Lanny Tucker has been hired as Farm Representative during his vacation period by the Farmers State Bank.

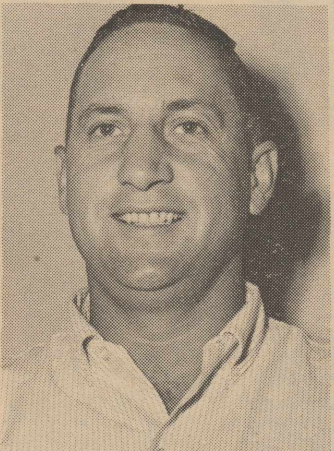
Tucker has been employed by the Hart schools for the past six years. He holds a B.S. and M.S. degree from Texas Tech in agriculture education.

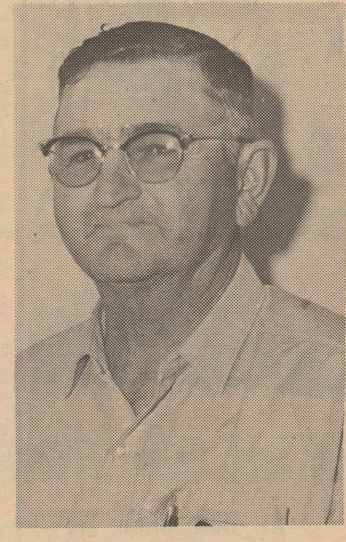
McLain, Rice Run-Off Up To Voters Saturday

Hart area voters will have a chance to go to the polls once again this Saturday to vote in run-off elections to finish the state primaries.

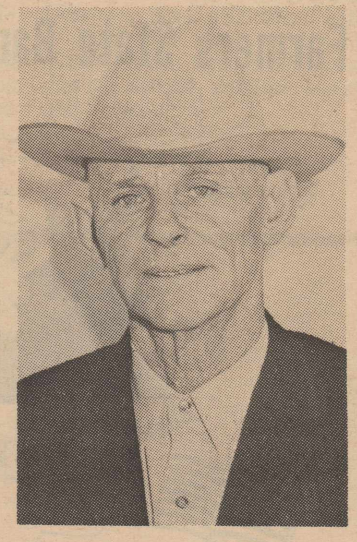
Hart voters will vote on one local race--Precinct 1 commissioner. John Rice will face incumbent E. I. McLain for the post. The two candidates are survivors of the May 2 election, which saw M. L. Aven and T. C. Ray eliminated from the race.

Democratic voters will vote on one state race. Robert Baker of Houston will face incumbent Joe Pool of Dallas for U. S. Representative At-Large.

George Bush of Houston will face Jack Cox in the Republican run-off for the right to challenge U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough in the November general election.

Rev. E.H. Phillips, Church Presented District Award

The Rev. E. H. Phillips, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Hart, was awarded the Town and Country Award last week in Amarillo ceremonies.

The Town and Country Commission was organized originally in the Northwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Churches in 1950. During the 13 years that awards have been presented, Rev. Phillips has received the award for the Plainview area some 11 times.

The First Methodist Church of Hart also received the district award for "Church of the Year." This award is based on the over-all program of the church, as that program pertains to the general conference participation, and on church facilities and

their relationship to local community activities.

The Hart church supports 11 missionary projects and provides facilities of the church for a community youth recreation program.

Rev. Jerrel Thorp of Estelline was elected conference chairman of the Town and Country Commission for a four-year term at the Amarillo meeting. Rev. Phillips was elected secretary of the commission, also for a four-year term. He has previously served as vice chairman of the organization for eight years.

Phillips has also been granted, previously, a scholarship allowing him to spend six weeks during the summer of 1957 at the University of Western Maryland studying rural sociology.

Rev. Phillips has been reappointed to the Hart church for the coming conference year.

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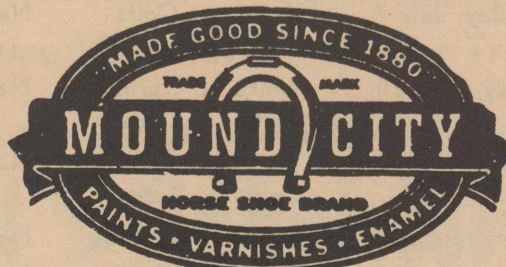

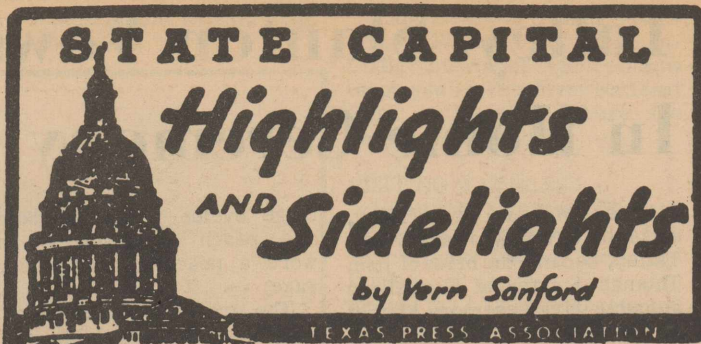
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AUSTIN, Tex.--There is a certain sadness around the capitol. An old friend is about

to depart.

