School Board Vote Saturday

Six Men Are Seeking Three Posts On Board

Voters of the Hart Independent School District will elect three members to the school board Saturday.

Six men are seeking the three positions on the board.

Two of them are incumbents--Doyle Davis and Lorenzo Lee, both farmers. The third incumbent, Milton Sharp, will not run after serving 13 years on the board.

Four other farmers are seeking election. They are J. M. (Marcellus) Kendrick, L.C. (Laurence) McLain, Cleve McLain, and Ralph Futrell.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday.

Hart Places Sixth In Track Tourney

Nine boys from Hart's track team were entered in the Springlake Invitational Tournament, Saturday, March 28.

Billy Joe Farris, Dennis and Darryl McLain, Bob Crick, Joe Bob Sanders, George Ed Bennett, Danny Rodriguez, Carl Ward and Kenneth Sharp captured 42 points to place Hart sixth out of 13 schools competing in the Class B division.

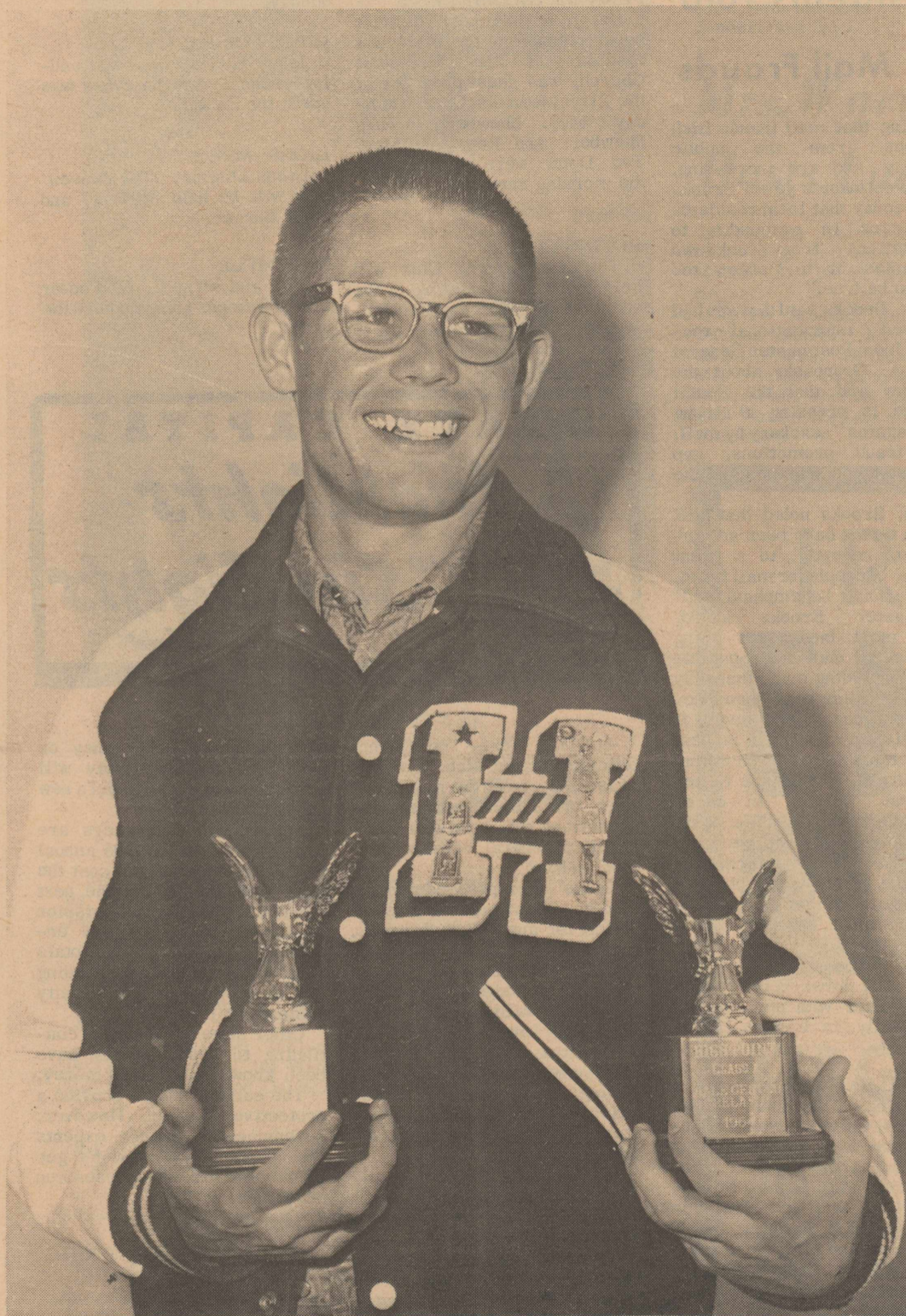
Dennis McLain repeated for the second week in succession as high point individual contestant in the Class B division. McLain won first in the 180-yard low hurdles with a time of 20.6 seconds, breaking the record of 21.7 seconds set by him in 1963 at the Springlake meet. He also won first in the 220 yard dash with a time of 23.1, breaking the previous record of 24.0 set by Altman of Smyer in 1963. He won second place in the 100 yard dash, turning in a performance time of 10.2 seconds.

