When the siren sounds, residents are asked to pull car to curb and not to follow the truck. For emergencies, they are asked to switch citizens band radios to channel 16.

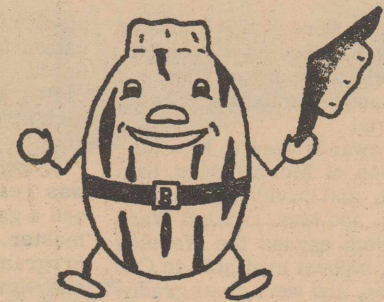

Patterson Youth Chosen For Top Science Group

Senior Gary Patterson, 17, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. C.E. Patterson of Hart, has been selected for the Honors Group in the Westinghouse science Talent Search.

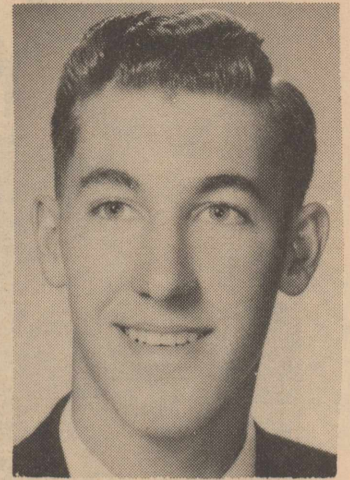
The top 10 per cent of the students who competed in the talent search were chosen to be among the 314 in the Honors Group. Of this number, 40 will go to Washington, D.C. to compete for the \$34,500 in scholarships.

The preliminary application for the talent search competition consisted of a personal data sheet, a 1,500 word research paper explaining the student's science project, a 75-word summary for publicity purposes and a three hour test to determine scientific aptitude in all major areas of scientific endeavor.

Gary's project for the competition dealt with nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy. Simplified, this means determining the kinds of atoms in a molecule and how those atoms are chemically bonded to the other atoms in the molecule.

"I formulated a theory that the resonance frequency of a proton is directly proportional to the ionic character of the chemical bond" said Gary.

Gary first became interested in nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy during a trip to California Institute of Technology. There he saw a nuclear

resonance spectrometer in operation and heard a lecture on the subject by one of the outstanding research scientists in nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy.

Gary is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Patterson of La Mesa, Calif., and has been a straight A student and never missed a day of school or been tardy.

His father is a former Hart resident, who after finishing school, joined the Navy. He has retired, attended college and will receive his Masters Degree this year.

Recipe Of The Week

Mrs. Nancy Bowden gives us our recipe of the week, enchiladas.

ENCHILADAS

Prepare chili with beans, then heat grease in large skillet as for deep frying. When grease is hot dip tortilla in the grease then lay on platter covered with chili, chopped onion and grated

cheese. Then fold. Place chili, onion and cheese on the top. Place in hot oven until cheese is melted.

TOASTADAS

Cut tortilla into four pieces like you would a pie. Place in hot grease, as a deep fry, until golden brown and hard. Then place on absorbent paper. Sprinkle salt.

These enchiladas are good with toastadas or crackers and a combination salad.

Couple Gives Impressions Of Washington, DC Trip

Mr. and Mrs. Milton Sharp were recently given a trip to Washington, DC along with other directors of Mid-Plains Telephone Cooperative.

The couple spent a week in the city at a national telephone convention.

Below are some of their impressions of the trip:

"Washington DC, our national capitol, is not only the most beautiful city, but has the most famous and fascinating historical background of any city in our nation.

"Mounted on horseback, George Washington rode along the bank of the Potomac river he knew so well, and after a careful survey selected the present site of the city. In 1790, Congress passed a bill creating the District of Columbia located on the banks of the Potomac river.

"We left by jet from Love Field in Dallas and two hours later landed at Dulles Airport near Washington.

"As we sped through the air, our captain would give us bits of information as to our location, altitude and speed. Over Nashville, Tenn., our speed was 695 miles per hour, which was unbelievable to us, then a few minutes later the captain informed us we were over Charleston, West Virginia, traveling at a ground speed of 795 miles per hour.

"Far above the clouds, hurtling through space, as comfortable as sitting in your easy chair at home having your meals served, is a most wonderful way to travel.

"The convention was held at the Mayflower Hotel, where we stayed. This is on Connecticut Ave., which is compared to 5th

Ave., in New York. Goldwater and Rockefeller headquarters building were on Connecticut Ave. and also the St. Matthew Church where President Kennedy's funeral was held.

"Our second day there was Sunday and we attended church services at The National Presbyterian Church a historic church where a number of our Presidents have attended naming a few, Presidents Jackson, Polk, Pierce, Buchanan and Cleveland. Alexander Graham Bell's granddaughter is a member of this church.

"We sat directly behind President and Mrs. Eisenhower's pew during the service.

"President Johnson and the whole Congressional staff attended Red Mass at the St. Matthew Church. This is a ceremony they attend once each year just before Congress goes into session for the coming year, and the purpose of Red Mass was to bless all government workers and it called a rededication to their task.

"Needless to say, a crowd gathered around the building waiting for the service to end for some interesting watching and picture-making. Needless to say, we were in the front row doing our share of the waiting and when those doors swung open and the President and Congressional staff drifted down the flight of steps, we were doing our share of picture-taking. The ladies in our group thought Lady Bird Johnson was much more beautiful in person than her pictures could ever portray.

