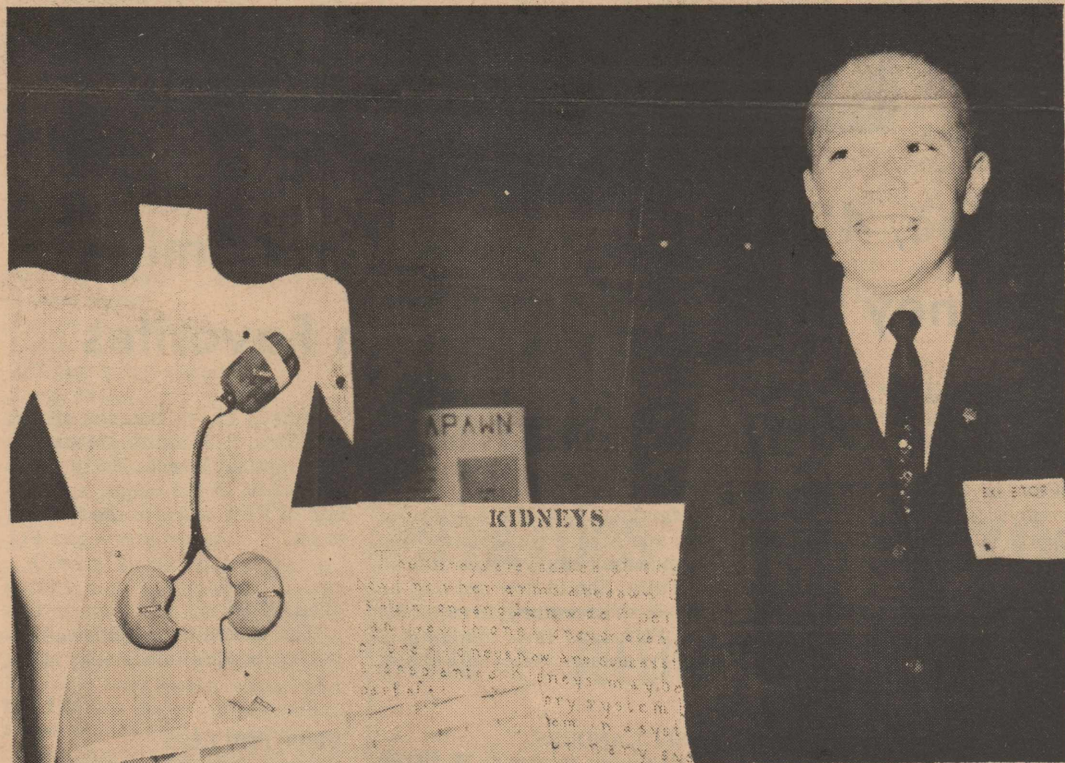

Hart Area Gets 500 Acres Of Sugar Beets With Holly

Hart farmers signed contracts with Holly Sugar Corp. Monday night for 500 acres of sugar beets, according to Charlie Martin, president of Hart Sugar Beet Growers.

"We distributed the seed Monday night and are going to get the planting done right away," Martin said.

Hart also has 140 acres of sugar beets planted for Great Western of Colorado.

Martin said that 18 men signed up for the 500 acres Monday night.

He added that this is the first

year that Hart has had any sugar beet acres.

Postmaster Jewel Brooks reminded residents of Hart that an effective date of April 1 has been set for new domestic parcel post rate increases.

The parcel post increase approved averages about 13%.

Grain Sign-Up Will End Friday

Tomorrow, March 27, is the last day a grain producer may sign up for the feed grain program of 1964, according to Charlie Hill, ASC officer manager at Dimmitt.

Sign-up started Feb. 10 and Hill said about 840 county farmers had signed up for the program Tuesday. This is out of a possible 1,082 farmers.

"We probably have a few less farmers to sign up this year," Hill said, "but we have more acreage, I think."

