LAWNMOWER ACCIDENT

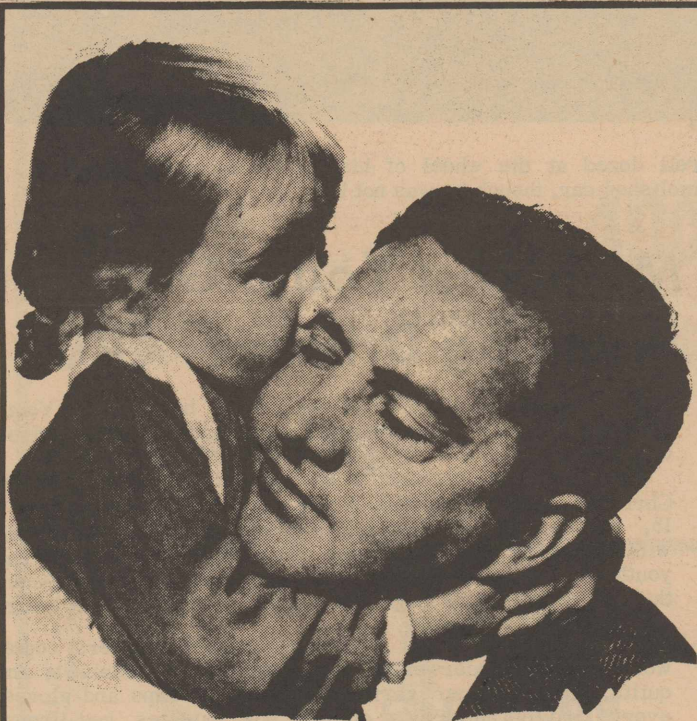

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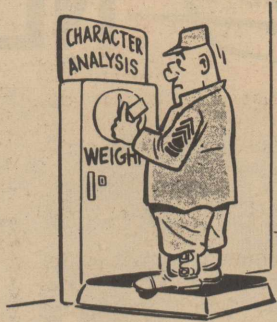

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Extra Caution Urged For July 4 Holiday Driving

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has described the traffic situation in Texas as "critical" at mid-year and appealed to all motorists to make the July 4 holiday weekend the turning point away from a two-year upward trend in fatal traffic accidents.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. announced that "Operation Motorcade" will be in effect from 12:01 a.m. Friday, July 3 through 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 5, in an effort to focus public attention on the added hazards of holiday road travel and at the same time bring about continued safety consciousness among all drivers. During this three-day period, the DPS estimates that 32 persons will be killed in Texas traffic.

As part of this program he said, additional patrolmen from the DPS License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection Services will join the regular Highway Patrol force for the 3-day holiday period.

Garrison added that numerous agencies, organizations and individuals will take part in "Operation Motorcade" in a coordinated attack on traffic accidents. For example, he said the Texas Safety Assn. will conduct a public information program stressing the need for courtesy and caution on a statewide basis and coordinate local safety council holiday safety emphasis programs.

The Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and the Texas Motor Transport Assn. will conduct a "Holiday Road Patrol" in which a fleet of 35 to 40 cars will be used over the state to assist stranded motorists and thus help to relieve highway patrolmen for more enforcement work.

The State Highway Dept. will conduct a continuing information and education program in-

structing drivers on freeway driving and the need for caution near construction areas.

In a mid-year summary of the traffic situation in Texas, Garrison stressed that fatal accidents on the streets and highways are up about 14 per cent over 1963 -- which was the worst year in history for Texas traffic with 2,729 fatalities.

"If this trend continues through the rest of the year, traffic deaths will go over 3,000," he said. "We must break this trend toward ever-increasing fatal accidents which seems to have set in almost exactly two years ago. To do so, we must have public awareness of this dangerous situation and the full cooperation of everyone in saving lives and cutting down on injuries and economic loss.

Garrison said a study of the present situation shows that the increase in fatal accidents has been in the cities and towns as well as on the open highways. A recent report shows that 445 fatal crashes occurred in cities and towns as well in cities and towns so far this year, compared to 363 for the same period last year. The same report shows that a total of 524 rural fatal accidents have occurred this year, compared to 480 for the same period in 1963.