"The capitol building is the most famous and costliest building in the country. The floor area of the Capitol build-

ing is 14 acres, with 430 rooms all devoted to offices, committees and storage purposes. The Rotunda, where President Kennedy lay in state, and where the general public enters is most beautiful. An interesting experience and the highlight of our Capitol tour was to see Congress in session.

"Every lady should visit the White House, the home of the first family of our land, the President and his family.

"The interior is beautiful beyond description with 132 rooms and every room decorated to perfection in their own period setting. The President and family occupy 8 rooms, which I might add, we didn't come close to seeing, the rest of the White House if for his staff and state affairs. We loved the Red Room above all, the chairs and divans and walls were covered in red velvet. The Green Room walls were covered in a green silk material. The Blue Room walls were covered in satin material. Every room was furnished with historic furniture and pictures, huge gorgeous chandeliers hung from every ceiling.

"The most beautiful and important building in Washington is our Supreme Court Building, highest court in the land. The exterior is of Vermont White Marble and the inner courts, corridors and walls are of Georgia white marble.

"The Library of Congress is one of the largest libraries in the world. Anything that has ever been printed and has a copyright, gets it here in this building. From funny books on up to the most important material, and anything every copyrighted in the U.S. is on file

in this Library. The size of this building is unbelievably spacious, 36 acres of floor space, with 420 miles of book shelves.

"The National Archives Building was very interesting and unique in that it is a double building with the inner building of steel and concrete forming a fire proof vault to protect rare and valuable documents, such as The Declaration of Independence, Constitution of The United State and the Bill of Rights.

"The most fascinating and interesting of all about those papers, The Declaration of Independence is sealed in a glass counter in gas to preserve it, and automatically goes 10 feet underground every night inside a steel vault. The building is pressurized and if a piece of paper is moved anywhere in the building it sets off an alarm.

"The United States Treasury Department which administers the Bureau of Engraving and Printing that we toured with absorbing interest is where our nations paper currency is printed. This agency probably touches more closely upon the daily lives of the American people than any other work in Washington.

"We were told that the life of a one dollar bill is 13 months, it and all worn and damaged currency is reclaimed and destroyed. Over \$30,000,000 dollars worth of returned currency is relegated daily to the large incinerators for burning. \$39,000,000 worth of currency is printed daily and this replacement goes back into circulation daily.

"We made an interesting tour of the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. The Academy trains Navy officers.

"The Pentagon Building, headquarters of the Department of Defense is a five-sided, five story building across the Potomac River in Arlington, Virginia.

"This is the largest office building in the world. It covers 29 acres, has 50,000 employes, a one-mile walk around the outside and 16 1/2 miles of corridors. The building and its furnishings cost \$64,000,000.

"We toured the largest Catholic Church in America. The

National Shrine of The Immaculate Conception of Washington, DC.

"It is built in the form of a Latin Cross. In the description of this church, I want to strike a musical note and this will be of interest to musicians, the organ they plan on installing has pipes from 3 feet to 3 stories tall.

"Treasured highlights of our Arlington Cemetary tour are pictures of the late President's grave.

"An interesting visit was the F.B.I. Building, where we saw a very small portion of the amazing art of crime detection. The most impressive feature is the scientific thoroughness with which the F.B.I. solves crime.

"A much larger part of the Federal Agents accomplishments is the highly developed ability to establish guilt--and innocence--in crime through advanced methods.

"If John Dillinger had taken a tour of the Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters in Washington D.C., he probably would have been less willing to take on the F.B.I. as a foe.

"We live in the greatest nation on the face of this earth and every American should pause for prayers and be more patriotic to this great and wonderful country we are privileged to live in. Our blessings are bountiful and numberless. And we daily take all of this for granted.

"We have great leaders, they need the prayers and support of the American people of this great nation.

"As J. Edgar Hoover says, 'Patriotism is Everybody's Job.'"

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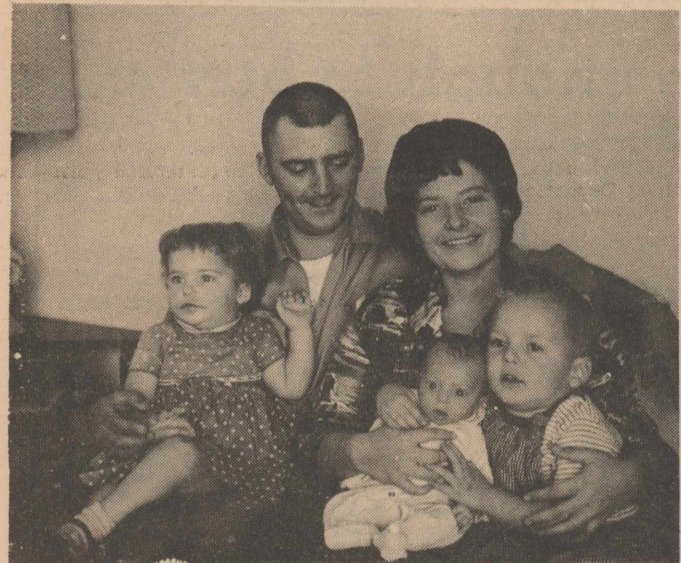
