Principals Re-Elected, Building On Schedule

In a regular meeting Monday night, Hart school trustees renewed contracts for Malcolm Atwood, high school principal, and G. C. Graves, grade school principal.

Atwood is in his fourth year at Hart and Graves is in his third year.

In other action, the board set the trustee election, accepted a resignation and discussed progress on the new high and junior high building.

Trustee election is set April 4 with filing deadline set March 4.

Terms of Lorenzo Lee, Milton Sharp and Doyle Davis will expire.

Robert C. Hudson, school business manager, resigned to

take a similar job at Shallowater.

Herbert Brasher, architect, met with the board to discuss the new building.

Trustees decided on a pastel color scheme to be used inside the building. Interior wainscoting will be of plastic material. Ceramic tile will be used in the restrooms.

The building will have only

two windows and these will be in the principal's office.

Prestressed columns are now in place for the gym and prestressed beams for the roof are ready to go up next week.

"We're fairly well on schedule and possibly a little ahead," Paul Kennedy, superintendent, said.

Completion date for the building is June 15.

Beet Association Formed In Hart

Hart Sugar Beet Association was formed here Monday night with Charles Martin as president.

The organization was formed at a meeting attended by approximately 50 local farmers. Homer Garrison, president of the High Plains Sugar Beet Association, and Luke Miller, Plainview, spoke to the group about progress being made toward securing a sugar mill in Plainview.

Farmers were to sign letters of intent to grow sugar beets and approximately 5,085 acres were promised in the Hart area.

Board of directors for the Hart association include Wade Mills, Harvey Davis and David Nelson. David Willis was elected secretary-treasurer.

Anyone interested in joining the group is asked to contact one of the above.

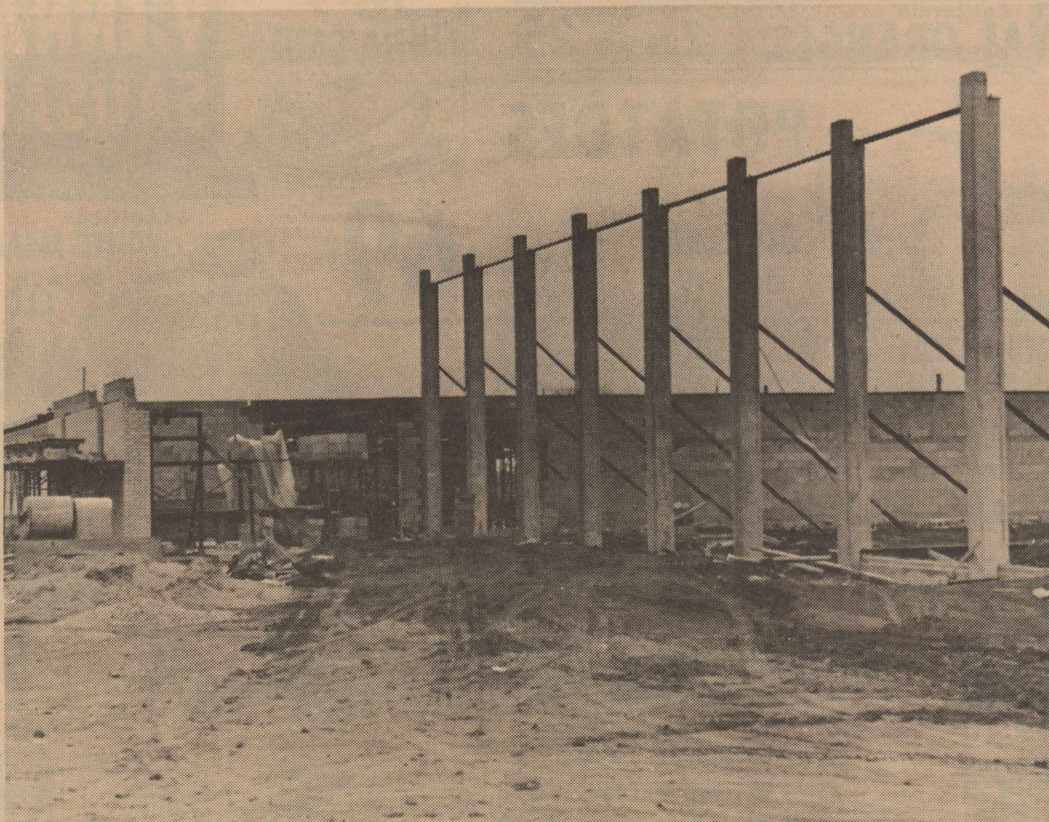
Present plans call for a \$20 million beet sugar refinery in the Plainview area.