That old friend is the majestic Walton building. For many years it was the home of the Game and Fish Commission (now part of the State Parks and Wildlife Commission). The building soon is to be demolished, by order of the 58th Legislature, to make way for a parking lot.

Just when the Walton building will be demolished is a decision due to be made by the State Building Commission, com-

posed of Gov. John Connally, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, and Charles Coates of Chappell Hill, chairman of the Board of Control.

SABINE WATERS PLENTIFUL--Surface water supplies of "excellent quality" can be developed in the Sabine River Basin of Texas and Louisiana, Texas Water Commission reported.

Average annual basin rainfall ranges from 40 inches in the northwest to more than 56 inches in the southeast. Annual runoff averages 13 inches, according to the TWC report.

Water was termed excellent in existing Lake Tawakoni, Greenville Reservoir, Lake Gladewater, Lake Cherokee and Murvaul Lake. Satisfactory to excellent quality water was found at the proposed Kilgore, Cherokee Reservoir No. 2 and Toledo Bend, Big Sandy, Rabbit, Carthage, Stateline, Tenaha and Bon Wier Reservoirs.

Additional studies of water quality at the proposed Lake

Fork Reservoir were recommended.

POLLUTION BY SALT WATER--At the request of the Railroad Commission Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is reconsidering his opinion that the Texas Water Pollution Control Board has jurisdiction and permit-granting power over oil-field waste disposal.

Oil operators told a special committee reviewing the opinion that much of the oil industry has not accepted the new Board's jurisdiction, and look instead to the Railroad Commission for disposal regulation.

Water conservationists support the Board's authority, claiming that the 1961 Legislature gave the Pollution Control Board jurisdiction over pollution by oil and salt water in Art. 7621d.

TRAVEL WRITERS' TOUR--Texas Tourist Development Agency is looking at West Texas for a repeat of its successful April tour for out-of-state travel writers.

On the first go-round, the agency led the writers from Dallas to San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Houston and several other cities in the eastern half of the state.

In November, they plan to take them to such favorites as Palo Duro Canyon, El Paso and Juarez, Big Bend National Park, Fort Davis and the Davis Mountains, Guadalupe Peak, Fort Clark, and Alamo Village at Brackettville.

Feature articles in metropolitan dailies and national magazines already are reflecting the favorable reaction to what the writers saw in Texas on the first tour. Agency spokesmen feel the result of the valuable free publicity should mean more tourist dollars in every Texans' pocket this summer.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 21

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING STORAGE, DISPOSAL AND
REMOVAL OF GARBAGE AND TRASH, PRESCRIBING
CHARGES TO BE COLLECTED FOR REMOVAL, AND
PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY
OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION I: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corp-
oration to sweep, throw or deposit any garbage, trash, dirt,
concrete, rocks, stagnant water or dead animals into, upon
or along any drain, gutter, alley, sidewalk, street or vacant
lot or upon any public or private premises within the corp-
orate limits of the City of Hart, Texas, or to permit such
garbage or trash to remain within the corporate limits of the
City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION II. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or
corporation owning, managing or operating, leasing or rent-
ing any premises or any other place where trash and/or gar-
bage accumulates to provide a suitable garbage can which
shall be placed at a point accessible to garbage and trash
collection vehicles.

SECTION III. The City of Hart, Texas, shall collect, or cause
to be collected the trash and/or garbage within the corporate
limits of the City of Hart at regular intervals, and the month-
ly charge for such service shall be the sum of \$2.00, to be
collected in like manner as the water and sewer charges.

SECTION IV. Waste from building operations, or resulting
from salvage or general cleanup of property will not be re-
moved by the City, but shall be removed by the building con-
tractor or owner at his own expense.

SECTION V. Any person, firm or corporation who violates,
refuses or fails to comply with any of the provisions of the
Ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon con-
viction shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding
\$100.00.

