The new facilities, which include a new gymnasium, are windowless and completely airconditioned.

Originally scheduled to be completed in June, the new structure should be ready for occupancy by August 1, accord-ing to Paul Kennedy, school superintendent.

Kennedy said, "They're putt-ing the finishing touches on the building now--the paint and powder, so to speak."

The new junior-senior high and gymnasium facilities will be used for the first time when school opens here in September.

The new building has 15 classrooms--study hall, library, science labs -- and will, according to the superintendent accommodate 300 students if needed.

The new junior high-high school complex being com-structed in east Hart is near-the first year. He went on to add that it would hold "several" students with ease and convenience.

He pointed out that the brick building is "absolutely fire-proof."

Speaking to Hart students about the building at groundbreaking ceremonies last Oct-ober, Kennedy remarked, "We hope it will give you a better chance for an education."


Among the family visitors was another of the A.R. Bosticks' sons, Cecil, and his family.



SAVORY POT ROAST 3 lbs. chuck roast 1/3 c. grape jelly 2 large onions (cut in 1/4 in. slices) 6 whole black peppers 2 bay leaves, (crushed) 2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. ginger 1/2 tsp. allspice 1/4 tsp. pepper 1/3 c. vinegar 1/4 c. water 1 tsp. Kitchen Bouquet Trim excess fat from meat; fry lightly in pressure pan to make 2 tablespoons of fat. Brown meat slowly of all sides in the hot fat. Allow: 10 to 20 minutes for browning. Place on rack in pressure cooker spread with grape jelly; top with onion slices; sprinkle with

Combine remaining ingredients and pour over meat. Cook at 15 pounds pressure 45 munutes. Let pressure go down normally.

Remove meat to hot platter and thicken juice to make gravy.