He pointed out that a new ruling by the United States Department of Agriculture increased feed grain diversion payments on acreage planted in castor beans.

The price support payments and final diverted acreage payment will be made next fall, after performance has been determined.

All persons who will receive a share of the Feed Grain on a farm must sign their intentions before an advance payment is made to anyone.

Again in 1964, as in 1963, the entire intended diverted acreage must be diverted, except for a small tolerance, for the farm to be in compliance.

However, a grower may change his intended diverted acres through tomorrow.

The minimum participation is 20 percent of the feed grain base and the maximum amount that can be diverted is 50 percent of the feed grain base.

The new ruling by Washington provides that if a farmer diverts 41 percent to 50 percent of his feed grain base, he will receive one-half of his maximum diversionary payment as figured on the crop with the lowest rate.

There will be no change in method of calculating the payment of the feed grain diverted acres planted to castor beans

if a farmer diverts only 20 percent of his feed grain base.

Prior to this new ruling, a farmer would have received only one-half his minimum diversionary payment regardless of the percentage of the acres that he diverted from feed grains and planted to castor beans.

The grower will also receive the full price support payment on the farm.

This same ruling also applies to sesame and guar. Sunflowers will be at 30 percent. A farmer may plant safflower but he can not receive diverted payment for it.

Designed to introduce area residents to the Toastmaster's organization, this was the first meeting of the club ever held in Hart.

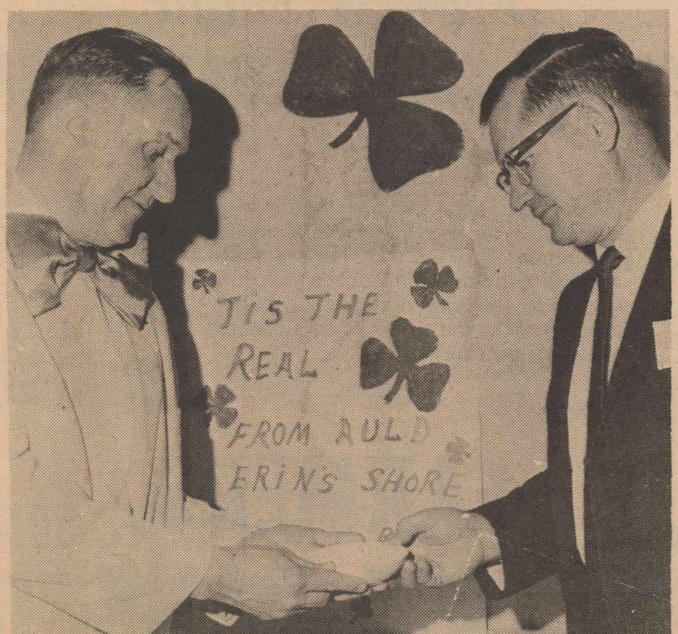
Tony Steiert served as toastmaster with Paul Leach, Plainview, giving the welcome and introduction.

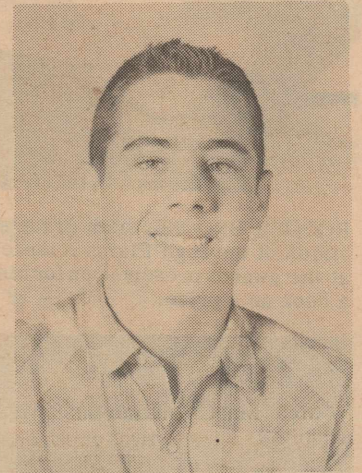

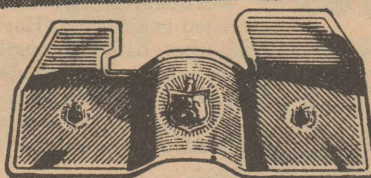
Martha Sharp and Jerry Smith have been named freshman class favorites at Hart High School.

