This is an annual American Legion Boys' State government workshop in Austin, June 4 to 11.



Joe Rubalcaba served as president of the graduating class, which was sponsored by Mrs. Carol Grubaugh. David Gardner was class vice president, Betty Galyon was secretary and Konnie Bowden was treasurer of the class.

Mrs. Paul L. Kennedy presented awards to the outstanding graduates. Billy Farris was named the outstanding athlete and the outstanding student in agriculture. David Gardner, who won the American Legion Citizenship Award, was the outstanding bookkeeping student. Betty Galyon was the outstanding girl athlete, and Linda Cole was the outstanding student in typewriting--she also received scholarship from church-affiliated colleges. Kenneth Fincher, who received the \$200 PTA scholarship, was the outstanding student in social studies. Estella Rubalcaba won both an American Legion Citizenship Award and the school

The salutatorian, James Mitchell, viewed the high school diploma as a claim on the future. Speaking for the senior class he said that the graduates "are looking for an opportunity to develop our abilities to their fullest and use them wisely."

Hart Farmer Dies Of Burn

I. C. Sharp, 52, died Monday of burns suffered May 13 when an explosion and fire ripped through a four-room renthouse on his farm 12 miles northeast of Hart.

The explosion was apparently set off by a spark as Sharp was unplugging an electric refrigerator in the house a quarter of a mile from his home. Apparently gas had accumulated from either an open jet or a leak and was ignited by the electrical spark.

Funeral services were Monday, May 25, at 4 p.m. in the First Baptist Church in Plainview, under the direction of Wallace Funeral Home.

Dennis McLain, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. McLain, has received a track scholarship to South Plains College in Levelland.



Our eighth grade sponsor was Mrs. Wescott. This was the year Linda Cole and Jo Ann Clark joined our class.

President was Billy Joe Farris. Joe Rubalcaba was vicepresident; Jo Ann Clark, secretary-treasurer; and Thom Natal, reporter.

As we entered our high school days, we elected Mr. Blocker as our freshman sponsor with 26 enrolled. Billy Joe Farris was chosen Who's Who, and Betty Galyon and Billy Joe Farris were our Freshman Favorites.

Our sophomore year, we elected Mr. Tucker as our sponsor with 21 enrolled. Betty Galyon and Billy Joe Farris were our sophomore favorites and David Gardner was Who's Who.

Our junior year, we elected Mr. Cummings as our sponsor with 16 enrolled. Dennis McLain and Konnie Bowden were chosen class favorites. David Gardner and Kenneth Fincher were chosen Who's Who. Our officers were: president, James Mitchell; vice-president, Joe Rubalcaba; secretary-treasurer, Betty Galyon; reporter, Linda Cole.

Now we have completed our final year of high school. We elected Mrs. Grubaugh as our sponsor with 14 enrolled. Gilbert Guzman, who left us at the semester, joined the Tulia Hornets. Carol Mousner became Mrs. Junior Featherston, leaving a graduation class of 12. James Mitchell was chosen Who's Who and our class favorites were Dennis McLain and Konnie Bowden. Billy Joe Farris, James Mitchell, and Kenneth Fincher made all-district in football. In basketball, Billy Joe Farris, Kenneth Fincher, David Gardner and Betty Galyon made the all district teams. Dennis McLain and Billy Joe Farris went to regional in track. The menu included fried chicken, baked beans, potato salad, corn, relishes and hot rolls, followed with home-made ice cream.







Services Held For Grandson Of Residents

Curtis Dean Lilley, 20, a crop dusting employe of Dimmitt was killed about 10 p.m., Friday when his car hit a culvert on Highway 385 about 10 miles north of here.

Critically injured in the wreck was Jerry Leon Cox, 21, a laborer of near Claude.

Highway patrolmen said that after striking the culvert, the car overturned end over end. It was demolished. They said that Lilley was evidently the driver.

Cox was reported in critical condition Saturday at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt. He has a crushed chest, possible back injuries, fractured shoulder and a cerebral concussion.

Funeral services for Dean Lilley were conducted at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church at Dimmitt. The Rev. Murle Rogers, of Cactus, Tex., former pastor of Sunnyside, officiated, assisted by the Rev. M.A. Smith, pastor of Dimmitt's First Baptist Church.

at Amherst.
