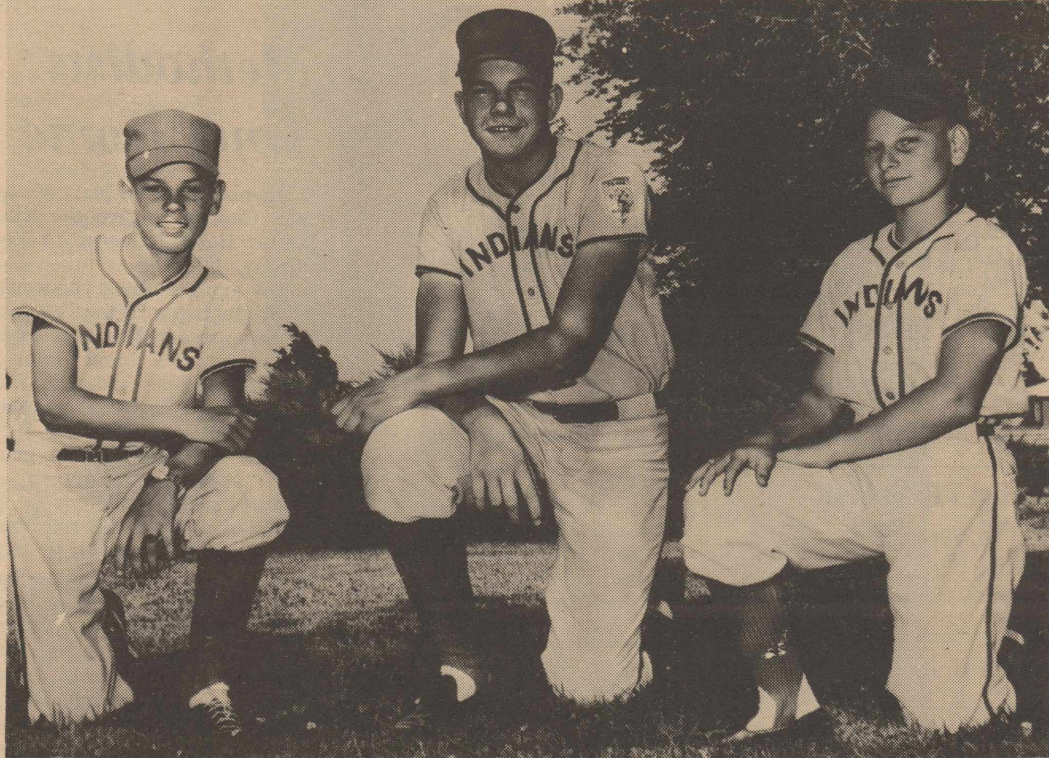

Sgt. Bostick Home After Four Years

Sgt. Rex Bostick has served in the army for a long time now.

He has many decorations, earned and won during the years he has spent in the army--the air medal, joint commendation medal, good conduct medal, Korean medal, U.N. service medal, army occupation medal, national defense medal, armed expeditionary medal. But one of the more recent and noticeable decorations is his attractive wife.

School Building To Be Finished By August 1

The new junior high-high school complex being constructed in east Hart is nearing completion.

The \$300,000 plus brick structure is being added to the Hart school system as the result of a \$360,000 bond issue passed by Hart voters a year ago May.

The new facilities, which include a new gymnasium, are windowless and completely air-conditioned.

Originally scheduled to be completed in June, the new structure should be ready for occupancy by August 1, according to Paul Kennedy, school superintendent.

He pointed out that the brick building is "absolutely fire-proof."