SECTION VI. The invalidity of any section, sub-section,
paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words of this
ordinance shall not invalidate any other part of this ordi-
nance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting
this ordinance that the provisions hereof are separable and
no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by rea-
son of the invalidity of any other provision.

SECTION VII. That by reason of the fact that the City
Commission considered the passage of this ordinance
necessary to protect the health, welfare and safety of the
residents of the City of Hart, Texas, it is hereby declared
to be an emergency measure, demanding that the rule re-
quiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting of
the City Commission be suspended, and that this ordinance
take effect immediately from and after its passage, and it
is so ordained.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 22

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE TAPPING OF SEWER LINES; PROVIDING FOR PERMITS TO TAP SEWER LINES; AND PROVIDING FOR FEE FOR SUCH PERMITS AND FIXING THE PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION I. It shall be unlawful for any person to tap any sewer line of the City of Hart, Texas, except as herein provided.

SECTION II. Before any person, firm or corporation shall be permitted to tap any of the sewer lines of the City of Hart, Texas, said person, firm or corporation shall make application to the City Secretary of the City of Hart, Texas, for a permit to tap said sewer line, stating the purpose for which such tap is to be made and the location of such proposed tap.

SECTION III. The City of Hart, Texas, shall make a charge of \$5.00 for issuing each permit.

SECTION IV. Permits to tap the sewer lines of the City of Hart shall be granted only to persons, firms or corporations approved by the City of Hart and no sewer line shall be tapped by any person, firm or corporation not so approved.

SECTION V. Any person, firm or corporation who violates, refuses or fails to comply with any of the provisions of the Ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding \$100.00.

SECTION VI. The fact that there is no adequate ordinance regulating the tapping of sewer facilities in the City of Hart, Texas, and because the City Commission considers the passage of this Ordinance necessary to protect the health, welfare and safety of the City of Hart, Texas, and its inhabitants, properly provide for the orderly installation of sewer taps within the City of Hart, Texas, it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure demanding that the rule requiring that ordinances be read at three several meetings be suspended and such rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall become effective upon its passage, approval and publication.

SNOW BALL IN THE SPRING- Snow Ball, a rare albino shetland mule born May 15, is dwarfed by her breeder, J. D. Rogers. Rogers has been breeding the unusual hybrid mules for two years now and has been rewarded with the rarest of them all--an albino cross between a paint shetland mare and a paint jack.

Rogers Raising Rare White Mule

Snow Ball, owned by J. D. Rogers, area farmer, is a most unusual mule.

Although white as fresh driven snow, no snow was in sight when this Snow Ball was born.

Being a mule is distinctive, but Snow Ball is a shetland mule--which is even more distinctive. To top off her other accomplishments, Snow Ball is an albino--completely white except for her pink nose and eyes. As an albino shetland mule, Snow Ball is probably the most unusual animal in the area.

Snow Ball is not the only unusual animal in the Rogers menagerie. Rogers also has a couple of spotted shetland mules--spotted being only slightly less unusual than albino, though not nearly so rare--and a six week old solid black shetland mule.

The farm also boasts an Apoloosa shetland--a cross between a shetland mare and an Apoloosa stallion.

Rogers, who enjoys training animals when he can find the time, also has a 20 month old Apoloosa stallion, Hi Fi Jr.,

on the farm. The stallion has been trained and can perform several tricks.

He also has a spotted jack, a spotted jenny and several shetlands on the farm.

The shetland mule is a hybrid, and, in almost all cases, is sterile. "I've never known any," Rogers said, "that reproduced their kind." Snow Ball weighed 38 pounds when she was one day old, and she looks a lot like a shetland with the head of a mule.

Rogers has been raising shetlands since 1954 and started the hybrid crossing to produce the shetland mule about two years ago.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 23

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE STORAGE AND HANDLING OF ANHYDROUS AMMONIA WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS; FORBIDDING THE ISSUANCE OF A BUILDING PERMIT FOR SUCH FACILITIES AND FIXING THE PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION I: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to install, maintain, own or operate additional storage and handling facilities for anhydrous ammonia within the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION II: No building permit shall be issued for the erection, construction or equipping of such a storage or handling facility for anhydrous ammonia by the City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION III: The invalidity of any section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other part of this ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting this ordinance that the provisions hereof are separable and no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

SECTION IV: Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$100.00. Each day that any person, firm or corporation shall continue to violate, or fail to comply with, a provision of this ordinance shall be a separate offense.

SECTION V: That by reason of the fact that the City Commission considered the passage of this ordinance necessary to protect the health, welfare and safety of the residents of the City of Hart, Texas, it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, demanding that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting of the City Commission be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect immediately from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.
