I. C. Sharp, 52, a Hart area farmer, suffered burns from his waist to his shoulders when an explosion and fire ripped through a four-room renthouse on his farm 12 miles northeast of Hart Wednesday eve-

He was rushed to the Swisher County Hospital by his wife, then rushed by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital at Amarillo. He is in serious condition in the intensive care unit. He was said to be some improved as of Sunday.

An accumulation of butane gas was believed to have caused the explosion which occurred while Sharp was working in the unoccupied rent house near his farm home.




