ED HARRIS----Hart's Man of the Year

ED HARRIS NAMED HART MAN OF YEAR

Ed Harris, a 17-year resident of Hart with an outstanding record of service to his community and his country, Monday was named the town's "Man of the Year".

Presentation of the award was made at the regular noon luncheon of the Hart Lions Club. It highlighted a meeting which also featured the visit of Steve Stephens of Amarillo, district governor of Lions District 2T-1.

In other activity at the meeting, Warren Dayton of Plainview presented the club with its charter for the Hart Boy Scout troop.

The "Man of the Year" was presented a plaque for his civic work.

The 43-year-old Harris, who now serves as Hart's mayor, has operated Ed Harris Lumber Co. here since 1947. He also is a director of Farmers State Bank and operates Ed Harris Lumber Co. at Tulia.

A native of Tulia, Ed was graduated from Tulia High School in 1939. After two years of college work at Texas Tech, the outbreak of World War II saw him volunteer for duty.

In six years of service with the U.S. Army, four of it overseas, Harris rose from private to the rank of captain.

He's been advancing ever since. After his discharge in 1947, Ed located in Hart and established his lumber yard.

During his first year in business here, Harris bought some materials from a Lubbock distributor represented by a pretty young saleswoman.

"She sold me a bill of goods," quips Ed, with a wide grin.

The young saleswoman and Ed were married in 1947. Now he and his wife, Melba, have two children, David, 10, and Jan 7.

The Harrises attend the First Methodist Church where he has served as chairman of the board of stewards and is now a trustee. He is also president of the Methodist Men.

A charter member of the Hart Lions Club, Ed served as its first Lion boss in 1956.

He is in the Masonic Lodge, Tulia, Khiva Temple of Amarillo and the Commandery at Plainview.

He is a past commander of the Hart American Legion Post and now is its service officer. He is also a past scoutmaster of the Hart troop.

In the past three years, top honors at the Hart Fat Harris' work on civic projects has come strongly to light. He is in his second term as may-

> When Harris became mayor, he and his co-workers, councilmen Claude Cox and Norlan Dudley, made their first project an effort to update all city records.

This has been done, along with numerous city improvements. These include about \$40,000 worth of new paving in the past three years, \$34,000 worth of improvements to the city water system and approxi-mately \$132,000 in the sewer system. Hart also installed trash service recently. For the first time, the city

of Hart has a full-time city office, with one full-time employee and one part-time.

Harris' ability to get the job done, no matter what he undertakes, is reflected in the way he served his country during World War II. He participated in the Nor-

mandy Invasion on D-Day in June, 1944 and subsequently saw duty in the Battle of the Bulge.

His alertness is reflected in the way he earned the Bronze Star Medal in early 1945.

While on duty in France, Harris once heard a Canadian officer remark that he hadn't eaten any peanut butter for two or three years.

Harris, familiar with the British army menus, thought that everytime he had eaten at a British mess, that plenty of peanut butter was at hand.

Skeptical of the Canadian officer, Harris followed him to a hotel and subsequently learned the man posing as the officer was actually a German espionage agent. Harris' curiosity resulted in

the capture of several German agents and earned him the Bronze Star.

The Hart mayor still has those qualities of service, alertness and curiosity and they are paying off in helping to make Hart a better place in which to live.

Felder, a senior student, is now doing practice teaching at Monterey School in Lubbock. He was a 1961 graduate of Hart High School.





3 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup water

l tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. almond flavoring 6 egg whites

Cream butter until smooth and light. Gradually add sugar and continue creaming several minutes to incorporate as much air as possible. Combine flour, baking powder and salt; Sift 3 times. Add flavorings to milk and water. Add flour alternately with liquid to cream mixture. Beat well after each addition. Beat egg whites, until stiff, but







She adds, however, that she thinks that there are other things that are important, too, and that a teacher can do her job well and not be "completely" dedicated.