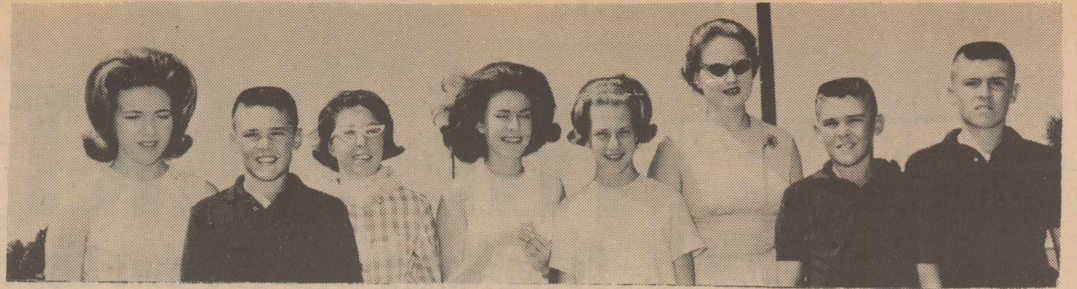

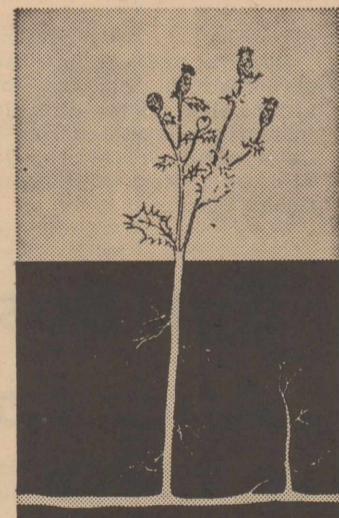

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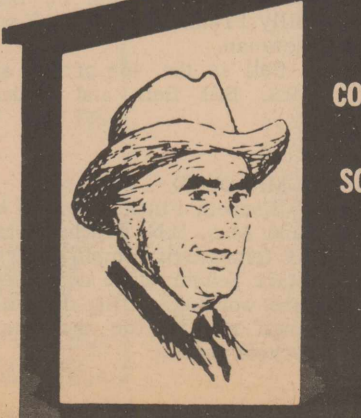

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

SAVORY POT ROAST
 3 lbs. chuck roast
 1/3 c. grape jelly
 2 large onions (cut in 1/4 in. slices)
 6 whole black peppers
 2 bay leaves, (crushed)
 2 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. ginger
 1/2 tsp. allspice
 1/4 tsp. pepper
 1/3 c. vinegar
 1/4 c. water
 1 tsp. Kitchen Bouquet

Trim excess fat from meat; fry lightly in pressure pan to make 2 tablespoons of fat.

Brown meat slowly of all sides in the hot fat. Allow 10 to 20 minutes for browning. Place on rack in pressure cooker spread with grape jelly; top with onion slices; sprinkle with seasonings.

Combine remaining ingredients and pour over meat. Cook at 15 pounds pressure 45 minutes. Let pressure go down normally.

Remove meat to hot platter and thicken juice to make gravy.

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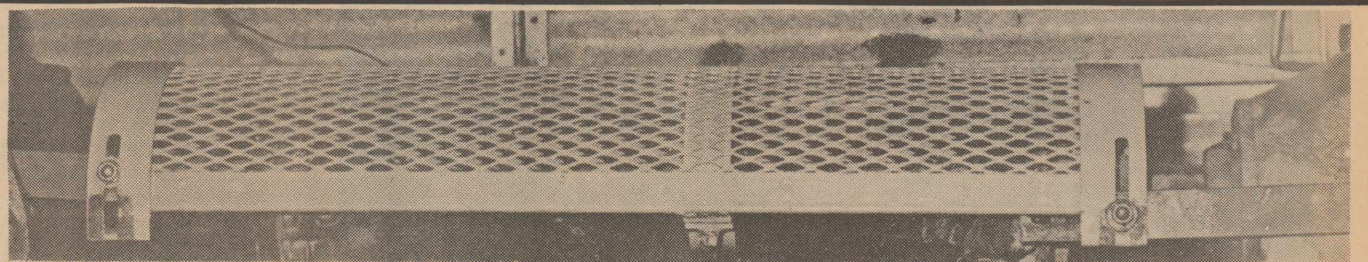

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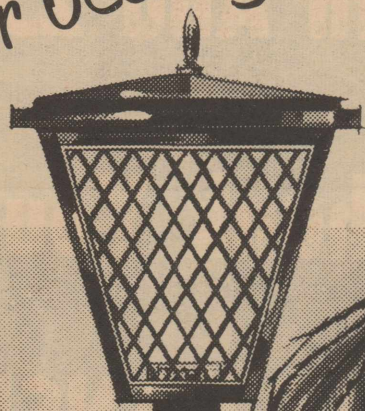
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
