I. C. Sharp Is Burned Seriously In Farm Mishap

I. C. Sharp, 52, a Hart area farmer, suffered burns from his waist to his shoulders when an explosion and fire ripped through a four-room renthouse on his farm 12 miles northeast of Hart Wednesday evening.

He was rushed to the Swisher County Hospital by his wife, then rushed by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital at Amarillo. He is in serious condition in the intensive care unit. He was said to be some improved as of Sunday.

An accumulation of butane gas was believed to have caused the explosion which occurred while Sharp was working in the unoccupied rent house near his farm home.

A tenant who had been living in the house moved out Wednesday morning.

The front door was blown 30 feet into the yard by the blast, which knocked down portions of the walls. A fire followed and destroyed the building.

Man Jailed In Burglary

An Earth man has been jailed by Castro County officers in connection with a burglary at Hart City Hall on May 7.

The man, Raymond Lee Henderson, was arrested Tuesday night and charged with burglary.

Approximately \$150 in signed checks, \$70 in cash and a transistor radio were taken in the break-in.

A filing cabinet was heavily damaged and the fire department rifled during the break-in.

Officers said they had recovered bits of torn checks along the highway between Hart and Muleshoe, where Henderson was arrested.

None of the money was recovered, but officers believed they would recover the transistor radio, which belonged to Mrs. Bob Reed, city secretary.

Officers theorized that most,

if not all, of the checks taken in the break-in were torn up and thrown away.

Castro County teachers' meeting was held at Nazareth recently. Teachers attending from the county schools included, Hart, Dimmitt and Nazareth.