Recipe Of The Week

Mrs. Thelma Martin, who works at the school lunchroom, gives us our recipe this week, chocolate cake.

Mrs. Martin and her husband, Granville, have two children, Thelma Joyce, 14, and Willie of Grand Prairie.

- Chocolate (Devils Food) Cake
 3/4 cup butter
 2 cups sugar
 3 eggs well beaten
 1 tsp. vanilla
 2/3 cup sifted cocoa
 1 cup sweet milk
 3 cups flour
 1/2 package yeast
 1/4 cup luke warm water
 1/4 tsp. sugar
 1 tsp. soda
 1/4 cup warm water

Cream butter and sugar together, add beaten eggs, vanilla and cocoa—Next add portions of milk and flour. Last, mix in the yeast which has been stired into 1/4 cup luke warm water with the 1/4 tsp. sugar and allowed to stand 5 minutes to soften. Let batter stand in a covered bowl over night in a cool place. Next morning dissolve the soda in 1/4 cup warm water and add to cake mixture. Bake in oven 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

Phillip Jones, Rt. 2 Hart, will attend the New York World's Fair early this year as a guest of Ford Motor Company.

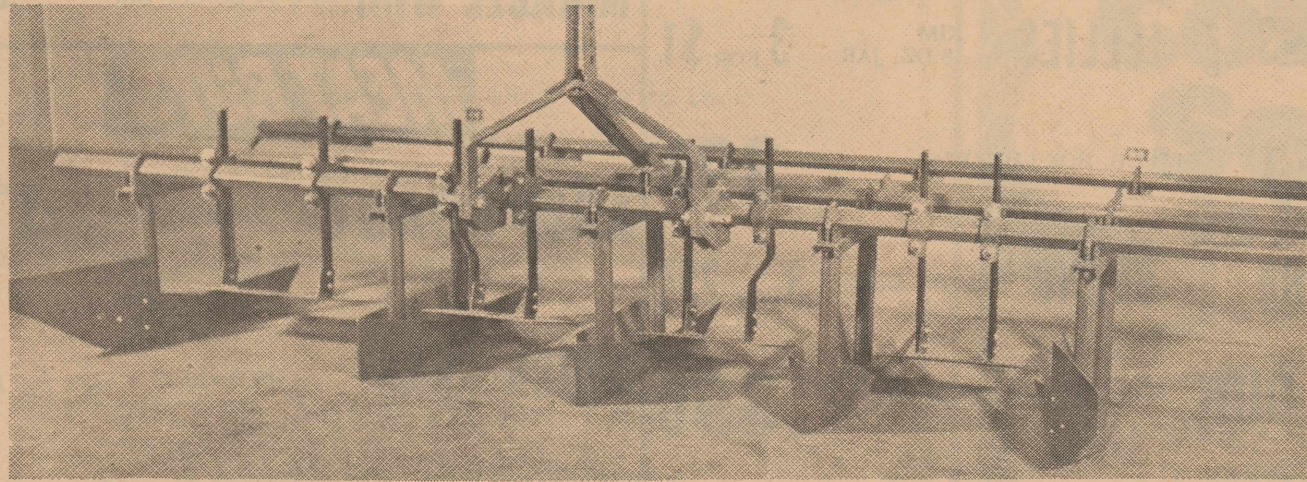

Prizes will be given in junior and senior divisions.

