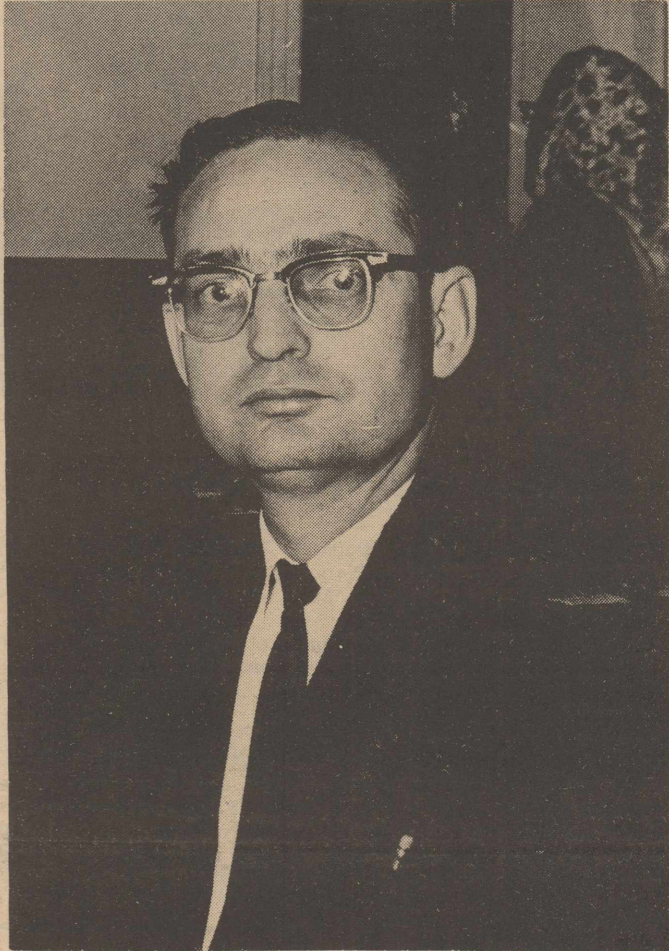

New High School Principal Hired

To Replace Atwood



OLD PRINCIPAL

The Hart School Board met in special session Tuesday for the express purpose of selecting a new high school principal from approximately 25 applicants to replace Malcolm Atwood, who recently resigned.

W. Andy Gardenhire of Memphis, Texas, was selected for the position. He will replace Atwood as Hart High School principal this fall.

Gardenhire is a graduate of Memphis High School, and he went to college at both Texas Technological College in Lubbock and West Texas State University at Canyon.

He received a Bachelor of Science degree from the Canyon school. He also holds a Master of Education degree from WTSU, with a special certificate in school administration.

The new principal is a former coach. His first coaching assignment was at Lakeview High School in Lakeview, Texas. He went from there to Quanah High School, where he remained four years.

He moved to Plainview High School as assistant coach in 1960.

In 1962, Gardenhire changed positions to become principal of the O'Donnell high school.

Mrs. Gardenhire was also employed, subject to placement. She has an English major with a minor in history.

She received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Wayland Baptist College in Plainview.

The Gardenhires have two daughters, the oldest in the 7th grade and the younger in the 3rd grade.

The family will move to Hart shortly after July 1, at which time he will assume the principal's duties.

In addition to the Gardenhires, Haydon Moore from Girard, Texas, was hired to coach at the school this coming year.

Moore received a Bachelor of Science degree from Texas Tech, where he majored in education and science. He also holds a Master of Education degree, and is currently working toward an administrative certificate.

He has five years working experience, starting at Dell City, Texas. He served two years as assistant coach at

San Angelo, and has been in Girard for the past two years.

His wife was also hired, subject to placement. Mrs. Moore has teaching fields of English and social studies. She did her college work at Duke University, N. Carolina.

The Moores have two daughters, a seven-year-old second grader and an 18-month-old child.

ASC Cotton Measurement

An announcement from the Castro County ASC Office points out that cotton and feed grain measurements have begun in the area.

The announcement points out that it is necessary that the farm operator, or a representative who is familiar with his farming operation and his intentions on the various programs, assist the reporter.