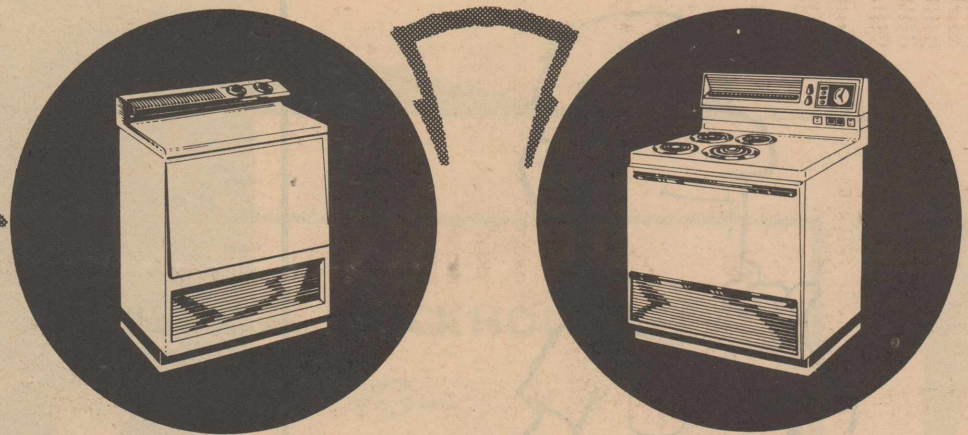

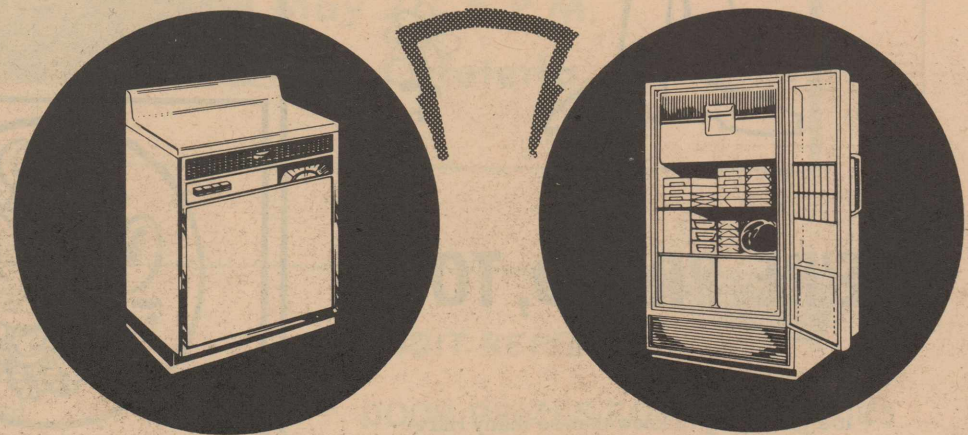

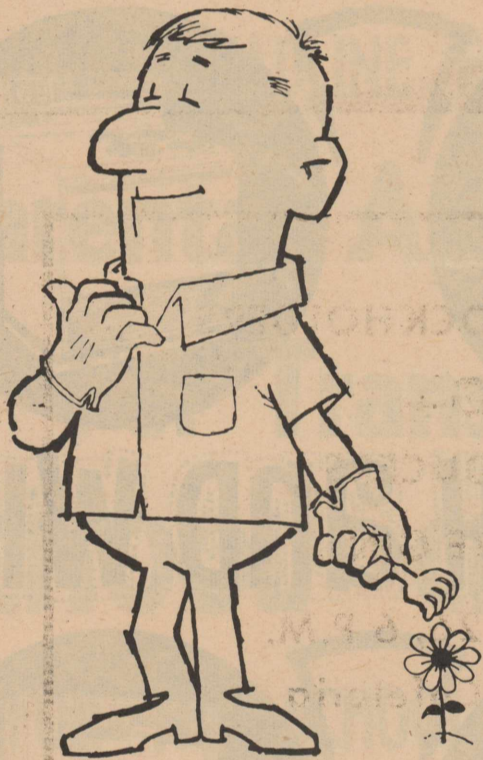

RAILROAD-FIREMAN FIGHT RAGES—Atty. Gen. Carr said he is going to see how several suits filed against railroads turned out before he decides if he has authority to enter a dispute involving discharge of some locomotive firemen.

Railroad brotherhoods say the state's "full crew law" should be observed although a federal arbitration board award permitted dismissal of firemen on some diesel engines.

Walter Caven, Texas Railroad Association attorney, said several prosecutors have agreed they won't accept complaints involving dismissals of the firemen.

Lubbock and El Paso prosecutors were among those who would not file complaints against the railroads under the full crew law, said E.F. Jergins of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

YOUTH CONFERENCE SCHEDULED—The second annual Texas Attorney General's Youth Conference will be held here July 10-12. More than 1,600 junior and senior high school students will attend.

Delegates will discuss juvenile juries, vocational training, public awareness projects, church and youth activities and other projects resulting from the 1963 meeting.

Program is based on the idea that Texas youth can find solutions to their own problems.

Noting that 40 per cent of Texas crimes are committed by youth under 21, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr termed the conference a vital step toward finding new cures to an old problem.

REDISTRICTING HEARING SET—First meeting of the Texas Legislative Council Committee on congressional redistricting is tentatively set here for the weekend of May 30.

Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe, chairman, said he probably will call an informal session at that time, as most study committee members will be in Austin anyway for President Johnson's address at the University of Texas.

Hearings in major cities over the state, to seek public advice on how to carve up districts on an equal-population basis

under court order, will begin after the second primary elections, June 6.

Moffett, Texas' oldest lawmaker in point of legislative service, said he doesn't think the public is nearly as interested in the problem of redistricting as political furor over recent court action indicated.

He indicated there will be no revelation of the study committee's final recommendations for a redistricting bill before the Legislature convenes in January.

Summer Music Camp Is Set At Texas Tech

LUBBOCK---Texas Tech's department of music will sponsor the annual summer music camp for high school, junior high and elementary students during weeks in June and July on the Tech campus.

The high school division, for band, chorus and orchestra, will be June 8-19. Junior high and elementary school divisions will be June 22-July 3 for band, and July 6-17 for chorus and orchestra. The keyboard division will be June 22-July 3.