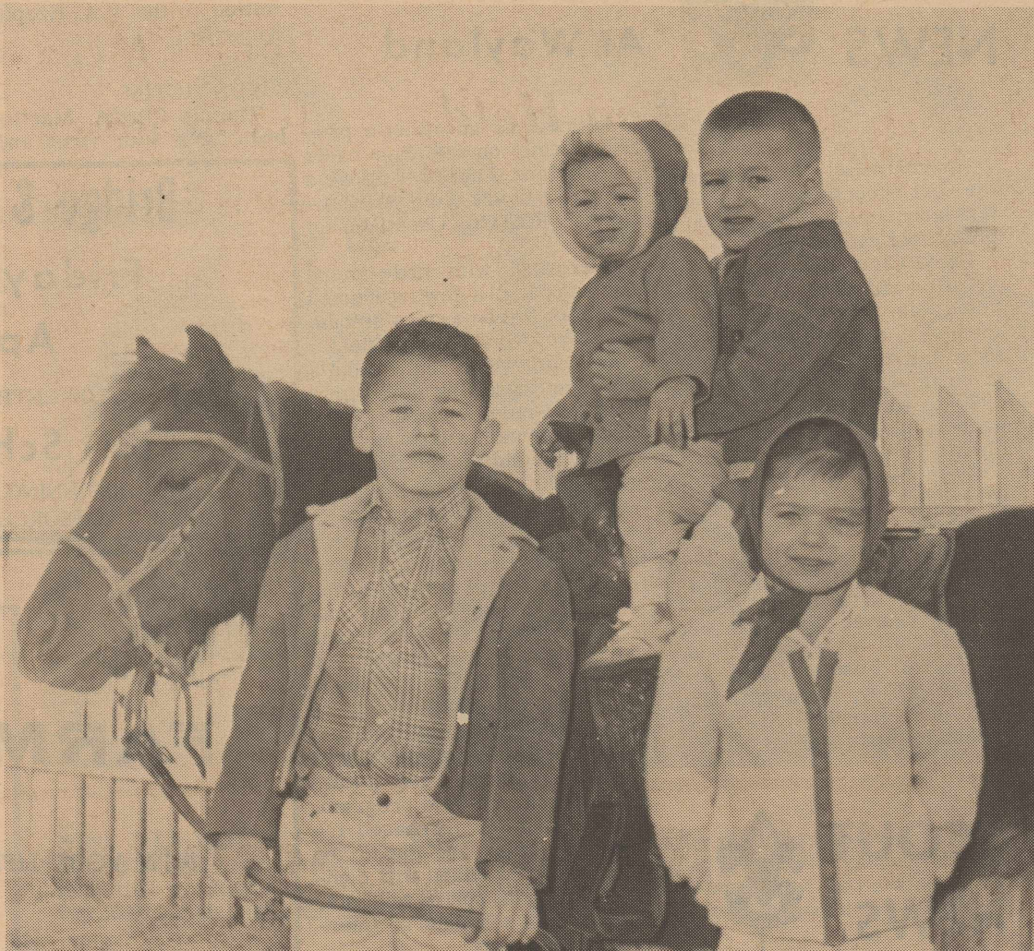

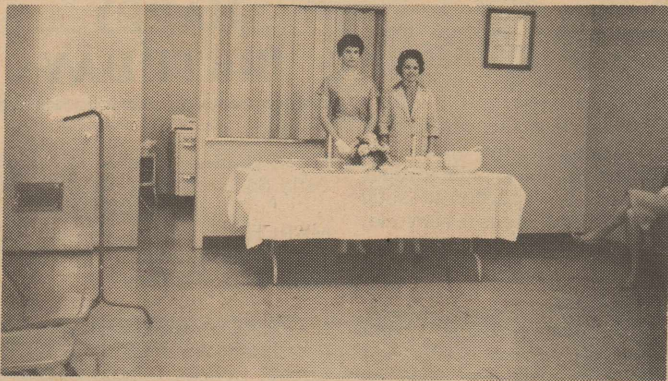

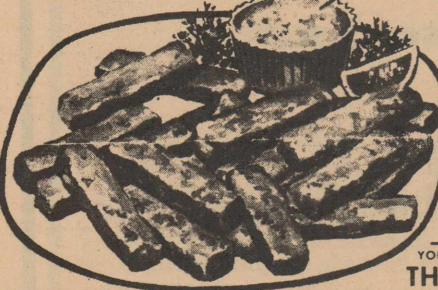