The Public Safety Director pointed out that nearly half of the fatal accidents that occur on rural highways involved either running off the roadway or head-on collision. To guard against these most frequent types of fatal mishaps, he offered these suggestions:

1. Be sure that your equipment--tires, steering gear, brakes, lights, windshield wipers, etc.--are in proper working order at all times.
2. Be sure the driver is in good physical and mental condition whenever he takes on the

exacting job of driving a motor vehicle.

3. Always be on the alert for unexpected actions of other drivers and for other hazards, such as slick pavement, pedestrians, construction areas, etc.

4. Reduce speed before entering curves, not after, when it may be too late to retain control.

5. Avoid improper passing, one of the major factors involved in head-on collisions. This includes such things as passing with insufficient clearance, and passing in no-passing zones such as on hills and curves.

6. Adjust speed to existing conditions and circumstances, regardless of the posted limits.

The Texas Safety Association has also issued an "Accidental Death Alert" for the three-day July 4th holiday weekend, beginning at 12:01 Friday and ending at 11:59 p.m. Sunday.

J.O. Musick, TSA General Manager, urged Independence Day celebrants to put safety first in all their activities.

"Whether you are driving on the highway, spending the weekend at the lake or just relaxing at home, being extra careful can make your holiday a time to remember instead of a time of tragedy," he said.

The safety director reminded citizens that accidents normally increase on a holiday, and holiday weekends are especially hazardous.

TIPS FOR BIKE RIDERS

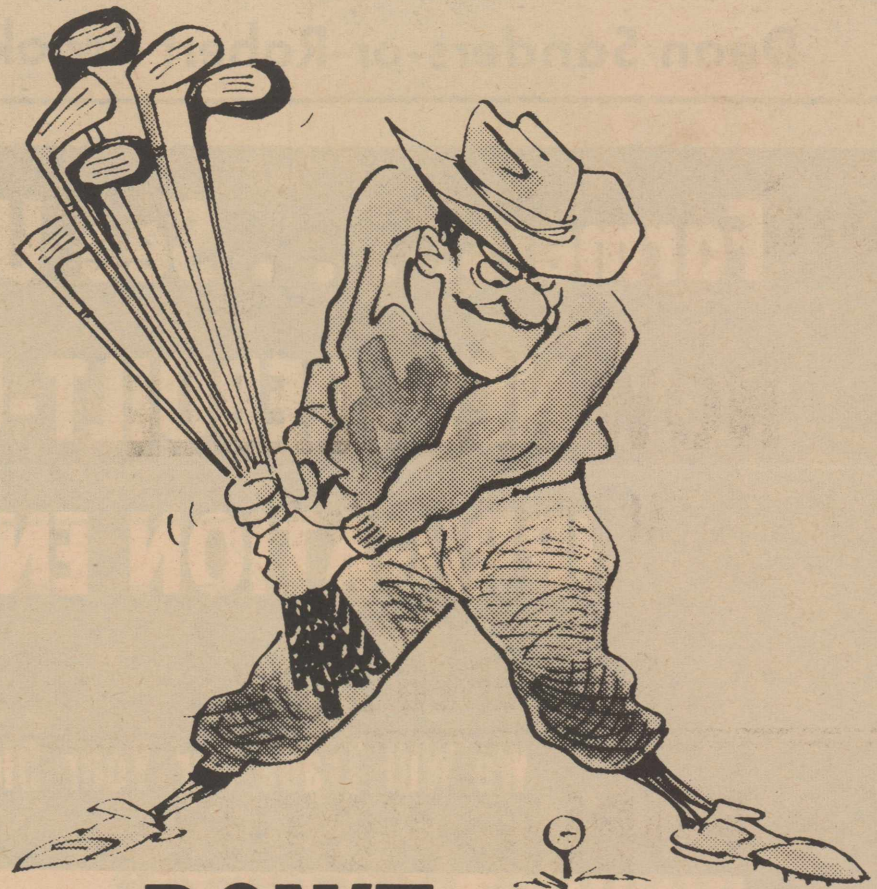

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Agronomist Urges Sidedressing

Cotton is off to a good start this season in most areas. This part week of warmer weather and higher soil temperatures has caused cotton to start growing faster. The question comes up as to whether to sidedress.