Danny Rodriguez was in a five-way tie for first place in the high jump, with a 5 foot, 4 inches performance. Carl Ward took fifth in the discus with a distance of 115 feet 10 inches toss, and Billy Farris was a three-way tie for third place in the broad jump.

The Hart athletes were among nearly 500 contestants entered in the meet which included participants in Class AA, Class A and Class B divisions. The high point individual performers in each class won that position with two first place showings and one second place.

Hart's team will be entered at the Levelland track meet. This week and then will be out to capture district honors at Lazbuddie the following week.

Residents Told Of Mail Frauds

Noting that mail frauds file millions from the public annually and are increasing, Hart Postmaster Jewel Brooks urged today that local residents take care in responding to solicitations from unknown companies or to "offers too good to be true."

Mrs. Brooks said that she had received informational material from Postmaster General John A. Gronouski about the problem and that the Postal Service is pressing a strong drive against "quackery by mail, land fraud promotions, gyp work-at-home schemes and the like."

Mrs. Brooks noted that stiff prison terms have been administered, recently, to a great number of people for mail fraud. "It should be emphasized," Postmaster Brooks added, "that most businesses doing business by mail are reputable firms, including many that may not be familiar to the prospective purchaser. However, if there is any doubt, it is best to get information from reliable sources, such as the Better Business Bureau. In cases where there is a genuine basis for suspicion of fraud, we would like to have prompt information from the public in my office--and I will see that appropriate action is taken."

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights
AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex.--Top finance officials of the state now feel reasonably sure the next fiscal year for Texas governmental operations will dawn with an unfamiliar general revenue surplus on hand.

Texas' hard-pressed general fund has been in almost constant deficit for more than six years. As of March 25 it still was \$36,600,000 in the red.

However, budget-makers are impressed with optimistic U.S. Treasury reports that the income tax cut is going to boom state and local revenues by putting more money in circulation. (Theory: more money spent, more sales taxes collected.)

"There will be a surplus. The question is how much," commented one veteran finance observer.

Ideas on "how much" stretch all the way from a relatively modest \$35,000,000--estimated by the comptroller's office--to upwards of \$90,000,000.

While the feeling is general that the Legislature will begin its budget writing next year

with prospects of money on hand, the surplus likely will not be big enough to avert a new tax bill.

Public school teachers are campaigning for a \$405 annual pay raise which would cost the state \$68,000,000 for the next biennium. Texas Commission on Higher Education has endorsed a program which totals \$86,000,000 additional spending for the college and university system for 1965-67.

Other state agencies are continuing to grow and few have been known to ask less money.

The surplus should provide a protective cushion. However, governmental finance experts feel that taxpayers won't get by the 1965 legislative session unscathed.