Applications are now being accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis. A \$5 deposit is required on tuition and a \$20 deposit is required for students who will be living in Tech residence halls. 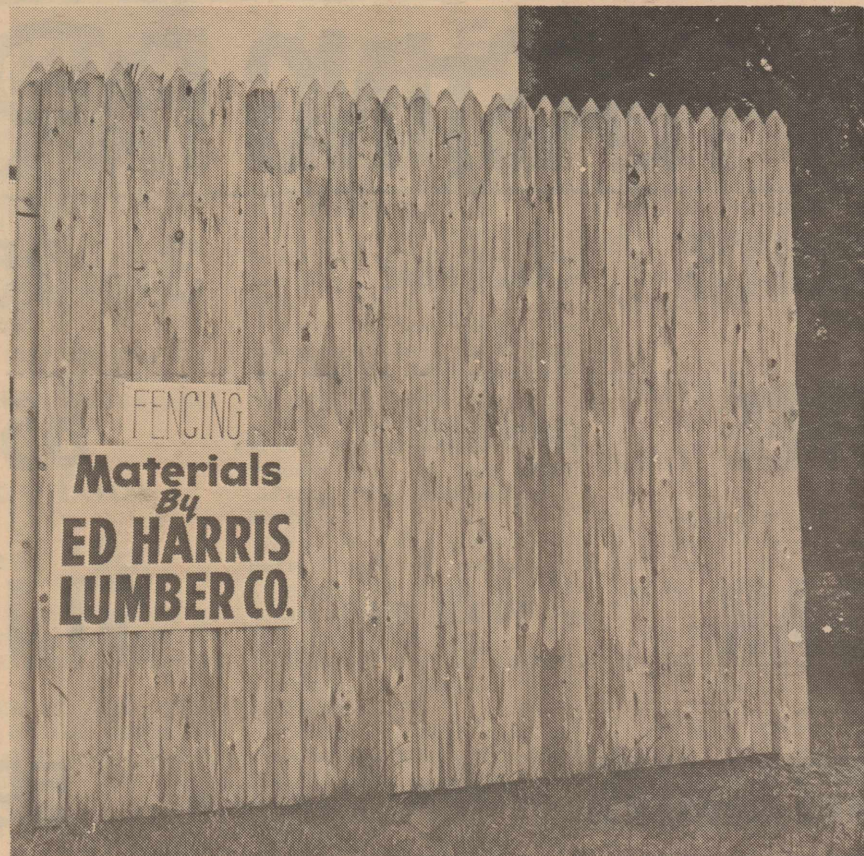

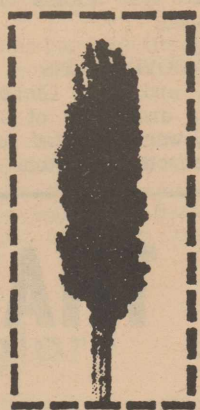

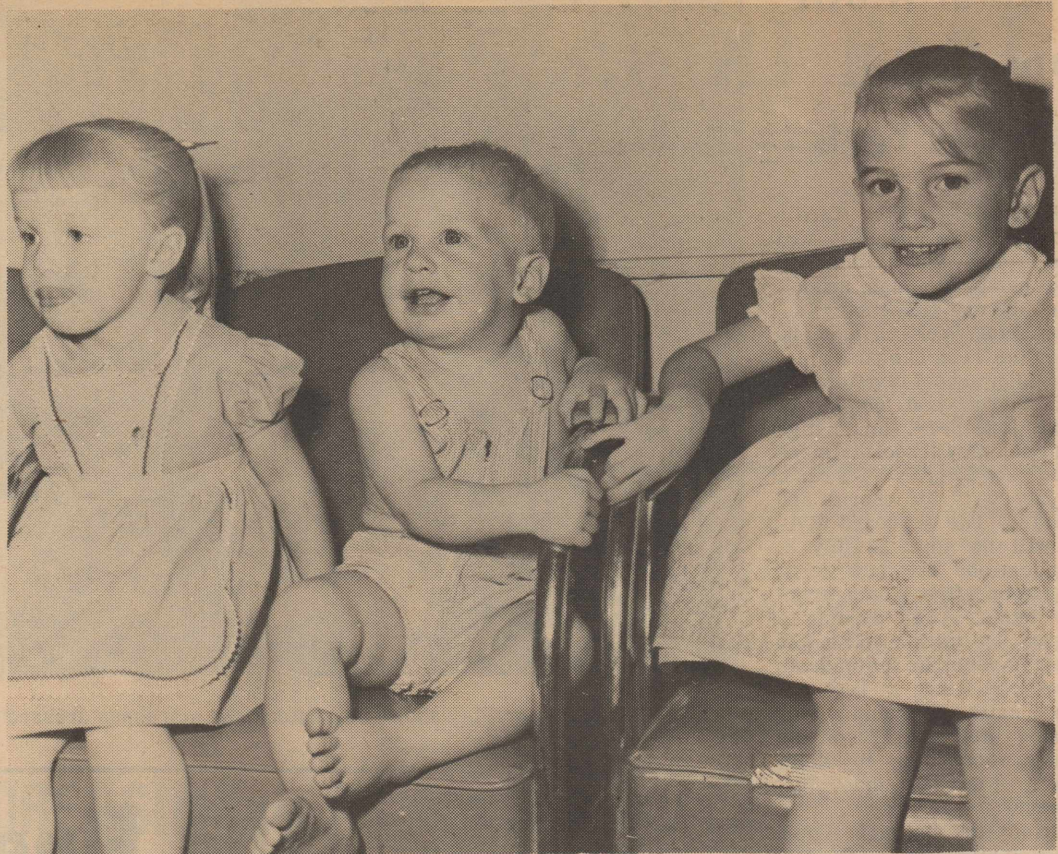
Make Trip