With cotton off to a good start and a good stand, yield potential on cotton looks good. This says that possibility of profit from fertilizer looks good.

First, lets look at nitrogen. If cotton follows grain sorghum, nitrogen is definitely needed. A good rate is 80 pounds ammonia per acre on heavier textured soils. If cotton follows cotton or wheat, 50 to 60 pounds ammonia should be sufficient on heavier textured soils. On light textured sandy loam soils, increase these rates by 20 pounds nitrogen.

Phosphorus can still be applied. The most convenient way to apply it now is as a liquid with a dual applicator. Sidedressed phosphorus may not be as beneficial as pre-plant but there is still time for

response. It should be applied soon, however. A suggested rate of phosphorus for cotton is 150 to 200 pounds 7-21-0 or 8-18-0-3 per acre on clay loam soils and 200 to 250 pounds 7-21-0 or 8-18-0-3 per acre on sandy loam soils.

When sidedressing cotton, be careful not to prune roots. Root growth on cotton is good so far this year. It would be desirable to apply fertilizer, particularly phosphorus, just ahead of new root growth. Applying it on 20 inch centers is still satisfactory for most cotton but it may be necessary or more convenient to place it in the middles.

Autos And Trips Are Expensive

Summer--the season of vacations and vacation expenses--has arrived. Automobile trips to various parts of the country seem to be an integral part of the vacation season.

With many local families planning vacations, the problem of just how much the trip will cost--for overnight lodging, for food and for gasoline--is entering the figuring stage now.

The American Automobile Association has produced some estimates which may have application to the frantic economic planning of vacations.

On the basis of AAA estimates, Castro County residents should be able to get along comfortably on a daily budget of \$31 for two people. This figure, however, will take care only of necessary expenses.

The AAA estimate is based on 300 miles of daily travel, with the car averaging 15 miles to the gallon of gas.

This theoretical budget allows \$10.50 for meals and snacks, \$2.50 for tips and miscellaneous items, \$11 for lodging and \$7 for gas and oil.

Additional money spent for amusements, recreation, souvenirs and the like will be determined by personal preferences, tastes and means.

After the expense of a particular vacation trip has been taken care of, the expenses of owning and operating a car for the rest of the year remain.

Again the AAA has an estimate of the cost. The figures indicate that the average car in the middle-price range, driven 10,000 miles a year, costs \$1,162 annually--or 11.6 cents per mile.

The AAA study shows further that a car costs \$2.17 a day, or \$792 a year, even if it just stays in the garage.

The largest part of this fixed figure is depreciation--some \$621 a year.

Operating costs--for gas, oil, tires, and maintenance--amounts to 3.7 cents a mile, or \$370 for the 10,000 miles of driving.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 24

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DIGGING OF CESSPOOLS ON PROPERTY WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS, WHICH IS ACCESSIBLE TO THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM, FORBIDDING THE PUMPING OF EXISTING CESSPOOLS AND SEPTIC TANKS ONTO THE GROUND, AND FIXING THE PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION I: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to dig a cesspool or install a septic tank on any property within the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas, to which the sanitary sewer system of the City of Hart is available.

SECTION II: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to empty the contents of any cesspool and/or septic tank on to the ground within the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION III: Any person, firm or corporation who violates, refuses or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding \$100.00.

SECTION IV: The invalidity of any section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words of this ordinance, shall not invalidate any other part of this ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting this ordinance that the provisions hereof are separable and no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

SECTION V: That by reason of the fact that the City Commission considered the passage of this ordinance necessary to protect the health, welfare and safety of the residents of the City of Hart, Texas, it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, demanding that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting of the City Commission be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect immediately from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.
