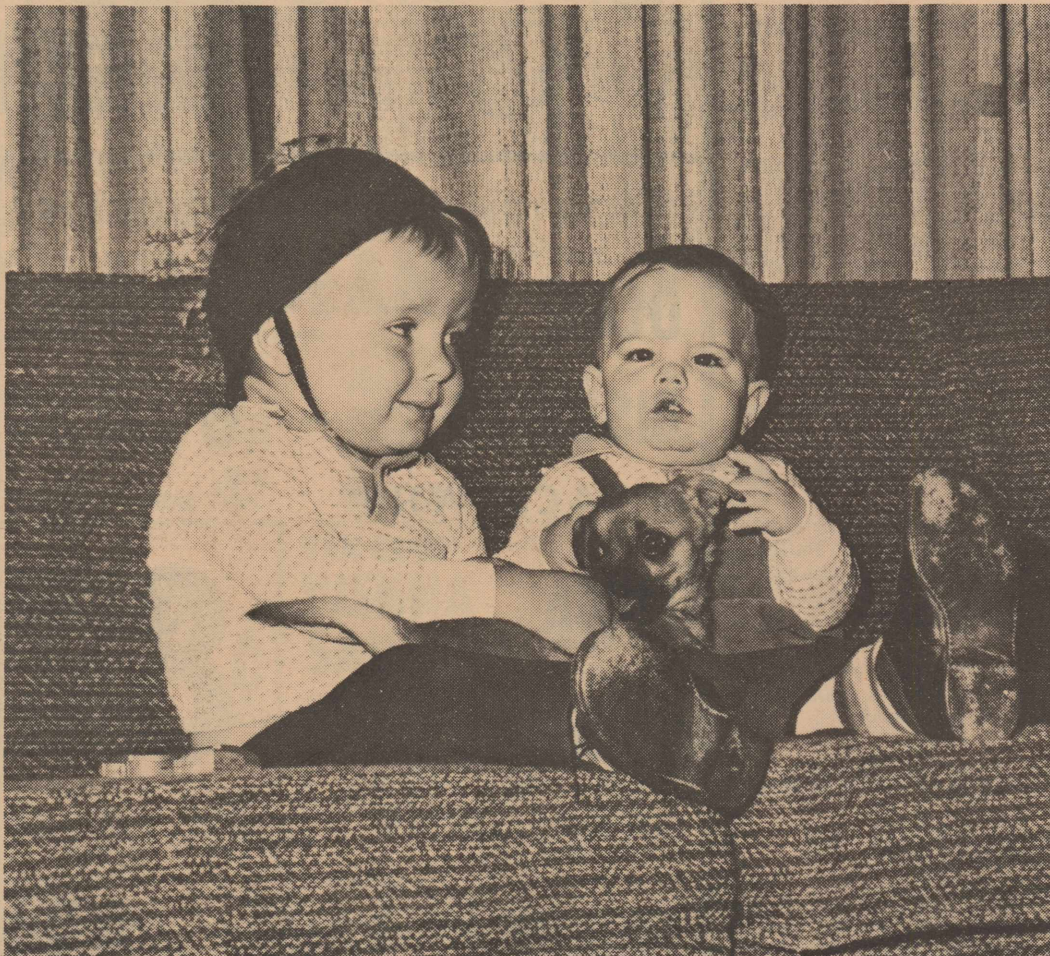

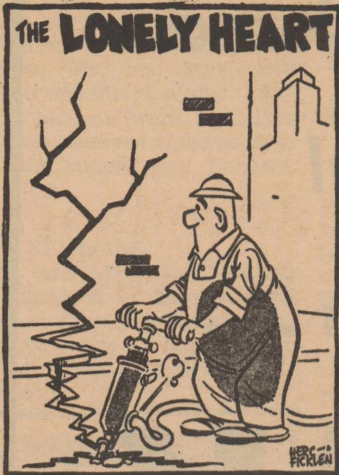

## Homesteading In Nevada Attracts Hart Families

Edward Todd, along with three other Hart families, were to have left Hart this week for Nevada with plans for homesteading.

Todd has a half section homesteaded near Eureka, in the north central part of the state. He plans to work as foreman for another man, who will also employ the three families going with Todd. He noted that the families hope to homestead, too.

"I think there are about eight sections filed on from Hart in Spring Valley, 36 miles east of Eureka," Todd said.

Main products of the area are wheat, oats, barley, alfalfa, and potatoes.

"The area is very thinly settled...mostly cattlemen and miners," Todd said. "They don't want to farm."

He said that a man can get a half section of land for himself and a half for his wife, and that you don't have to live on the land to homestead it.

"You have to have 40 acres in cultivation and have a well within three years," he explained.

Todd said that potatoes make from 200 to 400 sacks per acre on the Nevada land.

He reported the water situation good.

"You dig irrigation wells 200 feet," he said, "and usually strike water at 50 feet. Water rises within 35 feet. One well tested at 1600 gallons per minute at 54 feet and 2400 gallons per minute at 54 feet and six inches.