Sugar beet growers would be required to take some equity in the plant without cash outlay, the equity being in sums taken from payment at the mill for their beets.

Growers who sign agreements will take \$2 a ton less for their beets, not to exceed \$200 or 10 years.

Commitments will be presented before the sugar division of the Department of Agriculture in Washington Saturday.

In this district, Glenn Terrel reported he had an average yield of 24 and a half tons per acre of sugar beets last year. Luke Miller had 37 tons per acre.

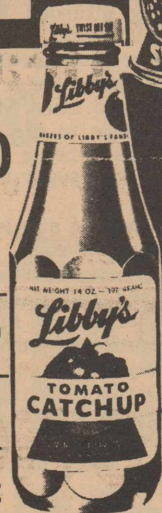

Our recipe this week comes from Mrs. Miles Jackson, a resident of Hart since July of 1963.

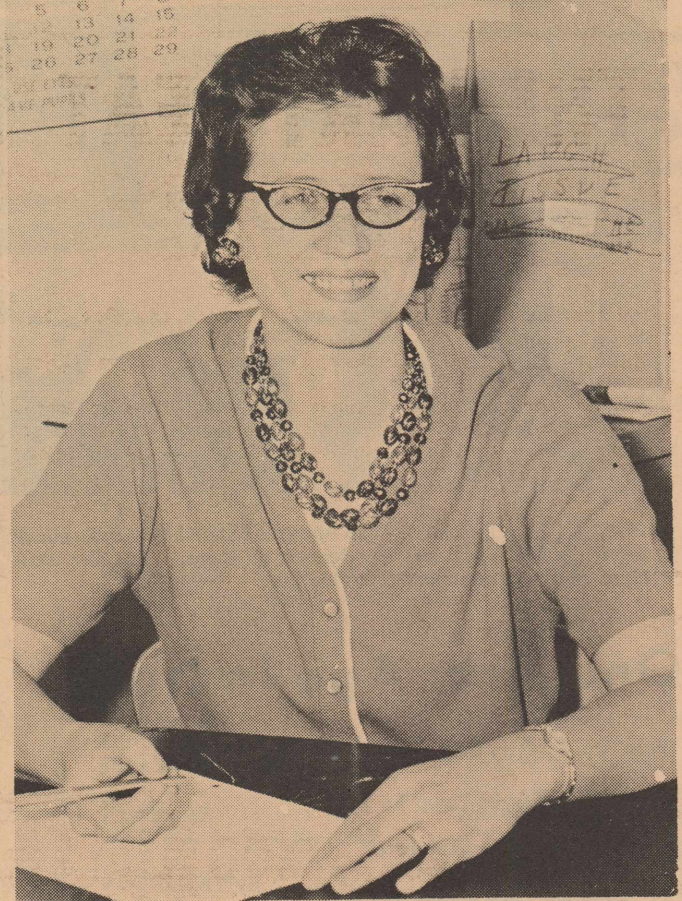

They have three children, David, 9; Kathy, 7; and Jimmy, 4. They are members of the Baptist Church.

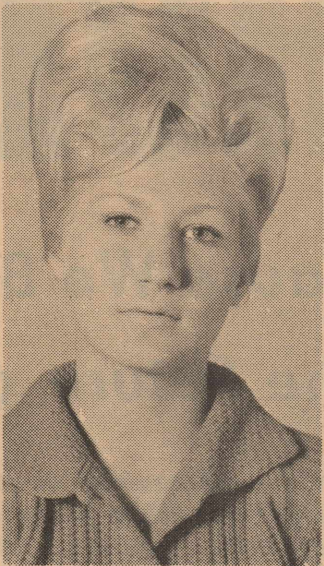

1 can tomato juice

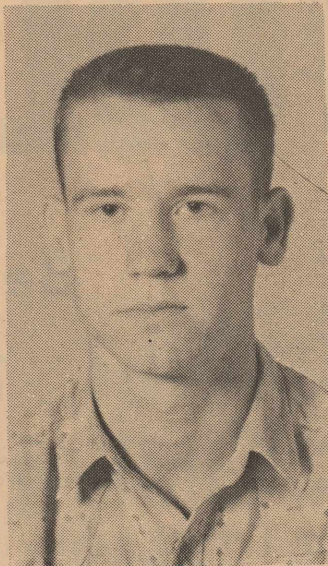
Mix all ingredients together and form in a loaf in a baking dish. Cover the top with tomato sauce and green pepper rings. Bake at 350 degrees for about an hour.