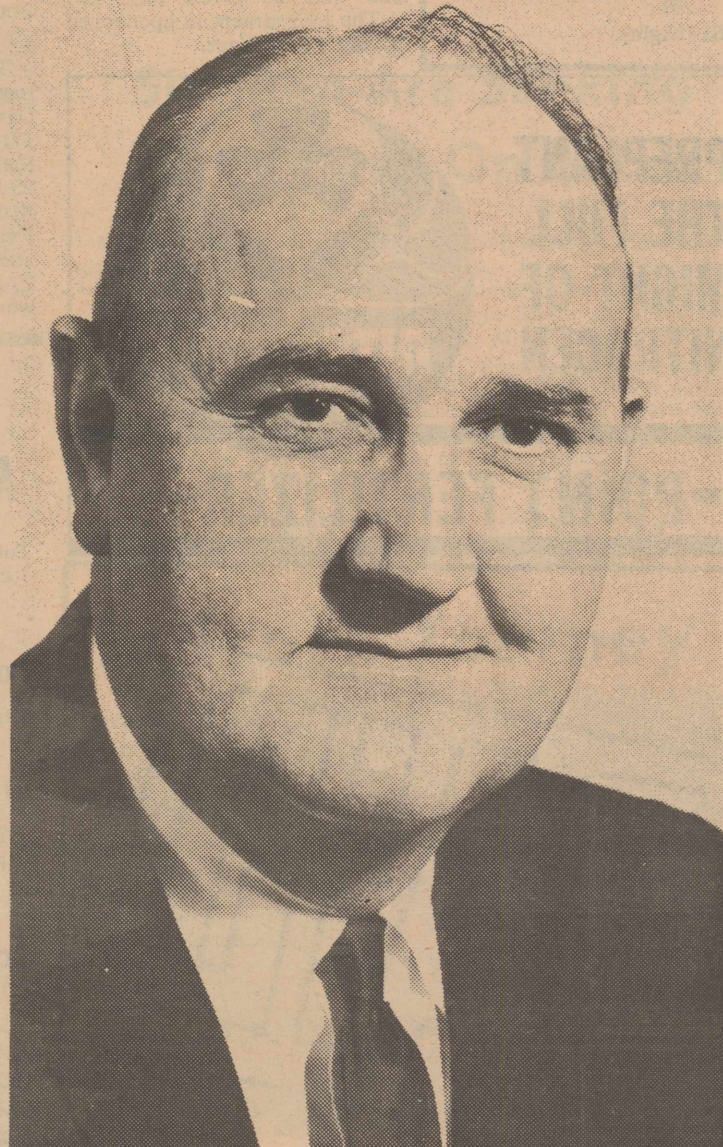
TOMY LANCASTER

Lancaster is a graduate of Hart High School and was employed with Hill Farms, Hart. He also attended Draughon's Business College, Lubbock.

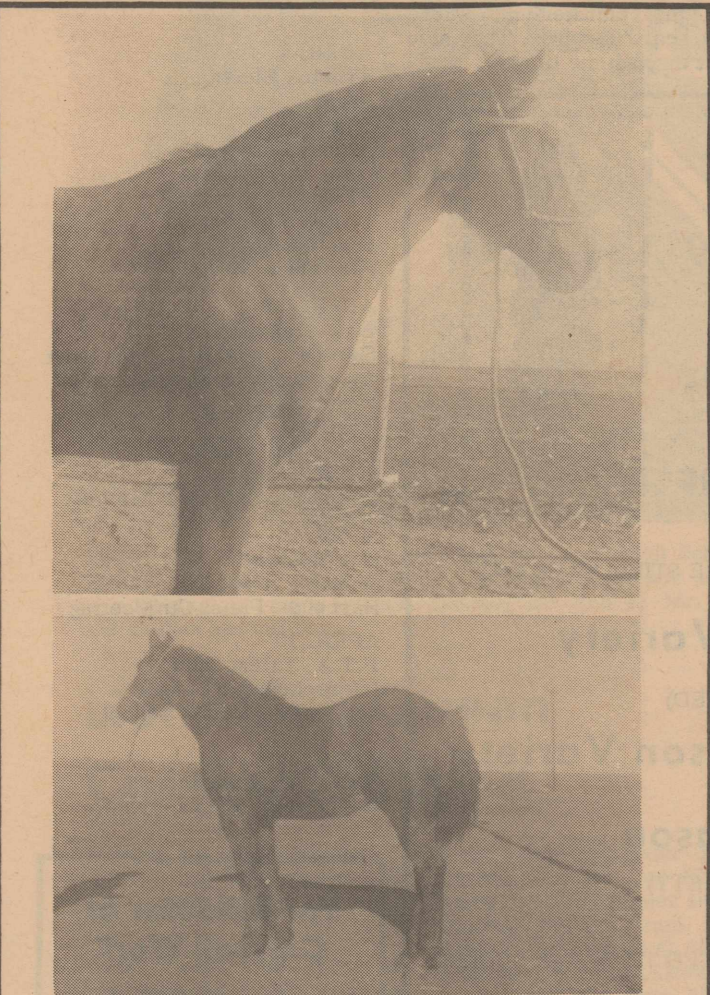
He will be located at Fort Polk for eight weeks of basic training. He will then serve six months of active duty in the Guards.

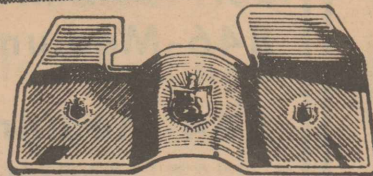

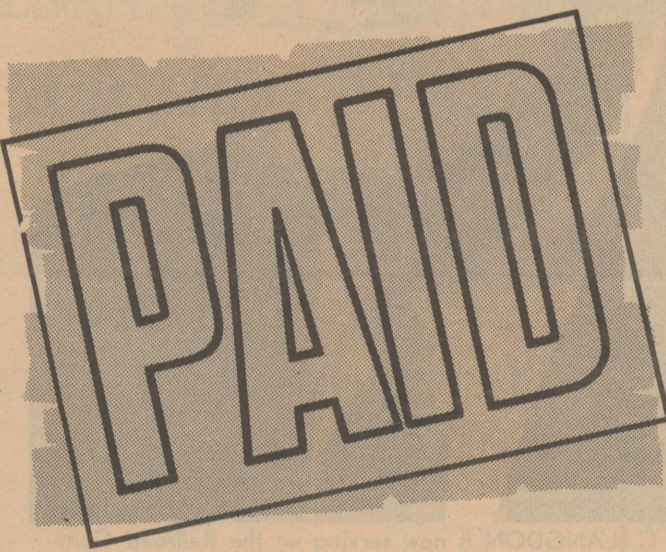