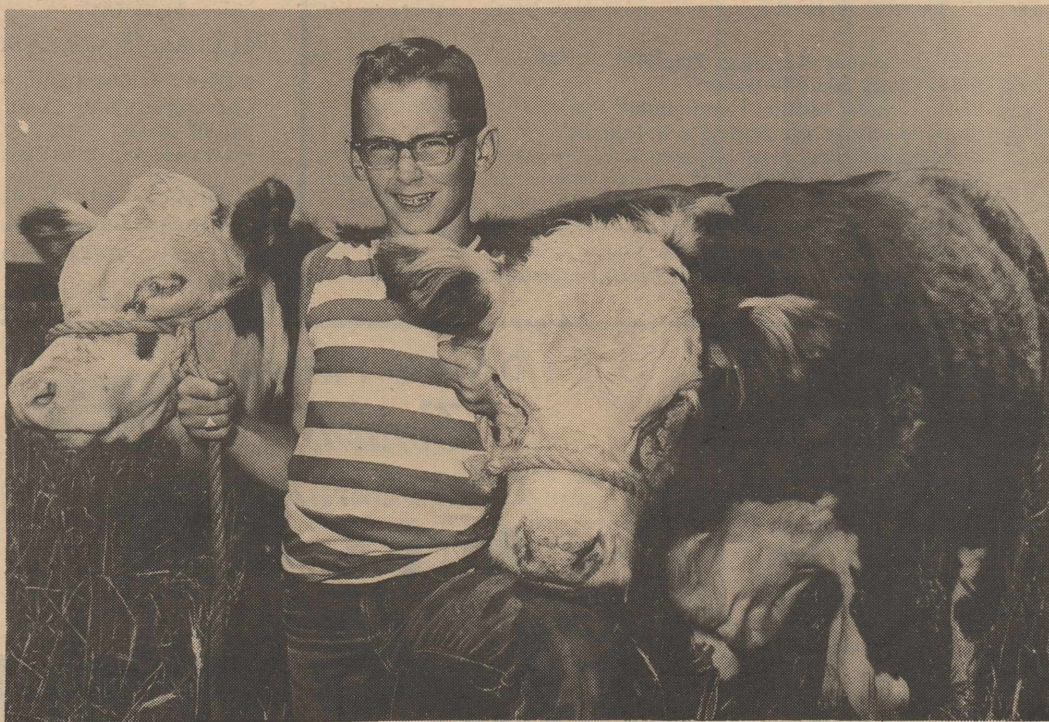
It is very important that the reporter measure your cotton on his first visit to the farm since we will probably not be in your vicinity again until the time to measure cotton destroyed.

When the reporter calls at your farm you should (1) show him all of the fields of cotton and call to his attention any blank spots or any other areas in the field that would be deductible. (2) Advise him which cotton plan you will choose—(a) Effective Allotment, (b) Export Acreage Allotment or (c) Domestic Allotment. (3) If you have signed an intention to participate in the feed grain program, show the reporter where the fields of diverted acres will be, where the feed grain fields are and advise him of the land use on all other acreage.

You may change your decision on the cotton plan you choose any time before September 1st, you may also change your designation of the diverted acres by calling at the County Office and paying for a visit to the farm to change the designation, or if an entire field that has already been measured is being changed for another entire field, the change can be made in the County Office without charge.

Irrespective of whether your farm is measured in June or on August 15th, the deadline date to dispose of excess cotton, feed grain or to designate additional diverted acres is September 1st.

REMEMBER THE ONLY BIG CHANGE, EXCESS COTTON, FEED GRAINS, AND THE DESIGNATION OF ADDITIONAL DIVERTED ACRES MUST BE TAKEN CARE OF BY SEPTEMBER 1ST, OR WITHIN 15 DAYS OF THE NOTICE OF OFFICIAL ACREAGE, WHICH-EVER IS LATER.

Boys Have LBJ Calves

The letter from Dale Malechek, superintendent of the LBJ Ranch, said:

"We do have some pretty good calves left for use in club work. Some of the best steer calves have some white in their backs, but if you did not object to this I think we can fix you up on a couple of good calves."

The boys did not object.
